### THE CHINESE INVASION.

We hear that a proposition has been made to the Government by a Chinese Company that they will furnish all the Chinese laborers wanted, from 1,000 to 5,000, for terms of three years, renewable for two years more, at a rate of wages which has not transpired. At the end of the five years those that wish to return would be sent back, and their places supplied by new ones.

If an engagement like that could be formed with a responsible party it would be probably the best thing that could happen for the sugar and rice planting interests. The supply could be kept up to meet the demand, and could be arranged to work like a machine. It would be well though to make a bargain compelling all of them to return at the expiration of the three or five years' contract, so that the actual number in the country would not increase. It is as well to consider, too, the expressed views of the Planters, that Chinese labor is the best, when it does not cost over \$10 to \$12 a month.

We have stated before that we have heard that the Portuguese Consul and Commissioner, Mr. Canavarro, has written to his Government, advising them in case this large importation of Chinese continues, to forbid the emigration of any more Portuguese subjects, on the grounds that they would not be required as laborers.

It therefore is a matter of the greatest importance that this importation of Chinese should be arranged in some definite and desirable manner. We do not want the country flooded with Chinese males who come here to stay, we do not want to lose the ultimate benefits of the Portuguese repopulation, and we want cheap labour to make our plantations pay, and our country prosperous.

If the present ministry succeed in dealing with this question so as to arrange it leaving the minimum of discontent in the public mind they will have earned the gratitude of the country that will wipe out the recollection of many past acts.

**THE GUILD OF ST. ANDREW** held its regular monthly meeting at the Cathedral close on Thursday evening. A large number of members, both lay and cleric, were present, the occasion being the presentation of an address of welcome to His Lordship the Bishop on his return from his tour. The Rev. Alex. Mackintosh read the address (which was signed by all the members of the Guild) in the absence of the Chairman of the Committee. The Bishop replied, thanking them for their hearty welcome and impressing the necessity of having a cleric at the wharf to welcome strangers arriving by the mail steamers. The usual presentation of a subject for the evening and subsequent discussion was then gone through. The Rev. Geo. Wallace was then elected warden of the Guild, *vice* Rev. Thos. Blackburn. A vote of thanks to the acting warden, Rev. W. A. Swan, for his energy and earnestness in the position he had so ably filled was passed and two new members were elected, and the meeting adjourned after receiving the Benediction.

### SHIPPING NOTES.

The Kilaua Hou brought 351 bgs sugar and 21 bbls molasses.

The C R Bishop brought 2407 bgs sugar and 10 green hides.

The Almy brought 2279 sacks bran, oats, and flour; 2400 posts; 27,000 Bricks; 200 M. Shingles; 42 boxes seed, ammonia etc; 239 bbls wine, salmon and lime; 351 cases sample cards, cod-fish etc; 408 bgs bran, ground barley etc; 2 tanks ammonia; 70 pkgs doors, blinds etc; 395 bales hay etc; general merchandise 239 doors, pipes etc.

The J D Spreckels brought 20,000 Bricks, 1,000 Red wood posts; 34 bbls lard; 41 boxes apples, 422 bales hay, canvas; 745 cases shoes, lard

etc; 51 kgs boca beer; 283 pkgs leather, groceries, 1 Barometer, 1 steam tray; general merchandise, 1220 bars iron, pieces pipes etc.

Some of the goods received by the Elinor Vernon this trip were in very bad condition.

As the steamer C. R. Bishop went to land her cattle her bow hit the wharf, broke the chains and damaged the wharf.

A neat little office has been built on Foster's wharf for the Inter-Island Steam Navigation Co. The old disfigurement has been torn down.

Captain Cameron, having recovered his health, will take charge of the Steamer C R Bishop this trip.

The Brig Hazard Capt Tierney, will leave to-day if, possible, for the South Sea Islands, she will take to their home 5 Gilbert Islanders who were brought here by the Suez on her March trip.

The Caibarien expects to leave to-day for San Francisco.

The Lehua brought 937 bgs sugar. The Waialea brought 1300 bgs sugar.

The schr Rosario arrived at Kahuhi on the 7th instant.

### LOCAL & GENERAL ITEMS.

We are requested to state that the Amateur Musical Society's rehearsal is unavoidably postponed until tomorrow evening.

A bunch of keys has been found, and is now at the Police Station. The owner can get them on application and proving ownership.

We are requested to state that other stationers have received articles ordered just as fast as that mentioned on Saturday.

Messrs. J. U. & B. W. Kawainui were arrested for libel in the 2nd degree on Saturday, at the suit of the Deputy Sheriff of Wailuku. They were promptly bailed out.

MANY Honoluluans will remember the bluff heartiness and manly figure of Captain Roper of the Anjer Head. They will be sorry to learn that he died of smallpox at Hongkong lately.

QUEEN street will shortly be finished. The steamroller is now smoothing down the asphorities of "Life's rough way" as its residents have lately called it.

THE case against the Mochonua estate by an adopted son of the late W. L. Mochonua to recover possession of the house and lot next the Music Hall, now occupied by the Premier, and purchased by him from the estate, was gained by the estate.

THE German and Russian men-of-war have adopted a very sensible idea in regard to their liberty men. They keep a watch on the saloons, &c., and when any of them get too drunk to take care of themselves a hand-cart is brought, and they are bundled in and run down to the wharf and sent on board.

THE wharf behind Brewer & Co's is much in need of supervision. All the year round the sweet odor of bone-meal floats on the air, and now, to add to that there are some 2,000 cases of Kerosene, enough to set the whole town and harbor on fire; while, from leakage, the ground and wharf are completely saturated with it.

On Saturday, at noon, two drunken natives in a light wagon were galloping along Queen street. As they passed E. P. Adams' a policeman ran out to stop them, but the shaft caught him and knocked him down. He got up speedily and ran after them, blowing his whistle. They turned up Fort street into Merchant, and we have not heard whether they were caught or not.

On Saturday morning, at a quarter to 10, a native man named Meheula got off his horse at the Iwalani wharf and went to tie it up. As he did so, a dray coming down the street frightened his horse and it bolted, the rope catching his leg and throwing him on his back. He was dragged in this way for about 50 feet, when the horse was stopped by a young man named Ewaliko. He was bruised considerably, and the palm of his right hand is severely cut.

We have received from Mr. T. G. Thrum, the publisher, a copy of a work by Mr. E. Bailey, entitled

Hawaiian Ferns. From it we gather that there are 149 varieties on these islands. To the fern-collector and enthusiast, it will, no doubt prove invaluable but the mind in search of relaxation will not, we opine, find much in statements such as this "Sort marginal, varying in shape from globose to linear, usually numerous and distinct, sometimes confluent and continuous." Still we think that if others were to be found with the same patient energy as Mr. Bailey to gather and put forth their knowledge on the flora and fauna of the islands we should all be benefited.

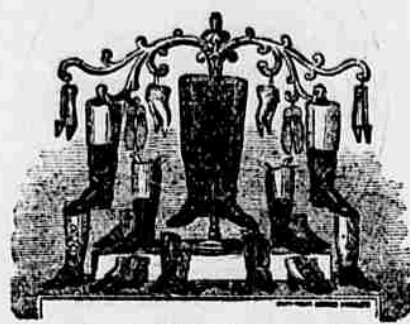

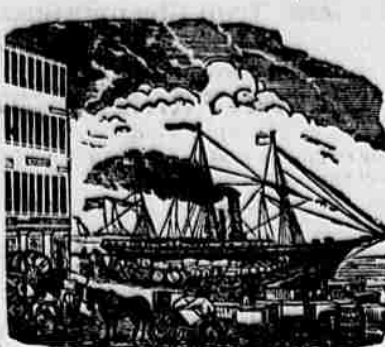
