He has been advised to sell him to the Tramways Co.

A BURNT CHINESE.

A Portuguese Boy Helps Him Out of a "Pilikia."

An elderly Chinaman escaped being burned to death through prompt assistance rendered by Joe Dias, a Portuguese boy. The Chinaman, who was walking down Lihua street about 11 o'clock this morning, had been smoking a pipe. After a while he put the pipe in his pocket. He trudged along down the street, and it was not until his pocket was ablaze that the man noticed something wrong. The embers from the pipe had caught the man's coating and caused the blaze. Being feeble and old the Chinaman was excited, and began crying. Dias who happened to witness the incident ran to his assistance and with no little trouble smothered the fire with his hands. Dias' hands were slightly scorched.

Wishart's Sentence Suspended.

Ex-policeman Carl Wishart appeared before Judge Wilcox this morning to answer to a charge of "being present, countenancing and encouraging" in the assault by Geo. Nelson on Captain Cook of the mounted patrol. Wishart, who has been in prison even since his arrest stated to the court that he desired to change his plea of not guilty made yesterday and to now plead guilty as charged. The motion was granted.

On motion of the Deputy-Marshal sentence was suspended until moved on by the prosecution. Wishart will leave the country.

GREATER THAN SUPERIOR.

America's Great Fresh-Water Lake Has a Rival.

Is Lake Superior the largest fresh-water lake in the world? asks the New York Sun. Most geographers and other people certainly believe it is, and almost every authoritative book says so. There are a few geographers, however, who say they do not know, and think the question had better be kept open until we have more exact knowledge of Victoria Nyanza, the largest African lake. The celebrated geographer Reclus seems, prematurely, to have awarded the first place to the Nyanza, for he computes its area at 83,900 square kilometers, while he gives the area of Lake Superior at 81,000.

Several of our best sources of information agree in giving the area of Lake Superior at 31,200 square miles, and of Victoria Nyanza at about 30,000 square miles. The fact is that these great lakes are nearly equal in size, and we cannot tell exactly how they compare, because our information about Victoria Nyanza is still very imperfect.

About two years ago Dr. Baumann discovered on the southeast coast of the lake a deep bay that no one had heard of before, and which is just beginning to appear on the maps. He was five days walking around the shores of this indentation, which is now known as Baumann Gulf. A while before this discovery Father Sebynze surveyed the southwest prolongation of the lake, which Mr. Stanley did not discover during his voyage of eighty days around its shores. These two discoveries have added many square miles which are not included in the estimates here given of the lake's area, and the shores of the lake are still so inadequately explored and surveyed that hundreds of square miles are likely yet to be added to or subtracted from our present computations of the area. Meanwhile Lake Chad, on the edge of the Sahara, may continue to stand off at one side and smile at the pretensions of both these rivals for first place. In the rainy season this lake loses all semblance of its former self, and spreads over a vast area, until it covers more ground than the vaunted Lake Superior itself. It is spread out very thin, to be sure; but it is all Lake Chad, and if its outlines, when at their largest, were correctly mapped, the lake would look very imposing; but Chad, on these occasions, like beauty, is only skin deep.

A worthy man, who was very sensitive and retiring, having lost his wife, privately requested that he might be remembered in the minister's morning prayer from the pulpit, but asked that his name might not be mentioned. The Daily Bulletin.

While the BULLETIN is strictly attending to its own business there are about two thousand white men in this city who appear to be vastly interested in what that business is.

Suppose the damage suits of the political exiles are decided against the Government will they be paid out of the revenue from the sale of bonds issued in settlement of the war debt or by a direct tax on the people?

What with increased taxes to support the Military and Police Departments the average citizen has a cup full.

An exchange says that Colonel Francis V. Greene of the Seventy-first Regiment of New York told the faculty and students of Union College the other day that roads and civilization went hand in hand, and were mutually dependent on each other. In an address delivered to an assemblage of Samoans a few days before his death, Robert Louis Stevenson said the same thing. Another instance of great minds running in the same channel.

If anyone deserves a vacation it is Walter Pomroy, the efficient and popular foreman of the Advertiser. That gentleman has gone to Hawaii for a couple of weeks' rest, and no one needs it worse than he does. That the subscribers of the Advertiser both in Honolulu and on the other islands get their papers regularly without a mail being missed is largely due to Mr. Pomroy and the BULLETIN cheerfully accords him the credit due to him on that account, knowing whereof it speaks.

Referring to the insubordination on the part of some members of the Mounted Patrol the BULLETIN is informed that Nelson in the most profane manner declared in the presence of a half dozen patrolmen his intention of doing up Captain Cook. If this story is true it was the duty of any one of the men who heard the threats to arrest the man without delay. As we take it the police force is established as much to prevent crime as to detect the perpetrators. A little investigation on the part of the officials might bring facts to light that would warrant the dismissal of a half dozen other malcontents.

It is not only among the opponents of the administration here but with supporters that a doubt regarding the calling of a session of the Legislature was felt. Notwithstanding frequent flat denials, the rumor still exists to the effect that the Government itself is lukewarm in the matter of annexation to the United States. As each individual member of the Legislature was nominated only after having pledged himself to support such a measure, it might be embarrassing to the Government to find itself forced to accept the opposite of what it desired.

In this connection we might ask what has become of the native movement toward the political union? The boom seems to have flattened out, and why? Is it because pressure was brought to bear by representations of the Government upon the leaders, and the natives convinced that they are living under a pretty good form of government.

The thousands of dollars collected a couple of years ago to be used in educating the natives into the advantages of living under the Stars and Stripes seems to have been washed, as far as results show.

A NARROW ESCAPE

A Chinese Boy Comes Near Being Run Over By a Tramcar.

This morning about 10 o'clock, as one of the tramcars had just crossed the King-street bridge, a Chinese boy dragging a toy wagon on which was a bale of leather, crossed directly in front of it. He came nearly being run over, so nearly that the miles knocked him down and smashed his wagon into smithereens, but in so doing the bale of leather came under the wheels of the tram. As a natural result the tram went off the track but fortunately did not turn over. The Chinese boy escaped without injury and when the BULLETIN reported left he was still "cussing his luck" in fluent Chinese.

Living Stones of Falkland.

The most curious specimens of vegetable or plant life in existence are the so-called "living stones" of the Falkland Islands. In such a climate it is impossible for trees to grow erect, as they do in other countries, but nature has made amends by furnishing a supply of wood in the most curious shape imaginable, says the St. Louis Republic. The visitor to the Falkland sees, scattered here and there, singular-shaped blocks of what appears to be weather-beaten and moss-covered boulders in various sizes. Attempt to turn one of these "boulders" over and you will meet with a surprise, because the supposed stone is actually anchored by roots of great strength; in fact, you will find that you are fooling with one of the native trees. No other country in the world has such a peculiar "forest" growth, and it is said to be next to impossible to work the odd-shaped blocks into fuel, because it is perfectly devoid of "grain," and appears to be nothing but a twisted mass of woody fibers.

May 7, 1895.

Yesterday witnessed one of the quietest elections ever held in Honolulu or elsewhere. It was a good deal like some of the elections in the South American republics where you always vote the government ticket or stay away from the polls. Although only 111 votes were cast, that number was even larger than was expected.

Talking about the election, however, reminds us that we have just received a novelty in the shape of a newly invented can opener, which is simplicity itself. It is called the A. B. Captain Smithe went out in command of the steamer Keauhou yesterday. His place on the Waialeale will be assumed by Captain Gregory.

It was the only beacon to guide vessels heading for the place. The lighthouse was supported by four stout poles which, however, had not been imbedded deep enough in the sandy foundation. Consequently a recent strong gale toppled it over.

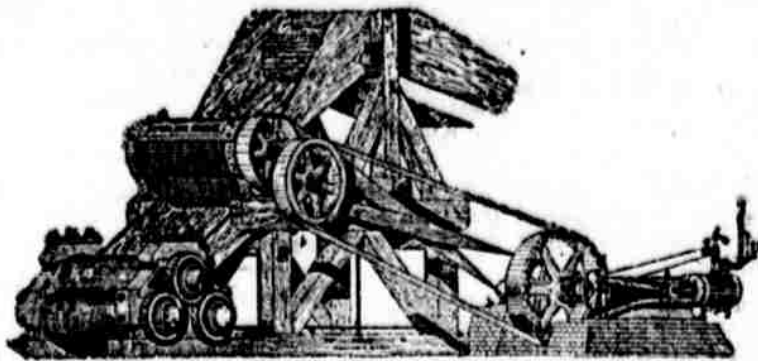

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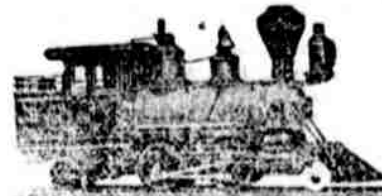
