## ASST. SECRETARY CARVER VISITS SAIPAN

Accompanied by High Commissioner M. W. Goding, Assistant Secretary of the Interior John A. Carver, Jr., arrived in Saipan on Monday, November 4, for a week's visit and conference with the High Commissioner and his staff in connection with the Solomon Survey Mission's report. While en route to Saipan, Mr. Carver also met with Governor Guerrero of Guam and other Government of Guam officials during a few hours stop there.

During a staff meeting held on Tuesday, November 5, at the Headquarters, both Assistant Secretary Carver and High Commissioner Goding noted that a number of major recommendations contained in the Solomon report were very much in the same direction of accelerated programs now already underway in the Territory. The Mission's report has been submitted to the President for review. The Assistant Secretary and the High Cormissioner noted that the report was an official report to the President and has not been publically released by the President's Office. The High Commissioner added, however, that some of the recommendations of the Solomon Survey Mission might be discussed in general with the delegates of the Council of Micronesia during its forthcoming session.

High Commissioner Goding was in Washington, D.C., attending the annual budget meeting on program estimates for fiscal year 1965. He also met with the Inter-Departmental Task Force, chaired by Assistant Secretary Carver, and discussed the U.S. Mission's report.

Mr. Carver was scheduled to depart Saipan for Washington on November 12.

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## COUNCIL OF MICRONESIA MEETS

The fourth session of the Council of Micronesia convened at the Territory's capital in Saipan on November 12, 1963.

The Council was scheduled to convene officially for business on Tuesday following an opening address by High Commissioner M.W. Goding. Assistant Secretary of Interior John A. Carver was expected to address the delegates at the opening session. The first order of the Council's business was the election of new officers, followed by the appointment of the Agenda Committee to work on the agenda items to be discussed by the Council.

Ponape delegates Heinrich Iriarte and Joab Sigrah were accompanied by Clerk of Court Edwel Santos who will serve as their interpreter.

### FISHERMEN'S CO-OP IN ANNUAL SESSION

The annual membership meeting of the Ponape Fishermen's Co-operative Association was held yesterday at the Kaselehlia Inn.

Mr. Harry Jackman, Co-operatives Advisor to the High Commissioner, was introduced and spoke briefly to the group reviewing the Statement of Assets and Liabilities which he had helped to prepare.

The Statement of Assets and Liabilities noted a profit for the past year of \$7,261.54, making a present surplus of \$7,754.93. The members voted to distribute one-half of this amount in cash patronage refunds and one-half in share patronage refunds.

Members voted to follow the uniform membership fee and share value schedule proposed by the High Commissioner to make memberships in co-operative societies available to a greater portion of the populace in any one area, as well as to (Continued on page 3)

strive for a greater uniformity in co-operative organization and practices. The membership fee is now established at \$1.00 and a share value at \$5.00. Present members who have paid a \$5.00 fee will be given \$4.00 credit toward the purchase of an additional share.

At the invitation of the Board of Directors the District Administrator commented briefly and favorably on the operations and financial condition of the co-operative. He also pointed out to the members that the present practice of withholding from government employees' salaries amounts of their credit purchases of fish from the cooperative is contrary to government policy and regulation and advised the membership and its directors to consider their plan of future operations without the advantage of a salary withholding practice.

The membership will meet again on December 10 to consider discontinuation of salary withholding and credit practices, to elect the directors for the coming year and to distribute patronage refunds.

### LIGHTS OUT

Public Works officials announced this week that until further notice there will be a routine check of power plant facilities every two weeks beginning at 12:30 a.m. Tuesday, November 19 (that is shortly after midnight, Monday-got it?). Power will be maintained on the island except for the PICS area. The maintenance work will require approximately four hours but may take longer, depending upon the nature of the conditions to be corrected.

Condition of power equipment here has not improved. Each power user should have emergency facilities available for light and cooking. It is recommended that refrigerators and freezers not be opened immediately before and during power outages.
