The time made by Burt Lee in the trial heats last week but bears out the old saying that "trotting horses have no particular lineage," and are not, so to speak "born to the purple." The Spring Exhibition to Close on Thursday.

What was originally intended to be the closing evening view of the Kilohana Art League's spring exhibition was held on Saturday evening. Mr. A. Marques and his amateur associates regaled the two or three score of visitors with their delightful string music. Mr. Hutchinson, Prof. Berger and son received the visitors, while Miss King acted as door-keeper. There is to be another view on Wednesday evening, owing to many having been kept away by the rain Saturday evening. The exhibition will close on Thursday.

Allen Hutchinson's "May," an ideal portrait in low relief profile, is admired by all visitors. His relief profile of Captain Babcock is regarded as one of his best works.

D. Howard Hitchcock's most admired works (oil) are the portrait of Mrs. S. N. Castle, the artist's own portrait, Hina—legend of Rainbow Falls and Sunrise on Mauna Kea.

Mrs. R. L. Oglivie contributes a noteworthy effort in a California sunset. A still life painting by Mrs. Pierre Jones is replete with merit.

The water color section has some excellent pictures. Miss A. H. Parke has several good bits of scenery in and about Honolulu, as well as a fine view of Mauna Kea, all characterized by successful efforts at producing atmosphere and perspective. Mrs. A. B. Tucker shows a number of creditable productions, the best perhaps being Kualoa.

Conspicuous on the platform in the music alcove is a lanai set of furniture decorated in pylography, or poker etching, by Mrs. W. M. Graham. This is a branch of industrial art that, in this era of new industries for Hawaii, it would be an advantage for young people to learn. A kindred branch is that of pottery decoration, in which Miss Frederika Nolte exhibits several beautiful specimens.

Everybody having an eye for art should try to attend the closing views of the exhibition on Wednesday evening and Thursday afternoon.

THE PHILADELPHIA

The Flagship of the Pacific Squadron
Off for the Coast.

The United States steamship Philadelphia sailed for San Francisco at exactly twenty minutes after noon yesterday. The work of raising the anchors commenced a little before noon; but took longer than usual, owing to the port anchor becoming foul of the ram several times. Executive Officer Ingersoll was on the bridge and in charge of the vessel. Admiral Beardslee and Captain Cotton were on the lower bridge. Those of the crew not engaged in necessary duties were stationed on advantageous positions and were busily occupied in waving adieus to friends on shore. The band was on the poop deck and alternated with the government band on the tug Eleu in playing appropriate airs. For ten minutes previous to her departure the flagship was engaged in signalling with the Bennington. As the screw of the big ship commenced to revolve the crew of the Bennington manne the yards and gave three hearty cheers, which were returned by the boys of the flagship.

OBSERVATIONS.

NATIVE home rule has still some hold even under the republic. Mr. Kamaooha was elected by a good majority over Mr. Richards this morning as Vice Speaker. As Speaker Naone will be seldom absent the election of Mr. Kamaooha can hardly be construed as being for the purpose of getting surcease from his much talking on the floor.

WHAT do the local knights of the willow think of this record, coming from London under date of May 20: "There has been a wonderful week's cricket, thirteen centuries having been scored in the big matches. Nottingham made seven hundred and twenty-six runs, the record for county cricket, defeating Sussex by an innings and three hundred and seventy-eight runs."

WHEREFORE THE CHANGE?

After removing yard refuse for two or three years, the men of the garbage carts are ordered by the Board of Health to leave it alone, and only carry off household waste. In consequence of these new instructions people have to burn the leaves that drop from their trees. This causes a smoke nuisance all over town, besides great danger of fire. You may keep your ears open now for the fire bell. It seems as if the present government is one of experiments. It jumps at new-fangled notions and drops them after the expenditure of a heap of money. A while ago it imported a street sweeper, which filled the people's eyes with dust for a week or two and was then relegated to the old iron yard. Why it began removing yard refuse, and then all at once stopped, is something no fellow can understand. The new rule has already caused neighborly quarrels all over town, everybody who has trees annoying first one neighbor and then another, according to the way the wind blows. At the same time newspapers have never had more requests on file to call attention to unsanitary conditions, in regard to poi shops and other necessary institutions, than at the present time. Let us be consoled, however, by correspondence in American papers which represents this as "the best government the islands ever had."

FORMOSA.

Russia's interference with the acquisition by Japan of the prizes she honorably and fairly won from China is probably to be debited with the unfortunate state of affairs in Formosa. There is no doubt that the Chinese, thus encouraged by Russia, are at the bottom of the Formosan declaration of an "independent" republic, which is as much of a fake republic as some others that might be named—say in South and Central America. That the instigation of the rebellion against Japanese occupation has a Chinese source is proved by the following proclamation that has been posted up in the island:

China has been so insulted by the Japanese that all the Chinese should be angry with them. Therefore, we the literati and all the populace ought to join together and oppose the Japanese if they dare to land. If anyone sympathizes with the Japanese they will be seized and killed at once.

(Signed) All the populace of Formosa.

However, if Japan is not actually interfered with by Russia, or France as the tool of Russia—Germany as reported having withdrawn from the action against the peace treaty—there is little doubt that she will make shorter work of the Formosan rebels than she did of the Chinese in their resistance to her espousal of the cause of reform in Corea.

Speaking of Corea the fine hand of outside intrigue is manifest there as well as in Corea. The Japan Gazette received by last mail says: "The politician who throughout has tried to thwart Japan in all the attempted innovations has succeeded to power and once more the queen's star is in the ascendant. That lady is a remarkable schemer and if there is one thing arouses her anger it is Japanese interference. Hell hath no fury like a woman scorned, says Congreve, and it is not in an imperious woman's nature to forgive the haughty lecture Count Inouye felt called upon to read the ambitious queen. Japan, indeed, has made a grave error in seeking to reform Corea by sagacious counsel. There is only one way whereby that cesspool of corruption and cruelty can be cleansed and that is at the point of the bayonet. If Japan hesitates to use military force it is not impossible Russia may. The same paper quotes from a vernacular paper that "Corea is disgusted with Japanese statesmen on seeing the result of their labor as shown by the return of the Liaotung Peninsula, and apparently thinks such a powerful nation as Russia a more reliable friend than the small and powerless empire of Japan." It is further stated that Home Minister Pak has intrigued with "the henpecking queen" and initiated a policy so inimical to Japan that the pro-Japanese Ministers have resigned. The advice of Count Inouye is utterly disregarded, and it is said that "the Power upon whom Corea is now relying is reported to be making suspicious movements, and Corea is like a vessel without a rudder drifting helplessly on the rough waves of the ocean."

Japan has a hard row to hoe, but since her adoption of civilization and parliamentary government she has done so well that it may fully be hoped that she will come out of the crucible well refined and be a potent factor in the civilization of all Asia.

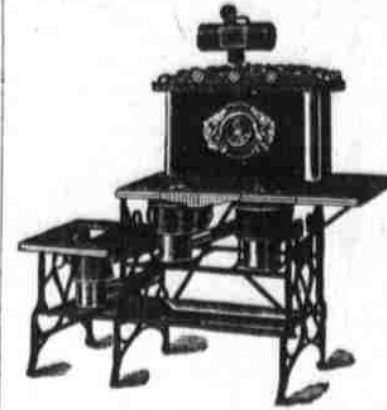
A Kingfisher bicycle lamp will perhaps be suitable for Waikiki, while a Demon lamp seems to indicate meeting with the mounted police.

COURT RECORD.

Waterhouse vs. Dimond—Matters at Chambers.

The June term of the Supreme Court opened yesterday morning. J. T. Waterhouse and others vs. W W Dimond and others occupied the time well into the afternoon. Hartwell for plaintiffs-appellant; Hatch, Carter and Kinney for defendants.

CIRCUIT CHAMBERS.

It is stipulated by the parties that August Strohm vs W F Wilson, A Cockburn and A McDowell, assumpsit for \$24, be heard in vacation. This is a suit arising from the attempt of McDowell to float the steamship Miowera.

F. A. Schaefer has filed a waiver of commissions as administrator under the will of the late C. P. von Mengerson.

Antonio J. Lopez has filed a bill of exceptions against the verdict of a jury for \$1,900 in favor of F. W. McChesney, assignee in bankruptcy of C. L. Brito.

J. R. Holt, Jr., plaintiff, by his attorneys, Carter and Kinney, has filed exceptions and objections to the exceptions of George Lycurgus and others, defendants, in a suit decided in favor of plaintiff at the late term.

Satisfaction of judgment for \$191.31 has been filed in the District Court case of J. F. Colburn vs W. C. Achi and Lau Chong.

Judge Whiting has admitted the will of Mele Kealaiki to probate and appointed Kahahawai administrator under \$500 bond. Kahookano for petitioner.

The accounts of J. Pae, guardian of Kealohaokalani, have been approved by Judge Whiting.

THE DISTRICT COURT.

Kapu Found Not Guilty of Embezzlement and Discharged.

Judge Perry yesterday rendered his decision in the case of W. H. Kapu, who was tried for embezzlement last week. The Court decided that the prosecution had not made out its case and ordered the discharge of the defendant.

Puia (w) pleaded guilty to violating the law relating to prostitutes and was fined \$3 and sentenced to thirty days' hard labor.

John Montgomery, John Sullivan and Paul Volnal pleaded guilty to feloniously taking, stealing and carrying away the yacht Bonnie Dundee, and were committed for trial at the next term of the Circuit Court.

The trial of A. J. Ferreira for selling liquor without a license resulted in his being found guilty and sentenced to pay a fine of \$100 and \$3.30 costs.

The Court was engaged in civil business in the afternoon.

Senator Cecil Brown is the only legal luminary in the upper house.

The Senate chamber has been rearranged so as to allow seats for about twenty spectators.

A copy of the Standard Dictionary lately introduced here has been added to the law library.

The little missionary schooner Hiram Bingham sailed for the Gilbert Islands at 4 o'clock yesterday. Religious exercises were held previous to her departure.

John Neill, ex-fire marshal, with his wife and daughter, are welcomed by a host of friends, on their visit to town after a long residence on Maui.

Among those who left on the Coptic were F. A. Schaefer and Miss Irmgard Schaefer, who will spend two months on the coast. They expect to return on the steamer leaving San Francisco on August 29th.
