### CLAIMS HEAVY DAMAGES.

**An Hawaiian Exile Demands \$50,000 Because of His Expulsion.**

SEATTLE, Wash., May 25.—Frank Honeck, a native of Missouri, has forwarded to Secretary Gresham a claim for \$50,000 damages against the Hawaiian Government.

Honeck says he went to Honolulu ten months ago and joined Company A of the militia, gaining a medal as the best marksman in the service. W. O. Smith, the Attorney-General, employed him as a secret service agent to watch for the smuggling of arms ashore. He got evidence against the small vessel Waimanalo, and says that on January 6, 1895, when that vessel was at Honolulu, he went in search of Smith to have him swear out warrants for the arrest of Captain Davies of the Waimanalo and his crew.

Not being able to find Smith, and considering the matter urgent, he informed Colonel Fisher, commander of the militia, who caused the arrest.

Next day Honeck went into the field and did not have an opportunity to tell Smith of his discoveries for a month later. When he had not been told first. He refused to hear Honeck's explanations, and ten days later Honeck was arrested and thrown into jail. He says no charge was made and he was refused communication with the American Consul. He was finally told that he must leave the islands or he would be imprisoned for thirty-five years, guilty of innocent. He chose the former alternative and was given an honorable discharge from the army.

**Pastor of Central Union Church**

—Installation Last Night.

Central Union Church was crowded last night by members and friends to witness the installation services of Douglas P. Birnie as pastor of the church. The occasion was made doubly interesting from the fact that many of the clergymen attending the evangelical session were present.

The meeting was opened by Rev. S. E. Bishop reading the minutes of a council held at the church to arrange for the services. W. W. Hall then read the vote of the church and Hon. A. F. Judd read the call of the church sent Mr. Birnie.

Rev. C. M. Hyde delivered a most impressive address in handing over the charge to the new pastor. The sermon was preached by Rev. C. M. Hill, pastor of the Hilo Foreign Church, and Rev. H. H. Parker of Kawaihau made appropriate remarks in extending the right hand of fellowship.

He was charged with being a common nuisance and the Court so adjudged him and fined him \$5 and costs. ### Foreign News Items.

Representative Cogswell died at Washington on the 21st, aged 57 years.

Franz Von Suppe, the great composer, died at Vienna on the 21st at the age of 75 years.

The condition of Gail Hamilton at Washington is critical and her death is hourly expected.

It is reported that Balfour will be made premier of England on the dissolution of parliament.

Mexico has placed a levy on all gold and silver mines for revenue. American capital is heavily interested.

The price of leather has advanced in New York from 50 to 100 percent. The rise is due to a scarcity of hides.

The principal saddle and harness manufacturers of the United States met at Pittsburgh recently, and formed a combination to decrease expenses and put up prices.

The General Assembly of the Presbyterian church has decided that the control of the theological seminaries rested in its hands. The action has taken Presbyterians by surprise.

A boycott against the Canadian Pacific Railway company by the Trunk Line Association is on. This all grows out of the fact that the Canadian Pacific has secured the biggest slice of the business with Chinese going home.

It is announced that Mrs. Hedberg, widow of Captain Hedberg, who was shot and killed some months ago by Lieutenant Maney at Fort Sheridan, is to be married June 3d to D. A. Stephens, son of Henry Stephens, the box manufacturer of Chicago.

### "THE KING PRO TEM."

**Photographs of the Principal Characters Now on View.**

### Circuit Court.

The jury in the case of A. Heranson accused of manslaughter failed to agree and were discharged at 7 o'clock last night.

Ling Tai, charged with a felonious assault, waived a jury trial and his case was tried before Judge Cooper. The Court found him not guilty.

In the case of Serrao vs. Serrao, the plaintiff has filed a motion for a new trial.

The defendant in the suit of W. C. Peacock & Co. vs. Kitakaye has filed an answer this morning denying each and every allegation of the complaint, except the one that he is about to leave the country.

The case of E. W. McChesney as assignee vs. Antonio Lopez is on trial before the following jury: George Dillingham, J. L. McLean, S. B. Rose, J. J. Lecker, E. A. Jones, C. E. Huston, T. M. Starkey, J. M. Tracy, T. S. Douglass, J. L. Torbert, C. V. E. Dove and C. Hustace. This case arises out of the entanglement connected with the estate of C. L. Brito, a bankrupt.

### To Be Revived.

A movement is being made towards reviving the Improved Order of Red Men in these islands, which order existed here some years ago. Several of the members of Hawaiian Tribe, No. 1, now defunct as well as sojourning members of the order, have signified their intention of applying to the Great Sachem of the United States for a charter, and for this purpose a meeting will be held to-morrow evening at half-past seven o'clock at the Knights of Pythias hall on Fort street. It is desired that all ex-members of the order make their appearance at this meeting. His late Majesty Kalakaua was a strong patron of the order during his reign, he having held the high office of Sachem in the Hawaiian Islands.

## LOSS OF THE COLIMA.

Wrecked Off the Mexican Coast - Many Lives Lost.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 29.

The wreck of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company's vessel, the Colima, off the coast of Manzanillo, Mexico, caused hundreds of people in this city yesterday to shed tears of bitter grief. While there exists at present an utter lack of any evidence tending to show that the sinking of the big vessel was attended by great loss of life, the relatives of the passengers, officers and crew fear the worst. Throughout the morning and afternoon yesterday the office of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, on First and Market streets, was crowded with visitors who anxiously inquired, yet feared to hear, the awful tale of death that was hourly expected from Manzanillo. Mothers, with tear-stained eyes, inquired for their sons, and had to content themselves with the meager details of the wreck which were contained in the dispatch received on Tuesday night by R. P. Schwerin, the vice-president and general manager of the company. That dispatch simply announced the names of eighteen out of nineteen passengers and members of the crew of the vessel who are known to have been saved from the wreck. For all that any one in San Francisco knew at a late hour last night every soul might have escaped safely from the sinking ship, but all efforts to settle that question proved unavailing. Telegram after telegram was sent to the company's agent at Manzanillo asking for particulars of the disaster and the names of the rescued and drowned. Hour after hour slipped by without any reply from the agent at the little Mexican seaport, and the crowds of anxious people who kept streaming into the company's office in the hope of learning the fate of friends or relatives would depart, some sobbing and crying, only to return an hour later and listen to the same distressing tale that the company was not yet in possession of any details of the disaster.

From all that can be learned of the shipwreck it is known that the Colima foundered off Manzanillo on Monday and that the passengers and crew took to the boats. Up to a late hour last night but one boat has been heard from, and that was the boat accounted for in the dispatch received by R. P. Schwerin. It turns out that the dispatch was sent to Mr. Schwerin by William G. Pitts, captain of the Pacific Mail steamer San Juan. The San Juan picked up the boatload of shipwrecked passengers off Manzanillo and carried them into port. Captain Pitts then forwarded a dispatch to this city, announcing briefly that the Colima had foundered and that fourteen passengers and five of the crew had been picked up in an open boat.

A dispatch of a most startling nature reached the city yesterday from Lloyd's, London. It was as follows:

"The steamer Colima is a total wreck. One hundred and sixty passengers and crew are drowned. Twenty-one are saved. Much bullion is lost."

The source of this information is not known, but the announcement of the loss of life was undoubtedly taken from the wires at the City of Mexico. The same information reached the city from other sources, but it appeared in the form of a rumor rather than an official or authentic statement, and was probably deduced from the fact that only one boatload of people has thus far put in an appearance.

Harper's Weekly scores Admiral Meade for losing his temper and criticizing the administration. The admiral's is not the first tongue that has wagged to the discomfiture of its owner.

Ex-private Honeck considers his reputation damaged to the extent of fifty thousand by being deported from Hawaii. At the salary he received when he was a private here he would have earned the amount of his claim in a little less than a century and a half. But we doubt if he could have worked so long.

It stands between Whitney and Dickinson for secretary of state. The sentiments frequently expressed by Mr. Dickinson lead one to believe that he has a bit of jingo in his composition not altogether compatible with the make-up of Cleveland. It's doubtful if their methods of harmonizing factions would agree.

It is astonishing how many Japanese merchants are cropping up here when the rumor is current that trade is so dull as to warrant a half dozen of the largest firms removing to Formosa. Scarcely a week passes that a new firm does not start up and enter the field of competition against the white traders.

If the Hon. Audley Coote can bring sufficient influence to bear upon the people at Washington, so that a cable will be subsidized, he will have accomplished that which will entitle him to the greatest consideration by his fellow man. Great Britain will no doubt contribute its portion toward the cable scheme, and then Hawaii will chip in her mite so that the line would be an assured fact and operations would begin in short order.

Rev. Douglas P. Birnie, pastor of the Central Union congregation, though a stranger here, has, by his forcible sermons eloquently delivered, won the admiration and respect of every one in the church. With a certain liberality of thought which characterizes his sermons, he has won to his heart the younger element of his congregation without alienating the affections of those of the church who believe that the only road to salvation is an exceedingly narrow one.

In the contest in New York between the "cloth and the club," the former came out victorious to an alarming degree. The old idea that the better element in New York refused to mix in politics because of the overwhelming influence of the hoodlum element seems to have been exploded by Dr. Parkhurst, when he finished his tour among the dives and learned, for the first time in his life, and from actual experience, how the other half of New York lives.

The value of Dr. Parkhurst's services in this connection can never be reckoned in dollars; they are the sort that will be felt in the homes of the people.

The action of the deported men who refused to answer questions at the preliminary trial of their cases against the steamship company would, it seems, weaken their side. If their claims for damages against the Canadian and Australian steam-

ship line for forcibly carrying them away from Honolulu are just, there is no reason why relevant questions should not have been promptly answered. The verdict in these cases will be waited with interest by the Hawaiian Government, for upon it will depend largely the suits brought against the government for deportation from the islands.

If it should happen that cases of this nature continue to be brought against the Republic, and even half of them are decided in favor of the claimants, the treasury would be in such a feeble condition that it would be a hard matter for it to recover. High taxes caused through unwise acts of a government would scarcely be tolerated here while a tax for improvements would meet with little opposition.

If it had not been for the excellent quality of coffee produced in Kona, it is not likely that foreigners would have been induced to invest their capital in lands in that district nor would the building of a telephone line, such as the new company proposes to construct, have had an existence even on paper. It's the fact that the locality produced in a small way and in the most primitive manner an article which caught the fancy of "canoosers" in the matter of coffee; they wanted more and they were willing to pay a good price, but there were no means of getting it. Investigation demonstrated that the land would produce an unlimited quantity, but the people in the vicinity had not given the proper attention to the cultivation, you all know the result, foreign capital came in and is coming every day, and before another decade the production of coffee will be a leading industry of the islands and the machinery used in pulping, cleaning and putting it through the various processes necessary to make it marketable will come through us. ### SAUNDERS WILL NOT RESIGN.

His Trip to Washington in the Interest of New Customs Regulations.

TACOMA, Wash., May 28.—Deputy Collector of Customs Henry Drum says positively that Collector Saunders is not going to resign and that he was not called to Washington to make an explanation, but asked permission of the department to go East and confer with the treasury officials. His particular purpose is to endeavor to secure a revision of the customs regulations, the present regulations, which were promulgated in 1792, when the customs service was established, being obsolete in many particulars, though some amendments to them have been made. The need of revision has been emphasized here by the large growth of the Asiatic trade.

### A Japanese Consulate at Tacoma.

TACOMA, Wash., May 28.—A letter received from Yokohama by the Chamber of Commerce here contains the information that a Japanese consulate will soon be established at Tacoma. An appropriation of \$18,000 has been made by the Japanese Government for the purpose. The appointment of a consul is expected to be made in the immediate future. This will place Tacoma on an equal footing with San Francisco so far as diplomatic connection with Japan is concerned, as there is no other consulate on the coast north of San Francisco.

### AMERICAN WAR SHIPS ABROAD.

Rules for Guidance of Commanders at Kiel.

WASHINGTON, May 29.—Owing to the great number of applications that have been received from persons anxious to visit the American war ships at the naval demonstrations at Kiel, Secretary Herbert has been obliged to issue an order to Admiral Kirkland, in command of the fleet, for his guidance in the matter. By its terms he may admit visitors to his vessels before and after the ceremonies, but during their progress every civilian will be rigorously secluded from shipboard, save Embassadors and Ministers. This is believed to be necessary to the maintenance of a good naval appearance and discipline while the ships are parading, or are subject to the inspection of the German Emperor.

### ST. CLAIR RESPITED.

The Date for His Execution Postponed Until the Middle of Next October.

By order of the President a respite has been granted to Thomas St. Clair, condemned to die next Friday, until October 18. The following telegram relating to the matter was received by Marshal Baldwin yesterday morning:

WASHINGTON, D.C., May 28, 1895.

Baldwin, United States Marshal, San Francisco, Cal.: In case Thomas St. Clair further respite granted until Friday, October 18, 1895. Acknowledge this telegram.

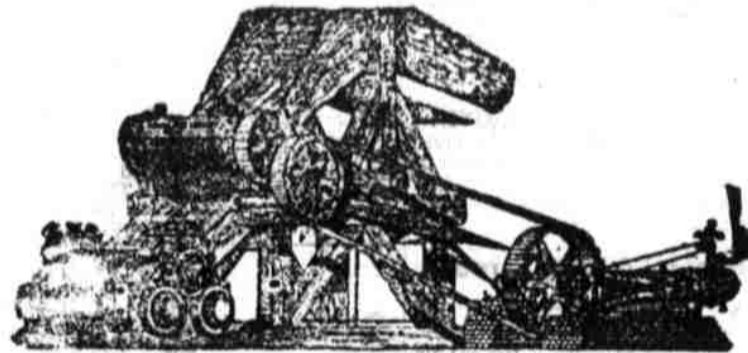
