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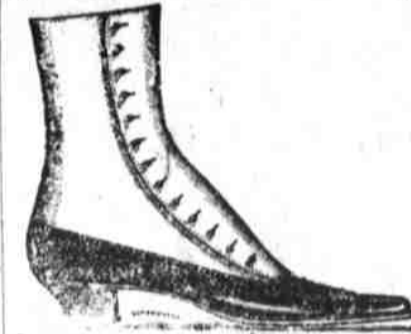

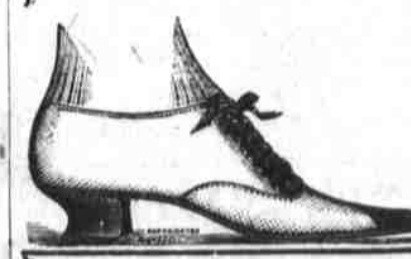

## The Japan-Chinese Treaty.

The S. S. China which arrived off port brings Yokohama advices to the 9th inst. The following regarding the ratification of the treaty is clipped from the Japan Daily Herald:

"A telegram from Peking, emanating from a source to be relied on, conveys the intelligence that the treaty with this country was ratified on the 2nd instant.

It thus appears, that in spite of all prognostications to the contrary, China has honorably fulfilled its engagements to Japan, but it now remains to be seen, whether the allied Powers of Russia, France and Germany will permit the recently concluded treaty to go into full operation. As far as Russia is concerned, we apprehend not, and we therefore, with some degree of confidence, expect that it will insist on Japan evacuating Manchuria. What part France will now play is beyond our knowledge, but we apprehend that it will support the action of Russia. It is not to be expected that China will enforce the treaty in the teeth of the Powers objecting, though it stands committed to allow the process to go on at the hands of Japan, without the interposition of any obstacle on its own part.

So far as China and Japan are concerned, if faith be kept, the war between them we must suppose to have been brought to an end, but how about Russia and France? The former, it is understood, will not tolerate a Japanese occupation of any part of Manchuria, and France is understood, though for what especial reason we know not, to object the cession of Formosa to Japan. Beyond peace with China, which seems to be for the present assured, it is by no means clear as to what the two above mentioned Powers will do; we can only await the development of events, for there is no telling what a day may bring forth.

Commenting upon the numberless rumors that have floated over the country regarding foreign intervention the Nichi Nichi says that although many rumors are current with regard to the movements of foreign Powers, the only reliable information on the subject is contained in two Reuter's telegrams, and so far any joint action on the part of these Powers does not appear to have been fully agreed upon. Such being the present condition of affairs, the authorities are doubtless cautiously making an effort diplomatically to preserve the rights and interests of the Empire. But such statements as that the Russian men-of-war have made such and such preparations, or that the Russian and German Ministers have left for Kobe, are either premature or unfounded reports. As a matter of fact the Russian Minister is staying at the Consulate at Yokohama during the repair of the Russian Legation in Tokio. The Minister is said to have remarked that while such a rumor was prevalent, he could not even take a trip to Miyanoshta. Our contemporary also states that although it has been reported that the Emperor of China has ratified the treaty of peace, no reliable report of this has been received from any quarter,

but as the term granted for the exchange of ratifications expires on the 8th prox., some definite intelligence on the subject will be received before long.

The N. C. News of April 29 publishes the following under the caption *The Secret Compact.*

A treaty of alliance, offensive and defensive, between China and Japan, with a proviso to allow Korea also to join and enjoy the benefits of the said alliance, has also been arranged between the respective Plenipotentiaries of China and Japan, to take effect immediately after ratification of the first named treaty; but this treaty of alliance is supposed to be a secret one, the terms of which are to be kept from the knowledge of the outer world. China, moreover, engages by this treaty to employ a large force of drill instructors from Japan for the Chinese land forces, and even undertakes, when necessary, to entrust her navy to the command of Japanese naval officers. In this treaty, also, China promises to reform certain parts of her civil, military and naval administrations upon Japanese lines, it being specially impressed upon China that unless a radical change be adopted in them China can never hope to contend successfully against foreign Powers in the future.—N. C. Daily News, April 29th.

There is no confirmation of the rumor which prevailed on Saturday of the resignation of Count Ito, but it is alleged that there have been some dissensions in the Cabinet arising out of the grave posture of affairs, and it was probably owing to these, that Count Ito's resignation was regarded as far from unlikely; and when transmuted into actual fact, obtained currency.

Speculation is rife, not unmingled with some anxiety, as to whether existing complications will lead to war with one or more of the Powers that have given notice to Japan that they entertain objections to some of the articles in the recently concluded treaty with China. Let us hope for the sake of humanity and of Japan, that some peaceful conclusion may yet be reached, but the assumed to be facts talked about, seem unfortunately to point the other way. Thus we hear of Russia placing her mercantile ships under the British flag; of the Russian authorities giving notice to Japanese residents in Vladivostock, that in the event of hostilities they must clear out, and that the Japanese Government is despatching a steamer to bring its subjects from thence. The destination of the Russian ships which have left ports of Japan under sealed orders, excites no inconsiderable curiosity. It is thought that they will rendezvous at Chemulpo, and that if war really be declared, they will land troops, and take possession of Korea, where Japan at the present time, has no great amount of soldiers, in comparison with what it has in China. It is anticipated that Russia will blockade Japanese ports, and that France will prevent Japan from taking possession of Formosa, though ceded by China. Such are the rumors at present current amongst the *quid nuncs* of this place.

"EVEN STEPHEN."

The Kams Bring Down the Unknown to the Tune of 11 to 4—Poor Fielding the Cause.

Captain Thompson of the Unknowns hid himself behind the grand stand several times on Saturday and employed a certain small boy to kick him for having in his nine men who, through carelessness or something else, allowed the Kamehameha students to score ten runs in the last four innings of the game.

The students have been putting in some of their spare time during the past week in practice on the old grounds, so they were prepared to take advantage of any bad playing or errors on the part of the Unknowns. Mahuka had the direction of the practice games and had his men thoroughly posted on flies, bunch hits, etc., and when the time arrived for an exhibition of their prowess they did it to the satisfaction of themselves and their friends in the grand stand.

The result of the game does not carry with it any great amount of glory considering the fact that the Unknowns neither batted nor fielded up to their standard.

Willis at first played a good game throughout and Thompson made a catch that caused the spectators to rise in their seats and applaud him with all their might. 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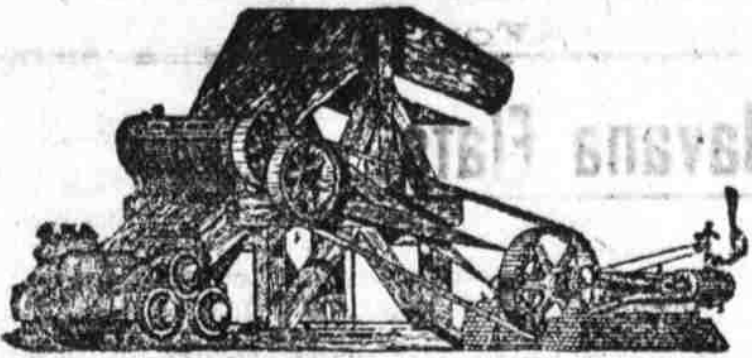

The Hawaiian, Julien D. Hayne's contribution to the literature of Hawaii, made its appearance in the book stores this morning. The periodical is octavo size and will no doubt be sought after by the people who see no good in anything missionary as well as by many who do. Mr. Hayne is a forcible writer and he seems to have put all his energies in this, his initial number, in attacking an element which, if not entirely popular with certain classes, enjoys the happy distinction of fathering some of Honolulu's best institutions.

As the engines at the new pumping station have no connection with the Makiki reservoir it is rather mystifying that people on the plains are so often deprived of sufficient water for household purposes. From eight o'clock until eleven this morning at Makiki, in some of the residences, it was impossible to get a drop of water from the pipes, and this, after we are told that there is an ample supply in the artesian well for all purposes, and engines capable of forcing it to all of the residences in the district. Occasionally the lack of supply may be attributed to breaks in the machinery as was the case this morning, but would it not be well to arrange for such an emergency. As it is the householders are deprived of water for three or four hours; but had the break been more serious they might have gone on for an indefinite period washing themselves in root beer and ginger ale. On the other hand if the arrangements for supplying the city with water were even half complete there would not be any occasion for the complaints that are forever being made.

The Tournament.

Honolulu has among its citizen a few knights of the cue who rank with the average billiard player in the United States, but there are apparently, so few of them that interest in the game is lost. For a house game there is none that requires greater skill and closer calculation than billiards and as a means of quiet recreation and change of thoughts from the usual business channels nothing so fills the bill.

The billiard rooms of the Hawaiian Hotel have lately come under the management of Harry Saylor, who has put the tables in first-class condition and arranged them in position much more comfortable for the players. A tournament is being arranged to take place after June 11th, and four of the best players in the city have signified their intention of taking part.

The arrests made to-day include a Japanese for deserting contract service, three native drunks and a Portuguese and Chinese for assault and battery.

JOHN DUNN KICKS.

Objects to Being Hauled Up as a Vagrant.

John Dunn is a man who, according to his own account has done considerable service for the Hawaiian Republic in furnishing the police department with news concerning the late uprising. He also gained some notoriety by, as he says, venturing alone and unaided into the rebel camp, full particulars of which were published in one of our contemporaries at the time of the adventure.

John was told some time since that the police had no further use for him, but when on the 14th of the present month he was arrested as a common vagrant his heart was broken and it is not mended yet, although on the day following his arrest a nolle pros. was entered in his case.

Instead of being a vagrant Dunn claims that on the day of his arrest he had a meal ticket calling for 21 meals at the Sailors' Home restaurant, of which only four had been eaten, the ticket being purchased the day before. He had also on his person an Elgin watch worth \$26 and \$20 in cash on deposit with Castle & Cooke.

New Native Paper.

J. Nawahi, recently acquitted on the charge of conspiracy against the Republic of Hawaii, is soliciting patronage for a new native paper soon to be issued from the Independent office. It will be issued both daily and weekly, and it is asserted that Nawahi himself will be the boss editor.

### THE WAIANAE EXTENSION.

Only Nine Miles More to Build—  
A Contractors' Push.

The 1:45 train from the O. R. & L. Co. station Saturday afternoon carried with it Mr. B. F. Dillingham and party of gentlemen on a tour of inspection of the Waianae extension of the railroad.

The new line is complete up to the six mile post beyond Ewa mill, and at the present rate of progress should be completed to Waianae plantation before the end of June. The track, so far as laid, presents a delightful improvement over that between Honolulu and Manana—the roadbed is especially solid and without the sags and hollows noticeable in many new pieces of track. The roadbed is of limestone and the ties are of ohia wood, the material for both being obtainable along the line of the road and at a very much less expense than if the ties had been brought from the Coast. The rails are heavy enough to stand any amount of traffic that they may be called upon to support.

Mr. Bickall, the contractor placed in charge of the work, after Mr. Feek left for the Coast, is pushing the work with phenomenal ardor. He is now accomplishing nearly a half mile a day, and at this rate the road will be completed in a very short time, and if nothing unforeseen should happen it is the intention of Mr. Dillingham to make the day on which the last spike is driven a memorable one in the history of the Oahu Railway Company.

Children's Day.

The always popular children's day at Central Union Church was especially attractive yesterday. The choral service was excellent. In the Sunday school a violin solo by William Love and an excellent vocal solo by Miss Maggie Lishman were special features. Mrs. B. F. Dillingham's address to the children was listened to with unusual interest.

Pumping Plant Test.

The new pumping plant engines developed such a pressure on Saturday that the twelve-inch main at Beretania and Alapai streets burst. Minister King was sent for and the test was suspended until repairs could be made. On Sunday water oozed through the surface on Punchbowl street near Beretania, supposedly from the same cause.

The test proved the engines to be first class, developing a capacity of 150,000 gallons of water per hour at twenty revolutions per minute. The break in the pipes may have been through a flaw in the casting, not an uncommon defect.

THE POLICE COURT.

Shakels Did Not Pour Into Its Coffers To-day.

Monday is usually a good day for fines in the Police Court, and is generally good for \$20 in the shape of fines from those who partook too freely of the flowing bowl on the day preceding. But the Court was hampered with a small docket, one which only one poor solitary drunk appeared.

Ah Choy, for violating Chapter 28, Laws of 1792, responded cheerfully but not in person. Rather than face the stern majesty of the Court on a Monday morning Ah Choy betook himself to parts unknown, thereby forfeiting \$10 bail which he had put up as a deposit.

W. Fernandez is an unfortunate individual who is in trouble over a little sum of \$3. Noy Frank Gerard claims to be the owner of those particular three dollars and the defendant insisting that he did not fraudulently convert the same to his own use and benefit, the Court set next Friday to hear the matter, the magnitude of the case probably demanding that Queen Victoria's birthday should add solemnity to the occasion.

Four Chinese, charged with having "paka pio" tickets in their possession will have their trial on the same day.

Ichikawa, for running a hotel without a license, pleaded guilty, but if he interviews the license department before May 23d and squares matters with them, Judge Wilcox will have nothing more to do with the case hereafter.

Ah On was accused of vagrancy. The prosecution showed that he was in the habit of giving information to the police regarding various offenses committed in the Chinese quarter, but that said information was always false, and that when Ah On took them on a chase after a wild goose the bird was not on the nest. In his behalf Ah On said it was not his fault, but His Honor thought differently and concluded that thirty days on the reef would be about the proper punishment for deceiving Detectives Hammer and Kanae.
