PARTY REORGANIZATIONS.

With regard to "trusts," holding that "a private monopoly is indefensible and intolerable," Mr Bryan makes the following terse applications: "The Republican party does not promise to annihilate the trusts. It points to the merger suit, which has not produced any substantial results, as its only act hostile to the trusts. One ineffective prosecution in three years? With more than 200 trusts in existence it would take 600 years to extinguish them at the rate the Administration is going, not to speak of the new ones that are constantly springing up. The Republican party must sooner or later take its position upon this subject. It cannot always draw votes from the masses who want the trusts destroyed and at the same time draw campaign funds from the trusts. If the President attempts any real interference with the trust program the trusts magnates will be interested in selecting a different kind of a nominee for the Republican party next time. If he fails to do any-

publican party will in 1908 be the weaker for his failure."

With past declarations of the Democratic party on the subject of "private monopoly," he says that "the Democratic party has declared in two platforms that a private monopoly is indefensible and intolerable. It has demanded the enforcement of the criminal law and it has also demanded that the privileges of interstate commerce be withdrawn from the trusts. It has a chance to bring this question before the public with increasing emphasis, and it will profit by the public sentiment which must ultimately condemn private monopolies of every kind."

But in regard to the Democratic party's "attitude toward labor," we quote the following terse remarks in favor of arbitration, in which Mr Bryan says that "the Democratic party is already on record in favor of arbitration—the only rational and peaceable means of settling and their employees; it is also in favor of the enforcement of the eight-hour day on public works, and it is opposed to the use corporations difficulties between corporations now make of the processes of injunction against their employees. It is, therefore, in a position to profit by Republican inaction on this subject."

On the subject of "the popular election of Senators," Mr Bryan opens up as follows: "Besides refusing to reform existing abuses the Republican leaders refuse to consider the new issues which are being raised. The growth of municipal ownership in the cities has been accompanied by a growth in public sentiment favorable to the extension of government activity."

He then treats of the opposition of the banks for an enlargement of the money-order system, the interference with the business of the great express companies by demanding a parcels post and the opposition of the telegraph companies against the establishment of a postal telegraph system in connection with the mail system. He then follows with the following: "The demand for the election of Senators by the people is strong among the masses, but this, too, is opposed by the corporations. The House of Representatives, fresh from the people, has four times adopted a resolution proposing the necessary amendment to the Constitution, but the Senate has four times refused to consider the subject. This issue must be met by the party in power. The demand for direct legislation is growing every day. The corporations oppose this also, and the Republican party must before long take a position upon it."

"Attention has been called to some of the problems (and there are others) which the Republican party must meet; they are problems intimately connected with the welfare of the country, and the Republican party is not in position to offer a permanent solution of any of them. It is too much under the influence of the great corporations to settle these questions upon the people's side, and they can never be settled until they are settled upon the people's side."

And in conclusion, with reference to "the direct effect of all Repub-

to confer unearned benefits upon the minority of the people at the expense of the majority of the people, and it would be a reflection upon the intelligence and patriotism of the masses to believe that this tendency can long go on unchecked. The sense of justice is the deepest seated sense in the human breast, and this sense of justice demands such a distribution of the wealth created in this country as will give to each producer a fair and equitable share of the joint product. This sense of justice is not satisfied by an increase in the production of wealth if that increase is monopolized by a few. It is to this sense of justice that the Democratic party must appeal, and its appeal will be effective when the people are convinced that the party is more anxious to promote the public welfare than it is to secure the offices which go with a national victory."

And Mr Bryan closes his very able paper with the following terse remarks that "there is every indication that the Democratic party will now address itself to these reforms, and thus, by deserving success, lay the foundation for a real victory."


MARVELS OF DIPLOMACY.

Will Bishop Willis raise an indignant voice against the forcible annexation of the Tonga islands? We wot not. Despite the strenuous way that he reproached the United States for violating the sacred rights of Hawaii the chances are he will be on hand bright and early to give the British freebooters the solace of his Episcopal benediction.—Advertiser.

Most assuredly, knowing him too well he will, even if his own country was to do it in the same manner as the United States did in Hawaii nei. We are more than certain that he will raise his voice in righteous indignation against any "forcible annexation" the same as he did while in Hawaii nei, because it is his place to fight wrong with right.

Long before Bishop Willis left here, the annexation of those distant islands of a kindred people living in the same Pacific "pond" as a dependency under the British crown was talked of, and the news now received may be only the carrying into effect of plans already laid and about to mature, in all probability, by and with the free will and consent of its people, which cannot be said to have been the case with us here. Who is there here, at this writing, that knows that it is so or not? All that is known here is very meager, everything else being merely conjectural.

If such an annexation is consummated, not by "benevolent assimilation" and force, but by the free consent of its people, there need be no indignation and objection to such a course from the only man whom, while here, with us, the Advertiser nor its following could hush or turn down by abuse, ridicule, vilifying and maligning. He fought the good fight for right and justice against wrong and injustice being enacted toward a helpless and weak people, who were falsely misrepresented by those they had befriended in their days of poverty, and who later became known in their true color as thieves and robbers, pirates and buccaners, whose nefarious doings were "marvels in politics and diplomacy" as they might wish to

BY AUTHORITY.

PAYMENT OF WATER RATES.

As provided for in Section 1, Chapter XXVI of the Session Laws of 1886:

All persons holding water privileges or those paying water rates are hereby notified that the water rates for the six (6) months ending June 30th, 1905, will be due and payable at the office of the Honolulu Water Works on the first day of January, 1905.

On all such rates remaining unpaid on January 15th, 1905, an additional charge of 10 per cent will be made.

All privileges upon which rates remain unpaid to February 15th, 1905, (30 days after becoming delinquent) are subject to immediate shut off, without further notice. The outside men have been instructed to shut off all delinquent privileges as fast as possible after February 15th, 1905.

Rates are payable at the office of the Honolulu Water Works to the Chief Clerk of the Department of Public Works.

The Kinau arrived about 11 this forenoon from windward.

The Territorial grand jury is expected to report next Wednesday.

Football was played Monday afternoon between the local team and H A C team.

Republican leaders held an open session last night at Territorial headquarters.

Our streets were alive last night, and the same today, with people making holiday purchases.

The transport Solace, from San Francisco for Manila, arrived this morning and will get away in a few days.

The Siberia yesterday brought 258 bags of mail, heavier than ordinary, on account of the holiday season.

After their marriage reception last Thursday evening, Judge and Mrs J T DeBolt left for their home at Kaimuki.

The China arrived in from the Orient about 10 this morning. She leaves out for San Francisco at 5 this evening.

Purser "Admiral" Beckley reports only 4000 bags of sugar left on Hawaii, 3000 at Waiakes and 1000 at Laupahoehoe.

Henry Brower, the pedestrian who has been touring Hawaii, arrived in the Mauna Loa yesterday from the big Island.

Hana plantation was sold at auction today, under foreclosure sale, and only one bid was made, by A Gertenberg, trustee, for \$7,000.

James F Morgan and W H Hoogs will leave in the Siberia for San Francisco on business, Mr Hoogs to remain away two or three months.

The flagship Kinau brought the following inward freight this forenoon: 211 sheep, 10 1/2 cords wood, 10 kegs, 11 pigs, 1 horse and 298 pkgs sundries.

Purser Friel of the W G Hall reports fine weather still on Kauai. Encountered light south east winds and smooth seas in crossing channel. She brought as freight 5600 bgs sugar and 52 pkgs sundries.

Former Judge Hore's, of Waiakua, ten-year-old son Tommy was yesterday removed in the police patrol wagon, from the Kamehameha Preparatory School to the Queen's Hospital, to undergo an operation for appendicitis.

Attorney General Andrews rested the respondent's case in the matter of a petition for a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of Mikala Kaipu, at five minutes after three yesterday afternoon. Mr Ashford, for the writ, called President Pinkham of the Board of Health, and after his examination, asked for a continuance of the case until some time after Monday.
