

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It has been said that we are a litigious people, and the argument has been advanced that anything that encourages the individual to go to court is un- Fourth Precinct wholesome in that it tends to accent a disposition to dispute claims, to evade Fifth Precinct responsibility, to take issue on technicalities. Probably there is no basis in this for apprehension of evil effects flowing from efforts to make the courts of greater use to the class that needs them most. Judge Taft's hope is that the delays in the courts may be lessened, so that the inequality which now marks the administration of justice in favor of the claimant or the defendant with the longer purse may be eliminated. He would have the system amended so that it is no longer possible for a wealthy corporation to "wear out" a petitioner for damages. He feels that the right of appeal given to him is, in truth, detrimental to his interests, as it must also be given to the other and wealthier party. Therefore he thinks one appeal should suffice for all purposes of the Twelfth Precinct

Miss Peck is accompanied y two trained Alpine climbers.

Miss Peck left New York two months ago to make another attempt to reach the summit of Mount Huascaran. ### NEW HAWAIIAN BOOK BY REV. H. H. GOWEN






