





With regard to "trusts," holding that "a private monopoly is indefensible and intolerable," Mr Bryan makes the following terse applications. "The Republican party does not promise to annihilate the trusts. It points to the merger suit, which has not produced any substantial results, as its only act hostile to the trusts. One ineffective prosecution in three years ? With more than 200 trusts in existence it would take 600 years to extinguish them at the rate the Administration is going, not to speak of the new ones that are constantly springing up. The Republican party must scener or later take its position upon this subject. It cannot always draw votes from the masses who want the trusts destroyed and at the same time draw esmpsign funds from the trusts. If the President attempts any real interference with the trust program the trusts magnates will be interested in selecting a different kind of a nominee for the Republican party next time. 
Former Judge Hore's, of Waialus. ten-year-old son Tommy was yes-Hospital, to undergo an operation for appendicitis.
