

(a) Inspection by field sanitation officer. A call was made at every village in this command. In most cases there was considerable improvement shown over last inspection.

(b)

- (1) No change since last report. (see December report No. one)
- (2) Military Government supervision and training was carried on at the time of the field trip.
- (3) The supervision is under the atoll medical practitioner and magistrate. Instructions in sanitation measures are given to sanitary policemen, council members, and all the people by the sanitation officer on each field trip.

(c) Nonchange since last report. (see December report No. one)

- (1) Insects: Very few mosquitoes were noted during inspection. Screen wire, lumber, and DDT were issued to all islands visited to be used in insect control.
 - (2) Rodents: Little evidence of rats was noted. Close attention is being kept, however, for any evidence of an increase in numbers.

(e) No change since last report. (see December report No. one)

(f) Sanitary conditions in most cases were only fair. All the people were given a talk by the Sanitation Officer, on how and why sanitation conditions should be improved, pointing out how sanitation corrective measures will improve their health, etc. Every one seemed to take the talks well and to understand.
