## LECTURE ON JAVA

Sequah Speaks on its Government and Customs.

A large audience attended the above lecture in the armory hall on Saturday evening. The lecturer dwelt for two hours upon the subject of Java—its people, its mode of government, its railways, tramways, irrigation, religion of the people, civil and military organizations, etc. He explained to his audience that in order to deal fully with his subject he must refer his mind back to his arrival in Java, and in this way review his tour of that country and relate to them the things he saw and the impression made upon him by such. He then went on to speak of the capital town, Batavia and its harbor, taking his audience with him from the landing at Tanjeon Priok, from where the railroad cars take us eight miles to the town of Batavia itself. Arriving here we who are not residents of Java have, within three days of arrival, to report ourselves to the police department, that is, if we desire to remain longer than three days. We then are granted a permit to remain in the colony for six months when, if we wish to become permanent residents, we must obtain a further permit from the authorities to do so. Upon becoming permanent residents the lecturer stated we must join the volunteer corps of the country and agree to protect the government if called upon. At the same time the lecturer stated we should, although acting as volunteers in a foreign colony, not relinquish our rights as subjects of our own country's government.

The lecturer then went on to explain the mode of government from the governor-general down through residents, (lieutenant-governors), assistant residents, judicial departments, chiefs and magistrates of various districts, supervision of Javanese, Malays, Chinese and Europeans separately, safeguards against uprisings, mode of irrigation, the products of the colony and how disposed of by the producers. Every subject was dealt with in a masterly manner.

The large audience were thoroughly interested. Some, upon being invited, put questions to the lecturer and received courteous replies. Sequah concluded his interesting lecture by exhibiting a few curios brought by him from Java. He appeared in Burmese costume which was very pretty. He thanked the audience for their kind attendance and promised future lectures upon different countries. Sequah lectures to-night on his medicines.

## COAL STEALER CAUGHT.

He Had Been Helping Himself to the Fuel for Selling.

A considerable quantity of coal has been missing during the past three months from the coal pile of Allen & Robinson on the city front. Although a watch was kept for thieves no clew could be got as to the perpetrators of the deceptions. Officer Kaapa was detailed on the case, and he in turn employed two others. On Friday night last, about 9 o'clock, a Chinaman named Kwong Yau, who had seen the inside of Oahu Prison at frequent intervals, was seen skulking down to the coal pile, taking a circuitous route thereto. The sleuths made a closer approach, but were seen by the man, who was in the act of tying the top of a bag filled with coal. The thief skipped and, although a chase was made, escaped. He was later found and identified at his home in Chinatown.

In the District Court this morning Kwong Yau was found guilty of larceny in the fourth degree and sentenced to six months' imprisonment at hard labor. Several Chinese laundrymen testified that they had purchased small quantities of coal from the defendant.

PALM H CASYS A HOROS OFF.

Illinois Senator Gives His Opinion  
Regarding Coming Issues

In reply to questions propounded  
by a local paper, Senator Palmer, of  
Illinois, says:

The next national democratic  
convention will not declare in favor  
of the free and unlimited coinage  
of silver, because if it did, so it would  
not represent the democratic party.  
The democratic party is committed  
to the coinage of dollars of equal  
acceptability and value in the mar-  
kets and in payment of debts, and  
no democrat believes that the free  
and unlimited coinage of silver upon  
the present or any other suggested  
ratio would produce silver dollars  
of equal acceptability and value  
with the gold dollar of 25 8-10  
grains. There are parties which  
favor the free and unlimited coinage  
of silver dollars of 412½ grains of  
standard silver, without any expec-  
tation that the dollar they propose  
will be of equal acceptability and  
value with the gold dollar. They  
look to a silver standard of value as  
the logical and necessary result of  
the free and unlimited coinage of  
silver on the present ratio. But the  
democratic party will stand on the  
Chicago platform, which demands  
the equality in value and usefulness  
of the dollars of gold and silver.  
Every effort should be made to  
bring silver coinage up to the pre-  
sent standard of values, but the pre-  
sent standard of values should not  
be lowered to meet the reduced  
value and acceptability of the silver  
coinage, which would be the neces-  
sary effect of the free coinage of sil-  
ver upon the present or any other  
ratio which has been suggested.

Before the campaign of 1896 the  
country will again become prosper-  
ous as the result of its own resources  
and the energy of our people, so  
that neither the monetary nor tariff  
question will be of controlling im-  
portance.

The folly of the free silver craze  
will be manifest when prosperity  
returns. Before that time the tariff  
of 1894, which is at once the most  
just and reasonable of all legislation  
of its class which had marked our  
history, will have demonstrated its  
value. The republicans of the fifty-  
fourth congress rely upon the cer-  
tainty that Mr. Cleveland will re-  
fuse to approve any measure which  
seems to look to a return to the  
principles of protection and will  
demonstrate that the controlling is-  
sues in 1896 will be based upon the  
policy of annexation. The republic-  
an party will attempt to annex the  
Sandwich Islands and Cuba, and I  
predict that in 1896 the country  
will be prosperous, the monetary

as of small consequence, and the  
political issues forced upon the  
country will be a great navy and an  
expensive jingoism supported by  
turgid appeals to American patri-  
otism.

Members of the Knights of Pythias of the Catholic faith in these islands will see in this paper news of a stand being taken by their brethren, in a double sense, in the State of Indiana, and that with some prospect of overcoming the prohibition.

There is a rumor on Maui, which has been heard in Honolulu, to the effect that Mr. Thurston has returned from Washington with the object of effecting a compromise with the royalists. There is at least a strong suspicion afloat that Mr. Thurston as well as others have come to the conclusion that a military government cannot be a permanency.

Senator Palmer's horoscope of the political issues of 1896 will be found in this issue. It is intensely interesting to the people of these islands, as indicating that the annexation issue to be pressed forward by the Republicans is, so far as Mr. Palmer's foresight goes, about all they have to rely upon. But, suppose the Democrats assent to the annexation proposition on terms agreeable to the people of these islands, where will the Republicans go?

Maui society has long been famous for strange freaks. One of the latest is described by the Advertiser correspondent. It is a dinner without anything but delf, the entertainment consisting in the guessing of what the plates should have contained. It may be useful practice, however, to hold Barmecide feasts, in anticipation of eventualities that may accrue upon changes in the American sugar tariff—or, mayhap, Japanese annexation.

**Arrival of the Gaelic**

The O. & O. S. S. Gaelic, Pearne commander, arrived to-day from Yokohama and Hongkong. The steamer was placed in quarantine, no one being allowed on board. Only cabin passengers were allowed to land. The Chinese and Japanese immigrants were taken in scows to the quarantine station. The Gaelic brought a large quantity of freight, besides nine cabin passengers. She will leave for San Francisco at 7 o'clock to-morrow morning.

**China Concedes the Main Demands of Japan.**

A Japanese who is connected with the information bureau of his home government is a through passenger on the S. S. Gaelic. In an interview with the editor of a local Chinese paper he stated that peace negotiations between China and Japan had been completed. China cedes to Japan the island of Formosa, a province in the southern part of the Yalu and 200,000,000 silver taels.

A Chinese merchant also received a letter from a fellow countryman in China corroborating the above report, with the exception that the money is in yen.

The Japanese Hawaii Shippo printed this afternoon contains the same intelligence.

**Timely Topics**

April 13, 1895.

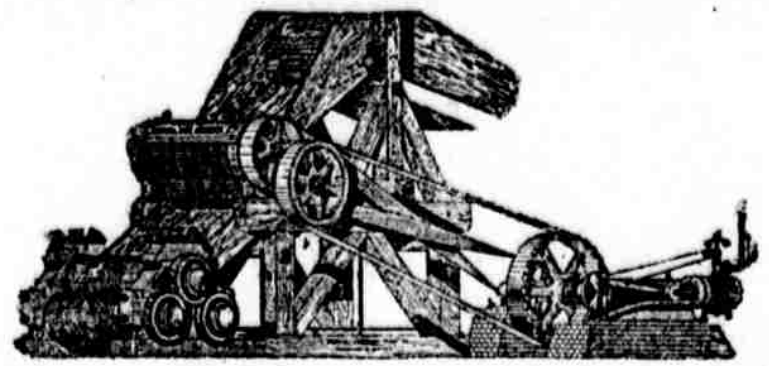

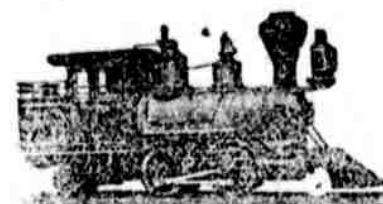
