Dear Senator Dan:

The following is the method under which our agency works on a project, the agency's areas of responsibilities and system of charging.

We would, of course, be very flattered and excited by creating visually and orally the image of Senator Dan in the modern world with its sudden, traumatic problems...and translate to the viewer, the reader, the listener what Senator Dan can do for them in resolving these and other problems.

To do so would take the top talents of our thirty-man agency team...namely a three-part account supervision with John McDermott, our agency president, John Cavanagh, our operations vice president and myself working on the account.

We need to have an agreement with you on your general line of attack which is going to take several more in-depth conversations and a chance to watch you in operation at home in Honolulu and at work in Washington.

Our first target will be to develop a sound and a visual program under which everything will fit...posters, TV spots, testimonials, newspaper, radio, direct mail, buttons. We want to be concerned with reaching the objectives with all media...not to be too slick or too professional.


Our financial requirements are covered by a retainer and by commission on media and by our art department charges.

The man-hours required by such an account are not covered by the media commissions alone and we, therefore, charge a retainer to make the account profitable. We have talked among the three of us and agreed that a \$5,000 retainer for the entire campaign would be equitable to the campaign organization and to the agency.

The art department time charges range in price from \$9 to \$23 per hour, depending on the nature of the work and the artist performing it.

The following are standard extracts from our basic letter of agreement which we want all clients to read carefully so that there are no misunderstandings.

ADDENDUM

With references to charges, advertising space in consumer and trade periodicals, and in newspapers, and advertising time on the air for radio or television, if used, shall be charged to you at the card rates in effect at the time of purchase, or at such a figure (net plus 17.65%) as will make our commission in all cases the equivalent of fifteen per cent of the gross charges of publishers or broadcasting companies had they included commission.

Unless the following include 15% agency commission, type composition, printing, engravings, electrotypes and other cuts, they shall be charged at the net cost to us plus 17.65%. Layout and art charges, if furnished by our own art department, are billed to you at our rates at time of purchase. Design, layout and mechanical art services range in price from \$9 to \$23 per hour, depending on the nature of the work and the artists performing it. If furnished by outside artists, their net cost to us plus 17.65%.

Express, postage or other transportation charges involved in shipping advertising material to and from publications or other media, telegraph or telephone tolls especially incurred in carrying out your instructions or safeguarding your interests shall be billed to you at net cost.

Neighbor Island travel and expenses would be billed to you at net cost with your prior approval.

No commitments for advertising space, radio or television time or any of their accessories will ever be made unless we have your prior authorization.

Taxes on retainer and media will be passed on to you which is standard agency practice.

Bills for whatever advertising, printing or art work you may authorize will be presented to you in advance and will be paid to us within 10 days of your receipt of our statement.

It is our suggestion that we be retained immediately but without any publicity of any kind and the fee be made in two parts; one part now and one part at the end of the Primary.

- 5) For DKI: Notify staff members as to Fall plans (who to remain in D. C. / who to go to Honolulu:
- a. Assuming we are adjourned on August 3d, the following will be affected:

One week after adjournment on or about August 10th, Lamela & Lefforge to proceed to Hawaii.

Henry, Kimie and Alice will go to Chicago, proceed to Hawaii after Convention.
 - b. During the Convention: in D. C. will be Teehan, Sue Brandon part of the time. Charlotte and Beverly.
 - c. After the Convention, Teehan will proceed to Hawaii. Remaining in D. C. will be Charlotte and Beverly as caretakers.

Jack 10) Check photo collection

B. AGENCY (Fawcett-McDermott Associates, Inc.)

- ✓ 1) Prepare a letterhead for the campaign committee. Names to be placed on the letterhead will be supplied.
- ✓ 2) Draw up a poster which would be acceptable under the applicable ordinances of the City & County of Honolulu (square one)
- ✓ Prepare sketch of a larger one which may be used in counties not having sign restrictions.
- ✓ 3) Arrange for the rental of HIC Banquet Hall for Wednesday , September 4, for DKI Campaign Kick-off.

Submit a proposal for a program format for this evening, keeping in mind the following minimum requirements:

- a. If food is to be served, participants will be charged a minimal amount (not more than \$1.50 -- food should be simple fare.
- b. Dress: Informal (Aloha shirts, muumuus)
- c. No speech-making (other than by DKI)
- d. Program should consist primarily of audio entertainment
- e. Consider possibility of televising this event (1/2 hour ?)

- ✓ 4) Prepare outline for a brochure . This should serve dual purpose: for throw-away and for mailing.
- ✓ 5) Submit for immediate study by DKI: an over-all plan.
Consider the feasibility of campaign cards, newspaper inserts; begin work on newspaper and magazine ads.
- ✓ 6) Apply for a bulk-mail permit with the Post Office (before doing so, check w/Morio to see if old permit is still good.

B. AGENCY (cont'd)

- 7) Begin purchasing time for 1-minute spots on TV and radio.
Most of the spots should be during the month of October leading up to the General.

DKI wishes to schedule one important 30-minute program two days before the General Election which would fall on Sunday, November 3d.

- 8) Begin working on formats for 1-min. spots. Wish to have at least 10 different 1-min. spots. These could be repeated.

C . CAMPAIGN HEADQUARTERS

Matt Lee Loy and Morio Omori to immediately scout the City for a site keeping in mind the following restrictions.

1. No desire for campaign headquarters on King Street between River and Punchbowl Sts.
2. Would suggest looking into Keeaumoku between King and Kapiolani, or Kapiolani between King and Kalakaua.
3. There should be adequate parking space adjacent to or near the headquarters building.
4. Building should be air-conditioned (or one which would allow installation of air-conditioning).
5. Floor area should consist of approximately 2,000 sq. ft. It should consist of one large room and two small private rooms. (If two smaller rooms not available, explore possibility of partitions to create extra room)

Look into availability of necessary office equipment : desks, chairs, typewriters, tables, etc.

Investigate different types of telephone systems (switchboard, etc.)

Install telephone in car.

Dear Jack:

I am happy you were able to join me for lunch during my recent return to Honolulu. However, I regret most deeply that we were not able to spend more time together to discuss the plans for our forthcoming campaign.

Since time is of the essence, may I submit the following:

1) Please prepare a contract with provisions identical to those set forth in your letter to me. The parties to this contract will be your agency and the "Daniel K. Inouye Campaign Committee." The contract will be signed by the Treasurer of this committee, Mr. Morio Omori.

2) I am presently scheduled to return to Honolulu on or about the 20th of July. I plan to be in Honolulu for approximately one week. I plan to set aside sufficient time for me to visit your plant. It would be most helpful if the following could be prepared for my study during my next return to Hawaii:

- a) Sketch of a letterhead for the "Daniel K. Inouye Campaign Committee." I am certain you will have many ideas as to the use of identifying symbols, colors, etc. This letterhead will set forth the names of officers and committee members. These names will be furnished at a later date.

- b) Prepare a sketch of a poster within the dimensions set forth by the sign ordinances of the City & County of Honolulu. I believe the new sign ordinances provide a maximum of one sq. ft. for political signs or posters. However, I gather that the size would be unrestricted if posted in the interior of a building. Therefore, may I request the sketch of a larger one which may be used in building interiors and other Counties not covered by sign restrictions.
 - c) Please prepare a draft outline for a campaign brochure. This should serve a dual purpose -- for mailing and for handing out.
 - d) Please prepare draft proposals for one-minute spots. I would just like to study your suggestions for these spots.
 - e) Your ideas as to your over-all campaign format. In this format, I would wish to have you set forth in percentages or in dollars a budget for TV, radio, newspapers, magazines, etc.
- 3) Please arrange for the rental of the HIC Banquet Hall for the evening of Wednesday, September 4th, for my campaign kick-off. The format should be similar to that which we had planned for the August 9th kick-off. I believe the following should be observed:

 - e) Consider the possibility of televising this event --1/2 hour. I would be interested to know the cost figures for such live telecasting.

4) Please arrange for a bulk-mail permit with the Post Office. However, before doing so, may I request that you check with Mr. Morio Omori to determine if my old permit is still good.

5) Will you begin purchasing time for 1-minute spots on TV and radio. Since I do not anticipate any strong Primary opposition, I would wish to have the bulk of my TV and radio spots during the last three weeks of the campaign. In addition to the 1-minute spots, I would wish to schedule a 30-minute telecast two days before the General Election -- Sunday, November 3d. Please get the best time for this 30-minute program. This 30-minutes may be important to tie up loose ends, if such be necessary.

In order that activities may be coordinated, I believe the following should be brought to your attention. The following actions have been taken, or are in the process of being completed:

- 1) Twelve 4'x6' blow-ups of my portrait.
- 2) Purchase of bumper stickers (they are considerably cheaper in Washington).
- 3) Arrangements have been made with the Senate TV Studio for filming of color spots , indoor and outdoor.
- 4) I have a date with a portrait photographer for a new 1968 portrait.
- 5) The President, Vice President and Majority Leader will be soon filming a short clip endorsing my candidacy.
- 6) Drafts of position papers are now being drawn.
- 7) A personal letter announcing my candidacy for reelection is being prepared. This letter will be sent to approximately 7,000 people on my private mailing list.
- 8) My agents are now scouting the City for a headquarters site.

I wish to share with you a copy of a letter addressed to Jack DeMello of Fawcett-McDermott Associates, Inc. Please note the first page.

May I request that you and Matt immediately scout the City for an appropriate campaign headquarters site. Please keep in mind the following conditions:

- 1) I have no desire to establish my campaign headquarters on King Street between River and Punchbowl Streets.
- 2) I would suggest looking for a site on Keeaumoku between King and Kapiolani, or on Kapiolani between King and Kalakaua.
- 3) There should be adequate parking spaces adjacent to or near the headquarters building.
- 4) The room or rooms should be air-conditioned. If not, it should allow the installation of air-conditioning equipment.
- 5) The floor area should consist of approximately 2,000 sq. ft. preferably consisting of one large room and two small rooms. If small rooms are not available, inquire into the possibility of constructing partitions to create these private rooms.



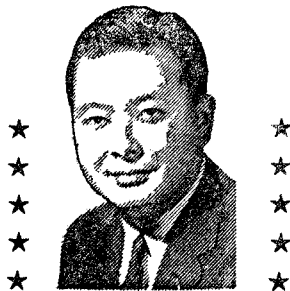

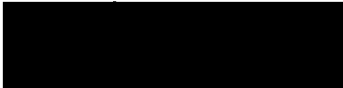

This will confirm our telephone conversation Tuesday afternoon in which I told you of Cecil Heftel's offer to make facilities and half an hour of non-prime time available at no cost for the U. S. Senatorial candidates to appear together on KGMB-TV and asked if you would do so, and in which you informed me that you would not have time to do this prior to your departure Saturday but that I might inform your campaign manager Randy Randolph that you would agree to do so when you returned if your schedule permitted.

You also said you expected to return about the 15th and agreed that Mr. Randolph would know prior to your return what the date would be, enabling him to contact us so that the program could be set up if your schedule permitted.


As only half an hour of TV time is involved I think it is safe to assume the whole thing would not take very much more than an hour of your time, including time to get to the studio, and that this is not an unreasonable amount of time to put into such an appearance before the voters of Hawaii.

BUD LAMPARD'S CANDIDACY FOR THE UNITED STATES SENATE

If you were favorable to Senator Eugene McCarthy's candidacy for the presidential nomination, and have been disappointed-- or dismayed-- at what happened in Chicago, take heart; all is not lost. The fight still goes on. You still have an opportunity to register a vote, here in Hawaii, for what McCarthy and his supporters stood for, and still stand for.

Bud Lampard of our faculty is running in the Democratic primary against Senator Dan Inouye. He's no more sure of success than was McCarthy when he went into New Hampshire, but we know what happened after that, all the way from LBJ's decision not to run, up to and including Mayor Daley's maintenance of "order" at Chicago. Commenting on that "~~democratic~~" convention, G. M. Roberts of the Washington Post put it well: "It is evident that hardening of the party's political arteries has set in; power, so long held, has atrophied the political flexibility for which the party has been famous".

"Happy" consensus, and government by cronyism, is not going to revitalize the Democratic Party, nor bring it future success in solving our problems, either on the national or the local scene. As a New York Times editorial notes: "Old rigid political structures on the campus and in civic life are breaking down, and young people are demanding more direct and effective political participation".

The wiser among the survivors of Chicago will, sooner or later, have to get that message, or perish politically, for the party which so long boasted of its flexibility; that it was the party "with a heart", seems badly in need of a transplant. Bud Lampard's candidacy is meant to bring these points home.

LAMPARD: VALUES AND ACTIONS

Before this country entered World War II, Bud Lampard volunteered for, and served with, the British Eighth Army in Africa. Between 1943-1945 he was with the

U.S. Navy in the Pacific. It was, he felt, the right, the necessary action.

When Autherine Lucy registered at the University of Alabama in 1955 as its first black student, that campus seethed with racial hysteria and potential violence. At a mass faculty meeting, one man rose to speak for racial integration in education, for human equality, and for reason. Life magazine photographed him as he did so. The man's name? Bud Lampard. For him, it was the right, the necessary, though not the easy action.

Later, when it became apparent that the war in Vietnam was not only immoral, but a danger to our real national interest and security, Bud Lampard opposed its continuing disguised escalation toward "victory". When Senator McCarthy took direct action in confrontation of that policy, Bud pitched in to help organize a Hawaii chapter of Volunteers for McCarthy. It was the right, the necessary, though not, at the time, the most popular of actions.

When it became clearly apparent that the "old guard" of neither of the major political parties would nominate a leader who stood for real change, Bud Lampard decided that he could, at least, carry the fight to the home front. In this campaign he is doing just that. It is, he feels, the right, the necessary action. Each of you can imagine how big a "machine", and how much money he's got for this latest uphill grind.

Does the above give you some idea of the man's calibre? Think his candidacy deserves your serious consideration? Could it be that it's your cause he's taking on? Perhaps he needs some help? Your help?

Come what may, you'll be hearing more about him, and from him, on the basic issues confronting state and nation, between now and October 5. I'm a serviceman in the United States Air Force. I was stationed at Eglin Air Force Base, Florida; but evidently I'm going to South East Asia for a year's tour.

To put it more clear, anyone going to South East Asia could have their military clothing sent home, expenses paid by Uncle Sam. So I took my duffle bag down to House Hold Goods, building 642. Before getting my orders, I had contacted the people in charge for some information. They told me all I needed was, six copies of my orders and being an airman first, I could send not more than 200 pounds through them. After telling them, I would like to have my duffle bag sent home to Hawaii; they told me I couldn't, because Hawaii was considered overseas and they couldn't ship things overseas. I told them that was my home state, and I enlisted there, but they still said it was or they couldn't handle it.

It all boils down to, "They considered Hawaii as overseas, and because of that, they wouldn't send my duffle bag home".

I would really appreciate it, if you could look into this matter. If they do consider Hawaii as overseas, and because of that; I'd like to see if someone could have this matter brought up before Congress and have a bill passed of some sort, so that we can have the right to be able to send our things home. I know, a lot of Hawaii boys, who are stationed stateside; and then having orders to go to South East Asia would really appreciate that.

I will be leaving for Thailand on the twenty sixth of this month. My address there will be:



"It is now known that such vital organs as the kidneys, thyroid, aorta (main heart artery), liver, lungs and others can be the sites of an unusually high fluoride build-up. No matter how small the amount of fluoride in the diet, a part of it tends to accumulate in the body. When the water supply is fluoridated the intake of the individual is considerably increased and the accumulation in the body increases accordingly. There is no clear-cut pattern as to the degree of retention among individuals. Further, it accumulates in certain organs in an unpredictable way. Some individuals may store up to 100 times more fluoride in certain tissue than others. This has given rise to concern over fluoride's possible role in chronic disease. Fluoride is an enzyme poison and medical authorities recognize that disturbances of the enzyme system are a cause of disease."

FLUORIDATION CAN CAUSE MOTTLING (Fluorosis, or Poisoning of Teeth)

Flu'o-ro'sis (floo'o-ro-sis), n. (fluor- + -osis.) Med. An abnormal or poisoned condition caused by fluorine, as the spotting of the enamel of teeth caused by too much fluorine in drinking water.
Webster's New Collegiate Dictionary

Dr. P. H. Phillips, Prof. of Biochemistry Univ. of Wisc. leading U. S. expert, having devoted 30 years to research on fluoride toxicity.

"Fluoridation of water . . . will be toxic to some individuals. A fluoridated tooth can become carious and once it does, there is no satisfactory repair. A mottled tooth is not a structurally strong tooth. We do not know enough about fluoride to recommend its indiscriminate use."

"We have had fluoridated water for seven years. It is lately that mottled enamel is starting to show up. It is not pretty. When they come in and I see the typical brown and white stains, I have to explain these are unremovable and caused from the doctored water they drink. This is a serious disfigurement to those who are interested in their looks. What it does to them further inside is a question I leave them to think about."

NATURAL CALCIUM FLUORIDE WATER LESS TOXIC THAN ARTIFICIAL SODIUM FLUORIDE USED IN FLUORIDATION

DR. C. G. DOBBS, (Ph. D., A.R.C.S.) Bangor, Wales, England
"The claim that fluoridation is one of 'nature's experiments' is not valid because the salts put into the water supply, sodium fluoride or silicofluoride, are industrial products never found in natural water or in organisms.
