### PLAN TO END BIG I.-I. TIE-UP WAY OPEN FOR ADJUSTMENT

Star-Bulletin's Suggestion of Arbitration Meets Approval—Chamber of Commerce Offers Services of Mediators—Both Sides Willing to Consider

### CORRESPONDENCE OF STRIKE GIVEN

This Paper Today Publishes Letters With History of Controversy From Beginning—Deadlock in Steamer Service Still Complete

Arbitration of the Inter-Island strike is in sight. With another day of deadlock so far as the steamers of the big company are concerned, and with the public interests suffering seriously from delay, inconvenience and a partial paralysis of business all over the Territory, the situation has become so acute that it was evident a plan of settlement must be solved.

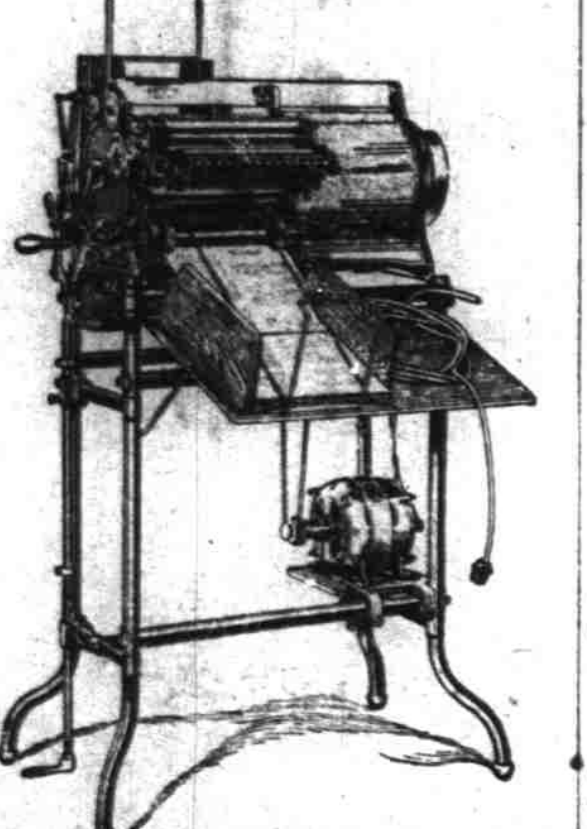

### MUST SERVE LIFE SENTENCE

Chung Nung must serve his sentence of life imprisonment, imposed by Circuit Judge Robinson following the verdict of a jury which found him guilty of criminal assault on a little Hawaiian girl. Such is the ruling of the Supreme Court, which yesterday afternoon filed a decision overruling the exceptions filed by Attorney Loren Andrews, the prisoner's counsel.

The Supreme Court holds that the evidence, though entirely circumstantial, was sufficient to support the verdict and that the jury was uninfluenced by passion or prejudice. "There is no evidence tending to show the use of any force or threats or the holding out of any inducement or that he was intimidated by the presence of officers or by the absence of counsel," says the Supreme Court, replying to Attorney Andrews' contention that undue advantage was taken of the Chinaman when he was given a physical examination and questioned in the presence of officers, while his own counsel was not present.

"It does not follow that because defendant made his statement in the presence of officers or that his counsel was not permitted to remain and advise him of his rights, that he was intimidated or coerced or that he did not make his statements freely or voluntarily.

"A statement in the nature of a confession made by a person while in jail and before any charge is entered against him, made in the presence of the city and county attorney and police officers, and without the advice of counsel, but made freely and voluntarily, is admissible in evidence.

### HAD A GOOD TIME IN SAN FRANCISCO

J. W. Pratt reports having had a good time in San Francisco. Mrs. Pratt and he were entertained almost nightly by friends during their stay. It was really their honeymoon trip after seventeen years of married life, this being the first opportunity they ever had for an excursion worth while together.

In addition he took up the Mascot copper mining proposition, on which he is to report to local investors and those thinking of the matter, but it will take from sixty to ninety days for him to get reports on the enterprise on which to base his findings. ### CELEBRATES 10TH ANNIVERSARY AS BISHOP IN HAWAII

Bishop Restarick is today celebrating the tenth anniversary of his coming to Hawaii, where he came to assume charge of the work of the American church in the Islands after a 20 years' rectorship at San Diego, Cal. His coming signalized the passing of the English church from Hawaii and the turning over of the reins of ecclesiastical government to the American church.

For the past ten years the bishop has worked continuously for the betterment of his diocese and has devoted a considerable part of his time to the extension of the church in Honolulu. This work includes the establishment of the mission work of St. Elizabeth's House and church, the Epiphany Mission, at Kaimuki; St. Mary's, at Moiliili, and a church at Kapahulu.

During this same period of time the Davies Memorial parish house has been built by the family of T. H. Davies. The Alice Mackintosh tower, a memorial, has been completed. Iolani School has been moved to comfortable quarters, and St. Andrew's priory, founded by an English sisterhood in 1867, has new buildings. Other buildings in contemplation are a new St. Peter's church and a home for employed girls.

On the other islands, new church buildings have been erected at Wailuku and Hilo; new rectories at Wailuku, Hilo and Lahaina, and the work of the church has grown generally.

### WINE-SELLER GETS OFF WITH LIGHT SENTENCE

In the case of A. V. Dias, who pleaded guilty to the charge of selling liquor without a license, License Inspector Pennell has asked for leniency in the case, and as a result Dias will be permitted to go with a fine of \$100 and costs, on condition that he ship out of the country the forty-seven casks of wine which were found in his place at Palolo Valley when he was apprehended by the license inspector last week.

A similar charge against Dubrovnik, a Russian, who was arrested on the evidence of two soldiers, was dismissed. He was fined \$100 on the first charge, and on consideration of the fact that he pleaded guilty on the first charge, a petition of nolle prosequere on the second charge was entered by the prosecution.
