SENATE EXPERIENCES CHANGE OF HEART.

All Matters Relating to Pensions and Permanent Settlements Deferred to the Next Legislature,

TWENTY - THIRD DAY, JULY 11TH.

THE SENATE.

The Senate was called to order at 10 o'clock this morning, presiat 10 o'clock this morning, presi-dent Wilder in the chair. Roll lat of July of last year, the coun-called and minutes of yesterday try owed \$3,526,000 in bonded read and approved.

A communication was received from the House stating that Senate Joint Resolution relating total of \$3,585,000. On the first to the commission on the Pali road had been adopted. Also that Act No 11 fixing the terms of the Circuit Courts had passed its third reading.

Act No 6 appropriating \$58,600 for permanent settlements, together with Senator McCandless' amendment inserting an annual pension of \$5000 for the family of Chas. L. Carter, came up on the regular order of the day.

Senator Horner moved an amendment that all matters relative to pensions and permanent settlements be deferred to the regular session. The first vote was 5 for and 5 against, the second vote showed 7 for and 7 against, and the chair voted in the affirmative.

The amendment was then carried. Those voting for the amendment were Senators Baldwin, Hocking, Horner, Northrop, Mc-Candless, Wright and Lyman.

The chair stated that the amendment struck out the Kaiulani item of \$4000. Senator Brown appealed from the decision of the chair. The chair was sustained by a vote of 7 to 7.

The Attorney - General moved to amend Section 1 by making the amount \$54,600 instead of \$58,600. Carried.

The bill as amended passed its third reading by the following session. Carried.

Ayes-Lyman, Northrop, Notley, Hocking, Baldwin, Horner, McCandless, Schmidt, 8.

Noes-Kauhane, Brown, Waterhouse, Wright, Rice, Wilcox.

Senator Waterhouse's joint resolution regarding the liquor traffic then came up.

Senator Brown argued that the passage of the resolution was a mere waste of time.

Senator Waterhouse said it was brought in the interest of the majority of the community and that it was not intended to bring up any prohibition laws.

Sen. Baldwin said that the correction of the evil complained of must begin in the homes of the community. He was in favor of the resolution on the ground that if it did not accomplish any good it would cost nothing and do no harm. The resolution was adopt-

The Attorney-General introduced his act to encourage the cultivation of cansigre and other fibrous plants.

The bill exempts everything connected with the cultivation of the plants, the crops, mills, etc., from taxation for ten years.

The Minister of Finance gave notice that he would introduce a bill regarding a Labor Commis-

Under suspension of the rules Senator McCandless presented the report of the Military Committee on the military bill. Tabled to be considered with the bill, which comes up tomorrow on the regular

House bill 4, known as the currency bill, came up on its third

reading.

Minister Damon made a verbal statement of the present actual financial condition of the country which received marked attention from the Senate. From his stateand interest - bearing indebted-ness, together with the bills for April, May and June previously of July of this year the bonded in debtedness was \$3,738,000, an increase of \$211,000; the unpaid bills for March, April, May and June amounted to \$117,000, making the gross indebtedness \$3 .-855,000 or \$270,000 more than it was a year ago. Of this last amount \$211,000 is bonded indebtedness. The cash on hand on current account this year is \$121,000 as against over \$230,000 last year. Eighty thousand dollars of Postmaster-General's notes have been paid off during the year and the deposits have increased \$21,000 over withdrawals during the same period.

On motion the bill was referred to a Special Committee consisting of Senators Brown, Baldwin and

Wilcox.

The Attorney-General offered a resolution that the matter of the compensation of the Labor Commission be referred to the Finance Committee.

Senator Waterhouse moved to amend by referring to the Committee on Commerce and Agriculture. The amendment was lost.

The resolution then passed as offered.

On motion Senate bill No. 8, appropriating \$102,728 80 for appropriations supplementary was taken up for the third reading.

Senator Lyman moved that an item be inserted appropriating \$1800 for telephonic communication between Pohoiki courthouse and Hilo.

Senator Waterhouse moved the matter be deferred to the next

The bill passed its third reading by a vote of 13 to 1, Senator Brown voting no.

The Senate on motion then took up the military bill. A discussion at once ensued over the first section which provides that the band shall be made a part of the military organization.

Senator Brown moved that the item concerning the band be stricken out and argued that the band should be left as it now is under the control of the Minister | CORPORAL SAM'L JOHNSON. of Foreign Affairs. The Attorney General supported the amendment which was carried.

The second amendment, which was offered by the Millitary Committee, takes the sharpshooters out of the military organization but entitles them to all its immunities. Section 1 as passed provides that the National Guard of Hawaii shall consist of not less than six companies

Section 2 states that the companies shall not be organized with less than 40 nor more than 103 officers and men.

Section 13 allowing the commander-in-chief for good and sufficient reasons by and with the consent of the Executive Council to disband any portion of the National Guard, passed as in the bill. An amendment referring the matter to the advice of the Council of State was lost by a vote of 8 to 6.

Section 15 exempts officers and soldiers from the payment of polltax, school tax and road tax. Recess to 1:30 p m.

THE REPRESENTATIVES.

After opening at 10 o'clock, the House received a message from the Senate announcing the third reading in that body of the House bill to grant an electric light franchise for the town of Hilo.

A message from the Senate announced the passage of the joint resolution relating to the question of land transfers and its reference o the committee on passed bills.

Mr. Winston reported from the commerce committee, recommending the passage of the bill to permit the withdrawal of kerosene oil from warehouse.

The same committee reported favorably on the Senate bill to prevent the wanton destruction of

Mr. Robertson reported from the judiciary committee, recommending the passage of the bill to provide right of way across the land of others.

Mr. Robertson propounded questions to the Minister of the nterior: 1. Has the Minister of the Interior received a petition from residents of Honolulu for the removal of the powder magazine? 2. If so, what action, if any, has been taken?

Order of the day brought up the bill to incorporate the Honolulu Electric Railway Company for third reading. It was agreed to read it through without stops excepting where an objection or remark might be made by a mem-

There was a little talk over the third section, as to certain words in the Hawaiian version, which Interpreter Wilcox described as "little distinctions without any difference."

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Senate is engaged with the Military bill, during a discussion on which Senator Baldwin wanted to know if the bill was prepared for a despotic country like Russia or for the Republic of Hawaii.

The House completed the Electric Railroad bill and it has passed its third reading. It is engaged with the second reading of the alcohol bill as this paper goes to press.

ELECTRIC RAILWAY BILL.

COMPANY PROTECTED FROM IN-JURY TO ITS PROPERTY.

Right of Eminent Domain Conferred Upon the Company with Arrangements for Arbitration.

(Continued from July 10.)

Section 36. Any person who shall willfully or maliciously inure, molest or destroy any of the ines, posts or other material, or property of the Company, or shall use such posts as a medium for advertising, without the consent of the Company, or in any way willfully obstruct, or interfere with the working of the said electric plant, or property, shall, upon conviction thereof, before any court of competent jurisdiction, be adjudged and condemned to pay a penalty for every such offense, not exceeding one hundred dollars, together with costs; and such court may, on default of payment, condemn such person to be confined in any common jail in the Republic of Hawaii, for a space not exceeding one calendar month, with or without hard labor. Section 37. It shall be lawful


for the Company, their servants, agents and workmen, from time to time, and at all times hereafter, as they shall see fit, and they are hereby authorized and empowered so to do, to enter into and upon the land of any person or persons, bodies politic or corporate, and to survey, set out and ascertain such parts thereof, as they may require for the said works or any of them, and to contract with the owners and occupiers of, and all persons and bodies corporate having any interest in the said lands, for the purchase of the same or any part thereof, or of any privilege that may be required for the purpose of constructing and operating said lines of railways or other works, or any of them, or for the right to take timber, stone, gravel, sand and other materials from the aforesaid or any lands adjacent thereto, for use and construction of the said works, or any of them.

Section 38. In any and every case of disagreement between the said Company and the owners, occupiers or persons, or other body corporate, as aforesaid, respecting the amount of the purchase money or value thereof, or as to the amount of damages any of the persons or bodies corporate aforesaid, shall suffer through the construction of the said railways or any of them, the matter or matters so in dispute shall be decided by three arbitrators, of whom the Company shall appoint one, the person or body corporate so damaged shall appoint another, and such arbitrators shall, within ten days of their appointment, or that of the last of them, appoint a third arbitrator; but in the event of two such arbitrators not appointing a third arbitrator, within the time aforesaid, a judge of the Supreme Court of the Republic of Hawaii shall, on application of either party, appoint such arbitrator. In case any owner or occupant, or other person having an interest in said lands, shall be an infant, or insane, or in case any such person shall be absent from the Hawsiian Islands, or shall refuse to appoint an arbitrator in his behalf, or in case of a body corporate not having an agent or representative in the Hawaiian Islands, then a judge of the Supreme Court of the Republic of Hawaii, on application being made to him for that purpose by the said Company, shall appoint a disinterested person as such

arbitrator. Section 39. The said arbitrators shall award, determine, adjudge and order the respective sum or sums of money which the Company shall pay to the respective persons or corporation entitled to receive the same.

Had Victoria been there to the elegance with witness which her first ance was commemorated, she would have been quite content to recognize the hospitality of her representative as above pir and worthy of his station. There were many guests, and among them was a spirit of unity, not withstanding the fact that a great many of them were Americans who had but recently been introduced to the atmosphere of royal occasions, and from many a pair of Ameriean lips came the expression: Johnny Bull is not so bad after all." In fact, English and Americans are on better terms here now, as a result of this little social affair, than they have been for many a long day past. The usual bogie rumor that Grest Britain is reaching out for Hawaii is now more than ever in order. It only needs one more entertainment by Brother Hawes to do the trick.

Not a single letter has appeared in any newspaper regarding it. If silence gives consent, the public has passed the bill already.

By the casting vote of the chair, the pension to the ex-Crown Princess Kaiulani has been defeated in the Senate. As the Ministry strenuously supported the item, after having placed it in the Appropriation bill, the adverse vote amounts to a vote of want of confidence in the Cabinet. This does not require the resignation of the Ministers, however, under the irresponsible government established by the Constitution of the Republic. Nevertheless it is a direct snub to the Ministers.

It is incumbent upon the Board of Health to strictly investigate complaints against Government physicians, without regard to any personal considerations whatever. Whether in open or in secret session, let it be done. These subsidized physicians should not only be required to faithfully attend calls from indigent Hawaiians, but they should be restricted in their scale of fees to those who though poor are able and willing to pay something for treatment. Private information has been received of outrageous fees charged by a Government physician in one of the country districts.



PROPOSED SCHOOL TEST.

Bishop Willis Shows How It Will Work Injustice and May Become Tyrannous.

EDITOR BULLETIN:-Permit me in a few words to call the attention of the public to the "School Act" published by you last evening, so that they may judge whether they are prepared for its becoming law.

If it does become law (1) it will kill mission schools among the



Chinese, and (2) be a standing menace to Christian boarding schools like St. Louis and Iolani.

First, very rightly and properly the Chinese desire their children to be educated in their own language as well as in English. To meet tois laudable wish St. Peter's school, for instance, maintains two teachers, one for English, the other for Chinese. The English teacher is engaged for the morning session, 9-12, the Chinese for the afternoon Now, if the bill was satisfied with three hour's in-struction in English, there would be no ground of complaint, and the purpose of the bill as stated in the preamble would be attained, for a Chinese child will learn more in three hours than children of other nationalities do in five. But to insist on four hours is to make a provision of which I can discover no other object but that of killing Chinese mission schools.

The second point I call attention to is the uncertain quantity of the power proposed to be vested in the Board of Education. Any school may at any moment be declared not to be a school in the eye of the law, by the issuing of a new code of rules by the Board of Education. The first section is so worded that either the Legislature or the Board may at any time make any rules they please touching the qualifications of teachers. It would be within the meaning of the act if the Board were to make rules excluding from approval all instructors who belonged to the Roman Catholic or Anglican churches, I do not say this is the intention of the bill. I only call attention to the enormous powers it will vest in the Beard of Education, to interfere with the denominational schools of the country.

Granted that there is no intention to introduce the odium theologicum, and that it is not introduced, it remains that after withdrawing all aid from denominational schools, it is now proposed by our paternal government to exercise an authority over such schools, never exercised when government aid was given.



GAME PROTECTION

The Senate Bill that has Passed Second Reading in the House,

Following is the text of the Senate's game bill:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful to take, kill or destroy any migratory wild duck, plover, snipe, turnstone, curlew, stilt or mud hen, between the first day of May and the fifteenth day of September; to take, kill or destroy any native wild duck, [or] Hawaiian goose between the first day of February and the fifteenth day of September; to take, kill or destroy any quail or pheasant between the first day of March and the fifteenth day of September; to take, kill or destroy any dove wild pigeon or between the first day of February and the first day of July, to take, gather or destroy the eggs of any wild duck, mud hen, pheasant, dove, pigeon or quail at any time; to buy, sell or offer for sale, transport or have in possession any of said game at any time when it is

unlawful to kill the same. Section 2. Any person convicted before a District Magistrate for violating any of the provisions of this Act shall be fined not less than ten dellars nor more than fifty dollars.

Section 3. Chapter 60 of the Session Laws of 1886, entitled "An Act to Prevent the Wanton Destruction of Game," approved on the 15th day of October, 1886, is hereby repealed.

Section 4. This Act shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication.

SANITATION PROTECTORS.

SUBSIDY GRANTED TO NEW HOS-PITAL AT WAIMEA, KAUAL

Fifteen Lepers Ordered to Molokai-The Walluku Trouble Discussed in Executive Session.

W. O. Smith, president of the Board of Health, took the chair at the weekly meeting of the Board of Health yesterday afternoon. With him were present Drs. Emerson, Day, Wood, Messrs. J. T. Waterhouse, T. F. Lansing and David Keliipio, members; C. B. Reynolds, executive officer; Chas. Wilcox, secretary; Senator H. P. Baldwin and Dr. Wayson.

The usual reports on the slaughter house and the Mitigation Act were received.

Matters connected with the difficulty between Dr. Armitage and certain people of Wailuku were, after some discussion, reserved for executive session.

A petition with 100 signatures was received from North Kona, praying for the removal of Dr. Lindley as Government physician, and the appointment of Dr. Mc-

Wayne in his stead.

The president submitted a question as to the proceeds of effects of the late Rev. J. H. Pahio, a pastor at the settlement. They amounted to more than \$80 and were the subject of dispute among the heirs. The president suggested that if the parties could not agree among themselves, they would have to resort to the courts for administration of the estate. This was adopted.

A list of fifteen persons at the Kalihi receiving station, pronounced to be lepers by the full board of examiners, was read. It was ordered that they be sent

to Molokai.

Mr. Baldwin had spoken to the president about a hospital that had been erected by private subscription at Waimea, Kauai. There was a debt of \$6000 against the hospital, and its promoter desired some Govern-ment assistance. Dr. Campbell, who was the moving spirit in the enterprise, held that it was a ne-cessary institution. Mr. Baldwin now gave the Board full information regarding the hospital. The only other hospital on Kausi was at Koloa, but it was too distant to be of any use to Waimea.

Mr. Waterhouse moved that not more than \$500 a quarter be paid out of the Board's appropriations for the support of the Waimea hospital, on condition that it be in charge of the Government physician of the district and that indigent Hawsiians be treated free. Seconded and carried.

reported for sanitary committee on the forms of registration for births, deaths, vaccinations, etc., submitted by Dr. Weddick. It was believed that the forms were rather complicated, but that some system of registration ought to be adopted. The committee wanted more time.

President Smith suggested that legislation on the subject should be effected at the regular session of the Legislature next year.

Mr. Reynolds reported a nui-sance of which there had been complaint, in the storage of fertilizers in town. After discussion the matter was referred to the sanitary committee.

The president appointed Mr. Keliipio on the leper committee in place of Mr. Ena, resigned from the Board.

The Board then went into executive session.

IN THE HIGHER COURTS.

Sundry Matters in First Circuit Court Chambers

Judge Ceoper yesterday issued an order confirming sale of real estate by Henry Smith, commissioner, in the case of Elizabeth K. Nahaolelua and others vs. Kaashu and others, and authorizing the execution of deeds to convey all of the right, title and interest of the parties in litigation. Johnson for plaintiffs; Stanley for defendants. Today Mr. Johnson filed a plea in bar for the plaintiffs, moving that the motion of the defendants to assess the value of improvements on the property may be dismissed, on the ground that the rights of the parties have already been determined by a decision of the Supreme Court.
