A MEETING OF INTEREST HELD

Takes Action Relative to Insanitary Condition of
Certain Buildings.--Will Try to Get
Odorless Excavator.

LARGE PINEAPPLE CANNERY FOR OAHU.

Largest Cannery in Territory Nearing Completion.--Will
Give Employment to Three Hundred Persons.--Will
Manufacture Cans in Separate Establishment.

MEETING OF THE IMPROVEMENT ASSOCIATION.

The Wailuku District Improve-
ment Association held its regu-
lar monthly meeting on Thursday
evening.

The attendance was not so large
as usual but the interest was quite
as great.

In the absence of President
Wadsworth, D. H. Davis presided.
A communication was received
calling the attention of the Associ-
ation to the fact that certain buildings
had been condemned by the Board
of Health many months ago as
being insanitary and yet no action
had been taken since then. W. J.
Coelho moved to lay the matter
before the Board of Health. Rev.
Ault and L. M. Baldwin opposed
this and advised taking the matter
up first with the local representa-
tive of the Board as being the prop-
er officer to whom the communi-
cation should be addressed. Carried.

Judge McKay reported that he
had laid the matter of the need of
certain street lamps before the
Board of Supervisors and while
that body had referred the matter
to the proper officer no lamps had
been put in place.

A Communication was received
by the Tax Commission asking for
suggestions. The communication
was referred to the Executive Com-
mittee.

The matter of an odorless exca-
vator for Wailuku was discussed
and a letter received from the Pres-
ident of the Board of Health
stating that no help from that
body could be given. Coelho stated
that the many excavators of the
Board were under the control of
the Superintendent of Public
Works and loaned by that official
to the County of Oahu. This called
forth caustic language from
many present as all felt that as
they were paid for by funds raised
by all of the tax payers of the Ter-

ritory it was a gross injustice to
turn them over for the benefit of
one locality.

The matter will be taken up with
the Superintendent of Public
Works and the Acting Governor.

Coelho spoke of the injury to the
young trees along the public roads
by cattle of the H. C. & S. Co. that
came out on the roads every night
and even in town. He said steps
would have to be taken to get after
Wells as the cattle came on the
road through an opening cut in
the fence by the Wailuku Sugar
Company where they have laid
their new track below the old de-
pot. The cattle continue to come
out on the road at night and are
not only damaging the trees but
are a nuisance on the public road
as they sleep in the road and cause
horses to shy and some of them re-
fuse to move when vehicles are
driven by. Such indifference to
the rights of the public in matters
of this kind and in placing wretched
temporary crossings of rails on
the public roads would justify the
Board of Supervisors to demand
better treatment in future or re-
fuse to grant privileges asked for.

ANOTHER LARGE CANNERY.

At Iwilei on Oahu is being con-
structed the largest pineapple can-
nery in the territory. It will be
ready for business in a week or so
and will give employment to 300
men women and children. In the
packing of pines the finest refined
sugar is required and a large quan-
tity is now on hand for this pur-
pose. Cans for the product will be
manufactured by the American Can
Company which has a factory in
Honolulu that will manufacture
from 70,000 to 80,000 cans per day
and employ about sixty-five men.
The amount of tin required for this
factory will reach as much as
five tons of sheet tin per day.

As the pineapple has far out-
stripped any other product of the
Territory except sugar it will give
employment to many persons here
who do not care to engage in that
industry.

Persons on these islands believe
there is no place in the Territory
where pineapple will do so well as
at Haiku and the surrounding
country and if the industry con-
tinues to prosper we may yet have
the largest factory and canning
establishment.

Divides the Appropriation.

The last Legislature appropriated
the sum of \$18,000 for the Liquor
License Commissions of the various
Counties, but did not specify in what
proportion it should be divided.
Treasurer Campbell has been en-
deavoring to arrive at a fair division
of the money, and has made the fol-
lowing apportionment.

Oahu, \$6000; Hawaii, \$4500; Maui,
\$1000; Kauai, \$3500.

Mr. Campbell says he thinks this
will be about the right division, based
on what he figures it will cost the

several counties to run the Commis-
sions. It took considerable figuring
to arrive at a satisfactory apportion-
ment. An equal division, of course,
would not be right, as the expenses
and work of the commission of one
county are not the same as in an-
other. Two principal factors enter-
ed into the calculations,—the size of
county and the number of saloons in
it.

It was as first suggested that the
division might be made on the basis
of the amount of licenses collected in
the several counties during the year,
but this would give Oahu about 60
per cent of the fund. During the 11
months past, which practically means
for the fiscal year ending June 30, as
no more licenses will be collected this
year, the license collections have
amounted to the following sums:
Oahu, \$59,359.57; Hawaii, \$17,314.-
51; Maui, \$11,146.25; Kauai, \$9,666.-
66—total \$97,486.99.

The \$18,000 appropriation which
has just been apportioned is for the
purpose of paying the various ex-
penses of the Liquor License Com-
missions, including the pay of inspec-
tors, traveling expenses, pay of
secretaries, etc.

I'm for You.

That is what the horse men of Maui
are saying to the public and that is
what they mean. The evidence is
the fact that they are training a
number of horses at their own ex-
pense to entertain the public on July
Fourth but do not hope of remunera-
tion at present but hope to in
future years. If racing is kept up
along fair lines it will encourage
breeders and ranch owners to breed
good horses as well as good cattle
and from past experience they know
which pays the best. It is but one
or two years distant when Maui will
lead the group in the encouragement
of racing and breeding good horses
and as in the past the purses offered
by the Association will be the largest
ever offered by any racing associa-
tion in this territory and it will prob-
ably be confined to Hawaiian bred
horses. So as to repay the home
producer for his trouble.

The few men who take an interest
in keeping up this good work are
leaving no stone unturned to make
this coming meeting a success in
every respect and their efforts de-
serve patronage.

The present programme consists of
about sixteen races, running, trot-
ting, Mule and Automobile races and
furnishes sufficient variety to suit
anyone.

License Commissioners Meet.

The Board of License Commis-
sioners for the county of Maui met in
the public room of the Masonic Temple
Thursday morning and received a
number of new applications for liquor
licenses.

A number of applications were in
for the position of inspector.

James Kirkland was appointed to
the position and was ordered to in-
spect the places where traffic in
liquor is proposed to be carried on
and report at the next meeting.

None of the later applicants will
be granted a license until a report is
received by the Board.

Monday evening at the Wailuku Arm-
ory the Catholic Ladies Aid Society

cottage for the brothers of St. Anthony's
school.

On the day following, June 11, at the

one to the luau.

A Correction. We call special attention to the corrected statement of the condition of the Lahaina National Bank as called for by the comptroller of the currency on May 20th.

We regret the error that occurred in the statement as published last week and congratulate the bank on its splendid strong showing at the end of the first year of its existence.

Will rehabilitate The owners of the land on which the town of Kahului is situated are considering the question of building up the town on new lines.

All of the land there has been for many years under leases and was not under the control of the owners but as the lease are now about to expire it will be possible to make a very different town there than there has been in the past.

A notice appears in this issue of the News requesting all parties holding leases to meet with the representatives of the Company for a conference.

It is the desire to have all prospective residents of New Kahului to be present as well as those who are now residents of the place.

With its harbor improvements and its natural advantages Kahului should be the second city of importance in the territory.

No Saloons The Board of License Commissioners of the for Hawaii. County of Hawaii have adopted a resolution that will make that island a dry one for a time at least and will do more to bring about a change of a law at the next session of the Legislature than any thing they could do unless it was to have refused all applicants a license on the big island.

The Board has adjourned until July 3rd at which time they will receive applications for licenses. After this is done it will be necessary for them to publish the names of the applicants and the nature of the license sought by the applicant which will cause the places of business to be closed until some time in August. As all licenses expire on June 30th there will be no legal places of business on the island except those paying special fifteen dollar per day licenses and those in the outer districts cannot afford to do that. It will be hard to convince many that the law does not infringe upon their rights and much opposition to the law will doubtless develop.

The San Francisco Traffic on the street cars of San Francisco is increasing and the strike seems

to be losing ground, probably due in a great measure to acts of violence on the part of the lawless element of that body. Since the strike was declared it has been the custom of the lower element of that organization to throw bars of iron, stones and bricks from the tops of high buildings where they were working at street cars as they passed below. These cars had for passengers innocent women and children yet this seemed to make no difference with the human beasts who sympathized with the strikers. Women have repeatedly been most grossly insulted for riding on the street cars by this class of men who claim to be strikers or strike sympathizers. Attempts have been made to dynamite the cars loaded with passengers and a consignment of powder that was designed for this purpose has just been seized by the police.

The leaders of the Labor Union are apparently in no way to blame for the lawlessness of some of the members and seem to be trying to prevent acts of violence as they must know that such acts injure their cause and make it all the harder for their cause to succeed. The moral support of the community would do a great deal toward making their cause succeed but where such criminal acts are practiced it is certain they will lose that support that means so much to them.

Even though the wages paid in the city are high the prosecution of officials and men high in financial affairs and especially officials of the very roads on which these strikers were employed made it all the more easy for them to gain their ends. Had there been fewer criminals in their forces the strikers could have easily won as none of the better class of the city could have any sympathy with the railroad officials. If the strikers lose their fight it will in all probability be entirely due to acts of violence on the part of many of the criminal element of their organization. Such acts by this class of men have brought odium on the organization that has done much for bettering the condition of the laboring men and can do much yet for them.

It cannot be denied that the laborer has as much right to organize for his advancement as the capitalists have to organize for theirs. The criminal element in labor unions occupies the same position in the union as the pirates of finance do in financial circles. Each class is a criminal one and a menace to the welfare of the community.

Division of Animal Industry.

Rule 4. To amend rule 1 of the Division of Animal Industry governing the inspection and testing of imported live stock.

It having been found impracticable, for want of competent inspectors, to have horse stock (including mules and asses) and cattle submitted to respectively the mallein and the tuberculin tests at any other port than Honolulu, it is ordered that paragraph 4 of Rule 1 of the Division of Animal Industry of this Board be and is hereby amended to read as follows: "Until further notice the port of Honolulu shall constitute the only port of entry for horse stock and cattle, unless the same shall be accompanied by certificate of mallein or tuberculin tests as provided for in Rule 2 of the Division of Animal Industry of this Board."

Any violation of this rule is a misdemeanor.

This regulation shall take effect at once.

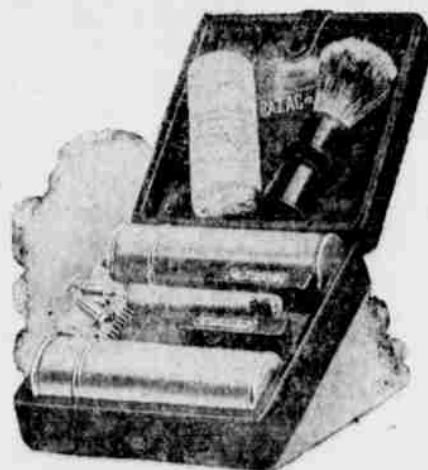

(Continued from last issue.)

"A bill was passed in the local legislature the other day asking for a revision of the Organic Act. It is a pretty good act and may not need revision, but a few amendments would not come amiss; for instance, among others, a measure adjusting the powers and duties of certain territorial officials to meet the conditions created by the inauguration of county government, and legislation allowing amendments to our land laws, by our legislature subject to the approval of Congress. The reason for this is obvious; such matters are local and locally understood. Congress would be at sea in attempting to enact the details of our land management, and the legislature would be safeguarded by the requirement of the approval of Congress.

"One of our needs, perhaps the greatest of them all, and yet not strongly in evidence at the present time, is the building up of our industrial, social and political life by the introduction from the mainland of American families who shall come to stay, and whose boys and girls shall grow up with the country and become a part of it. For about ten years something of this process has been going on, many American families having come, but as business has fluctuated a considerable proportion of these have returned to the mainland. The resulting benefit to this community has, however, been very great. But few of these have been farmers, the greater proportion being mechanics, clerks and men engaged in various branches of business.

"The Territory has many thousands of acres of land suitable for farming; land that will furnish to a family substantially all of its food except flour and certain groceries, and produce beside, something in demand in the world's markets; fruit, vegetables, maize, coffee, tobacco, sisal, with some promising experimental products such as vanilla, cacao and silk. The available land of the Territory is so limited that its tendency is to rise in value. Every settler by the fact of his occupation raises the value of the land next to him, while a colony of settlers has a remarkably stimulating effect on the adjacent lands. Wailawa is often quoted and may be quoted again as an instance of what the work and the perseverance of the American farmer can do here.

"There are many here who feel the danger of our status unless effort is made to replenish the American leaven in this community. The Chinese and Japanese boys in our schools will be voters in a few years, and they will make good citizens, but will they, with their traditions and parental influence, be equal to the upholding of American standards of life in the best American spirit? I appreciate these people, they are falling in with our methods, they are joining the procession, but if they should become the leaders and the controllers of the public sentiments would that sentiment be American in the best sense?

"What is the danger? It is easy to see that the Japanese and Chinese merchants will hold the patronage mainly of their countrymen and with eighty or ninety thousand of such countrymen the advantage of these merchants is incontestable, especially as they compete largely for the patronage of the other races represented here. Hitherto these Chinese and Japanese merchants have gone to the local wholesaling importing houses conducted by Americans, Germans, English and others, for their goods other than those of Chinese and Japanese origin. They are now beginning to explore the markets on the mainland and perhaps elsewhere with a view to doing their own importing. If this should be carried out and should become the rule with these men, the loss of business would be most keenly felt by wholesale business houses just mentioned. Already there have been shrinkages in certain lines of business. Every such diminution of business leaves clerks and other employes without work, some of them have to go away. Our little American community cannot stand this process very long without showing it, and being weakened by it.

"The American farmer is a good consumer. He lives comfortably; he consumes lumber, hardware, and dry goods, not to mention many things less necessary. A thousand new families would mean an added demand for goods that would give business an upward tendency. A thousand American farmers with their families added to our population and living contentedly upon their own farms, would almost guarantee the continuance and growth of the public sentiment to which I have already referred. With such a reinforcement every other good interest would be conserved and the work of the Territory in managing its own affairs would become easier, and statehood would, I believe, loom up as something more than a mere distant hope."
