There was scarcely a time during the entire race when the yachts were on the same tack that they were not within hall of each after.

Through the long, genile creatless swells on the fifteen-mile stretch by windward the Shamrock proved conclusively that she was a trifle the better ship. Her advocates have declared from the start that in smooth water and with the breeze at eight knots or more she would surprise the Tankes talent and she did. So, about two minutes after crossing the line, the slim British ship broke with her rival and went on the port tack. 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

It is the intention of the committee tonight to sait the first leg to windward, which will make the other two a broad reach and a close reach, provided the wind does not shift.

At Sandy Hook tonight everything is ready from comorrow's race, and if the weather predictions prove true the yachts will have pienty of wind. At 10 o'clock tonight the velocity of the wind

was thirty-six miles an hour, was thirty-six miles an hour.

While it was a quiet day, with the yachts lying at the mooring inside sandy Hook, the officials of the New York Yacht Club and the Royal Ulster Yacht Club had a busy time of it complying with the request of Sir Thomas Lipton, backed by the assent of E. D. Morgan of the Columbia, that in future the races should be had on consecutive days, not counting Sunday. In addition there came a request from George tion there came a request from George L. Watson, the designer of the Sham-rock, for a remeasurement because of his intention to take out ballast before

his intention to take out ballast before tomorrow's race.

On the first proposition an agreement was finally reached between the challenge committees of the two clubs for a race every day, but on the second Mr. Watson, after further considering the matter, decided to let it drop, and the yacht will sall tomorrow with exactly the same ballast she has carried in previous races. This will not prevent Mr. Watson taking out ballast at any time he may wish, which, of course, the club is willing to have done at any time. If, however, after tomorrow's race Mr. Watson decides to take out ballast, it is probable that there will be no race on Friday, as under the new arrangement either as under the new arrangement either yacht is at liberty to decline to race on the next day.

About noon it was learned at the club that those in charge of the Shamrock desired to shift some ballast, which, of course, necessitated plans for re-measurements. Whether this plan of removing ballast from the challenger was made with a view of decreasing the stiffness of the boat or cutting the water line the matter of a few inches so as to gain in time allowance could not be ascertained. Mr. Watson was at the be ascertained. Mr. Watson was at the club about 3 o'clock, but found none of the officials in the building and left immediately. He admitted, however, that he proposed to take out ballast from the Shamrock but refused to make any other statement regarding

Under her present measurement the Shamrock allows the Columbia forty-three seconds. Much of this allowance was due to her great sail plan, as her water-line measurement is already some inches shorter than the Columbia's. It will be necessary for Mr. Watson to decrease the Shamrock's water-line length by a foot to order to gain line length by a foot in order to gain fifteen seconds in time allowance, and aithough the overhang of the chal-lenger, both fore and aft, is very long. it is thought that considerable ballast will have to be taken out in order to make a gain of even five or six seconds. Frequently they speared for whales and came up dripping. The race had now become a grand spectacle. Flanked by long line of yachts, excursion boats and tugs, the billowy balloons and spinnakers, sometimes balloons and spinnakers, sometimes tremulous as the yachts slipped down a swell, and again rounded in enormous and symmetrical curves, made a beautiful picture.

Gradually the white sloop began to Gradually the white sloop began to draw away from the Shamrock and gradually the hopes of the Yankees rose. The wind fell to four knots or thereabouts, and the slowest of the steam fleet had no trouble in keeping up. The wind freshened a mile or so when the white boat was within an eighth of a mile from home, and the Shamrock was slightly benefited, being the first feel its influence.

The magnificent feet massed back of and to the sides of the finish line gave the victor as she swept majestically across the most delivious greeting ever accorded a cup defender. Even the pandsmonlium of steam, prolonged us never before, could not drewn the shrill cheers of happy Americams. From every packed tier of ocean, sound and river steamer thousands of men and women waved hats and handkerchiefs and dags and unbrellas and let out all their energy of lungs in cheers and and flags and umbrellas and let out all their energy of lungs in cheers and yells. The Shamfock did not receive so tumultuous a recognition, but she was not neglected. There was a crowding forward to see the victor and van-quished as they passed in, lowering their titht salls.

The Columbia finally got her wind free again and pulled out, and, with surprising rapidity, opened up on the challenger and pulled out a lead that left the result no longer in doubt. She

THE THIRD ATTEMPT. NEW YORK, October 1.—The Columbia and Shamrock II tried today to win the second international race for win the second international race for the America cup and both failed mis-erably. After the first near of the race, which was little more than a drifting match, the Shamrock led, and when the race was called off, when the second leg of the triangular course of thirty miles was haif-covered, the Irish boat led by hearly half a mile. Althought the Sham-rock was well ahead when the time limit expired, the partisans of the Irish boat found little in that fact to comfort them.

them.

Both the Shamrock and her rival found the wind gusty and fluky, and it finally died to such an extent that the race developed into a drifting match pure and simple. First the Shamrock and then the Columbia would profit by some wandering breeze. They alternately led until well into the second ten miles on the way home, when the committee called the race off, as there was absolutely no chance for the yachts to finish within the time set by the comfinish within the time set by the com-

finish within the time set by the committee.

There can be no question that, in the light of today's race, the Shamrock showed her superiority in very light airs. While the breeze held good the Columbia seemingly had an advantage. The partisans of the American boat, who were afloat by the thousands and surrounded the down-town bulletin-boards by ten of thousands, were greatly relieved when it became certain that the race would not be finished.

The race could I no wise be looked upon as a test in any way of the yachts' capabilities even in light airs. The light wind that barely filled the sails jumped from one part of the course to another and first one boat and then the other gave her rival the heartache by catching the breeze and moving along a few hundred feet, while the other unfortunate lay becaimed, waiting for the fickle wind to jump to the other side and give her a boost toward overtaking her rival.

The start was all in favor of the Columbia. Barr completely outmaneuvered Sycamore and got the while beauty across the line tweive seconds ahead of the challenger, securing the weather berth. Luck came to the aid of the white yacht before the boats had sailed fifteen minutes. There came a slant in the wind taily two points off.

the day.

Then followed a series of ingenious, but futile attempts on the part of the Yankee skipper to dislodge his antagonist from the favorable position which he had secured, and now seemed determined to retain. It was a little after 1:30 p. m. when Sir Thomas' boat passed the Herreshoff sloop to windward, and so blanketed her that the white yacht's sails shivered ominously in the wind, and she lost nearly all her headway. Captain Barr at once fook in head ward. in the wind, and she lost nearly all her headway. Captain Barr at once took in his fib-topsail, and set a long reaching lib-topsail, which maneuver was at once imitated by Captain Sycamore. The bronze yacht soon bianketed her antagonist again, and thus drew out ahead.

Time and again this was repeated. The Columbia would gather way again and close the open water between herself and the Shamrock, only to lose all self and the Shamrock, only to lose all her gain when the challenger's huge canvas shut off her wind and left her two or three lengths behind, practically motionless. Captain Barr got tired of this, and did a thing that made the critics stare. He lufted sharply under the stern of the Shamrock and went about on the port tack evidently intending to slide far enough out to windward to run no chance of being euchered out of any wind there might be blowing in the future. The Shamrock rounded the first ten-mile mark three minutes, eight seconds ahead of the Columbia and continued to draw away despite the failing breeze. When the race was called off about fifteen miles had been completed, with the Shamrock three-quarters of a mile in the lead.


