Proposed Conditions for Opening a New Port in Korea.

We find the following in the Japan Gazette of Oct. S, received per D. C. Murrey, on the 17th ulto., and as it bears upon the question of commerce, may have more or less interest to our readers. Art. 2. The ground rent in the settlement shall be the same at the beginning as is paid by the usual tax. It may afterwards be increased or decreased according to mutual arrangement.

This makes the number of immigrants which have arrived within a week from the South Sea Islands 465. These islanders are to all appearance a good class of people. Physically speaking (if we are to ludge from the specimens we see traveling through our streets) they are strong and healthy, and this applies to both sexes. Many of them are really fine specimens, and if they prove as docile as they are robust and healthy they will no doubt make excellent laborers on the plantations. The fact that the sexes are pretty nearly balanced and the females all young, hearty women, the likelihood is that the race will be materially increased in a few years. We learn that there is no difficulty about procuring any number of these people as they are numerous on their native Islands, and quite willing to emigrate to the Hawaiian group. We do not know what it costs to import these people per capits, and therefore, can draw no comparison on that score between them and the Chinese. These islanders are to all appearance a very primitive race of beings who by proper management might be fashioned as desired. They are inferior to the Chinaman in intelligence of course, but for the purposes for which they are brought here, this is no great objection, we presume.



The entire process of forming character, of gradually shaping well-ordered and independent opinions, of giving them body in action, and of molding action into manners, is one of such delicacy and personal, private life that all that is of the nature of interference must that all that is of the nature of interference must be held aloof from it. The opinion and example of the parent have pre-eminent significance and power in this process, and for that reason all the more ought the life of a child to be allowed to commence early the act of separation, to take in tits own nourishment and commence its own functions. A profound respect for the personality of each one, giving as timidity and pause in our dealings with it, inclining as to calculate carefully the range of the forces we have to handle and the good that is in them, is our first protection against that clumsy haste with which we strive to set all things right in a mechanical way by our own power, and substitute ourselves. way by our own power, and substitute ourselves for the rest of God's world.

If the parent can minister to the child on terms of freedom, there are no limits to his minstration; if he ministers only on terms of aqthority or intrusion, there comes a violent and fatal division, by which the one life, in mere self-protection, breaks from the other and be-

The Grain Vield.

The average grain product of Europe is reported at 5,000,000,000 bushels, of which Russia raises one-third, France and Germany 520,000, 000 tushels each, and Austria 500 000,000. The 000 tushels each, and Austria 500 000 000. The United States produces 1,600.000.000 bushels,—about the quantity that Russin does—which, in proportion to our population, is a much larger production than any other country can boast of. Counting our inhabitants at 40.000.000, we raise forty bushels per head, and Europe's inhabitants at 300,000.000, she raises but sixteen bushels per head. Russia has twenty-six and Great Britain only four bushels per head. The amount of grain consumed being generally fifteen bushels per head, we produce nearly three times as much as we want; Russia almost twice as much as she needs, and Great Britian not more than one-fourth of her requirement. Thus it will be seen needs, and Great Britian not more than one-fourth of her requirement. Thus it will be seen that the production for exceeds the consumption, but the excess is barbedge by broweries and dis-tilleries at home and abroad, which, more than any other cause, keep up the price of bread-stuffs. So men have to pay dearer for what they eat, because, perhaps, eating is a necessity, and drink-ing, for the most part, is much worse then a su-perfluity.
