MR. STEVENS VINDICATED.

THE STAR learns from excellent authority that, in so far as Mr. Cleveland's wishes are concerned, Minister Stevens is at liberty to stay at his post until the Hawaiian incident is closed.

His retirement will be at his own option. Col. Blount does not come to supplant or degrade the American minister or in any way to impeach his acts or criticize his motives and record.

If the Hawaiian royalists expected Mr. Cleveland to rebuke Mr. Stevens' course they were very credulous indeed. All that the Minister did during the memorable first days of the protectorate, was in line with the instructions which Mr. Cleveland's Secretary of State gave to Minister Merrill under date of May 12, 1887.

Mr. Bayard wrote: "American citizens in Hawaii must be protected in their persons and their property by the representatives of their country's law and power, and no internal discord must be suffered to impair them. Your own aid and counsel as well as the assistance of the officers of the government vessels, if found necessary, will therefore be promptly afforded to promote the reign of law and respect for orderly government in Hawaii."

ANNEXATION AND SUFFRAGE.

The first thing we want is annexation. The treaty between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands may be as brief as possible, omitting all such conditions as would excite the antagonism of either the House or Senate.

Questions of the elective franchise and the subjects which domestic legislation must include will necessarily be covered in such organic act. These things, after annexation shall have been decided or agreed upon, will depend on the exhibition of good sense and the capacity for intelligent legislation made by this community, as well as upon the way in which these matters shall be presented both to Mr. Cleveland's administration and to Congress.

GUESTS OR CITIZENS?

There are men who speak of themselves, when opportunity offers, as "guests of the Hawaiian people." They have lived here for years, and have taken part in the social, business and political life of the country, and yet on certain occasions adroitly assume the role of guests, intimating of course that some others should do the same.

"The Royalists say their cause is 'looking up.' That is what the fellow remarked about himself when he lay on his back after a misunderstanding with a bear."

GREAT AND GOOD FRIEND:—I have received the letter of January 24th, 1893, by which you inform me that the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands has been quietly and peaceably established under a Proclamation formally and publicly made at the door of the Government Building in Honolulu on the 17th day of January, 1893, and that the said Government has honored you with the office of President of the Provisional Government and Chairman of the Executive and Advisory Councils of the Provisional Government of the Hawaiian Islands.

I am pleased to note the expression of your earnest desire to maintain and strengthen the strong friendship which has for so many years existed between the United States and the Hawaiian Islands, and to assure Your Excellency that I shall omit no effort which may conduce to the accomplishment of a purpose which I so heartily desire.

In accordance with the provisions of an Act entitled "An Act to regulate and control the production and furnishing of Electricity in Honolulu," approved January 12th, 1893, there will be sold at Public Auction, on WEDNESDAY, the 3d day of May, 1893, at 12 o'clock noon, at the front entrance of Aliiolani Hale, the exclusive right and franchise to furnish and supply electric light and electric power within the district of Honolulu during the term of ten (10) years from the date of such sale.

The sale of such franchise is subject to the Rules, Regulations, Inspection and Tariff of Rates to be charged to Consumers, as set forth in the said above-mentioned Act.

THE UPSET PRICE, at Auction, of said Franchise is 2 1/2 per centum of the gross receipts of the Contractor from all electric light and power furnished to consumers.

THE BIDS for such Franchise shall be for the percentage of such gross receipts, which the bidder is willing to pay to the Government over and above such percentage.

THE CONTRACTORS shall be exempt from paying such percentage of receipts for the first two years of such contract.

STEVENS SUSTAINED.
GRESHAM ASKS HIM TO REMAIN AT HIS POST.
His Resignation Was Sent in a Year Ago.

Investigation shows that the royalist rumors, circulating since the Rush arrived, touching a recall of the American Minister, are without basis in fact. It was Mr. Stevens' purpose a year ago to arrange his official business so that he could leave here this Spring. Before the last American election he filed his resignation with the Secretary of State to take effect next May. "Even had my dear old friend James G. Blaine been President," said Mr. Stevens in relating these facts to a STAR reporter, "and had requested me to remain longer than the time already set for my departure, I should have been forced to refuse, in order to carry out private arrangements previously made."

The Delay To-Night.
The STAR was ready to appear at 4 P. M., but the engine broke down and the issue had to wait a chance to use the Advertiser press.

THE VISITING STATESMAN.
He Comes Accredited to the Provisional Government.

Commissioner Blount was pleasantly quartered in the Snow cottage last night where, until a rather late hour, he received callers. He was not inclined to talk politics but proved himself a good listener to all that was said by whites and natives alike. He proposes to give his attention to the leading men of all parties and to prepare a written report, the nature of which will not be made known here until after the President and Secretary Gresham have digested it. It is likely that nothing will be done to settle annexation before Congress meets next December.

The Commissioner comes accredited to the Provisional authorities. As this paper is going to press he is paying an official call upon President Dole in company of Minister Stevens. The party will remain in the government building half an hour.

AMBITIOUS JAPS.
They Want to Get Hold of an Island of the Caroline Group.

Captain Garland of the Morning Star says that the Japanese are trying to buy Ponape, or Ascension Island, where many of their traders are located. The island is now held by the Spaniards. The Japanese carry on a large trade with the Ponapeans and are on good terms with them, but the relations of the Spaniards and the natives are greatly strained, so much so indeed that a war ship and a force of soldiers have to be maintained at great expense to keep the Spaniards in power. Captain Garland states that the result of the Japanese negotiation was not known when he left, but that Governor Cadarso told him that the Madrid government under a treaty with Germany might be obliged to keep up the present island administration.

HE WANTED THE PALACE.
Smith of Santa Cruz Who Bid \$100,000 for the Royal Mansion.

James Phillip Smith, the capitalist of Santa Cruz, who has been spending a two months vacation in Hawaii, returned by the Alameda yesterday. Mr. Smith lately achieved some notoriety by his offer to purchase the Queen's palace from the Provisional Government for \$100,000. Mr. Smith was seen at the Palace Hotel last night and said:

"I got to Honolulu the day before the so-called revolution, so I was just in time for what little fun there was. I quite fell in love with the islands, and when the Queen was turned out of the palace I thought I might as well have it myself, if I could strike a bargain. So I offered the Provisional Government \$100,000 down for the place, but they refused. I thought they were striking out for a higher price and reckoned that I might give a little more for it and still get a good investment; but it appears that it was not the Government's to sell, although they didn't like to say so. It would have been cheap at \$150,000."

Mr. Barnfield Better.
Mr. R. C. Barnfield, the English artist who for some time past has been confined to his cottage at the Queen's Hospital, and was reported a few days ago in a sinking condition, is to-day brighter and stronger. It is hoped his cheerful disposition and remarkable vitality will enable him to pull through.

PERSONA NON GRATA.
Consular Agent Furneaux Not Acceptable to the Government.
A complaint has been sent to Washington by the Provisional government against the course of Charles Furneaux U. S. Consular agent at Hilo, who is opposing the annexation movement. Mr. Furneaux, who is said to be a Rhode Islander, has taken the extreme anti-American side in the present controversy and has made himself obnoxious to the Hilo people, a strong majority of whom favor union with the United States, by saying that America has no right to interfere in the affairs of the Hawaiian Kingdom and that the islands should continue under a monarchy.

THE ANNEXATION CLUB.
Work Being Carried on by the Executive Committee.

Tuesday afternoon and evening, until tea o'clock, was a busy time at the headquarters of the Annexation Club on Merchant street. The Executive Committee and clerks were hard at work preparing circulars for branch organizations on the other islands. Complete enrolling lists will be sent forward by the steamers. Eight lists will go to Hilo, eight to Kohala, Hawaii, eight to Waialua, Maui, two to Molokai and twenty-four to Kauai, making a total of fifty.

The management issued a badge yesterday, bearing the words, "Annexation Club," printed in golden letters, beneath the American flag, upon a blue satin ribbon.

STEAMSHIP RUMORS.
There was a mistaken report about town this morning that the Rio de Janeiro had been sighted. The shipping men and post office people do not expect her at all, nor do they look for the City of Peking. So far as is known the next mail from the coast will come by the Alameda on April 7th.

Stocks Looking Better.
It was only a short time since that stocks were selling at a discount in the Auction rooms, but the sales which took place yesterday at Morgan's, on Queen street, show a decided looking up all along its line.

Twenty-two shares of Inter-Island brought \$132 per share; ten shares of Hawaiian Sugar Co. sold at \$85, with \$70 paid up; five shares of Wilder Steamship Co. sold at \$101. Shares of the Haiku Sugar Co. and the ship John Ena were withdrawn before the sale began.

Easter Music.
Next Sunday April 2d, being Easter Sunday, the Choir of Second Congregation of St. Andrew's Cathedral will render elaborate programmes of music at the 9:30 A. M. service and also in the evening at 6:30 o'clock. Dudley Buck's Te Deum in B and Jubilate in A, Stainer's Anthem, "They have taken away my Lord," and Brigadier's Evening service in A will be sung. The solos will be taken by Mrs. E. D. Tenney, Misses Ward, and von Holt, Messrs Wakefield, Iaukea, May and Pierce. Mr. Wray Taylor will preside at the organ.

The Hesper Mutineers.
The five murderers and would-be pirates of the bark Hesper have arrived in San Francisco on the Tropic Bird and are now in the county jail. They do not realize the enormity of their crime but crack jokes among themselves as if nothing had happened. Admission is freely made that they intended to turn the Hesper into a free-booting craft and run her to the South American coast. The five men will be tried for their lives in the U. S. Court.

The Ready Regulars.
The regulars make a spirited appearance in their new uniform. Captain Good has reason for pride in his command, not more for its looks than for its readiness to meet emergencies. In but little more than a minute's time the men can answer a day or night alarm and present a bristling front of bayonets and galling guns.

An Advertising Boom.
All but two columns of the STAR's space has been taken by advertisers and enough trade announcements are now in the hands of the printers to narrow the margin still more. Arrangements will at once be made to enlarge the paper.

Success at Ewa.
Word is received from Ewa this afternoon that the Annexation Club organizing there has the names of thirty-two natives and twenty foreigners already on the roll. Formal organization will be effected in a day or two.

Kauai Organizing.
Word has been received by the steamer James Makee from Wm. Blaisdell of Kealia, Kauai, that Annexation clubs are now being organized throughout the island, and that it is the intention to return a rousing majority in favor of union with America. Mr. Blaisdell states the movement will receive a more general support from the natives of Kauai, than has hitherto been expected.

The new Marshal has ordered the liquor law to be stringently enforced. An official pamphlet on the history of the Crown Lands is about to be issued by Professor Alexander. Native recruits for the annexation movement are coming in rapidly. The Australia mail included 7593 letters and 2981 papers.

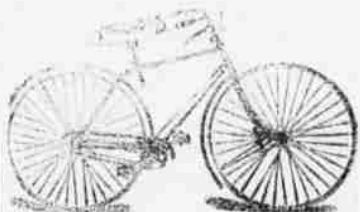

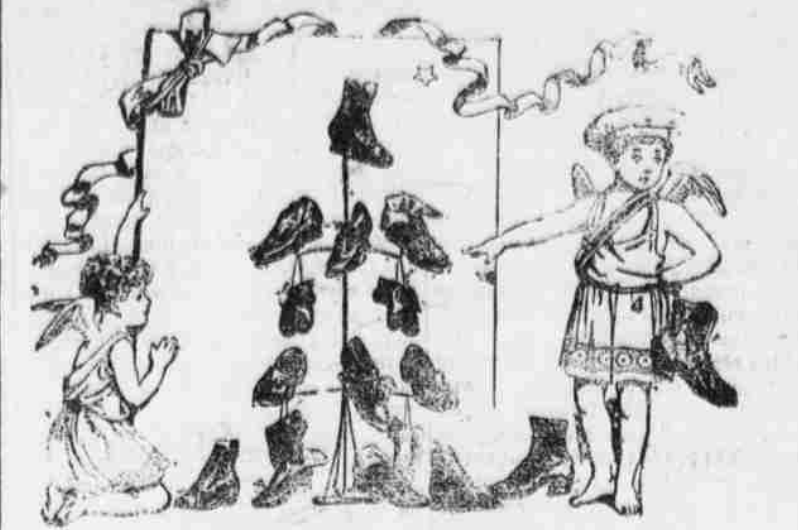

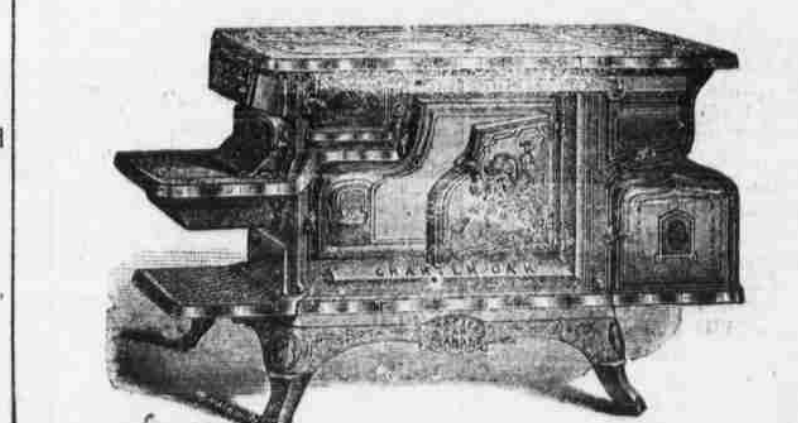
