If the amendments to the present patent laws now before the
Senate are adopted by the legislature and become law Sections 2
and 3 will read as follows, and two new Sections, numbered 15
and 16, will be added: "Section 2. Every patent shall
contain a short title or description contain a short title or description
of the invention or discovery, cor-
rectly indicating its nature rectly ndicating its nature and de-
sign, and a grant to the patentee,
his heirs or assigs, shis heirs or assigns, for the term,
of fifteen years, of the exclusive
rif oright to make, use and vend the
rinvention or discovery throughout the Hawaiian Islands, referring
to the specifications for the particulars thereof. A copy of the
specifications and drawing shall
be annexed to the patent and be a part thereof."
"Section 3 . Any person who
has invented or discovered any
