MURDER TRIAL DRAGS SLOWLY

It Will Go Over Until Monday Afternoon from To-day.

NEEDLESS CHINESE DRIVER HAS FINE REDUCED

Dowsett Partition Suit Amicable--Malcolm Brown Enters Appearance--Harry W. Flint Cited for Contempt.

The trial of Charles Downing for second degree murder will not be concluded today. Only the second witness has thus far been called.

Tomorrow will be devoted to divorce and chamber matters, and Monday forenoon to motions and appeals in mitigation.

Jurors not engaged in the murder trial are excused until 10 a. m. Monday.

IN FAVOR OF WILCOX

Carries Hawaii by Narrow Margin and Sweeps Kauai--Defeat of Parker Possible--Returns Are Not Complete.

Leaving Maui, Molokai and Lanai out of the calculation on the matter of delegate to the 56th and 57th Congresses, the following figures are arrived at: Wilcox's plurality on Hawaii--For 56th Congress 116 For 57th Congress 130

Wilcox plurality on Kauai--For 56th Congress 166 For 57th Congress 161 Total plurality for Wilcox on Hawaii and Kauai--For 56th Congress 282 For 57th Congress 291

Parker's plurality on Oahu--For 56th Congress 249 For 57th Congress 235

These figures give Wilcox's plurality for Hawaii, Oahu and Kauai: For 56th Congress 533 For 57th Congress 586

It was found yesterday afternoon that a mistake had been made in the returns from Waiakoa which, when first telephoned up officially, was given at 25. The correct figure is 55 which means an addition of 30 to the original figures.

Robert Wilcox has been elected Hawaii's delegate to the 56th and 57th Congresses. This is the bare statement of a startling and most disappointing fact.

The Noeas from Hamakua on the island of Hawaii and the James Makee from Kapaa on the island of Kauai brought the news at an early hour this morning. Through the kindness of Purser Adams of the former steamer and Captain Tullett of the James Makee, the Bulletin is able to give the correct figures of the election.

As it was supposed by the captain of the Noeas that the returns from all of Maui and Molokai had been brought to Honolulu by other steamers, no stop was made at Lahaina to get the news for the people of this island. However, the Kinau on her way up, got the figures, carried them to Hawaii and there, after careful figuring on the part of a number of men in Hilo, secured the plurality for Wilcox which will be given later on. So Maui and Molokai are practically heard from so far as the vote for delegate to Washington is concerned.

It was simply a snowstorm on the Big Island, the Independents carrying nearly everything before them. The storm was even worse on the Garden Isle, for not a Republican on the ticket to the polls wearing the yellow ribbon but they voted for the man who to their minds represented the ancient prejudices against the people whom they allege guilty of stealing the country from them.

On Hawaii, the vote for delegate to Washington stood as follows: For 56th Congress--

This shows a plurality of 116 for the 56th Congress and 130 for the 57th on the Big Island which was supposed to be strong for Parker. His own home district threw him down with a dull thud.

When the Kinau reached Hilo, a comparison of the results of the election on the Islands of Oahu, Maui, Molokai, Lanai and Hawaii was made and, after careful figuring, it was found that Wilcox led the Republican candidate by 15 votes for the 56th Congress and 78 for the 57th.

The result of the election for Senators was as follows:

Hawaii is entitled to four senators which gives the Republicans Paris and Holstein. The Independents have Kaho solid, while Brown ran on both the Democratic and Independent tickets and may be called either.

The fight for representatives was very lively on Hawaii. Following was the result:

For each of the districts of the island of Hawaii the number of representatives to be chosen is four. It will then be seen that Makekau, Haeo, Nalima, Ewaliko, Monsarrat, Kalikoa, Hanine and Kekaula will be the men to take their seats in the House of Representatives as representing the Big Island.

As will be seen, the Democrats succeeded in getting in three of their representatives--Makekau, Haeo and Nalima.

The news from the Garden Isle is most disastrous to the Republican party but when all is known, the Republicans were not expecting more than a hundred votes from that place. The result of the election was as follows: For Delegate to 56th Congress--

As will be seen, Kauai gives a plurality to Wilcox of 166 for the 56th Congress and 164 for the 57th and added to the 75 and 78 plurality from the remaining islands makes the total plurality of Wilcox 241 and 242 for the whole group. It can well be seen that his election is without doubt.

The fight for senatorial honors on Kauai resulted as follows:

Both Nakapahu and Kahilina are Independents. The former is a Waimea man and is perhaps the best liked native on the Garden Isle. It was not his intention to run for the Senate but natives from one side of the island to the other called on him and finally prevailed on him to enter the fight. He is an upright fellow and it is on account of his square dealing in everything that he is so popular.

The following was the result of the fight for representatives:

The Island of Kauai is entitled to four representatives so that Puuiki, Akina, S. W. Wilcox and K. auwai are the winners. The three natives are Independents while Wilcox is a Democrat.

When the steamer James Makee left Kapaa yesterday, the returns from the island of Niihau had not yet been received but as there are only about 20 registered voters at that place, no difference to the result on Kauai will be made by them.

Both steamers report a very quiet election on the Big Island and Kauai.

There was no fighting or rowdiness of any kind. The police were fully prepared for an emergency but their services, outside of regular routine duty, were not required.

The following will be the strength of the parties in the Senate:

As the vote of Wailuku, Maui, Molokai and Lanai has not yet been received here, it is hard to tell just how the senatorial ticket will go but, judging from the way the three islands supported Wilcox (this general statement was sent from Hilo to the Noeas just before the departure of this steamer), the election of senators will result in the choice of two Independents and one Republican (H. P. Baldwin).

Brown of Hawaii can hardly be classed a full Independent so that the Republicans with their seven senators and the Independents with their seven will stand on about an equal footing.

The strength of the parties in the House of Representatives will be as follows, Maui being left out of the calculation on account of news not having been received:

The news of the victory of Wilcox on the Big Island and Kauai was not received here with very much enthusiasm. As soon as the leaders of the Independent party heard of the, to them, good news, they rushed out to the home of Robert Wilcox and there held a short justification meeting. It is likely that there will be a big parade and luau tonight in honor of the success of the Garibaldi.

Bethel street in the vicinity of the Independent headquarters is crowded with natives who have gathered together to hear over and over again the news that has given them so much pleasure.

HE FINISHES STROG.

Buffalo, N. Y., Nov. 1.--The Roosevelt special pulled out of Buffalo at 8:30 a. m. bound for Jamestown, and scheduled to stop at many places along the route. The Governor felt very well, his voice not appearing to have felt the strain of last night's three meetings. For the first time since the campaign began, he last night attended a dinner after he was through with the meetings. Former Senator John Laughlin, of this city, gave a dinner to the orators and newspaper men of the train and the Governor asked to be included in the party. He made a few remarks about the pleasant features of the trip and the great assistance rendered by those who have accompanied him.

It is remarked that an appeal can be taken from the Supreme Court of Hawaii, where a party sees fit to attempt it, without being allowed by one of its justices. The notice of appeal might be acknowledged by a justice of the court to which it is attempted to take the appeal. That court might then determine whether or not the appeal could be entertained. It is pointed out, however, that the Territory of Hawaii has not yet been assigned to the Ninth or any Judicial Circuit of the United States. In view of the fact already mentioned, that the Hawaiian courts are given the same status as State courts—therefore not governed by the provisions of statutes relating to Territories in general—a probability is suggested that the judiciary system of Hawaii is to remain independent of Federal circuit courts.

Organic Act Gives Them Status of State Courts.

INTERESTING OPINION OF SUPREME COURT

Appeal Denied in Marine Collision Case to Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals of United States.

Chief Justice Frear has written an interesting decision on the latest phase of the Claudine-Carson marine collision case. Justice Perry signs it with the author. Justice Galbraith had left for the Mainland when the matter was argued. The opinion in effect declares the independence of the Hawaiian judiciary system in matters of purely Territorial jurisdiction.

The libelee had given notice of appeal to the Circuit Court of Appeals of the Ninth Judicial Circuit of the United States, and requested that the amount of bond to stay execution of the decree on appeal should be fixed. It had also been asked that the Supreme Court should issue a decree on its decision, instead of remanding the case to the Territorial Circuit Court. From the latter no appeal can be taken to the Federal courts.

It is held in this opinion that the power of the Supreme Court to remand cases to the lower court is not taken away by the statutes of the United States permitting such cases to be taken from the courts of the Territory to a Federal court on appeal or writ of error. But in this particular case, the opinion says, the Supreme Court makes the final decree itself.

Cleveland Nails a Bryanite Lie

Princeton, N. J., Oct. 30.—Ex-President Cleveland being shown a publication in the Philadelphia Times of today purporting to be an interview with him, said:

"The whole thing from beginning to end is an absolute lie, without the least foundation or shadow of truth. I have never uttered a word to a human being that afforded the least pretext for such a mendacious statement. I have already telegraphed the Philadelphia Times to this effect."

The utterances ascribed to ex-President Cleveland in the publication referred to embodied an expression that there would be "a landslide for Mr. Bryan" the morning after election. Mr. Cleveland was quoted as naming certain elements working in favor of the Democratic candidate and discussing Mr. Bryan as an orator and as an efficient campaigner.

PORTO RICAN NOT AMERICAN.

New York, Oct. 30.—The application of Frank Juarbe, a Porto Rican, for a peremptory writ of mandamus directing the Board of Registry to register him as a voter on the ground that he became an American citizen by virtue of the cession of Porto Rico by Spain to the United States has been denied by Justice Friedman in the Supreme Court.

Justice Friedman says in his decision that the treaties taking over the island of Porto Rico did not make inhabitants of the island citizens of the United States, but, on the contrary, left their political status to the future action of Congress, which has not yet acted.

TOD SLOAN DISCHARGED

London, Oct. 31.—The Sportsman states that the Prince of Wales has withdrawn his retainer to Tod Sloan, the American jockey, for his services next season.

The Sportsman communicated this information to the various morning papers and the latter express approval of the decision of the Prince of Wales, which is undoubtedly due to the agitation started by Lord Durham.

The Daily Mail recalls that Sloan's conduct has not been above suspicion and that he has been suspended more than once.

BOERS GET DANGEROUS.

London, Oct. 30.—The Cape Town correspondent of the Daily Mail comments upon the "astonishing outburst of Boer activity," and points to the possibility of the Boers having been re-enforced. Complaints are being heard in Cape Town, he asserts, regarding the "premature disbanding and dispensing with the service of the various volunteer forces."

The same correspondent says he learns on the highest authority that the late Prince Christian Victor was playing cricket early last week, and that he was then congratulated upon his rapid recovery from enteric fever. A chill caught during the game caused a relapse, with complication that proved fatal. The remains will be brought to England for interment.

Vital Statistics Month of October

A greatly elaborated form has been adopted by the Health office for the monthly report of vital statistics of Honolulu. It groups the causes of death in classes. For October there were 102 deaths, classified thus: febrile or zymotic, meaning fevers and diseases of fermentation, 8; diarrheal, 5; dietetic, 2; constitutional, including tuberculosis, 13; developmental, comprising old age and premature birth, etc., 9; nervous, 20; circulatory, 9; respiratory, 17; digestive, 13; urinary, 1; reproductive, 1; accident and violence, 4.

Another addition is from reports of sanitary officers: city sanitary officer—building permits approved, 58; refused, 2; recommendations made, private schools; cesspools located, 16; inspections, 311; prosecutions, 6. Sanitary inspectors—nuisances reported, 746; abated, 620; inspections, 1063. City physician—patients visited, 249; treated at office, 1175; sent to hospital, 3; prescriptions filled, 1309. Food commissioner—samples milk tested, 57; food, 23; chemical analysis, 1; prosecutions, 6. Bacteriologist—microscopical examinations, 266; cultures, 204. Plumbing inspector—plans filed, 97; permits, 97; final certificates, 75. Garbage department—cesspools pumped, 1359; scowloads garbage to sea, 110; loads garbage removed, 611; dead animals removed, 9. Meat and fish inspectors—fish examined, 309,748; fish condemned, 5124.

By nationalities the deaths were: Hawaiians, 46, of which 13 were under five; Chinese, 14, of which 6 were under 5; Portuguese, 9, of which 5 were under 5; Japanese, 29, of which 13 were under 5; British, 1; Americans, 0; other nationalities, 9. It will be observed that 38 of the deaths were of infants under 5 years of age, or considerably more than one-third of the total.

On the estimate of 44,500 population the annual death rate per 1000 for the month was 22.92, shared by nationalities as follows: Hawaiians, 31.25; Chinese, 13.08; Japanese, 38.60; Portuguese, 16.36; all others, 12.50. There were 19 non-residents died.

Three post mortem examinations were held, 14 deaths investigated and 2 coroner's inquests held. Thirty-seven marriages and 9 births were reported.

THE LATEST RETURNS.

The latest returns received from Hawaii and Kauai this morning as well as the report from Maui indicate that Robert Wilcox has carried the election for Delegate by a small plurality over Samuel Parker.

The results at hand today prove conclusively that the great strength of the Wilcox party was in the country districts, that Honolulu is not and never has been one of his strongholds.

The "good government" idea based on "voting for the best man" has been fully tested on the island of Kauai. The result of this test has been so terrifically disastrous to the opponents of party organization on American lines that the "best man" idea as epitomized by the acts of local politicians who came within an ace of wrecking the Republican ticket ought to have received its quietus forever.

The presence of Wilcox and Rice at the wrong end of the Senatorial ticket is all the vindication required for radical "party men" of the Republican ranks.

Present returns point to the conclusion that the Republican Territorial administration is in the hands of its enemies as regards the Legislature.

BRYAN IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Nov. 1.—William Jennings Bryan will arrive here at 4 p. m. under escort from Hammond, Ind., by several hundred members of the Cook County Democratic Club and the Cook County Marching Club and half an hour later will address a business men's meeting on the lake front.

The fast transport Sherman is a record breaker. She carries this trip the largest mail ever taken from the United States. She is loaded with Christmas presents from loving hearts at home for the soldier boys at the front.

GOVERNMENT OWNED AGREEMENT PROGRESS. LIEUT. HOOD'S STRONG ARGUMENT FOR CABLE.

Necessity for Absolute Control in Pacific—Takes Pessimistic View of Possibility of Legislation. New York, Oct. 28.—A special to the Herald from Washington says:

Lieut. Hood takes a very pessimistic view of the chances of cable legislation. For a time, he says, it seemed probable that action would be taken.

Lieut. Hood calls attention to the fact that surety and secrecy can only be attained by a cable owned, controlled and worked by the Government.

From a military point of view the question of the nationality of the operators is most important. No foreigner or alien of any description should be allowed to have any connection with the line in any capacity whatever.

ACCEPTANCE HAS NOT BEEN GENERAL YET. France and United States Find Stumbling Block to Prompt Action—Japan's Acceptance is Unconditional.

Washington, Nov. 1.—The alignment of the Powers on the British-German agreement is now practically completed, Russia being the only government remaining to be heard from.

The effect of the exchange has been in bringing five of the powers to an agreement to respect the "open door" and the integrity of China, and to consult among themselves as to a future course in case any of the other powers sought to take Chinese territory.
