LEAGUE MEETING.

Stanford University T-am Would Like to Play Here.

The Hawaii Baseball League held a meeting this noon in the office of W. F. Allen. Those present were President W. F. Allen, Capt. J. A. Thompson, representing the Unknowns, Harry Wilder and Lionel Hart, the Stars, and Robert Part and Beckley the Kamehamehas. It was decided to hold in reserve the gate receipts of the first three games in order to ensure the playing out of the season. The League decided on this in order to compel the three clubs to play the schedule out. The receipts of the first game will be divided on the fourth game, the second the next, and so on. Geo. Angus, who acted as temporary secretary, read a communication from the Stanford University baseball club, asking if sufficient inducements could be offered by the league for the club to visit Honolulu to play a series of games with the local clubs. The matter was discussed by the league and Mr. Angus was requested to write the manager of the Stanfords that the league could not do anything until after the season's games were played.

The rules of 1895 were adopted for the coming season. With regard to the umpire it was left to a future meeting. Captains Thompson and Wilder saw Harry Whitney this noon, resulting in his accepting the position of umpire for next Saturday's game between the Stars and Unknowns.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 22.

OTHER LANDS.

NICARAGUA.

H. B. M. ships Royal Arthur, Wild Swan and Satellite are at Corinto. It is said Nicaragua is willing to cede Corn Island to Great Britain in lieu of paying the money indemnity demanded for the expulsion of British subjects. The London Chronicle on this point says:

"The offer of Corn Island instead of a money indemnity looks like a scheme on the part of our Nicaraguan friends, for they know that its acceptance would call out against us all the champions of Monroeism. We do not want any trouble with the United States over this peculiar doctrine, and therefore it would be better if we stuck to our money demands. If Nicaragua wishes to sell Corn Island, she had better offer it to the Americans or some other people."

A "Loaded" Patrolman.

Johansen, a member of the mounted patrol, hired a horse from the Club Stables yesterday afternoon and started in for a good time. About 8 o'clock he was feeling pretty well "loaded." THE ORIENTAL WAR.

Approval by the Mikado of the Treaty of Peace.

An official dispatch says that Count Ito, President of the Japanese Council of Ministers, and Viscount Matsu, the Japanese Minister of Foreign Affairs, the two officials who negotiated the treaty of peace with Li Hung Chang and his son, Lord Li, at Shimonoseki, were received in audience by the Emperor before their return to Hiroshima. The Emperor said: "The principal points of the treaty are entirely satisfactory, and add much to the glory of the empire. I am highly pleased at the signal service rendered by you."

The London Times, after admitting that Japan evidently intends to cripple and humiliate China in a manner seriously affecting European interests, insists that the diplomatic history of Europe does not bear the pretensions that any power, or powers, are inclined to dictate the terms of peace between the two nations. It adds: "Great Britain's interests are involved quite as much as Russia's, but we find no stipulation in the treaty of peace warranting our interference at the cost of exciting the enmity of Japan."

A dispatch to the Times from Berlin says that the Vossische Zeitung blames the Government for joining France and Russia against Japan. The paper says: Suppose Great Britain and the United States support Japan in refusing the Russian demands? Germany would be immediately involved in endless complications and would lose her own trade without earning China's gratitude.

A dispatch to the Times from Kobe says that all furloughs of officers of the Russian men-of-war at that place and at Nagasaki have been stopped. The commanders of the warships have received an order from the Russian Legation to hold themselves in readiness to leave at twelve hours' notice.

The St. Petersburg Novo Vremya says that in return for the support of Germany and France in Russia's opposition to the cession of the Liao Tung Peninsula to Japan by the treaty of peace just concluded with China, Russia has agreed to support all German demands regarding German commercial interests and also any action of France in Indo-China.

Now that the war of the revolution is over, it is the duty of every man to support the existing form of government. Although things may not move with that cordiality that would ensure an everlasting peace, still they may be allowed to subside into that indifference without animosity that would allow either party to work out their best interests. All things considered it may be for the best, but time, the only arbitrator in such cases, must alone decide that James T. Timely Topics

April 13, 1895.

It looks just now as though the government is doing everything in its power to alleviate the misery and reduce the annoyance which naturally ensues through lack of sufficient water with which to make a cocktail.

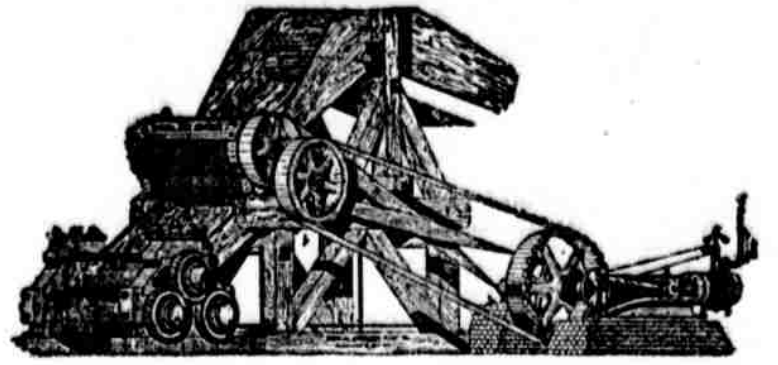

THE STEAMER COPTIC.

A Magnificent Specimen of Marine Architecture.

Quite a number of persons visited this splendid vessel yesterday during her few hours stay in port. She has been refitted throughout to take the place of the Oceanic, which has returned to England to be overhauled. Like all English vessels of her class she is roomy in her passenger accommodations and splendidly furnished through and through with rich and modern conveniences. The ladies drawing room and the smoking rooms for gentlemen are marvels of elegance and beauty.

The Coptic is a steel four-masted bark-rigged steamer, and is of 418 tons burden, and was built in 1881 at the shipyard of Harland & Wolf, Belfast, Ireland. Her length is 430.2 feet, breadth 42.2 and depth 24.2 feet. The vessel was in the Pacific Mail service eight years ago but has lately been running on the Atlantic in the White Star line.
