## COOK'S EXCURSION.

A Large Party of Teachers Coming on the Australia.

By the next Australia, due here on June 21st, one of Cook's teachers' excursion parties will arrive. From advices already received the party will be a large one. The round-trip rate from San Francisco to Honolulu and return is \$135. This includes first-class cabin on steamer, board at Hawaiian Hotel and expenses of every kind connected with the following itinerary:

June 15, 1895, sail from San Francisco on steamer Australia;

June 21, arrive Honolulu, Hawaiian Hotel;

June 22, in Honolulu, carriage drive up the Punchbowl;

June 23, carriage drive to Waikiki Beach, Diamond Head, Kapiolani Park, etc.;

June 24, trip by rail to Pearl Harbor, Ewa Mill and Sugar Plantation;

June 25, carriage drive to the famous Pali;

June 26, in Honolulu;

June 27, sail for San Francisco on steamer Alameda;

July 4, arrive in San Francisco.

## THE LEGISLATURE.

Arrangements Perfected for Its Sitting.

The program for the opening proceedings of the Legislature was arranged at the Government building this morning. The Senate will meet in the room upstairs now used as the Foreign Office. This room being small, admission will probably be by tickets which will be issued to the diplomatic corps, members of the press and others having business with the Senate and its members such as clerks of committees, etc.

The House of Representatives will meet in the Council Chamber, where seats will be provided for the public generally.

After the committees on credentials have reported and a proper organization effected, both houses will assemble in the Council Chamber to hear the President's message read. They will then proceed to business.

It seems to be the unanimous desire of the members to hold long sessions with a view to making the session as short as possible.

A correspondent who evidently enjoys the music by the Hawaiian band makes a righteous kick against the dimly lighted band stand in Thomas Square. The surroundings being so beautiful the necessity for more light has probably escaped the various officials who have directed the affairs of government since the organization of the band. There seems to be no reason why the light should not be furnished. As to the reference to hoodlums, the complaint is general wherever music is given in public places. It creates a desire among the younger element to sing, dance, and enjoy themselves generally, but it should not be permitted to the annoyance of people who attend the concerts to listen to the music.

If the Lehua, which was chartered at a certain sum per week, had been tied up at the dock from the time of the signing of the contract until now, the people would howl about it quite as much as they do about the frequent and mysterious voyages.

It was something of a farce to charter the vessel instead of arranging to buy or build one that would answer the purpose. Speed is what is needed, and it does not seem to be obtainable in the Lehua. If the report that the steamer is to be returned to her owners when the contract is at an end is true, the next step for the government to take will be to negotiate for a steamer that will have a speed of at least twelve knots an hour. The failure of the Lehua to catch an opium-smuggling craft is not an indication that there are none sailing in the waters.

The Independent is wrong again. Judge Widemann is not the person referred to as keeping the people from having a wider road from the tramcars to old Waikiki-kai road. The BULLETIN is not aware that Mr. Ena has asked the public to build the road and we don't believe he has. His name was mentioned in an article on the subject simply because, to the editor, it was the easiest way of fixing the locality.

To widen the road properly would require probably ten feet of land and the same quantity of fish pond. As we understand it, Judge Widemann was willing to donate a portion of his land, but the owner of the fish pond declined to do so without ample compensation from the government. This latter bit of information was obtained by the editor of this paper from the owner of the pond.

If the editor of the Independent has ever had occasion to go to Waikiki-kai over the road mentioned, he has no doubt felt that a wider one would be safer and better.

It is not a fact that a broad road would benefit "only a few people." You might just as well say that the building of roads through sections where there are no residences at all would benefit no one. There are quite a number of residents on the lower road and it is to say that each has visitors—the visitors are known in the newspapers as "the general public."

We presume the government would be willing to purchase ten or fifteen feet of fish pond if the treasury was fat enough to stand it, as it is not the owner might show a little public-spiritedness and donate

it. It would not injure the value of his property an iota, on the contrary it would enhance its value. The BULLETIN did not have the property-holders in Waikiki-kai in mind when the article referred to was printed, nearly so much as the "and others."

Several hundred children from the different native Sunday schools marched from Kaumakapili church to the Kawaiahao grounds at noon to-day, headed by the Hawaiian band.

On arriving at the grounds the children found long lines of tables on which were spread an abundance of Hawaiian delicacies, watermelons and soda water which soon disappeared under the healthy appetites of childhood.

The Hawaiian band discoursed sweet music during the luau, and all had a good time.

Chief Justice Judd and others interested in Hawaiian mission work were present.

## The Cathcart Case.

After hearing the testimony in the case of R. W. Cathcart, charged with using threatening language and threatening to shoot one Ellen Poaha, the Court ordered the defendant to give a bond in the sum of \$100 to keep the peace towards the complaining witness for six months and to be committed to prison until he give such bond.

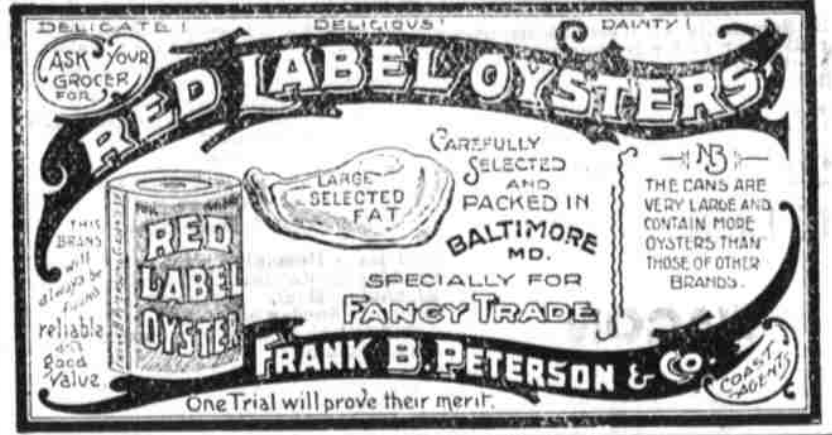

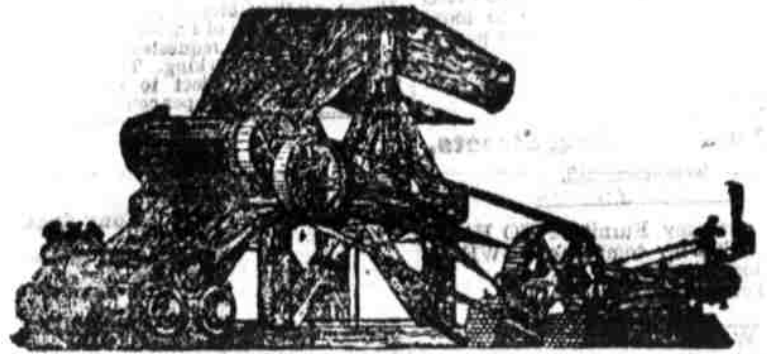

money about him.

The Manuel Llaguno hauled up  
to Wilder's wharf this morning.  
She is one of the old style wooden  
vessels, copper bottomed, of 1650  
tons register. She will carry away  
about 3000 tons of sugar. She will  
commence discharging ballast on  
Monday.

The Liverpool tug Blazer recently  
went from her home port to Rio de  
Janeiro, to tow thence to Genoa,  
the disabled steamer Colombo, a  
vessel of 2934 tons. On the way to  
Genoa with her tow she had to call  
in at three places for coal, making  
the distance traveled about 5500  
miles. From her starting point at  
Liverpool to Genoa the tug travel-  
ed over 11,000 miles. She eclipsed  
all previous records, and won for  
herself the honor of having success-  
fully accomplished the longest  
ocean tow on record.

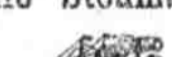

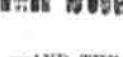
