

> ADDITIONAL OF THE LOSS OF THE CONSORT. and Geo. F. Alley, a passenger on the same vessel at the time she was wrecked, informs us that they left Honolulu on the 6th of October. On the 20th of the same month, when in lat. 45 2 30, lon. 140 2 23, about 800 miles from land, they encountered a severe gale, and were dismasted. Jury masts were rigged, and on the 6th November they got near enough to sight Care Flattery light, that same night a gale came on from the south-east, and they were driven they saw the bark Glimpse from San Francisco, heading towards the straits. A signal of distress was displayed, and the bark bore down towards they crossed the Consort's bows, and bore off towards brig was then driven to and fro by the wind and sanctioning it. waves, and on the 15th of November was driven ashere near the northern extremity of the Island-a raft was made and a hauser sent ashere, by means of which they all reached dry land safely. They stopped at the point where they were wrecked until the 23th of November, when, by the advice of some Indians, they repaired to a native settlement, called Carchiceny, where, on the 18th of December, the gunboat arrived and took them on board. Mrs. Lockman, the only female passenger on board the Consort, here up bravely during the whole of the trying scenes through which she was compelled to pass, and received great praise for the fortitude she displayed on all occasions. The Consort had a small cargo of Sandwich Island produce, and was bound to engaged in the trade for some time, and was considered a stanneli vessel, although a slow sailer. THE CONSORT'S CREW AND PASSENGERS - Yester-

day afternoon, we learned that all but two of the passengers and crew of this vessel were in destitute circumstances. A subscription list was immediately started, and in a few minutes \$193 75 were subscribed by our kind-hearted citizens, and handed over to Captain McLellan, late master of the Consort, for distribution. The amount was, doubtless, very acceptable to the unfortunate people, who have suffered so dreadfully for many months past. Mr. and Mrs. Lockman and child were kindly accommo dated with comfortable quarters at the residence of Wm. J. McDonald, Esq., M. P. P., who opened his house to them, where they received every attention from himself and lady. Several of the crew suffered from a want of food on Tuesday night, and some were relieved at the station-house by the officers in charge. The money raised yesterday, although sufficient for their most pressing wants, will not go far among so many; and further subscriptions will be received at Messrs. Hibben & Carswell's Stationer's Hall, Yale street; and at the British Colonist Office. We would earnestly entreat all those who have not yet subscribed to come, forward to-day and

BURGLARY .- On Wednesday evening, 6th inst., the store of Messrs. Castle & Cooke, at Kawaiahao, close to the Stone Church, was entered by thieves, and a considerable amount of goods assorted out, and piled beent at prayer-meeting in the fore part of the evening, had got himself locked in, unknown to the clerk, when the store was shut for the night, and fterwards, when darkness and stillness had succeeded, opened the end door of the store and let his comrades in. During the absence of the family at meeting, the discovery was made; one thief was seen running away from the end of the building; the clerk and several persons belonging to the premises entered the store to search for the thief or thieves : a strong watch set at the lower door, and a boy armed with a hatchet set to watch the upper door, with a light standing on the counter. While the search was actively proceeding in the lower end, the thief suddenly popped his head over the counter near which the boy was, blew the light out, rushed for the door, opened it, and escaped unhurt by the hatchet, which the boy threw after him, and a third rascal escaped through the win-low. This is the second time that Mr. Castle's store has been entered in the same manner. No clue has been had as yet to the thieves, though, from the peculiar kind of goods selected to be removed, it is suspected that they were Chinamen .-

CATTLE STEALING AT WHOMSALE, - A correspondent writes from Lahaina, that " quite a large number of natives have been detected in cattle stealing on Molokai, which has been heretofore known as a very moral island. It is reported that Mr. Gulick has lost one hundred and eight (108) head of cattle, His Majesty about two hundred (200) head of sheep, and other graziers some. This business appears to have been going on for some time, the thieves passing the meat off for turtle. What they have done with the hides and pelts is not known, but it is reported that ter to notice the supposed necessity and beneficence there is a kanaka who makes it his business of going around to the different islands buying up hides, asking no questions where they came from. He has, no doubt, been making a good thing of it, as he can generally obtain them at his own price. There are

twenty-two of these cattle thieves in Lahaina prison now, and they look as if they have had fine living." - A number of prisoners were brought down on the steamer from Labaina on her last trip, part of whom were these thieves, who have been shipped in the chain gang, on public service.

The first section provides that every common prostitute in and around Honolulu shall register her

name, age, place of birth and residence. The second, that all females known to be common prostitutes failing to register, shall, on complaint and conviction before the police magistrate, be imprisoned for from thirty to sixty days.

We may here observe in the first place, that the Port Madison to load with lumber. She has been law recognizes prostitutes as a well-known and definite class, distinct from other unchaste persons. They are distinguished in that they make a traffic of their shame. The law is one for prostitutes as such, for those who openly sell themselves for infamous purposes. So far it is well. A law expressly to act upon this class is undoubtedly needed.

We may notice also, that the law causes the government to take this class under special recognition and control, by means of the registry. It ceases to ignore. It no longer remains regardless or inactive respecting them. It awakes to action concerning them. It reaches out its arms and gathers them all and singly under its observation and control. Thus it assumes a full responsibility towards them, to deal with them as is befitting. They are now within the province of government action by distinct avowal, if

There is no longer any passivity. It has taken them in its hand, and they stand waiting its disposal. It can no longer plead neutrality respecting them. Unless it strictly forbids their pursuit, it gives consent thereto. Which is it?

To our shame the answer must be, that the law consents to and authorizes this infamous crime. It has not one letter of prohibition for it. It proposes not the slightest repression of it. It has penalties, but none for continuing a prostitute. It punishes neglect to register. It punishes neglect of sanitary regulations. But it has no thought of punishment for the vile, damning thing itself. On the contrary, it distinctly contemplates that

they shall continue their trade. It expressly provides for their sanitary regulation, so long as they choose to remain engaged in it. They are expected to pursue their business under the full cognizance and systematic inspection of the authorities. They are now no longer outlaws, but are received into the bosom and under the shelter of the law. They have full permission to go on in their trade until they choose voluntarily to withdraw from it. While they are thus in hand, they are carefully watched, nursed and purged of disease, that while they sin and others sin with them, none may suffer.

From the foregoing considerations and those previously urged, does not the fact sound out plain and incontrovertible, that this law creates an arrangement whereby the prostitute may enter into convenant with the authorities, and under their control and care may and does pursue her infamous and destructive trade, without fear of hindrance or punishment? What does this mean? Does it not mean that those who receive certificates of enrollment are under government protection and free from arrest, according to the old law? The writer can hardly avoid understanding it so, whether he desires to so understand it or not. And this we suppose is the understanding of all who receive their papers. They are not only free from arrest for adultery, but they are cared for by the Government by receiving medical aid without charge. If the law had gone a little further, and confined the business, as on "the continent," to certain houses and localities, with heavy taxes on the keepers of such houses to help pay for the mischief done, we should consider it a decided improvement on the present law. Now those who receive this informal license are allowed to find a domicil where they choose, and thus to spread the evil. The moral objection of the Reviewer bears quite as strongly against the Hawaiian system as the system which "prevails in most towns on the conti-

Until quite recently the surface of the moon has been supposed to be a vast lifeless desert. Astronomers have abused the moon in every possible way. They have said there was no heat in moonshine, They have denied the moon an atmosphere, and consequently water and organic life. "I have a patient here, and I want you to see | by day. But this is all changed. Knox and Melloni have shown, by very exact observations, that there is heat in the moon's rays. Zantsdeschi has discovered that this heat produces a sensible effect upon the mimosa. An English philosopher has found that the earth is colder during the first quarter of the moon than it is in the second.

Upon the growth of plants the moon exercises a remarkable influence. The chemical action of light is necessary to their principal work, the absorption of carbon from the carbonic acid gas of the atmosphere. This work all plants carry on during the day, and in the night they sleep, except when the moon shines. She wakes them and sets them at work. So the farmers who plant only just before the full moon are right, and the scoffers who call them superstitious are themselves the foolish ones. For, if sown before or near the new moon, the young plants get above ground just at the full, when the tender things need sleep. But if sown just before the full, they come up about new moon, pass their babyhood under the soothing influences of dark nights, and when the full moon comes are sturdy urchins, able to work

night and day.

The moon-worshipers are right, also, in regard to the influence of the moon upon the weather. Herschel, Arago, and Whewell recognized that the moon 211-6m. Schel, Arago, and Whewell recognized that the moon 211-6m. has some slight power in dispersing clouds. The sailors go further, and say the moon eats up clouds. At the last meeting of the British Association it was shown that the weather through a long series of years depended a little-a very little-upon the phases of the moon : and now Quetelet, the Director of the Brussels Observatory, has shown that between the first and last quarters of the moon more and not less rain falls than during the remainder of the time. However, fine weather and greater rainfall may go

Finally, Webb, after a careful comparison of the present appearance of the moon with the very precise maps made by Madler some twenty years ago, has shown that there have been considerable changes. Some of the small craters, in particular, have a no tably different form from what they had when Madler observed them. These changes show the existence of water and an atmosphere. Father Seechi, Director of the Roman Observatory, after much observation, has come to the conclusion that the peaks of the highest mountains on the moon are covered with snow. And to make us still more at home on the moon, I'e la Rive, the owner of the observatory at what were at first marked down as seas, and afterward supposed to be barren plains, are in fact extensive forests. In support of this somes up a great as-tronomic authority, Schwabe, the discoverer of the periodic times of the sun's spots. Besides these great smooth plains, which were called seas, there are a number of furrows or wrinkles, nearly a hundred, the nature of which was entirely unknown. Their length varies from three to thirty-five miles, and their greatest breadth is about five thousand feet : most of them are considerably narrower. Their sides are parallel and smooth; some run in strait lines and some are gently curved. Ordinarily they are separate, but sometimes they cross each other; often they cross craters, but occasionally they seem to be cut off by them. They are found all over the surface of the moon, except on the highest mountain chains. Of these furrows Schwabe has made careful study at various times. He found them to consist of very

fine parallel dark lines, separated by clear spaces. A few months later the lines or streaks had disap-"I will send you a new medicine," said the peared, but after a while they returned, again to disappear. In this periodic change he thinks he finds proof that these lines are rows of trees, and the clear streaks between them are the bare ground seen when the trees are leafless. When the trees are in full leaf the ground is so covered as to produce a uniform shade, and the lines disappear. Nothing is more natural than to suppose that the dark spots on the moon are forests; but how shall we

account for the growth of these trees in right lines? This hypothesis we must for the present consider to be only a hypothesis. With the aid of photography, which will secure for us accurate pictures of the moon from time to time, we may hope that the question will be solved, and that we may really find out what is going on upon the surface of our satellite.-
