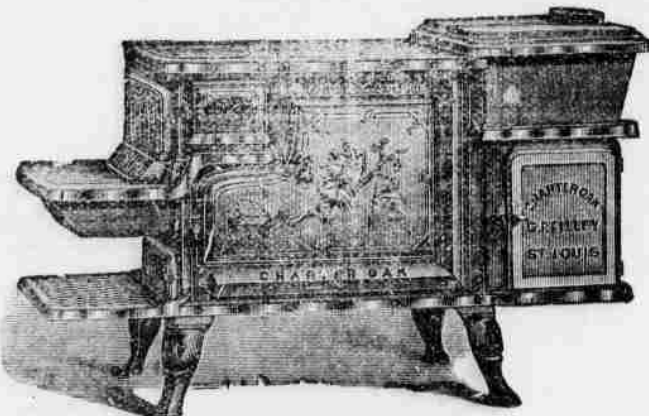

## BI-HOP HALL.

A Noble Building for Ramehameha Schools.

This building, the magnificent gift of Hon. C. R. Bishop, was planned and the general site for it selected early in 1887. Its erection was delayed by several considerations. It was deemed wise to inaugurate the school as soon as possible, and it was therefore decided to erect other buildings, such as dormitories, dining-hall, and workshops, and use other buildings temporarily for recitations. This afforded opportunity to perfect the plans for the principal building, and to determine the material to be used in its construction. An experiment in building the kitchen of the lava stone found profusely on the premises, and the later experience in erecting the Bishop Museum decided the matter, and Bishop Hall, instead of being a brick or concrete building, is a handsome and imposing stone structure. Its commanding site and attractive exterior make it a striking feature of the Honolulu landscape.

The building is on the so-called court-plain, being an L-shaped structure nowhere wider than the width of a class-room plus the width of an open corridor on one side of the building. It is 108 feet long on the side toward the sea, and 119 feet long in the rear. The corridor running all around the building is 10 feet wide, with broad arch-ways opening toward the sea.

There are fourteen rooms in the building, viz., the assembly room, where the students meet for chapel and general exercises, six class-rooms, a cloak-room for the lady teachers, a reading room, office, janitor's room, bat-room, and two spare rooms, one to be used for exhibiting samples from the workshops. The class rooms are large, well lighted and airy, capable of seating forty pupils. One of the rooms is used also for the Glee Club and another for mechanical drawing. The seats in the assembly room are arranged in a semi-circle, the rows of seats radiating from the rostrum. This room has an open timbered roof and presents a fine appearance.

The entire building is wired for lighting by electricity. The electric plant is on the way. Electric bells communicate with each class room from the office on the ground floor. At some future date, public exercises will be held in the Hall, of which suitable notice will be given. —Handicraft.

9—He must within three years enclose the Lot with a substantial fence.

10—He must pay quarterly in advance interest upon the unpaid purchase price at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum. The purchaser may pay the whole or any part of the purchase price at any time, which will stop interest.

11—The preliminary agreement is non-assignable and the land cannot be sold until all conditions are fulfilled.

12—Failure to comply with any of the conditions will work a forfeiture of the land.

### ROYAL SALOON ENTERED.

Some Imitator of Barretheaded Bill's Tricks at Large.

A daring burglary was committed last night, by two persons presumably. The place entered was the Royal Saloon, corner of Nuuanu and Merchant streets. What makes the burglary daring is the fact that the place entered is within half a stone's throw of the Police Station. Entrance was made between the hours of 11:30 p. m. and 5 o'clock this morning, and was effected through a window on the mauka side of the saloon in the rear. Mr. Simpson, barkeeper, closed the saloon at the regular time, leaving the place at 11:30 o'clock, having locked all the doors and windows in the place. At 5 o'clock this morning Mr. Wolter arrived at the saloon to open up, when he discovered that it had been visited by marauders. A demijohn of wine was standing on the table in a small rear room. There was a hole through a pane of glass large enough to admit the body of a man. Pieces of glass were scattered all over the yard opposite the window. Evidently a pocket knife had been used to cut the glass out, but either the glass broke in the process or the scamps got tired digging the hard putty and smashed the pane. Passing into the outer room one of them climbed over the partition into the storeroom where liquor in bulk is kept. There he emptied a barrel without finding any beer. He got a demijohn of wine, however, which he took to the back room. The fellows sat down and drank half the contents. Imprints of their shoes were plainly visible throughout the place. There is little doubt that the operations of the burglars are significant of a deep meaning, the near proximity to the Station and their not attempting to break into the main saloon being facts which go to show that they were not common robbers. A reward of \$250 has been offered for the apprehension of the burglars.

### SMUGGLING SOVEREIGNS.

The Case Continued till Saturday after a Strong Contest.

The Police Court was crowded yesterday afternoon at 4 o'clock, the Bloom and Douglas smuggling case being the drawing card. Police Justice Hopkins entered shortly after 4 o'clock, when Deputy Attorney-General Chas. Creighton stated that Messrs. A. S. Hartwell and L. A. Thurston would conduct the prosecution. Mr. Thurston then read the charge, which in substance was as follows: Smuggling about 30,000 British sovereigns inasmuch as said goods were not entered on the inward or outward manifests. Mr. Thurston after reading the charge asked for a remandment until Saturday morning.

Mr. A. P. Peterson for the defense wanted an immediate trial and he would term the opposing counsel's asking for a remandment simply "gall." They had promised at the morning session to be ready to go on with the case in the afternoon and now they go back on their promise.

Mr. Thurston replied that it was contrary to known rules to allow the defense to force the trial. As an important witness, Captain Gill, late master of the yacht, was about to leave the Kingdom he would request that defendants now plead to the charge, so that the Captain's evidence could be taken.

Counsel for defense then stated that they were not ready to plead.

Mr. Thurston said the defendants were fairly frothing at the mouth to plead in the morning, and they should be required to plead now, or the Government would lose important evidence.

The Court denied the motion and the required testimony of course could not be taken.

His Honor continued the trial to Saturday morning. Mr. Hartwell explaining that they expected important evidence by the steamer Australia.

The tilts between the respective counsel caused no little excitement among those present in the Court-room. There was an outburst of applause, which was promptly suppressed, at a point won by defendant's counsel.

## THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

Important Meeting of the Board of  
Representatives.

The Board of Representatives of  
the Honolulu Fire Department met  
last evening at the Bell Tower, As-  
sistant Engineer Geo. K. Norton  
presiding; with whom, besides Sec-  
ond Assistant Engineer J. H. Boyd,  
there were 14 members present. A  
large amount of business was trans-  
acted, principally in the line of re-  
form, as will more fully appear in  
the exhibits below.

Dr. F. L. Miner's bill of \$12 for  
medical attendance on a member of  
Hook & Ladder Co. was ordered  
paid. Several other bills against the  
department appropriation were, for  
the first time under the present ad-  
ministration, read to the members of  
the board, amounting in all to about  
\$250. These were approved and re-  
commended for payment by the  
Chief Engineer.

Mr. Chas. Lind was certified as a  
new member of the board from the  
Fire Police Company.

The Secretary then read the letter  
authorized to be sent to the Minister  
of the Interior, and the Minister's  
reply to the same, as follows:

BUREAU OF THE HONOLULU FIRE  
DEPARTMENT,  
Honolulu, Oct. 1, 1891.)

To His Excellency the Hon. CHAS.  
N. SPENCER, H. H. M. Minister  
of the Interior,

Dear Sir:—The members of this  
department beg leave to announce to  
Your Excellency, that there has re-  
cently arisen in the Board of Repre-  
sentatives to this department a differ-  
ence of opinion relative to certain  
duties of the Chief Engineer. It has  
been claimed on his behalf that un-  
der the statute governing the depart-  
ment (Chapter 45, Laws of 1888)  
the Chief Engineer alone may, by  
and with the approval of the Minis-  
ter of Interior, incur and cause to be  
paid all bills or accounts against the  
department appropriation without  
consulting the department. The  
question now referred to Your Excel-  
lency is simply this: Has the Chief  
Engineer by virtue of the above-  
mentioned law the exclusive power  
(1) to incur all bills and without  
consulting the department (2) to  
audit them at his pleasure?

It will not be sufficient answer to  
the question if Your Excellency  
should merely say, that the Interior  
Department has hitherto paid in  
good faith all approved bills under  
the belief that they were sanctioned  
by the department, for the object of  
this communication is not to censure  
the mode of paying, but to refer  
solely to the present method of applica-  
tion to Your Excellency or to the  
Interior Department for monies on  
account of this department.

It is due to the chief engineer,  
however, to say that he claims, by  
virtue of his office, the exclusive  
right to perform the aforesaid func-  
tion on the ground that such, being  
an executive act, requires only the  
sanction of the chief executive of  
the department. A copy of the de-  
partment by-laws is hereto annexed.  
Thanking Your Excellency for a re-  
ply, etc., etc.

SIR: I have the honor to acknow-  
ledge the receipt of your communi-  
cation of the 1st inst., in which, after  
citing a portion of the Act Relating  
to the Fire Department of Honolulu,  
you ask, "Has the Chief Engineer by  
virtue of the above-mentioned law,  
the exclusive power (1) to incur all  
bills and without consulting the de-  
partment (2) to audit them at his  
pleasure?"

I would say in reply, that under  
the law as set forth in Chap. 45,  
Session Laws of 1888, the Chief En-  
gineer has the power, by and with  
the approval of the Minister of the  
Interior, to make all expenditures of  
monies appropriated by the Legisla-  
ture for the Honolulu Fire Depart-  
ment. The Chief Engineer has no  
right to audit any bill to be paid  
from the aforesaid appropriation; all  
such bills must, by law, be audited  
by the Auditor-General. I have the  
honor to be, sir,

An exhaustive report on the finan-

18 months, prepared by the Secretary  
and Fire Marshal of the department,  
was then read in response to a resolu-  
tion passed at a previous meeting  
of the board. Following is the main  
part of the report:

FINANCIAL REPORT.

To the Board of Representatives of  
the Honolulu Fire Department.

Gentlemen:—The undersigned,  
John Neill, Fire Marshal of the  
department, and Henry Smith,  
Secretary of the department, beg  
leave to submit the following state-  
ments in obedience to the resolution  
of this board introduced by 24 As-  
sistant Engineer James H. Boyd at  
the last meeting of this board. If  
the financial statements here fur-  
nished do not cover the ground  
sought for, we have deemed it neces-  
sary to bring in this meeting our  
several books of record relating to  
the affairs of the department, so that  
if any questions be asked that are  
not answered by these statements,  
we may readily answer them verbally  
from a perusal of the record books.

period it is \$1445 97. To these in-  
creased amounts will be added the  
expenditures of the next six months,  
as this report covers only the past  
eighteen months of the present  
period. Prudence and economy will  
be claimed on the one hand, and an  
approximate increase of the expendi-  
tures for the department in view of  
its increased efficiency may be  
claimed on the other hand. The  
monthly pay roll of the department  
has also steadily increased; a list of  
the employees of the department is  
hereto annexed, and the amounts  
paid each are therein stated.

A statement of the cost of import-  
ing supplies for the department,  
through a local firm here, is attached  
hereto for the information of the  
board.

An information was laid before  
the board by the Fire Marshal relating  
to the false alarm given on the 28th  
Oct last, causing the engines to pro-  
ceed unnecessarily toward the Soap  
Works at Lele. After some discus-  
sion the matter was dropped from  
further consideration.

The committee on the relief ex-  
tended to a member of China Engine  
Company No. 5, recommended that  
said member have allowances made,  
to him until the end of this month.  
Granted and the committee was dis-  
charged.

Mr. Boyd then proposed that the  
reply of the Minister of the Interior  
be taken up for consideration. On  
the secretary saying that there was  
nothing in it for consideration, it be-  
ing evasive and not responsive to the  
issue, further consideration was  
dropped.

Delegate Smith proposed, seconded  
by Mr. Boyd, that hereafter all bills  
incurred by any member against the  
department shall first be read to the  
board before being approved by the  
Chief Engineer; this provision not  
to apply to the usual pay roll of  
monthly wages paid to the regular  
paid employees of the department,  
the use of horses, and rents. Passed  
unanimously.

Delegate Smith then said that  
owing to the evasive letter of the  
Minister of the Interior, the board  
had better legislate its own rules,  
and he hoped the following would  
not be in conflict with any vested  
rights. The following additions to  
the by-laws were proposed, which by  
the constitution were laid over one  
month before action:
