To this end one of the first requisites is to secure a complete understanding amongst all friends of reform itself and for its own sake. Thus only can a solid front be preserved against the mischief makers other motive than one of resentment because they were not able to divert a great popular uprising to purposes of selfish profit and aggrandizement. Better is to be expected of reflective minds that have unreservedly devoted themselves to the cause of reform, than that they should now voluntarily stop to brood over this and that result coming short of the common desire and expectation. Yet there is danger that many good men, who may be troubled with misgivings on some score or other, may permit a spark of discontent to be fanned into flame by any wind of mischief craftily directed be "Hold fast that which is good," and then the cause of reform and national development will go marching proudly forward toward triumphant consummation

The place where I was encamped was open, with no timber save mesquit trees. Three of these grew at the three corners of my tent, and by the aid of them and other trees I had cut and dragged. I formed a wind break on the east, which was the back of my tent, and on the south side. Having confidence in the wind break thus constructed, I undressed before lying down, that I might rest more than I could if I should, as caution suggested, lie down prepared for the worst. The thunder bellowed, the lightning dashed, and the rain fell in torrents, but about two minutes after my head touched the pillow I was sleeping soundly.

I awoke some time in the night, and finding the water running into the tent, I got up to open the ditch with my shovel, and soon went to sleep again. How long I slept I do not know, but I awoke to find the wind had changed from the east to the south, and the rain, driven with great force against the side of the tent, fell through the strained canvass in such quantities that I reached for my oil cost and spread it over me.

The wind blew in gusts, each gust coming more lively than the last, until I felt the mesquit brush of my wind break pressed between the growing trees bearing down upon me; and as the storm increased in violence, it seemed that I must be swept away.

The tent being wet, it lay flat and smooth with the southwest corner peg still holding. Cintching my bedding and oil coat tightly, I braced myself firmly, and notwithstanding the great protection the brush gave me, it was with the greatest difficulty that I could retain my position. The almost continuous lightning enabled me to see. With startling rapidity the wind whipped round to the northwest, and at the same moment I became sware that the water had overflowed my bed, and large hall that would weigh from three to five ounces began to fall, one striking me on the left leg. In great hasto I snatched a thin woolen mattress from under the wet tent and spread it over me for protection, my oil coat having been

Fortunately the storm abated, and my clothing being saved to me almost by a miracle, I dressed with wet garments, my teeth chattering. One step brought me to where my large provision box had stood, but it was vacant, the box of provisions had been blown away, and but two pieces of it could be found the next day.—Tom Green County (Tex.) The Manufacture of "Stick" Candy.

The "stick" candy which seems to be an indigenous American product, is ordinary "A" sugar boiled down with water and a little cream of tartar to prevent crystalization. The mass is taken in batches of about fifteen pounds to a marble table, where it is kneaded like bread, and the flavoring and coloring worked in. The paste then goes to the "pulling hooks," where for five or six minutes it is pulled and twisted. Thence it returns to the marble table, kept hot, on which is worked marble table, kept hot, on which is worked the candy into its final shape. Stripes are pressed into the batch, two feet long and a foot thick, and it is then drawn and twisted till the proper size of the penny "stick," the right length of which is climed off by horse sciences. THE DUTY OF THE HOUR.

Doubt upon the question of electoral registration, as effecting foreign citizenship, having been set at rest, matters o g verament may now in the main, as they can be with confidence, left to the ref rm Cabinet, while everybody who has the good of the country at heart devotes time, energy and influence to the work of securing a Legislature in harmony with the principles upon which the recent revolution was based. This stage of the programme is one as critical as the situation during the period covered by the week preceding and that following the mass meeting. So far it may be said that the reform of the nation has only been inaugurated in the rough. Until the different estates of the realm in a free Legislature have ratified what has been done, besides committing themselves to a sound and progressive policy for the future, the country cannot be regarded as safe. Therefore, it is incumbent upon every right thinking member of the community to subordinate personal and especially selfish interests to the grand work of securing a Legislature that will be creditable to the nation in intelligence, capacity, and thoroughly representative character. To this end one of the first requisites is to secure a complete understanding amongst all friends of reform itself and for its own sake. Thus only can a solid front be preserved against the mischief makers of different nationalities who have early got to work, most of them with no them in with as little delay as possible, to the other motive than one of resentment Departments responsible for their liquidation. because they were not able to divert a great popular uprising to purposes of selfish profit and aggrandizement. Better is to be expected of reflective minds that have unreservedly devoted themselves to the cause of reform, than that they should now voluntarily stop to brood over this and that result coming short of the common desire and expectation. Yet there is danger that many good men, who may be troubled with misgivings on some score or other, may permit a spark of discontent to be fanned into flame by any wind of mischief craftily directed across their path. The almost continuous lightning enabled me to see. The Manufacture of "Stick" Candy.

The "atick" candy which seems to be an indigenous American product, is ordinary "A" sugar boiled down with water and a little cream of tartar to prevent crystallization. The mass is taken in batches of about fifteen pounds to a marble table, where it is kneaded like bread, and the flavoring and coloring worked in. The paste then goes to the "pulling hooks," where for five or six minutes it is pulled and twisted. Thence it returns to the marble table, kept hot, on which is worked the candy into its final shape. Stripes are pressed into the batch, two feet long and a foot thick, and it is then drawn and a foot thick, and it is then drawn and twisted till the proper size of the penny "stick," the right length of which is clipped off by huge scissors.—Chicago Herald.
