BILLS ORDERED PAID.

Finance Committee Pass on County Claims.

Mr. Shipman, from the Finance Committee, made the following report, which was adopted by the Board of Supervisors.

Your Committee on Finance to whom was referred sundry claims and matters beg leave to report as follows:

Table of bills and amounts: Dr. J. Holland, Services, \$2.75; T. H. Davies & Co., Gasoline Engine, etc., \$450.00; Hilo E. Light Co., Lights and Materials, \$33.80; Wall, Nichols Co., Supplies, \$40.55; Hilo Telephone Co., \$11.50; Hilo Tribune Co., Supplies, \$13.25; W. C. Peacock & Co., Rent, \$75.00; E. N. Holmes, Furniture, \$6.75; W. Kino, Interpreter, \$6.00; T. J. Ryan, Salary Deputy Treasurer, \$25.00; L. A. Andrews, Garbage, \$3.75; Transfer Prisoners, \$6.50; Otto W. Rose, Supplies, \$4.25; Hilo Drug Co., \$1.85; City Stables, Hack Hire, \$1.25; First Bank of Hilo, Exchange, \$22.00; J. Carvalho, Band Master, \$100.25; Hilo Mercantile Co., Sheriff Supplies, \$25.00; Hawaii Herald, Printing, \$38.50; Carl S. Smith, Law Books, \$61.40; High Sheriff, Support of Prisoners, \$278.00; Anna H. McCarthy, P. O. Box Rent, \$3.50; Inter-Island S. N. Co., Transporting Prisoners, \$15.25.

As to this last item your Committee has made a reduction as it is quite evident an error has been made, the usual charge for deck passage to Honolulu from Mahukona being but \$3.00.

Your Committee further finds several small purchases by County officers where the notary fee is nearly as large as the purchase, and your Committee is constrained to say that it does not reflect favorably upon such officers, as under better management it could be avoided, and further that it has in several instances deducted the notary fee, in accordance with the published notice.

Your Committee recommends that all the demands presented for Coroner's Jury fees be returned to the Deputy Sheriffs certifying to the same for correction. Seven of said demands, from Hamakua, are not sworn to, which should have been sworn to before the Coroner without fee. Twelve of said demands, from Kau, are sworn to before a notary public and the notary fee in each case added to the demand. It is the duty of the Coroner to swear the jurors before entering upon their duties at the inquest and swear them to all papers connected with the case which are necessary to be sworn to, which includes demands for payment of their services. This should be done without fee, and your Committee recommends that the County Clerk be directed to notify the Sheriff to instruct the different Deputies accordingly.

These three claims your Committee recommends be not paid, the first because it was not authorized by this Board nor is it a necessary expenditure, and the other two because it does not appear for whom the services were rendered. Madeline Stolder, Stenographer, \$10.25. This claim also your Committee recommends be not paid as it is a Territorial charge. Palm Restaurant, Meals, \$7.75; Kodani, Board and Lodging, \$8.25; Dr. S. Kusuma, Cash Advanced, \$28.25.

Your Committee recommends that further consideration of the last mentioned three items be deferred until the next regular meeting. Your Committee further recommends that a warrant be drawn in favor of Geo. Desha, Postmaster, for postage for the Clerk's office in the sum of \$5.00, and also that the County Clerk be directed to notify the Hilo Electric Light Co. that the Honorable S. L. Desha is hereby authorized by this Board of

Supervisors to exercise full power and supervision over the installation and removal of all lights and power required for County purposes.

OVERLAND TRANSPORTATION.

Finance Committee Refuse to Pay Steamer Fares in Advance.

Your Committee has had under consideration the communications of the Sheriff and County Attorney concerning the approaching terms of court and the information submitted by the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co. requiring freight and passenger charges to be paid in advance. It is the opinion of your Committee that if the Steamship Company cannot comply with the County Ordinances, other means of transportation throughout the County can be resorted to and prisoners and witnesses can be transported overland.

The County pays its bills within thirty days and is presumed to be in a solvent condition financially. Therefore, no difficulty is apprehended concerning the means of transportation.

Your Committee recommends that the Sheriff and the County Attorney be given a hearing by the Board to submit a statement as to the number of prisoners and number of witnesses to be transported where from and where to. In that way any possible difficulties can be reduced to a minimum, as your Committee still adheres to its recommendation contained in its report dated August 5th, to-wit: "Your Committee believe it to be entirely unnecessary to appropriate this amount in advance and that witness fees as well as incidentals and all other claims against the County should be paid from month to month out of the Treasurer, only upon the same being properly sworn to and certified, and further, your Committee firmly believes that in this way only can the finances of the County be properly and economically administered."
