MISCHIEVOUS MISREPRESENTATION.

We have been requested to state

that there is no truth in the report

circulated around town, and printed

in the "Hawaiian Gazette," to the

effect that the King is about to promulgate

a new Constitution, and that the Household Guards and

other military companies are being

put in readiness with a view to approaching

hostilities.

The King is not preparing a new

Constitution. He is satisfied with the

Constitution as it is. This we

have been requested to state, and it

should allay popular apprehension.

A CONFUSION OF IDEAS.

The Government organ to-day

says that "matters of detail in sinking

into comparative insignificance,"

with the "possession of the great privilege of free, popular self-

government." Here is a confusion

of ideas truly. The objects to be

attained by free, popular self-govern-

ment are precisely those things

which the "Gazette" contends are

immaterial.

This same confusion of ideas runs

through the entire editorial article

of the "Gazette." It must be evi-

dent to intelligent readers that the

writers in that journal do not begin

to comprehend the vital principle

embodied in the terms used by it

namely, "free, popular self-govern-

ment," "independent legislation,"

and "responsible administration." It

is this defect in apprehension

which leads that paper to commit so

many vagaries when dealing with

constitutional questions.

For example, it labors under the

delusion that the New Constitution

confers upon the country "the in-

estimable boon of responsible gov-

ernment." It does nothing of the

kind. It creates a Cabinet, respon-

sible to neither King nor Legisla-

ture, if the contention of Ministers

be adopted as correct. This is not

what the people intended, whatever

may have been in the minds of

Ministers when they presented that

very unique instrument, the Consti-

tution of July 7th, to the King for

his approval.

At the very best, the Constitution

makes Ministers responsible to the

King; it does not make them respon-

sible to the Legislature or the peo-

ple. The King appoints and re-

moves his Ministers. That is the

plain reading of the Constitution in

this regard; but Ministers are fight-

ing to free themselves from respon-

sibility to the King, as has been al-

ready shown by the BULLETIN, and

are seeking to be responsible only to

their own consciousness of duty. It

is this irresponsibility of Ministers

for which the "Gazette" contends

for, the possession of which it declares

"should be guarded by every means

within control," and beside which

the "making and executing of laws

sink into comparative insignifi-

cance." The people of this country

think otherwise.

CONCERT AT KAUMAKAPILI CHURCH.

The concert to be given at Kaumakapili church to-morrow evening promises to be a great success. The programme has been published, and is a full and attractive one. The money derivable from this concert will be applied to a most worthy object, namely, the education of Hawaiian girls in the English tongue. As already stated in the BULLETIN, there are several pupils at Kawaiaha school and two day pupils at Miss Corney's school, maintained by the Liliuokalani Educational Society. The intention of Princess Liliuokalani and the lady members of this society, is to raise a fund the interest of which will be devoted to educational work. The subscriptions have been sufficient heretofore for the outgoings, and there is a reserve fund in the hands of Mr. Alex. Cartwright, senior, to the credit of the society, which may be regarded as a nucleus, to be added to from time to time by money derived from concerts or other entertainment, and by donations and subscriptions. The cost of maintaining, clothing and educating a girl at Kawaiaha school is about \$100 per annum. It is evident, therefore, that if the Liliuokalani Society is to become an effective educational force in the community funds must be more freely contributed than hitherto. The Hawaiian ladies who have the matter in hand have done commendably well, but interest is apt to slacken as the novelty of such a movement wears off. The concert at Kaumakapili church to-morrow evening should quicken interest in this work, and leave a considerable sum in the hands of the treasurer.



and call. The eyes of the commu-
nity are not shut to passing events,
and the desperate methods of the
soldiers of fortune in the Cabinet
and out of it have not escaped ob-
servation and condemnation.

PERMANENT INVESTMENTS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:—The "Gaz-
ette" of the 22nd instant gave as a
proof of public confidence in the
Reform Government the fact that
several planters had paid their taxes
in advance; and further stated, as
another proof, that "leading capital-
ists have largely increased their
investments in plantations and other
reproductive property."

The tax advances being simply a
loan to the Treasury count for nothing;
but if it were true that capital
is being extensively invested in per-
manent improvements which would
otherwise be untouched, it would
count for something. The fact,
however, appears to be that nothing
in the shape of permanent invest-
ment has been undertaken since the
new regime began that would not
have been undertaken in any event.
The new buildings in the city come
within this category, the latest, that
on the Brewer block, being essen-
tial to render the property renumera-
tive, and an intention to build was
announced long before the revolu-
tion.

The development of plantation in-
terests does not depend upon a
change of government, and cannot
be set down to that account. But
what must be taken into account is
the withdrawal of capital from this
Kingdom and its investment on the
Coast. This outward movement of
capital has been greatly accelerated
since June 30th, and it has now as-
sumed serious proportions. Thick-
and-thin backers of that movement
are sending away their money for
investment. Does that look like
confidence? Let the writer in the
"Gazette" try to borrow money on
the best kind of security and he will
speedily find out what capital thinks
of the stability of the existing order
of things.

It is admitted by all, and the
newspapers have been a unit on the
subject, that the Wilder railroad
project and the Dillingham land
colonization scheme are of para-
mount importance, and will do more
to develop the resources of the
country and add to its future wealth
than any enterprises that have ever
before been brought forward. This
being the case they should not lack
the backing of local capital, more
especially if the "Gazette" be cor-
rectly informed. But they do lack
this backing. Neither enterprise
can command a dollar of capital
worth speaking of in any island of
the group, and must go to London
seeking. In other words, Hawaiian
capital does not now look for per-
manent investment in Hawaiian en-
terprises. What cannot be with-
drawn remains here; what can be
withdrawn is being quietly sent out
of the country for investment else-
where. This is the truth of the
matter, and an unpleasant truth it is.


