Lord Brassey is to receive the Grand Cross of the Order of St. Michael and S. George (G. C. M. G.)

The "Standard" confirms the report that Lord Kensington is likely to be appointed Governor of South Australia.

A fire at the warehouse of the Colonial Sugar Company, Pymont, destroyed bales of bags and other property of the value of \$20,000.

London, April 8.—News from India states that despite a constant fire from the heights, the British troops marching to Chitral crossed the Alalland fords of the Swat River.

The Bengal Lancers were the first over. They made a brilliant dash, and pursued the enemy for nine miles, killing 100. The British loss was small.

The British Borderers have captured Umra Khan's fort at Tanna.

London, April 9.—The latest news with regard to the Indian frontier difficulty is that Umra Khan, in order to increase his forces against the British expedition, has withdrawn the majority of his men who were investing Chitral Fort. The garrison under Dr. Robertson, the British Resident, will be able to meet the remainder.

The Call says that experts on social life in London declare an outbreak of British morality occurs there at periods of five years, and that one is due now. We were under the impression heretofore that the outbreak occurred with the arrest of Oscar Wilde.

Secretary Gresham informs Minister Willis that John F. Bowler, by taking the oath in 1885 to support the constitution and laws of Hawaii and bear true allegiance to the king, and not having left Hawaii since that time, is not an American citizen, and that the United States will not interfere in his or similar cases.

An interesting communication from the island of Hawaii appears on the first page. It contains much of interest relating to that island and at the same time discloses the real grounds of the dissatisfaction which now exists there. This is nothing more nor less, as we gather from the letter, than a general disgust at the action of the present government in ignoring the island of Hawaii in the matter of internal improvements. Our correspondent certainly presents a very strong case, backed up also by indisputable facts. That Hawaii has been given the cold shoulder and is getting it yet cannot be denied. Taking into consideration the fact that of the total amount of sugar exported from these islands about one-half is produced on Hawaii, the claims of its citizens, as set forth by our correspondent, are at least entitled to more than ordinary consideration from the powers that be. On this subject more anon.

IT IS REPORTED?

This is a common expression used by common ordinary reporters and, it may be said by newspaper writers generally, when they have only a vague idea of certain happenings, the facts of which they are generally too indifferent or too lazy to find out. An illustration of this can be found in the following item which appeared in one of our morning contemporaries:

"It is reported that a syndicate of sugar planters will take over the Bulletin and conduct it in the interest of that industry, advocating a protective tariff by the United States as the best solution of the political problem."

SAMOAN NEWS.

Apia Has Suffered from a Sixty Thousand Dollar Fire.

A disastrous fire occurred at Apia on the 1st of April. A large number of business houses on the main street, together with some cottages and dwelling houses were destroyed. The loss is estimated at \$60,000 with \$25,000 insurance. During the fire a detachment of marines from H. M. S. Wallaroo was landed, but a conflict of authority arising between Captain Graham of the Wallaroo and Mr. Marquand, the chief of police, they were not of much use. During the wordy war which took place on the occasion various opprobrious epithets were bandied about, of which "d-d liar" was the most innocent.

As a result of this fire the City Council has voted \$1500 towards the purchase of a steam fire engine, and during the discussion which took place on the subject it was suggested and approved that the rules and regulations of the Honolulu fire department be adopted.

The German corvette Moewa, the latest addition to the German Pacific squadron, has arrived.

Chief Justice Ide is still holding court, most of his time being occupied in considering land cases.

H. M. S. Wallaroo has left for Auckland, from whence she will proceed to Sydney for a thorough overhauling.

Timely Topics

MINISTER THURSTON

Is No Longer Personally Acceptable to the U. S. Government.

The following statement to the press by Minister Hatch, given after a special meeting of the Executive and Advisory Councils yesterday at 4 p. m., explains itself:

"Minister Willis called on the Minister of Foreign Affairs on the 30th of April, and read to him a letter from Secretary Gresham dated February 21st last, which he said had been sent to Japan by mistake, intimating that Minister Thurston is no longer personally acceptable to the Administration at Washington as Hawaiian Minister.

"The ground is that Mr. Thurston had allowed a representative of the press to read private letters to Mr. Thurston from Honolulu concerning conditions and sentiments there, portions of which were made public. "These letters also contained criticisms upon the policy of the Administration toward Hawaii which were not published, but came to the knowledge of Mr. Gresham."

The Councils adjourned without taking any action on the matter.

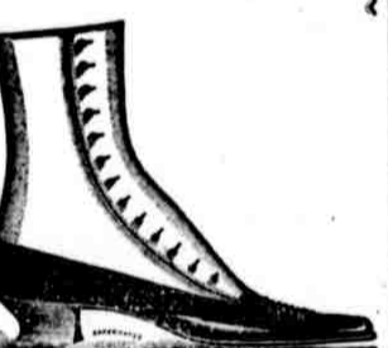

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PARWELL'S AGED MOTHER.

Beaten and Robbed in a Lonely Spot at Bordentown, N. J.

BORDENTOWN, N. J., April 19.—Mrs. Delia T. Parnell, mother of the late Charles Stewart Parnell, who lives at Ironsides, overlooking the Delaware River, near here, was found bleeding and unconscious late last night by Charles Casey, a son of the farmer who has charge of the farm at Ironsides. While descending a hill which marks the boundary of the property formerly occupied by Mrs. Parnell's father, young Casey heard moans.

Hurrying to the spot he found Mrs. Parnell lying beside the fence, with her face covered with blood. By her side were two small pieces of board, a piece of fence paling about three feet long and a brick. Help was obtained and she was carried to the home of Farmer Casey.

Dr. W. H. Shippis, who was hastily summoned, made an examination and found that, besides several bruises about the face, the woman had a lacerated wound on the right side of her head. Mrs. Parnell is unconscious, and because of her advanced age her condition is regarded as critical. Her handbag was found alongside the railroad track near by, her pocket-book missing and papers scattered in all directions.

This circumstance lends probability to the theory that she was brutally assaulted and robbed. Mrs. Parnell frequently came to this place at night and remained until a late hour. She was here last night.

At noon Mrs. Parnell lay in an unconscious condition. The authorities are convinced that she was assaulted and robbed, and have sent telegrams to all the near-by cities and towns asking that a lookout be kept for a man of medium height with a smooth face, wearing a light overcoat and a derby hat, who was seen in the vicinity about the time the assault is believed to have been committed.

Mrs. Parnell's house on the hill, about a mile from Bordentown, is known as "Ironsides." It is a big, old, two-story structure and was built by her father many years ago. It is as dreary a place as one could imagine.

The aged woman has no close acquaintances in Bordentown, and previous to 1890 had been living in destitution. In that year Congress granted her a pension of \$50 per month. At that time she lived alone in a bleak house, the only other person about her 300 acres being a gardener. During 1888 and 1889, in a fit of desperation, the aged woman stripped the house of furniture in order to obtain food, and the rooms have never been refitted. Mrs. Parnell had often expressed a desire to go abroad before the death of her son, Charles Stewart Parnell. She was once asked why she did not ask him to aid her. She replied, "He is at the end of his means."
