## THE BIG ISLAND'S NEED.

ROADS TO OPEN UP ITS FERTILE  
LANDS.

Scheme for Settling the Country and  
Increasing the Revenue—"Mill-  
ions in It."

The Hilo delegation have filed  
their protest, made their com-  
plaint, registered their kick or  
whatever else it may have been  
which they came down here for,  
and, with the exception of Mr.  
Roebenstien, gone home again.  
After making the mistake of ask-  
ing for a half a dozen minor im-  
provements for the town of Hilo,  
such as a new jail, postoffice, etc.,  
and classifying these things as of  
the same importance, apparently,  
as the opening up of the country  
in general for development, it  
is perhaps well to look into the  
matter of their petition and see,  
if possible, wherein the really good  
points lie. Hawaii is the great-  
est, most fertile and by far the  
most important island of the  
group and our principal source  
of revenue, inasmuch as it pro-  
duces more than one-half of the  
sugar and live stock and practi-  
cally all of the coffee raised in  
the Islands. It is also the poorest  
equipped in the way of roads.  
Aside from the highway connect-  
ing Hilo with the volcano there is  
not a decent road on Hawaii.  
When this road was built the  
region known as Olaa yielded the  
government \$150 per year. Since  
its construction, three years ago,  
this revenue has increased to  
\$15,000. And yet, for lack of  
cross roads, leading from the  
main highway through Olaa, up  
and down the mountain side, but  
a fractional portion of this tract  
has been settled upon and im-  
proved. Three miles above Hilo  
is an area of about 16,000 acres  
of excellent land for coffee grow-  
ing and fruit raising. Fifteen  
hundred acres of this has been  
taken up and is being developed,  
slowly. There is no road, no trail  
even, unless the tortuous footpaths  
over the irregularly placed blocks  
of lava may be, by courtesy, called  
a trail. Yet it is another Olaa  
awaiting a road to obtain im-  
mediate settlement.

Puna proper contains from 20,  
000 to 25,000 acres of the best  
coffee land and fruit land on the  
group, yet it has absolutely no  
road. The gentle burro, the pa-  
tient, long-eared brother of a good-  
ly percentage of the members of  
the Ancient Regime, affords the  
only method of transportation.  
Throughout the districts of Kau,  
Puna, Hilo, Hamakua and Kona  
are hundreds of thousands of acres  
of magnificent soil, which would  
be taken up and put under a high  
state of cultivation, at once, were  
there but some reasonable means  
of transporting supplies and the  
products of the land to and from  
the respective shipping points. Land  
that today is held at from fifty cents  
to three dollars per acre would, with  
the advent of good roads, easily  
bring fifty dollars and upward. Land  
that would, as has been well demon-  
strated, yield a net income, when  
trees are in full bearing, of any-  
where from seventy-five to three  
hundred dollars per acre.

The fragments of road, discon-  
nected and of use only to a few  
plantations, which are scattered  
through Hamakua, Kohala and  
Kona, are of no value as a factor  
in future development until they are  
converted into a continuous line of  
roadway. The island needs, to-  
day, at least four hundred miles  
of good roads to render accessible  
the fruit and coffee lands.

It is proposed to add to the  
road tax (\$25,428) the sum of  
\$30,750 from current receipts and  
revenues, making \$56,178 to be  
divided among the six districts of  
Hawaii. This would but little  
more than cover the cost of re-  
pairs on existing roads and streets.

A plan which has proven both  
economical and effective in

other countries seems to be  
peculiarly well adapted to cover  
the present difficulty. Its adop-  
tion has led to the settling up of  
millions of acres in different por-  
tions of America where other  
means failed utterly. Where  
large and fertile areas were  
without roads to connect them  
with their natural markets or  
shipping points, the people of the  
county would vote bonds, gener-  
ally payable in from twenty to  
thirty years, and bearing a  
moderate rate of interest, suffi-  
cient in amount to build good,  
substantial roadways ramifying  
the territory which it was  
desired to reach. The bonds  
were a tax on the land, on the  
property benefited, and in some  
cases represented more than two-  
thirds of the original value of the  
area bonded. There never has  
been any difficulty in effecting a  
ready sale of such securities at a  
premium. During the first ten or  
fifteen years interest only was  
payable; after expiration of that  
period, the principal was paid in  
small installments. This system  
entails no burden whatever upon  
a community. By the time the  
principal of the bonds begins to  
fall due, anywhere from five to  
one hundred times as many  
people occupy the land and,  
therefore, the pro rata amount  
payable by one individual is but  
a trifle.

Ways and means for increasing  
the revenues are occupying so  
much of the time of our legisla-  
tors, and the results are so un-  
satisfactory, that it would be well  
to give this matter considerable  
thought.

Suppose the Government, hav-  
ing now on hand a mass of data  
relative to the various areas of  
good land, its adaptability to a  
high state of cultivation, etc., were  
to issue and sell a half million  
dollars' worth of bonds, the pro-  
ceeds to be used for road building.  
As fast as any tract is opened,  
settlers will flock in. The land  
being put to immediate use be-  
comes infinitely more valuable,  
and when the bonds fall due  
there would be no question as to  
their payment by the beneficiaries  
of the act.

Or suppose the Government  
were to issue short time bonds,  
say eight years, and raise the  
price of the lands to such a figure  
as would cover the cost of the  
roads leading to them. A private in-  
dividual or corporation purchases  
a large tract of land and improves  
it with roadways and in a variety  
of ways to render it salable at a  
profit. Under normal conditions  
this is almost invariably a suc-  
cessful operation.

It is not well for a Government  
to convert itself into a firm of real  
estate agents, but taking into con-  
sideration the exigencies of the  
case, the need of permanently in-  
creased revenues, the equally  
vital need of settlement by civil-  
ized people, and considering also  
the vast benefits to the whole  
country certain to ensue from the  
pursuance of such a course, the  
writer fails to see wherein any  
large degree of fault can lie in the  
carrying out of such a scheme.

## Some Heavy Safes.

A large crowd of people have  
been putting in the morning boss-  
ing the unloading of two heavy  
safes and their transportation to  
the upper floor of the Republic  
building. The safes weigh be-  
tween three and a half and four  
tons each and will be used by the  
Yokohama Specie Bank which  
now occupies the whole of the up-  
per floor of that building. Has-  
tace & Co. have the job and it is  
being superintended by Mr. Oud-  
erkirk. Architect Ripley has cer-  
tified that the floor joists are abun-  
dantly able to stand any weight  
that can reasonably be put on  
them, and the stairway up which  
the safes were rolled was strength-  
ened for the occasion.

F. A. Schaefer & Co. ask for a  
correction of the statement in re-  
gard to dividends paid on Pacific  
Sugar Mill stock, saying that the  
total dividend paid is fifteen per  
cent and not eighty-five per cent  
this year.

## THE PATENT LAWS.

The Amendments Thereon Now Before  
the Senate.

If the amendments to the pre-  
sent patent laws now before the  
Senate are adopted by the legisla-  
ture and become law Sections 2  
and 3 will read as follows, and  
two new Sections, numbered 15  
and 16, will be added:

"Section 2. Every patent shall  
contain a short title or description  
of the invention or discovery, cor-  
rectly indicating its nature and de-  
sign, and a grant to the patentee,  
his heirs or assigns, for the term  
of fifteen years, of the exclusive  
right to make, use and vend the  
invention or discovery throughout  
the Hawaiian Islands, referring to  
the specifications for the particu-  
lars thereof. A copy of the  
specifications and drawing shall  
be annexed to the patent and be a  
part thereof."

"Section 3. Any person who  
has invented or discovered any  
new and useful art, machine, manu-  
facture, process or composition of  
matter, or any new and useful im-  
provement thereof not known or  
used by others in this country,  
and not patented (or described in  
any printed publication) in this  
or any foreign country before his  
invention or discovery thereof,  
may, upon payment of the fees re-  
quired by law, and other due pro-  
ceedings had, obtain a patent  
therefor. Provided, however, that  
any person who has invented or  
discovered any new and useful art,  
machine, manufacture, process or  
composition of matter, or any new  
and useful improvement thereof,  
and has received a patent or patents  
therefor from any foreign govern-  
ment, may also obtain a patent  
therefor in this country as pro-  
vided above, unless the thing patent-  
ed has been introduced into public  
use in the Hawaiian Islands  
for more than one year prior to  
the application for a patent. But  
every patent granted for an inven-  
tion which has been previously  
patented in a foreign country,  
shall be so limited that it shall  
not continue longer than the time  
of the expiration of such foreign  
patent, or if there are several fore-  
ign patents, it shall not continue  
longer than the time of the expira-  
tion of the one with the shortest  
unexpired term, and in no case  
shall it be in force more than fif-  
teen years."

"Section 15. Whenever any  
patent is inoperative or invalid,  
by reason of a defective or insuf-  
ficient specification, or by reason  
of the patentee claiming as his  
own invention or discovery more  
than he had a right to claim as  
new, if the error had arisen by in-  
advertence, accident, or mistake,  
and without any fraudulent or de-  
ceptive intention, the Minister of  
the Interior shall, on the surren-  
der of such patent and the payment  
of the same fees required by law  
upon the issue of an original or  
first patent, cause a new patent  
for the same invention, and in accord-  
ance with the corrected specifica-  
tion, to be issued to the patentee,  
or, in the case of his death, or of  
an assignment of the whole or any  
undivided part of the original pa-  
tent, then to his executors, admin-  
istrators, or assigns, for the unex-  
pired part of the term of the origi-  
nal patent. Such surrender  
shall take effect upon the issue of  
the amended patent. The Minis-  
ter of the Interior may in his dis-  
cretion, upon demand of the ap-  
plicant, and upon payment of the  
same or first fee required to be  
paid on the issuing of a patent,  
cause several patents to be issued  
for distinct and separate parts  
of the thing patented. The spec-  
ifications and claim in every such  
case shall be subject to revision  
and restriction in the same man-  
ner as original applications are.  
Every patent so re-issued, to-  
gether with the corrected specifi-  
cation, shall have the same effect  
and operation in law, on the trial  
of all actions for causes thereafter  
arising, as if the same had been  
originally filed in such corrected  
form; but no new matter shall be  
introduced into the specification,  
nor in case of a machine patent  
shall the model or drawing be  
amended, except such by the

other, but when there is neither  
model nor drawing, amendments  
may be made upon proof satis-  
factory to the Minister of the In-  
terior, that such new matter or  
amendment was a part of the origi-  
nal invention, and was omitted  
from the specification by inadver-  
tence, accident, or mistake, as  
aforesaid. Upon the filing of any  
such application for a re-issue  
with the Minister of the Interior,  
the same examination shall be had  
as is provided by Section 6 of the  
'Act to regulate the issuing of  
Patents,' approved August 29th,  
1894."

"Section 16. Patents may be  
granted and issued and re-issued  
to the assignee of the inventor or  
discoverer, but the assignment  
must first be filed in the office  
of the Minister of the Interior.  
And in all cases of an application  
by an assignee for the issue of a  
patent, the application shall be  
made, and the specification signed  
as provided by law by the inventor  
or discoverer. An in all cases of  
an application for a re-issue of  
any patent, the application must  
be made, and the corrected specifi-  
cation signed by the inventor or  
discoverer, if he is living."

## QUEEN DOWAGER SUE.

Claim for Commissions and Wages—  
Other Court Matters.

L. K. Puahi (w), has brought  
suit for the May term of the Cir-  
cuit Court against Queen Dowager  
Kapiolani, to recover \$2701.90,  
balance claimed for services ren-  
dered as defendant's busi-  
ness agent, from October  
10, 1893, to January 18,  
1896, and estimated commissions  
since the alleged unjust dismissal  
of plaintiff at the latter date. The  
bases of the claim are five per cent  
commission and \$10 a week for  
120 weeks of labor, making a total  
claim of \$4174.25, on account of  
which the payment of \$1472.35 is  
acknowledged.

David Dayton has been appoint-  
ed administrator of the estate of  
James Donnelly under \$250 bond.

Questions of law have been re-  
solved by Judge Perry in the cases  
of I. I. Brown vs. C. A. Brown  
and Hemen vs. Kamakia.

Judge Perry rendered an oral  
decision, in Monsarrat vs. Mon-  
sarrat, sustaining the motion to  
quash proceedings for dissolution  
of order awarding alimony and to  
award custody of children. De-  
fendant noted exceptions. Kin-  
ney for plaintiff; Thurston for de-  
fendant.

L. Ahlo has sued Apa or Wong  
Fat for \$700 and interest from  
June 18, 1891, on two promissory  
notes, and under an allegation in  
the complaint, that defendant is  
secreting, or disposing of, or dam-  
aging his property. Deputy  
Sheriff Paha has attached the  
property, being the leasehold in a  
fish pond at Kaneohe.

The charge of assaulting an  
officer preferred against two sail-  
ors of the U. S. S. Petrel has been  
nolle pro'd and the men returned  
to the vessel.

Rep. Kamaooha returned from  
Hawaii yesterday and Rep. Ry-  
croft is due on Tuesday. After  
that time the House of Represen-  
tatives may be expected to get a  
move on and get through with the  
Appropriation bills anyhow.

John A. Hassinger, first clerk  
of the Interior Office, leaves by the  
bark Albert on a six months' leave  
of absence. He has been a  
great sufferer from rheumatism  
and has not had a vacation for  
twelve years. His many friends  
will hope that he may return with  
restored health.

One of the hymns to be sung at  
the anniversary service for the  
Sons of the Revolution, at Central  
Union church tomorrow evening,  
is the one composed for the Arbi-  
tration League of the United  
States, and sung for the first time  
at the recent convention of that  
body in Philadelphia, when it  
created a scene of great enthu-  
siasm. The hymn was lately re-  
printed in the BULLETIN, where  
the committee of arrangements  
for tomorrow's service found it.

## THE PORTUGUESE.

Senhor Canavaro, Portuguese Charge d'Affaires, is reported by the Hilo Tribune as being much gratified at the success of the sugar plantation and mill started by his countrymen in that district. There is no doubt that if the Portuguese only get a fair chance at the land, they will do well both for themselves and the country. Any conditions that keep that nationality largely colonized in Honolulu, whether the responsibility belongs to the Government or to the Portuguese, are to be deplored and as soon as possible ought to be remedied. City colonization without adequate employment for those able to work is liable to perpetuate discontent among the Portuguese, while continuing to be a source of embarrassment to the Government. They have as much right to live in the city as any other nationality, and no unfair elements should be allowed to prevent their getting all the employment for which they are peculiarly adapted, yet it is not to be gainsaid that their best prosperity, as well as their highest value as citizens, would be found in their settlement upon the soil, as individual or co-operative cultivators. Established in the country upon such a basis every avenue to success in any other calling in life would be open to their children, according to their bents and capacities, after receiving a substantial grounding in the now dominant language of the country and in general knowledge. In the free schools of the country the rising generation of Portuguese may add to the practical industrial qualities of their parents the benefits of a sound education which will qualify them for competing in the race of material and social progress with the nationalities born to the English tongue in these islands.

Before counseling procrastination on any question of needed legislation at this session, it should be remembered that many of the members of the present Legislature, who have the benefit of current discussions in public and private, may not be in the next Legislature. In the meantime, judging from past experience, the only fruits of waiting will be fresh—doubtless some very fresh—accretions to the mass of empirical theories that now confuse the minds of the assembled wisdom.

It is no small advantage, in the way of perfecting knowledge, to have measures upon moot questions full of difficulties introduced and thoroughly discussed, whether they are passed at the session when introduced or not. How many great political reforms gained in other countries have been agitated, in and out of the legislature, for many weary years before their consummation?

Contemporaries say there is not time to legislate an income tax law. Sluggard's excuse. What's

the matter with the present time, when the Legislature has nothing to do. The forty and odd days remaining of the ordinary limit is a good spell.

Now that the season for field athletic sports is on, considerate employers are commended to a consideration of the Saturday half-holiday question.

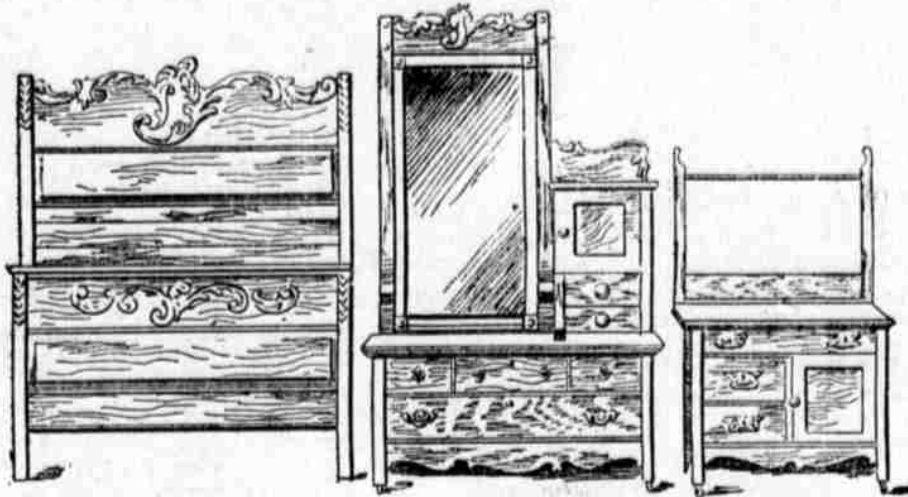

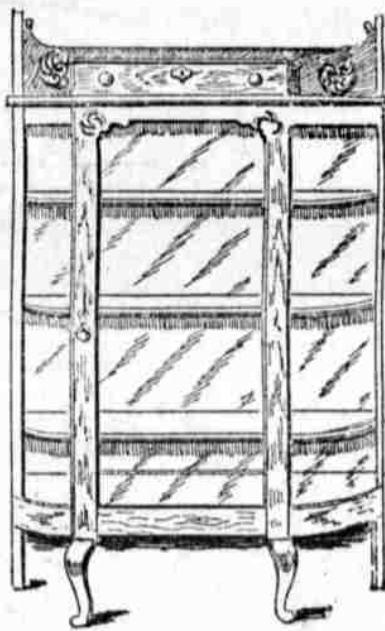

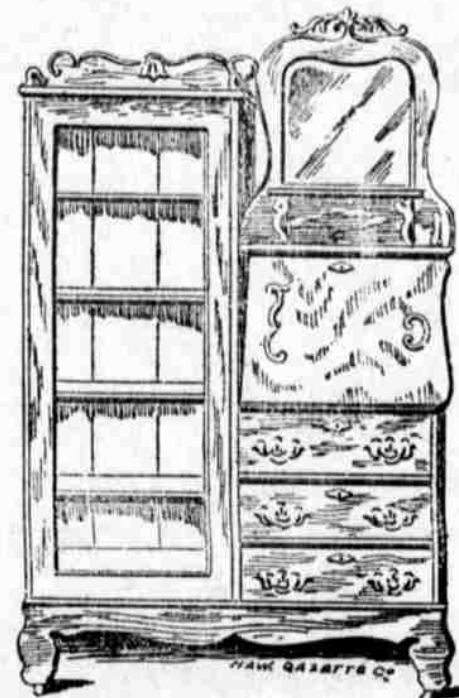

The Third Judicial Circuit of the Circuit Court was opened by Judge S. L. Austin at Kailua, Kona, on April 1, 1896, for the first time since its change from Waiohinu, Kau. The Court was held in the old skating rink, which is airy, large and very cool.

E. P. Dole represented the Republic of Hawaii as Deputy Attorney General; E. G. Hitchcock, as Sheriff of Hawaii; Chester A. Doyle, as Japanese interpreter; Li Cheung as Chinese interpreter, and Mr. Williams of Kohala, Hawaiian interpreter, D. Porter, Clerk of the Court, and Mr. Marks, Court stenographer.

The lawyers present were Messrs. Gardner K. Wilder, Gilbert F. Little, W. L. Stanley, S. M. Ballou, Enoch Johnson, H. L. Holstein, the new Senator, G. B. Kamaooha, Mr. Williams of Kohala and others.

Marshal Brown and Mr. Dillingham came from Honolulu via Mahukona, and stayed a day or so, then went over to Monsarrat's ranch to spend a week. Mrs. Paris's hotel was full. The latest acquisition to Kailua is a cottage of six rooms, which George McDougall has built for the accommodation of the traveling public. It was occupied by the Court folks and from all accounts the guests were well satisfied. Genial George spared no trouble to make all feel at home. His chef was formerly in the employ of the Hawaiian Hotel as first cook; so all were satisfied and pleased. Kailua has wanted a place of this kind for some time for the accommodation of invalids who would find Kona (at the beach) one of the greatest of places for helping weak lungs.

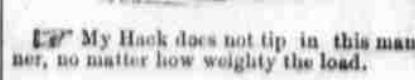

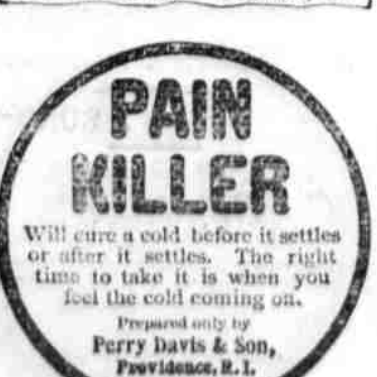

### AT EWA PLANTATION.

Enormous Yield of Sugar From Two Big Fields of Cane.

At the rate sugar is now being turned out of the Ewa mill, the estimated yield of 10,000 tons will be increased to 11,000 before the big mill stops grinding. The output of the mill during the present week has averaged about 104 tons per day. Last week the average was 111 tons daily and the week before it was 108 1/2.

The cane is yielding a better percentage of sugar than was expected, two large fields of 98 and 97 acres having averaged a little over nine tons of sugar to the acre. In addition to this a higher percentage of sugar is being squeezed out of the cane by the new improvements introduced by Manager Lowrie.

At present the cane is submitted to a pressure of 375 tons while going through the powerful rollers, from which it can readily be seen there is not much juice left in the trash.

New improvements introduced in the engineer's department have also resulted in a great saving of steam, so much so that two boilers are now idle the greater part of the time. All of which is good news for the stockholders and the general public who are indirectly concerned in the success of this vast enterprise.
