THE LEGISLATURE.
 THE SENATE HOLDS A SHORT EXECUTIVE SESSION.
 W. R. Castle is Confirmed as Minister to Washington--A Deputy Auditor-General.
 ELEVENTH DAY, JUNE 26.

THE SENATE.
 The Senate was called to order at 10 a. m., President Wieler in the chair. Chaplain Peck offered a short prayer. The roll was called, all present except Senator Cecil Brown.
 Minutes of preceding meeting were read and approved.
 Senator Rice from the Printing Committee reported back printed copies of the act to grant a franchise for the lighting of Hilo by electricity, also the amendments reported by the Special Committee on the Land Bill.
 Senator Brown took his seat.
 Major Potter presented a message from the President making the following appointments: W. J. Gillan to be consul at Newcastle, N. S. W., Peter Denniston to be consul at Glasgow, Scotland and Geo. R. Carter to be deputy to the Auditor General. Laid over for consideration in executive session.
 Senator Brown from the Committee on Joint Rules reported the rules adopted. The same were read by the Secretary and adopted, after which they were referred to the Printing Committee.
 Senator Baldwin stated that he had a report ready from the Special Committee on the appointment of W. R. Castle as Minister to Washington.
 On motion of Senator Brown the Senate went into executive session.
 Minister Damon introduced a supplementary appropriation bill, setting aside \$32,500 for internal improvements. On motion the bill took its regular order.
 On motion the Senate adjourned to 10 a. m. Thursday.

THE EXECUTIVE SESSION.
 The Senate executive session lasted about an hour this morning. The three appointments presented by the President this morning were quickly confirmed. The nomination of W. R. Castle was then taken up together with the report of the Special Committee on the same. The opposition tried hard to defeat the nomination but could not obtain the requisite eight votes. When the final vote was taken and the nomination confirmed several of the opposition Senators changed their votes, and afterwards all were pledged to secrecy. Senator Wright made an effort to have the report of the committee published but could not succeed. It is understood that the actual vote was 8 to 7 and that the government only succeeded in getting the last man this morning. The vote after the changes were all made stood 10 to 4 in favor of confirmation.

THE REPRESENTATIVES.
 After the usual routine business of prayer, roll call and reading of the minutes Rep. Kamaoha from the Committee on Joint Rules reported. On motion the report was laid on the table and made the special order of the day.
 Rep. Robertson introduced the following Joint Resolution: "Whereas the system of land transfer and registry of deeds now in vogue in this country is

unsatisfactory and fails to accomplish the object intended, and whereas the great uncertainty in many of the titles to land tends to hinder and obstruct the development and progress of the country.
 Be it resolved by the Senate and the House of Representatives that the President of the Republic be requested to appoint a commission consisting of three suitable persons to consider the different systems of land transfer existing in other countries and make a report thereon to the next session of the Legislature with such recommendations as to them shall seem proper.
 Act 2a appropriating \$12,000 for the expenses of the Legislature hitherto passed, was reconsidered and under suspension of the rules referred back to the Finance Committee.
 Rep. Richards asked for information about Appropriation bills 2 b and 2c, whereupon the Minister of Finance asked leave to withdraw them for the present. Granted.
 Rep. McBryde was excused for the balance of the day on his own request.

The House then took up the report of the Committee on Joint Rules which was adopted with a few minor changes, on which the Committee from the House is instructed to confer with that of the Senate.
 The clerk was instructed to notify the Senate that the House had amended certain of the rules.

AFTERNOON SESSION.
 Rep. Richard called up the bill to grant an electric franchise for Hilo, but after some discussion it was laid over to await the action of the Senate.
 The Act to Regulate the Currency was next taken up, read the second time, passed, ordered engrossed and its third reading made the special order of the day for tomorrow.
 Attorney-General Smith stated that two members of the Council of State elected by the House: John Eua and Geo. W. Smith were ineligible on account of holding government positions at the time of their election. He moved that the matter be referred to the Nominating Committee for investigation and report. Carried.

NOTES.
 Senators get round early in the morning and do a little communitating and committee work before the session opens.
 Strenuous efforts were made this morning to prevent the proceedings of the executive session from leaking out.
 Printed copies of the bill to grant a franchise for the Honolulu Electric Street Railway Company were distributed in the Senate today. The bill takes up twenty pages.

THE HIGHER COURTS.
Proceedings and a Decision of the Supreme Court.
 A new trial has been refused to Kahalauia and Kilikina Hake (w) by the Supreme Court in a decision written by Chief Justice Judd. They were fined \$50 and \$20 respectively in the District Court. They appealed to the Circuit Court, where the conviction was affirmed. They appealed to the Supreme Court, which granted them a new trial. On being tried a second time they were again convicted, and this time sentenced, the man to one year's and the woman to four months' imprisonment. Robertson for prosecution;

THE COUNCIL OF STATE.

Its Personnel Complete With Executive Appointees.

Article 81 of the Constitution says: "There shall be a Council of State of fifteen members, five of whom shall be elected by the Senate, five by the House of Representatives, and five appointed by the President with the approval of the Cabinet. The members of the Executive Council may sit and take part in the meetings of the Council of State, but shall not vote."

The same Article provides that the Council of State shall be elected and appointed at the first session of the Legislature, and at each regular session held thereafter. The Council may appropriate money in serious emergencies between sessions of the Legislature. It joins with the Cabinet in advising the President regarding reprieves, pardons and commutations of sentences. It shall also, when called upon by the President advise him in all matters for the good of the state wherein he shall require its advice. Its members are to serve without pay.

In accordance with the terms of the Constitution, the following elections and appointments to the Council of State have been made:

By the House of Representatives—Mark P. Robinson, John Ena, E. L. Naone, A. G. M. Robertson, G. W. Smith.

By the Senate—C. Bolte, P. C. Jones, W. C. Wilder, Cecil Brown, J. A. Kennedy.

By the President—John Emmott, T. B. Murray, Henry Smith, J. P. Mendonca, C. M. Cooke.

Treasury Statement.

Minister Damon's weekly financial statement shows the receipts of the week to have been \$68,241.45, of which \$12,750 was from customs and \$50,000 from sale of treasury notes.

The expenditures were \$2,861. The available cash on hand is \$293,841.57, divided as follows: Cash on hand in Postal Savings Bank \$139,060.90, to credit of Road Boards \$22,180.74, School Boards \$6,176.70, Current Account \$126,423.33.

Speckels in London.

A late London paper has the following: Mr. Claus Speckels and wife, with 150 trunks, arrived at a prominent hotel here May 31 and engaged a gorgeous suite of rooms. Mr. Speckels had no sooner settled down in his apartments than he accidentally heard that their former occupant had suffered from fever. Consequently he and Mrs. Speckels hastily left the hotel with their baggage in the middle of the night.

Drowned by a Catfish.

John Harnett, who was recently fishing in the Osage River, twenty-five miles from Jefferson City, Mo., caught a catfish weighing 165 pounds on a trout line, and was trying to land it when he lost his balance, and was drawn into the river by the fish. He had wrapped one end of the line around his hand, and in its struggles the fish succeeded in drowning him. The boy was found with grappling hooks, and the fish was captured.

OBSERVATIONS.

Land jobbery is what the people at large expect the Legislature to prevent in leg slating the new land law.

There should surely be no complaint, such as is heard, about scarcity of water in households, with that new pumping plant installed.

And still the family quarrel over Mr. Castle's nomination to Washington goes on. As the nominee had been "urgently requested" to accept, and only accepted the offer as a "temporary" incumbent, the fight his friends and his paper are making for him is hard to understand.

COUNCIL OF STATE.

While the constitutional convention was disposed to eliminate from the republic everything savoring of the monarchy, it borrowed from the monarchy its privy council under another name and made its term only transitory. The august body is now constituted by the selection of three elective powers, the people having no say in the matter. The fifth wheel to the coach may be useful to the country in saving special sessions of the Legislature, which would be costly and impossible to convene if required at an hour's notice, in the event of a grave emergency such as pestilence or war. In the main the Council of State is about as representative of the material interests of the country as could be expected, seeing that the selection was limited to persons eligible to election as members of the Legislature, and many truly representative men failed to qualify by swearing adhesion to the republic. There are four members of Hawaiian blood in the fifteen, which is probably more than the proportion of power the foreign oligarchy desires the Hawaiians to have in their own country. Popularity is of no use to members of a body that is independent of the people, but if the Councilors of State place any value upon regard of grateful hearts, they can secure it through the exercise of their function of advising the Executive in the matter of pardons. There is a grand opportunity of promoting that reconciliation of the natives, without which there is no permanent assurance of tranquillity, presented to the depositaries of the pardoning power. There are prisoners of war whose release should have immediately followed the restoration of peace, according to the example of the great nation of which it is desired, professedly, by the Government to make this country a part. These ought to be released, on the first anniversary of the republic, from the penal servitude to which they were committed by a commission of war at a time of profound peace. Others who were found guilty of instigating, or being accessory to, the insurrection, should at least have their outrageously long sentences, covering in many cases more than their expectation of life, commuted to terms short enough to give their wives, mothers, children, brothers and sisters the hope of soon having them back to their homes with happy years of domesticity in prospect. Make a record for civilization and humanity for yourselves, gentlemen, and it will not be forgotten when you may desire, as doubtless many of you will, to have the higher honor of being chosen by the people to serve them in the representative councils of state.

L. T. Kenake was unanimously re-elected last night as second lieutenant of Company B.

MR. CASTLE WINS.

Since another paragraph on the subject was in type, the Senate has ratified the nomination of Mr. W. R. Castle by, it is reported, a close shave. Since the institution of the Provisional Government, no act of either it or the Government of the succeeding Republic has been more unpopular among its strongest supporters. Now, however, the die is cast and the country will await with some interest the making of Mr. Castle's record as a diplomat. If he disappoint the expectations of those who opposed his appointment, his triumph will be doubly glorious. In the meantime there will be much suspicion as to the real reason for the forcing of Mr. Castle down the throat of an evidently unwilling people. There is also to face the possibility that the new Minister will not be received at Washington, and then in the interval between sessions the Executive will have the responsibility of finding a man who will go down with his fellow-citizens at home as well as with the administration at Washington.
