(4) Development and expansion of the program:

Most of the native nurses and health aides are attending English classes for an hour and a half daily, five days a week. This program is being developed in cooperation with the Education Department and has proven to have quite definite assets.

Since the choice of students for the medical, dental, and nursing schools on Guam is to be made by the Education Department instead of the Medical Department, the holding of these classes between departments will enable a better choice of students.

Rotation of nurses and health aids through the various services is being continued as possible. The shortage of corpsmen makes the training in special fields such as X-ray and laboratory rather difficult, but native boys are being trained in these fields. Two special native obstretical nurses are being trained to aid in deliveries. The return of trained, graduated nurses from Guam in the near future will greatly aid in the training and organizational program.

A committee of six influential Palauan men has been appointed as a committee to act as an advisory committee to the hospital. By far the major part of the work here is the natives. It is believed that through this committee various organizational work

may be accomplished and difficulties and misunderstandings settled. The native culture is entirely different from ours and although our efforts are all for their benefit, sometimes these efforts are misinterpreted. Through this committee, we hope to explain health problems and enable better cooperation in our medical efforts. Several discussions concerning tuberculosis and gonorrhoea have been held with a committee of the Palau Council. The explanation of these diseases are being given to this committee and they in turn are able to explain the diseases to the chiefs, and magistrates - who are the native officials. These people are very intelligent and once they understand the problem, they cooperate very well.

The new dispensary and wards at the Yap Detachment will be occupied in January. These new facilities are a great improvement and the health program at Yap will greatly improve once the new physical plant is occupied.
