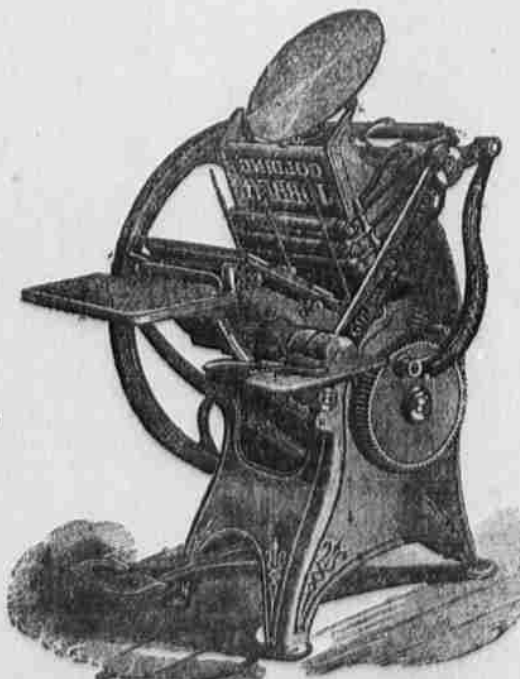

A FLOCCING AT THE JAIL.

The almost obsolete custom of flogging has been revived, under the Malaihi regime, at the Honolulu jail.

A native received a dozen lashes yesterday morning at the hands of Malaihi, who tells us that it was administered, by order of Marshal Parke, because the man "was saucy," and that the Marshal "wanted to give him two dozen lashes," but Malaihi "begged him off with a dozen." Malaihi further informed us that it was the first time that a man had been flogged in the jail for "five or six years." We believe that the punishment was administered at 5:30 a. m. yesterday, by Malaihi, in the presence of all the prisoners, the man being duly tied up, but that no medical man was in attendance to prevent a too severe castigation. The sufferer is a native who was working at the foundation of the new Government building, and he was "saucy" to the luna on Tuesday afternoon.

ISLAND NEWS.

(From Our Own Correspondents.)

KAUAI.

The weather is fine and business is lively on Kauai. All of the mills are running at their full capacity. No very remarkable yield has been reported lately, but the crops are generally good.

The projectors of the Waimea and Kekaha railroad have met with some unexpected difficulties, in the way of objections to their enterprise. The fact that Mr. Paul Isenberg and Mr. George Wilcox have the matter in hand, however, is pretty good

evidence that the road will be built.

Miss Ward and Miss Norton are having a very pleasant time on this island. They have visited Waimea and Hanalei. They are now spending a few days at Koloa, though Lihue is their headquarters.

Genial Dr. Sheldon of Wailuku unites business with pleasure during a limited stay at Lihue.

The marriage of Mr. Willi Richard and Miss Mele Cogswell was solemnized by the Rev. J. B. Hanalei, at the residence of Mrs. W. H. Rice, last Thursday evening. Mr. Richard is favorably known in this vicinity.

Miss Cogswell was a Kawaihae Seminary girl. The writer was favored with a piece of the wedding cake, which affected his dreams—because he ate it before going to bed. They have his best wishes.

A medical examination of the pupils of Lihue Union School resulted in the dismissal of four lepers. The lumber for the new school house is on the ground, and it is hoped that the building will be ready for occupancy at the beginning of next term. The number of pupils in attendance at present is one hundred and fifty, and it will increase with the facilities for their accommodation. The German school has about ninety in attendance. Who says children are scarce at Lihue?

LATEST FOREIGN NEWS.

By the S. S. Australia we have received San Francisco files to 17th Inst., including a copy of the *Evening Bulletin* of that date, from which we extract the following:

Peterson, the Californian sculler, beat Lee by almost a minute.

St. Petersburg, March 16th.—A paper summons the youth of Russia to oppose despotic forms of government, and says: "The Russian State machine is rapidly decaying, discontent is increasing in all classes, revolutionary ideas are spreading everywhere, even in the army, and the day of victory is approaching." The paper strongly deprecates terrorism and favors the union of all branches of Socialists who, it says, should pursue their desired end by moral energy and not by brute force.

Suakin, March 17th.—The Gordon Highlanders and Mounted Infantry, with tents and baggage, will proceed to Hanlonk tomorrow. The man-of-war Sphinx has gone to Massowah to report upon the defenses of that town.

Troops manifest great discontent at the prospect of being ordered to advance to Berber, as they consider the campaign useless.

London, March 15th.—In the Commons to-day, Hartington, War Secretary, announced telegraphic communication with Khartoum was broken and a steamer passing down the Nile from Khartoum to Shendi has been subjected to a continuous fusillade for three days. He believed the tribes in that region were in revolt. A battalion of British soldiers had been dispatched to Assowan.

Ellis Bartlett, Conservative, and Henry Labouchere, Radical, attacked the Government.

Fitzmaurice, Under Foreign Secretary, refuted the charge that the relations between England and Germany were unfriendly, and denied that Gen. Gordon was in extremities.

An interview between the Czar and the Emperor William has been arranged to take place in June, at Darmstadt.

A Suakin dispatch, gives another account of the panic last night among the Egyptians in Baker Pasha's camp at Zereba. It says the false alarm spread that Osman Digna had rallied, routed Gen. Graham's forces and was advancing on Zereba. The report produced a panic among the Egyptians, many of whom openly announced their sympathy with Osman Digna. A riot ensued and order was only restored by the arrest and imprisonment of the mutineers, two of whom had to be bayoneted.

London, March 17th.—The police of Newcastle-on-Tyne have received information of a plot to explode the principal buildings of the city, including the Central Railway Station and the post-office.

Dublin, March 17th.—Placards have been posted about Skibbereen, County Cork, announcing an outbreak or civil war in March. The police are removing them.

London, March 17th.—General Eddin, an Afghan Chief, editing an

anti-English paper printed in Paris, but to be circulated in Moslem countries, claims to be descended from the prophet. He promises undying enmity to England. After the Sepoy revolts of 1857, in which he participated, he went to Constantinople, but was expelled for claiming to be a descendent of Mahomet. Thereupon he took himself to Cairo, when the Chief Pasha gave him the Chair of Philosophy at the University. He was subsequently arrested for sedition and sent to India. Bundles of his papers are now at Constantinople ready for distribution through out the East.

Liverpool, March 17th.—The British steamer General Roberts, from Galveston, February 5th, has arrived. She collided with an ice field and had her bows smashed and her fore compartment filled with water. She had to jettison part of her cargo.

The bark Lucy, from Liverpool for San Francisco, was sunk by a collision with ice. Six or seven of the crew were drowned. The captain and three members of the crew have arrived at Youghal.

London, March 15th.—In Paris there is much uneasiness in diplomatic circles caused by the official information from Berlin to the effect that sudden and extraordinary activity has developed in the German Navy, while the Imperial Admiralty has just issued an order commanding the immediate doubling of the number of German marines and sailors. New submarine batteries on the most extensive scale have been ordered. The German Government has also taken steps to establish on a permanent basis a German commercial station in West Africa.

A BOTTLE ON HAWAII.

New York, March 5th.—A *Tribune* Norwich, Conn., dispatch says: Mr. and Mrs. Robbins Little of this place, who are on a tour around the world, sailed from San Francisco, September 6, 1883. When twenty-four days out Mr. Little placed a note in a bottle and threw it overboard with the request that the finder send it to John Mitchell at this place. To-day Little received the note, with a letter from John Stuppelbeen, dated Kawaihae, Island Hawaii, February 22, 1884, saying he had picked it up on the beach there.—*S. F. Bulletin.*

SHIPPING NOTES.

The Australia took, from San Fran-
cisco, 1250 pkgs general merchandise
for Auckland, and 8,700 for Sydney.

The Hawaiian bark, Lilly Grace,
formerly in command of Captain Hughes,
and recently sold to parties in Chili,
was about to take her departure last week
when the insurance men discovered
defects in her main and mizzen masts.
On this account no insurance would be
granted, and the vessel was compelled
to dock at section A of the seawall,
where new masts will take the place of
the old. The bark is now in command
of her first officer, Mr. Wall.—S. F.
Paper.

The Jane A. Falkenberg has gone to
Behring's Sea for codfish.

The s.s. City of Tokio arrived yester-
day, 14 days from Yokohama. She
brings 486 Chinese immigrants, 6 of
which are women. She also brings 14
cases of cigars, 22 cases of medicine, 50
cases of oil, 235 cases of tea, 1 case of
boots and 419 pkgs of merchandise. She
sailed yesterday at 5 p.m., with 103
through passengers.

The tern Hueneme, Capt G. Elliott,
34 days from Port Townsend arrived
yesterday with 450,000 feet lumber and
80,000 shingles. She is consigned to H.
Haeckfeld & Co.

The Excelsior is discharging at the
Likelike wharf.

The schr Mannokawai was hove down
yesterday to be caulked.

The W. G. Irwin sails to-morrow.

The bark Kale sailed yesterday for
San Francisco. She took 21,097 bags of
sugar, 644 bags of rice, 158 bales of
wool, 4 sks of coffee, 2 cases of jelly and
1 case of taro flour. Total domestic
value, \$138,300.18.

at 11 this a.m.

be convenient for a "run in" when
the new Station House is completed.

King street, between Nuuanu and
Fort, is being repaired by a large
gang of prisoners. The repairs will
be extended as far as the Chinese
Church.

HAWAIIAN Line of Steamers. Liv-
erpool to Honolulu and San Fran-
cisco, calling at the Azores to em-

steamer City of Paris, 100 A. 1. at
Lloyds, 3,086 tons registers and
2,250 (effective) horse power, will
sail for Honolulu and San Francisco,
receiving cargo till March 25th.
The preceding information was re-
ceived by Mr. Levey, yesterday,
from Mr. Hoffnung, on a neatly got
up card.

The new vessel, to replace the
Morning Star, will be built at Bath,
Maine, a contract having been al-
ready made by Captain Bray. She
is to be 130 feet long, with 12 feet
depth of hold and 435 tons register.
She is to have auxiliary steam power,
capable of steaming at the rate of
seven knots an hour. She will, in
one respect, be a novelty to these
waters, as she has no smoke stack,
the lower portion of the mast being
utilized for that purpose.

evolved the whole pageant in that brief period. I knew, of course, that time was no element in dreams, that any numbers of mental impressions may be crowded into a moment; but who ever heard of a man wide awake and walking the street in broad daylight suddenly falling asleep and dreaming? Was it possible that the eternal and immutable laws of time and space had been for an instant suspended; that invisible beings from some other world, immeasurably distant or close at hand—Impossible! the framework of my beliefs, which recognise no sphere beyond that of natural phenomena, is too firmly built up to admit of such a supposition for a moment. But it may be said, perhaps, that I had no such experience at all, that the whole thing was a subsequent freak of the memory or imagination. My answer to this is that I have put the matter to the test in the only way that seems to me possible. Some little time after what I have narrated, accompanied by a friend, I visited the public-house where I had the glass of brandy and obtained from the girl a complete confirmation in every detail of this part of my story. She recognised me at once, and said that my looks and the tone of my voice on the occasion in question were so strange that she would never forget them. The medicinal virtues of salt are thus referred to by an American contemporary:—Half a teaspoonful of common table salt, dissolved in a little cold water and drank, will instantly relieve heartburn or dyspepsia. If taken before breakfast, increasing the quantity gradually to a teaspoonful to a glass of water, it will, in a few days, cure any ordinary case of dyspepsia, if at the same time due attention is paid to the diet. There is no better remedy than the above for constipation; no better gargle for sore throat. It is equal to chlorate of potash, and is entirely safe. It may be used as often as desired, and if a little is swallowed each time it will have a beneficial effect on the throat by cleansing it and allaying the irritation. In doses of one to four teaspoonfuls in half a pint of water it acts promptly as an emetic, and in cases of poisoning it is always at hand. It is an excellent remedy for bites and stings of insects. It is a valuable astringent for hemorrhages, particularly for bleeding after extraction of a tooth. It has both cleansing and healing properties. It is, therefore, a most excellent application for superficial ulceration.

A story is narrated of a bishop on good authority. The bishop, who has for some time back been in extremely delicate health, was some days since by his physician that a trip to Nice was absolutely necessary to set him up in health; but he positively declined to entertain the idea of going, and shook his head so determinedly that the man of pills and potions thought it only right to express himself in plain terms.
