SAN FRANCISCO, April 22

(Per S. S. Coptic.)

UNITED STATES

A small rocky islet on the Mendocino, Cal., coast is reported to have burst out in a volcanic eruption.

Senator Cullom of Illinois is to visit the Pacific Coast.

The fight between Corbett and Fitzsimmons is lost to Florida. It may come off in New Orleans.

The United States defender of the America cup will have her first race July 4, when she will race the yacht Vigilant in the Larchmont Yacht Club's regatta.

Nine new Democratic morning papers are to be started in Chicago.

Harrison is predicted from Indianapolis to be the bim-tallic candidate for President.

The U. S. S. Concord has arrived at Nagasaki, the Castine at Zanzibar and the Olympia at San Diego.

The Nicaragua Canal Commission is arriving at Washington to organize.

Manuel Riveroll is in jail for the theft of a gold brick valued at \$12,800 owned by the Ybarra Gold Mining Company.

Paul Schulze is short half a million dollars in his accounts with the Northern Pacific Railway.

Citizen of Oregon are moving to make a suitable present to the battleship Oregon in recognition of the name.

Russell Sage and Jay Gould's estate are defendants in a suit of the Soldier's Home of St. Louis, to compel an accounting for the proceeds of 29,982 shares of Kansas Pacific consolidated bonds valued with interest at \$11,000,000.

The fastest railroad time ever made in America was by a special newspaper train between Philadelphia and Atlantic City. It was done in 46 minutes, the distance being 58 3-10 miles, and the average speed was 76 1/2 miles an hour.

Mrs. Parnell, mother of the late Irish agitator, is seriously ill at her home in New Jersey.

Alonzo Snyder, the collector of the aristocratic Second Baptist Church of Chicago, is a defaulter in several thousand dollars of church funds. He is 60 years old and is indifferent to his disgrace. His books had not been balanced for eight years.

A Houston, Texas, dispatch says more than 1200 negroes from the United States are kept in Mexico by armed guards, and worked under a system of slavery worse than Russian exiles endure in Siberia.

Alonzo J. Whitman, an alleged forger from San Francisco, is under remandment in New York.

Collis P. Huntington, the venerable president of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company, appeared before United States Commissioner Shields at New York on the 22d inst., to answer the charge of violating the interstate commerce law by issuing a pass to Frank M. Stone, a San Francisco lawyer. He was allowed to go on his own recognizance.

From a Mexican Jail.

Johnson H. Manley, a locomotive engineer who recently escaped from the coal mines about eight miles from Mexico, has arrived at Houston, Texas, with a strange story. Years ago he went to Mexico as an engineer on the International railroad. Seven years ago his train, backing out of a siding, ran over and killed a Mexican peon. The

whole train crew were arrested and thrown into prison, and without a trial sent to work in the mines. One night last January a guard got drunk and Mauley knocked his head in with a chunk of coal. He called his comrades—Bill Hughes, fireman; Billy Clark, conductor, and Frank Goodwin and Billy Stillwell, brakemen—and they knocked another guard in the head and threw his body down the shaft. They took the pistols of the dead guards and struck for the mountains. They traveled for three months, avoiding villages and railways. Two years ago Manley saw John Reynolds, a 16 year old boy from Syracuse, N.Y., shot for having killed a Mexican in self-defense. Some of the prisoners in the mine had been confined for twenty years, and none of them ever had the semblance of a trial. Manley says the treatment accorded the prisoners is worse than in Siberia.

EUROPE.

A true bill has been rendered against Oscar Wilde.

Right Hon. Arthur W. Peel, ex-Speaker of the House of Commons, has been created a Viscount.

Italy has been informed that Venezuela has agreed to pay \$100,000 for the loss sustained by Italians in the late civil war in Venezuela.

Sir Robert Hamilton, recently Governor of Tasmania, is dead. He has a Crimean record, was a supporter of Gladstone's home rule policy, a native of Shetland, Scotland, and 59 years of age.

Dr. Frederick William Farrar, archdeacon of Westminster, has been appointed Dean of Canterbury. He is author of "The Life of Christ," and in the United States is one of the most popular of English divines.

OTHER LANDS.

A special to the New York World from Caracas says steps have been taken to bring about an alliance of all the Latin-American countries against European aggression.

A local revolt has broken out in Santiago del Terrestre, the central province of the Argentine Republic. Governor Le Gar has fled from the capital.

Minister Costigan, of Marine and Fisheries, announced in the Canadian House of Commons that the Government had been promised aid by the Imperial Government toward securing the award of \$425,000, agreed upon as the proper amount to be paid by the United States as a compensation to British Columbia sealers.

There is to be a monster Orange celebration at Victoria, B. C., on July 12.

The Guatemala Assembly has approved the settlement with Mexico, and the Mexican Senate will take the matter up this week.

The Indian Frontier.

Sir Robert Low, commander of the British expedition against Umr Khan, has confirmed the report that Chitral was relieved by Col. Kelly. Gen. Calacaci's flying column has reached Dir, and the main body is following rapidly. A sensation has been caused in military and other circles by the discovery by Sir Robert Low at Miankalai of a letter to Umr Khan from a Bombay firm offering to supply him with every kind of modern weapon and enclosing photographs of quick-firing guns.

THE COPTIC ARRIVES.

She is a Large Ocean Liner—Replaces the Oceanic.

The Occidental & Oriental steamship Coptic, H. St. G. Lindsay commander, arrived off port at 1 o'clock this morning from San Francisco and came into port at 8 o'clock. Purser Tuttle reports fine weather the entire trip. She report two European steerage passengers for Honolulu and twenty cabin for Yokohama and Hongkong.

The Coptic is a handsome boat. She was built in Belfast in 1881 by Harland & Wolff. Following are her dimensions: Length 430 feet, beam 42 feet, depth 34 feet, draught 24 feet. Her tonnage is 4448 gross and 2857 net. She is not so long as the China by 10 feet. The China's gross tonnage is 4940, and net tonnage 2401. This is the first visit of the Coptic to Honolulu. Only privileged characters were allowed on board during the vessel's stay in port, and but few were permitted to inspect her. The Coptic will leave for Yokohama and Hongkong at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

The S. S. Oceanic, whose place the Coptic has taken, left San Francisco on Feb. 12 for Hongkong and from there goes to England for thorough refitting and overhauling.

Third Deserter Caught.

Two natives accompanied by a police officer arrived at the Police Station yesterday afternoon in charge of Spunmeyer, the last of the deserters from the German bark J. C. Glade. The sailor was caught at Kaneohe, Koolau, whither he had wandered from town. The men who apprehended Spunmeyer, not being connected with the Government service, received the \$20 reward in full, whereas if an officer had caught him he would have received only one-half the reward. The other two deserters belonging to the same ship were caught at Kakaako on Friday night. With the men who brought Spunmeyer in was another sailor, a deserter from the bark T. F. Oakes, which has departed for New York.

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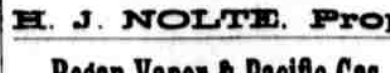

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A Discovery

EDITOR BULLETIN:—

Allow me through the medium of your columns to call the attention of those interested in scenic beauty to a locality on this island which hitherto has not, I believe, received the attention that it deserves. I refer to the Kolekole Pass, commonly known as "The Gaps," a mountain passage leading from the tableland to the foot of the Waianae ranges. The panorama that bursts upon the traveler upon reaching the summit I unhesitatingly pronounce as superior even to that of the Nuuanu Pali. No lover of landscape can fail to be enchanted with the kaleidoscopic variety of views that the everlasting turns of the trail cause to be presented to his eye. The effect of light and shade toward evening, and more especially when the vertical rays of the setting sun strike the overhanging clouds that encircle the peaks as with a halo is something so beautiful as to remain forever engraved upon a mind at all impressionable.

For those simply in search of the beauties of nature the best plan would be, in my opinion, to approach the pass from the Leilehua ranch and, having left their horses at one of the small farms situated in a gulch at the base of the mountains, to traverse the pass on foot. If you bring your horse he is apt to claim too much of your attention, the climb being a very tortuous and somewhat laborious one. There are no public houses of accommodation for the traveler, but Louis Warren, the enterprising and energetic manager of the Mikilua ranch, and his amiable spouse, dispense true Hawaiian hospitality in a manner that makes you feel at once at your perfect ease. The otherwise ubiquitous mosquito is here conspicuous by his absence. On the last occasion I slept capitally in an unprotected bed without hearing or feeling one single specimen of this pest.

I have thought this matter worthy of some little attention, for the reason that I have met quite a number of kamaainas, who are barely aware of the existence of this pass, and because I have never seen it depicted on canvas, photographs or in type. Here is a gratuitous tip to our local artists, whether of the brush or camera.

TACTICS UP TO DATE.

Exhibition of Maneuvers by the Philadelphia's Crew.

The usual weekly shore drill of the crew of the U. S. flagship Philadelphia took place this morning at the grounds of the Kamehameha School, Palama, and was witnessed by a large number of ladies and gentlemen, including Prince Joseph of Battenburg (the brother of Prince Henry who married the Princess Beatrice, daughter of Queen Victoria), who is at present paying a visit to the Paradise of the Pacific capital. The battalion landed from the big white cruiser about 8 a. m., and arrived at the grounds at 9 o'clock. After a short rest the maneuvers were commenced by a series of riot drill movements in quick time. These were followed by various marching movements introducing formations in fronts of fours, company and column, and all of which were executed with remarkable precision and unison of action. Lieut. R. R. Ingersoll, who had command of the battalion, and of whom it may be said, *en passant*, is an "up-to-date" tactician, gave the necessary orders for an attack and the whole detail of a hard-fought battle was gone through with, the "charges" showing the good spirit with which the officers and men entered into the movement, and much to the pleasure of the spectators. A short rest ensued, after the bloodless battle, during which Prince Joseph found opportunity to highly compliment Lieutenant Ingersoll upon the ability shown in the compliance with the many complex orders given, reflecting very creditably upon both officers and men. A bayonet drill and series of battalion movements closed the exercises, after which the battalion "marched past" the Prince and Col. Townsend, who was attending him, and then came into town, returning on board at 11:30. The drill was a very creditable showing by the "jack tars" of their ability to meander like veterans through the mazes of the military movements, and was the occasion of presenting to the spectators an exhaustive exhibition of "tactics up to date."

The same old cry of "No Water" is again heard in tone of voice as loud and as fierce as ever. But with the new pumping station almost completed the complaints against the Water Works Department will soon be a thing in forgotten history. It looks just now as though the government is doing everything in its power to alleviate the misery and reduce the annoyance which naturally ensues through lack of sufficient water with which to make a cocktail.

Here are some figures over which you may ponder if you are interested in wire fences: The European wire which we carry in stock has been tested at the Iron Works and shows a tensile strength of 2760 pounds. 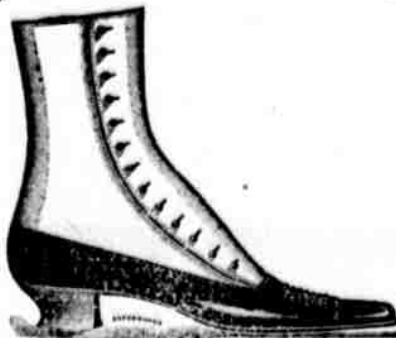

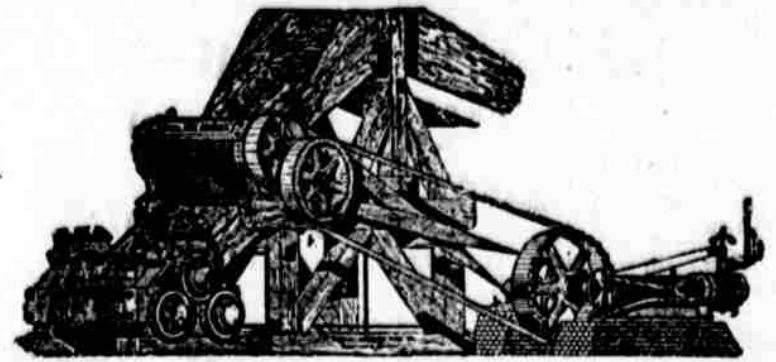

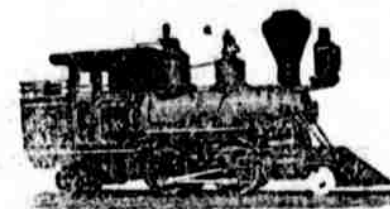
