## TO-DAY'S AUSTRALIA

THE VERY LATEST.

The controversy over the two or more wills made by Senator Fair is still occupying the attention of San Francisco Courts.

California will make a splendid exhibit at the Atlanta, Georgia, fair. San Francisco is still excited over the Emmanuel Church murders and the preliminary examination of the supposed murderer, Durrant, is now in progress.

There is nothing new in Hawaiian affairs, and for all mention that is made of them by American newspapers it would seem that the subject was ended and forgotten.

Minister Thurston's name is not even mentioned in the exchanges received by the Australia.

C. P. Huntingdon, president of the Southern Pacific Railroad Company has finally been arrested in New York on an indictment charging him with an infraction of the Interstate Commerce law. By order of Judge Morrow, the presiding jurist of the United States Court in San Francisco, the indictment found against Huntingdon has been spread on the minutes of the Court at length.

Captain General Campos has arrived in Cuba and taken command of the Spanish forces.

Cuban insurgents demand better tariff laws from the Spanish Government.

The revolution is still in progress, neither side having gained any advantage, owing to the rainy season.

### CHILD DROWNED.

Had Been In the Water—About an Hour.

A three year old child was found drowned in the stream on the mauka side of the bridge on School street, between Nuuanu and Fort streets. The child was missed at 10 o'clock and the father, a German, was much worried and made an immediate search for the infant. As none of the neighbors had seen the little one he went to the stream and began poking a pole into a pool. Finally it struck something and brought to the surface human hair. The man at once plunged in and pulled out the missing babe. The poor thing had been dead about an hour. Dr. Day was summoned but the child was beyond human aid. No inquest will be held, it being considered unnecessary under the circumstances.

### A Needed Improvement.

On Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock a jury, subpoenaed especially, will assemble in Deputy Marshal Brown's office for the purpose of considering the proposed re opening of a roadway from the Oceanic dock to Brewer's wharf. The jury upon assembling will first visit the premises and deliberate afterwards. Mr. Brown would like those interested to be present.

### "Sentences Suspended."

In the District Court this morning G. Apiki pleaded guilty to carrying a deadly weapon, to wit, a pistol. Sentence was suspended.

Hannah Naehu, disobedience to parents, pleaded guilty but sentence suspended in her case, as well as that of K. Paivi found guilty of playing the truant since April 21.

## Nicaragua Will Not Yield to Great Britain.

The Cuban Revolution—Some of the Olympia's Sailors Desert at San Diego.

LONDON, ENG., April 26.—In well informed English quarters to-day it is declared that the British ultimatum to Nicaragua has not been modified; that Admiral Stephenson has not been cabled to extend the time granted Nicaragua within which to pay the indemnity of \$75,000 demanded by Great Britain and in the absence of definite news it is believed that the Admiral has already occupied Corinto. The belief is also expressed here that the Nicaraguan Government will not yield to the demands of Great Britain until compelled to do so in order to avoid being forced to resign office.

The Pall Mall Gazette, commenting on the troubles between Great Britain and Nicaragua, says that nothing could be more courteously correct than the attitude of the United States in the difficulty, adding: "It is a good omen for a close understanding upon the China Japan question. Our action may be expected to teach the Spanish-American States that none of them are too insignificant to behave decently to foreigners."

CHICAGO, Ill., April 26.—A Times-Herald special from Colon says: The port of Corinto, Nicaragua, has been closed. The three British warships, Royal Arthur, Satellite and Wild Swan, have declared a peaceful blockade of the port.

Troops were landed shortly after midnight and took possession of the custom-house. There is great excitement in the town.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 26.—A special to the World from Corinto, Nicaragua, dated April 26, says: The garrison is drilling constantly. The British have not landed. Artillery has been placed in position so as to insure in case of the landing of an armed British force that the lives and property of natives and foreigners shall be respected. The excitement has cooled somewhat.

General Rivas of Mosquito Coast fame arrived to-day with 800 soldiers. When drill calls were heard this morning, followed by lowering boats from the British warships, all believed that an attack was about to be made. Business houses were closed and a crowd collected on the beach. But spectators were only treated to a magnificent maneuver drill by the ships under command of Admiral Stephenson.

It is now rumored that a settlement will be made and that the ships will soon leave.

Over sixty of the crew of the Olympia have deserted, owing to the alleged insufficiency of food on board.

The funeral of Coxwain Johnson of the cruiser Olympia yesterday afternoon was attended by about seventy men in charge of one officer from the ship. On the way out to the cemetery seven sailors suddenly broke ranks and fled.

**THE BOWLER CASE.**

**Secretary Gresham Decides that He is Not an American Citizen.**

At the request of several subscribers the BULLETIN publishes the full text of the decision of Secretary Gresham in the case of John F. Bowler, who took the oath of allegiance to the Hawaiian Government in 1885, has resided in the islands ever since, but after being convicted of misprision of treason two months ago has claimed the protection of the United States as a citizen thereof. The decision is short, sharp and to the point. It settles not only the particular case of Mr. Bowler but lays down the law for all similar cases now and hereafter.

The following is the full text:

DEPARTMENT OF STATE,  
WASHINGTON, April 5, 1895.  
ALBERT S. WILLIS, ESQ., HONOLULU,  
H. I.

SIR: It appears from your No. 88 of February 28 that on the 22d of that month, J. F. Bowler was convicted before a military commission sitting at Honolulu for participation or complicity in the disturbance or uprising in Hawaii early in January and sentenced to imprisonment at hard labor for five years and to pay a fine of \$5000; that he now claims protection as an American citizen; and that the Hawaiian authorities assert he is not entitled to such protection because he is a naturalized citizen of that Government.

When Mr. Bowler left this country and went to Hawaii does not appear, but on March 18, 1885, he voluntarily took an oath to support the constitution and laws of the Hawaiian Islands and bear true allegiance to the king, without expressly renouncing or reserving his allegiance to the United States. Section 432 of the statute prescribing this oath (Compiled Laws of Hawaii, 1884), provides that every foreigner so naturalized shall be deemed for all purposes a native of the islands and subject only to their laws and entitled to their protection, and no longer amenable to his native sovereign while residing in the kingdom, nor entitled to resort to his native country for protection or intervention; that for every such resort he shall be subjected to the penalties annexed to rebellion, and that having been thus naturalized he shall be entitled to all the rights and immunities of a Hawaiian subject. I am informed that the Supreme Court of Hawaii has held that the taking of this oath operates to naturalize the alien and admit him to full citizenship. It is not claimed that since 1885 Mr. Bowler ever returned to the United States or resided elsewhere than on the islands.

This Government has never held to the doctrine of perpetual allegiance, on the contrary from its organization, it has maintained that the rights to throw off one's natural allegiance and assume another is inalienable. "Expatriation," said Attorney-General Black in 1859, "includes not only emigration out of one's native country, but naturalization in the country adopted as a future residence." The effect of naturalization is to place the adopted citizen in the same relation to the government as native citizens or subjects. The right of the Hawaiian Government with his consent to adopt Mr. Bowler as fully as if he had been born upon its soil is as clear as his right to expatriate himself. He manifested his intention of abandoning his American citizenship by taking the oath to support the constitution and laws of Hawaii and bear true allegiance to the king, and, so far as known, he manifested no contrary intention before his arrest. That oath is inconsistent with his allegiance to the United States. By taking it he obliged himself to support the government of his adoption, even to the extent of fighting its battles in the event of war between it and the country of his origin. He could not bear true allegiance to both governments at the same time.

The President directs that you inform Mr. Bowler that he is not entitled to the protection of the

United States; that in similar cases you will be guided by the views herein expressed and that you furnish the Minister of Foreign Affairs with a copy of this instruction.

ARRIVED AT APIA.

The Honolulu "Suspects" Unbosom Themselves and Tell Startling Stories.

The Samoa Weekly Herald has the following:

The Mariposa arrived in port from San Francisco on Saturday last, having considerable cargo for Apia and a very full passenger list through. Among the passengers were three gentlemen—Messrs. Levy, Bailey and Swift—who were deported from Honolulu on account of their supposed connection with the recent trouble there. They tell rather startling stories about the treatment accorded them by the Government of Hawaii, one which they all affirm the truth of being that Mr. Swift, who was confined in jail for forty-two days, was tortured during that period, so as to induce him to divulge information the Government supposed him to be possessed of. His wife acted as Maid of Honor to the deposed Queen. These gentlemen, all being subjects of Great Britain, have appealed to their home Government for protection. Their passage was paid to Sydney for them, but, as Mr. Levy's property was confiscated, the Hawaiian Government was probably not much out of pocket over the transaction. If these stories are not exaggerated it would seem as if the hitherto peaceful Hawaiian Islands were to be exposed to many of the evils of a reign of terror. No doubt the spirits of the above mentioned gentlemen were not very high when they embarked at Honolulu, but they certainly could not have had any fellow-passengers more calculated to send them up to concert pitch than those on this steamer, as nearly every state room was occupied by members of "The London Gaiety Girls' Troupe," which is going through to Sydney. Judging by the way this merry band took possession of our peaceful town we venture to predict that seats in the bald-headed row of the theatre they occupy will always command a premium. Fourteen of San Francisco's gilded youths accompanied the troupe as far as Honolulu where, without exception, they all received their conge and departed, certainly sadder, if not wiser men, and incidentally considerably out of pocket.

Now that the war of the revolution is over, it is the duty of every man to support the existing form of government. Although things may not move with that cordiality that would ensure an everlasting peace, still they may be allowed to subside into that indifference without animosity that would allow either party to work out their best interests. All things considered it may be for the best, but time, the only arbitrator in such cases, must alone decide that James T. We acknowledge that the editor of the Advertiser is better posted on bifurcation and fin de siecle than we are, but he can't spell worth a cent.

It is surprising that considering how hardly worked government officials are, some of them can generally be found on the corner of Fort and Merchant streets.

Laboratory is a good word. It is found even in Webster's dictionary. But when it appears in the shape of "labratory" it makes one think of Labrador or some other warm place.

The steamer Australia arrived just as the BULLETIN was going to press. The paper was held back half an hour in order to give its readers the latest news. This may be summed up in a word, and that word is Venezuela.

The conviction for libel of Hoshina and Arai, two Japanese acting as editor and business manager of a newspaper, will set people to thinking. The individual who was presumed to be libelled was duly convicted and sentenced by a competent court as a common vagrant. For commenting on this case these two Japanese were this morning convicted of libel in the second degree and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 each. The case has been appealed by Paul Neumann, the defendants' attorney.

The Independent, in its issue of this morning, intimates that because Mr. Hatch is drawing a salary of about \$5,000 a year as Minister of Foreign Affairs he has no right to practice law. There is no man in the Hawaiian Islands who is better posted as to his rights to practice law or go fishing on Sunday than Mr. Hatch, and all we have to say is that if President Dole will give the writer the position now held by Mr. Hatch he will swear by all that is sacred he will not attempt to practice law, even before Judge Perry.

The Friend has made its monthly appearance on our editorial desk. While it contains much else of interest it eulogizes Dr. Hyde and incidentally refers to the attack made on him by one Thomas G. Shearman in a recent issue of the New York Post. This matter has been written and re-written so often by one of our morning contemporaries that Shearman, Dr. Hyde and the general public must be thoroughly well sick of it. Dr. Hyde's reputation is too well known in this community to need any refutation at the hands of any newspaper, especially one published in Honolulu.

The infamous report to the effect that Robert Louis Stevenson had been engaged in the importation of arms for the use of Samoan rebels is forever squelched and set at rest by a recent decision of Chief Justice Ide of the Samoan Supreme Court, the substance of which appears in another column. The family of the lamented novelist sued the writer of the libel for damages and presented overwhelming evidence in his favor. This preponderated to such an extent that even Chief Justice Ide in rendering his decision almost apologized to the Stevenson family that such a suit had been rendered necessary to protect the fame of the dead author. What the Chief Justice of Samoa gracefully and opportunely said the whole world will echo. Too late, alas, we all realize that Samoa never had a better and truer friend than Robert Louis Stevenson.

From a more thorough examination of the accounts of the late big fire in Apia, as published in the Samoan papers, it would appear that although all hands were on deck, to use a familiar expression, they were in a disgraceful state of intoxication from the chief of police of Apia to the cabin boy of H. M. S. Wallaroo. Although the fire had been in progress for hours Captain Grahame of the Wallaroo did not land his marines until it was nearly extinguished. A conflict of authority immediately ensued between the British captain and the chief of police of Apia, during which opprobrious epithets of all kinds were bandied to and fro between the principals. From the published accounts it would appear that the affair was a disgrace to every one concerned in it, and especially to the captain of Her Britannic Majesty's ship Wallaroo, which sailed for New Zealand the following day and is now, like an ostrich, trying to bury in the sand, the disgrace its captain has brought on the British navy.

**THE REVENUE CUTTER.**

The necessity of a swift, light draft and well-armed revenue cutter has never been so well demonstrated as in the past week. At present there is really but one vessel at the immediate service of the Hawaiian Government and that is the tug Eleu. A good idea of the value of this vessel to the government may be estimated from her recent trip in search of "opium smugglers." After two days' steaming she returned to port completely used up and is now undergoing a thorough overhauling as well as having her boilers renovated and cleaned.

During the absence of the Eleu a vessel was outside the harbor waiting for a tug to bring it to the wharf and was forced to stand off and on all day. It is neither fair nor right to the captains of merchant vessels for the government to use the only tug in port for two or three days at a time and possibly leave them at the mercy of the dangerous reefs and shoals which surround this coast.

The one and only remedy is for the government to purchase a light and swift steamer, which can be in readiness for any purpose at a moment's notice, even for chasing opium smugglers, filibusters or phantom ships.

**Timely Topics**

The same old cry of "No Water" is again heard in tone of voice as loud and as fierce as ever. But with the new pumping station almost completed the complaints against the Water Works Department will soon be a thing in forgotten history. It looks just now as though the government is doing everything in its power to alleviate the misery and reduce the annoyance which naturally ensues through lack of sufficient water with which to make a cocktail.

Here are some figures over which you may ponder if you are interested in wire fences: The European wire which we carry in stock has been tested at the Iron Works and shows a tensile strength of 2760 pounds. The man had been found guilty of being a vagrant and spent one month in jail. Both defendants, Hoshina and Arai, were found guilty of libel in the second degree and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 each. P. Neumann, who appeared for defendants, noted an appeal.

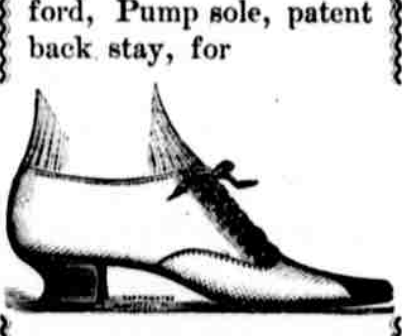

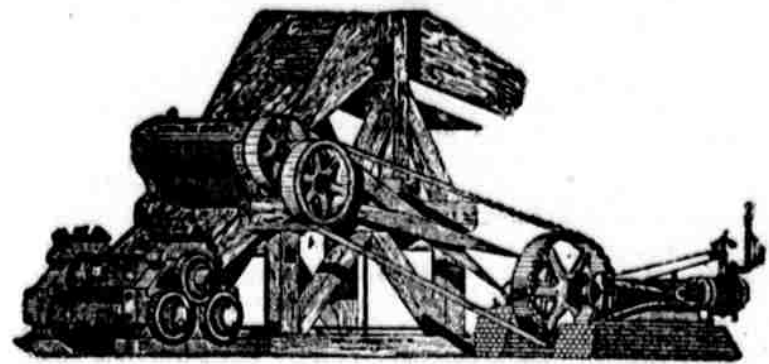

### ROBERT LOUIS STEVENSON.

His Family Wins a Suit for Libel in the Samoan Court.

The following is copied from a recent issue of the Samoan Times:

The family of the late R. L. Stevenson have just brought and won a libel suit before Chief Justice Ide. Taylor, the defendant, a young half-caste of some education, had been spreading reports to the effect that Mr. Stevenson had been involved (in conjunction with the captain and officers of the schooner Equator) in landing four hundred stand of rifles and two hundred thousand rounds of fixed ammunition. Taylor supplied the Samoa Times with the most specific details, and was responsible for a written statement being circulated through the town that the late Mr. Stevenson was deeply implicated in the illicit importation of arms into this country. It is scarcely necessary to say that overwhelming evidence was brought to prove the falsity of these allegations, and Chief Justice Ide, after a summing up in which he spoke very highly of Mr. Stevenson, sentenced Taylor to pay a fine of £4 10s, or 90 days' imprisonment, as well as the costs of the Court.
