(b) Native Sanitary Inspectors

Nature and degree of supervision--The island police are charged with this duty under the supervision of the Magistrate or Headman and the Practitioner. M.G. Medical Officer inspects and points out deficiencies.

(c) Native Cemeteries

(a) No supervision is maintained by the Medical Department over native cemeteries.

(d) Pest Control

(1) Insect - Mosquitoes - Very few mosquitoes noted during inspection of norther Marshalls.

Flies - Screen wire and lumber was distributed to all islands in the norther Marshalls for making fly traps.

(2) Rodent - Little evidence of rats was noted except on Wormej Island (Wotje Atoll). A large scale extermination program would be necessary to rid this atoll of rodents.

(3) Others - None.

(e) Potable water supply is obtained from rain catchments and shallow wells. Some cisterns require repair and screening, and this was brought to the attention of the local magistrates or headmen.

(f) Violations of sanitary regulations. The magistrate on Ailuk Atoll was warned and told that sanitary regulations as issued by the native medical practitioner must be carried out.
