METHUEN LOSES HEAVILY

SEVENTY-THREE MEN KILLED AT MODDER RIVER.

Casualties Number 438—Waiting for Re-enforcements Which are Being Pushed Rapidly Forward.

LONDON, December 2.—As surmised, the British dead and wounded at the hard-fought battle of Modder river number hundreds. The War Department today gave out the information that the total number of casualties was 438 and that the number killed was 73. From General Forester-Walker's dispatch it is proved that all reports of General Methuen's advance after the battle of Modder river were premature, though, with the railroad working, he should not be long in constructing a temporary bridge. His enforced delay doubtless will be of considerable service in giving his hard-pushed column needed rest and in allowing the arrival of re-enforcements, of which he must be sorely in need after three such fights, placing him de combat upwards of a thousand men out of less than seven thousand.

General Forester-Walker's announcement that the Canadian marksmen and other re-enforcements have been pushed forward to the neighborhood of the Orange river to protect General Methuen's line of communication has relieved much anxiety here, where it was fully expected the Boers would attempt to attack the vulnerable point of the line of communication.

LONDON, December 2.—The War Office has received the following from General Forester-Walker:

"Cape Town, Friday, December 1.—General Gatacre reports no change in the situation.

"General French had made a reconnaissance from Naauwpoort to Rossmead. The troops returned today. "General Methuen's flesh wound is slight. He is remaining at Modder river for the reconstruction of the bridge. Am reinforcing him with Highlanders and a cavalry corps. The horse artillery, Canadian regiments, Australian contingents and three battalions of infantry have moved up to De Aar and Belmont line."

The latest news from Natal indicates that the bulk of the Ladysmith relief force has arrived at Frere, though there is considerable conjecture as to the whereabouts of General Buller, whose movements have not been chronicled recently.

It is surmised in some quarters that he may reappear in a totally unexpected quarter, on the flank or rear of General Joubert's force, which is supposed to be concentrated at Gobaab's Kloof, north of the Tugela river. As General Buller's advance guard was in touch with the Boers as long as Tuesday last, developments should not be long delayed.

Donald's mounted force, on November 23rd, accompanied by four guns, went in pursuit of a body of Boers returning to Colenso. They followed the Boers to within two and a half miles of Colenso, when the Boers replied to the British shells with long-range guns. There were no casualties.

Colenso bridge, it is added, was afterwards blown up.

WANTS A NOTE CANCELLED

DR. NICHOLS SUES CHARLES EAGAN.

Agreed to Buy a Mare for \$5,000 in Case of Land Deal Went Through, But the Option Failed.

Dr. A. E. Nichols has brought a cross suit against Charles E. Eagan, of Oahu, to cancel a certain promissory note for the sum of \$5,000. Eagan had previously sued for the amount. Judge Stanley signs an injunction forbidding the prosecution of the matter in the Fourth Circuit Court.

On March 31 last, Dr. Nichols obtained a three months option on 300 acres of land belonging to Eagan at Oahu. He was acting for the Oahu Sugar Company. The price he was authorized to offer was \$100 an acre, but Eagan wanted \$116.66. As a compromise, to make up the difference, Dr. Nichols offered to buy Eagan's mare "Outcast" for \$5,000 on his account. This was accepted, and the option was given. A deposit of \$500 as a guarantee of good faith was made. Nichols gave his note for three months for the mare and took the animal.

For some reason not explained in the bill the sale of land was never made. It is understood that neither side was satisfied with the price. On July 1, Nichols' deposit of \$500 was forfeited to Eagan, as per agreement. Nichols then offered the mare back to Eagan and demanded his note, but the Oahu man declined to comply.

Nichols contention is that the sale of the mare depended entirely upon the sale of the land. With the lapse of the latter the former failed as well. Eagan sets up a claim that the sale of the mare was independent, the purchase being made by Nichols on his own account, and that it had no connection with the land deal.

Papers in the matter will go up by the next Kinau for service. Mr. Eagan is required to answer here within twenty days.

LADYSMITH SAFE.

Position Very Strong With Forts and Redoubts.

LONDON, November 29.—The Standard publishes the following from Ladysmith, dated Tuesday, November 21st:

"Last Saturday I had a whole saluting of my correspondence returned to me, showing the difficulty of communicating with the outside world.

"The Boers' cannonade continues almost daily, but there have been few casualties. Evidently the object of the enemy is to exhaust the spirits of the English troops by incessant harassing. The prospect of the British advance from the south has impelled them to redoubt their efforts. They are mounting more guns and drawing the lines of investment closer."

LADYSMITH, Monday, November 20 (by messenger to Mool River).—All here are well and cheerful. The Boers are not shelling today, and we have no fear they will attack the town. Our position we have made very strong with redoubts and breastworks, and we look forward confidently to the ultimate result.

PARTITION OF SAMOA.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The British and German Ambassadors had several conferences with Secretary Hay today relative to the treaty for the partition of Samoa, and it is understood the minor questions of phraseology which remained open were so reconciled that the way is clear for signing the document, probably tomorrow.

NEW SUGAR TRUST FORMED

AMERICAN SUGAR COMPANY AT THE HEAD.

All the Independent Refineries Will Consolidate—Havemeyer Engineering the Deal.

CHICAGO, December 1.—The News says today: A \$200,000,000 trust is in contemplation. There is every prospect that the American Sugar Company, the Glucose Refining Company and all of the so-called independent sugar refineries will be consolidated. H. O. Havemeyer of the sugar combine has, it is understood, secured an option on the Arbuckle Company, the Doscher concern and the outside plants in Boston and New Orleans. This evening he will, it is said, receive a definite proposition from the glucose people, when his representatives, who left Chicago last night, arrive in New York. It has been ascertained that representatives of the Havemeyer Company have been in this city in conference with President C. H. Matthiesen of the Glucose Company for several days. The result of these conferences, it is said, was an option on the glucose interests.

The important feature of the plan is that the American Sugar Company will increase its capitalization from \$75,000,000 to \$200,000,000. It is understood that \$20,000,000 of this will be given the glucose people for their plant, and \$20,000,000 to the outside refineries, and that the entire common stock of the sugar trust will be put on an 8 per cent basis. The rate of dividend on the preferred shares will not be changed, while the holders of ordinary will be allowed to subscribe for the new certificates at par.

The capital of the Glucose Refinery Company is \$200,000—\$14,000,000 preferred and \$200,000 common, so that the certificates will be taken in substantially at an average of \$75 per share.

When questioned in reference to the prospective sale of his company, C. H. Matthiesen today refused to discuss the matter, saying: "Any information that may be of value to the public will be given out at the proper time."

NEW YORK, December 1.—The dispatch from Chicago announcing the formation of a \$200,000,000 combination embracing the American Sugar Refining Company, Arbuckle Brothers, Glucose Refining Company and various independent companies, was discredited in trade circles here. New York sugar refining company interests knew nothing of it, and recalled the fact that a similar story was sprung last spring, but without corroboration as yet.

BLOFF TAKES BAYAMBONG

LIEUTENANT MONROE USES STRATAGEM.

With Fifty Men of the Fourth Cavalry He Secured the Surrender of Over Eight Hundred.

MANILA, Dec. 2, 6 P. M.—The capture by Lieutenant Monroe and fifty men of the Fourth Cavalry of the Filipino rebels at Bayambong, province of Nueva Vizcaya, was a successful bluff. Lieutenant Monroe tapped the rebel wire, telegraphed to Canon that he was advancing with a large force, and demanded his surrender. After negotiations, Canon consented to capitulate to a superior force, whereupon Lieutenant Monroe telegraphed that he would enter the town with a small guard and receive the garrison's surrender. He captured the whole Filipino force and secured their arms, the rebels supposing Monroe had an army behind him.

Canon, a native of Alabama, entered West Point in 1868, graduating two years later. Since 1876 he has been with the Eighteenth Infantry. He was very popular with the civilians as well as the military class.

MANILA, December 1.—When the landing party from the Oregon took Egan, they found there Albert Sonnichsen who was captured with Lieutenant Gilmore's party at Baler. He says that when they were taken to San Isidro they were ordered shot by General Luna, but that Aguinaldo interfered and prevented the execution.

THE COLORED REGIMENT

THE FORTY-NINTH GOING TO MANILA.

Officers and Men are All Colored Except Colonel W. H. Beck and His Staff.

The Forty-ninth, a "colored" regiment with colored line officers, arrived in town today on the transport Warren. The whole waterfront soon knew that they were coming when they entered the harbor and the men yelled as negroes came as they passed the Columbia and Dalney Vostok. As soon as the Warren docked Colonel Beck sent the band ashore and the musicians serenaded the custom house while the regiment's trick bicyclist did fancy riding on Fort street.

The line officers of the Forty-ninth are all colored, as is the case of the Forty-eighth, which is still in San Francisco. This is a new feature, former colored regiments having been offered by white men. Colonel Beck and staff are the only white men. The colored officers bear themselves very creditably. The Forty-ninth has a good band on board and the trip on the Warren was very pleasant. The band and the regiment marched up town soon after the arrival. The negroes made a fine showing as they marched through the city and much favorable comment was aroused.

Campbell, M. D. Bass, J. Crumley, F. R. Stewart, W. D. Edwards, J. C. Porter, A. A. Surgeon, H. W. Moore, white; Surgeon W. C. Wainwright, colored; Lieutenants W. D. Pritchard, F. Dobler, J. Maloney, white; colored, Lieutenants L. H. Gordon, W. Blancy, C. Spinlock, W. H. Buller, C. Perry, J. H. Thomas, D. T. Gilman, C. Butler, Henry Wagon, R. Cough, Perea, G. E. Payne, Leonard Hayes, H. Wheaton, I. Campbell, T. Dickenson. The noncommissioned officers are all colored.

When the Forty-ninth was in San Francisco there was some difficulty about the saluting regulations, the white soldiers not always giving the salute called for by the rules. In most cases, however, soldiers recognize the dignity of the uniform and among the commissioned officers the negroes are treated with all due respect.

The Philippine, from the circus in San Francisco, arrived on the Warren, returning to their native land. There are 568 enlisted men on board.

HONOLULU BREWERY.

There was a report in circulation this morning that the brewers' syndicate of the mainland had bought a controlling interest in the Honolulu brewery and that in consequence work would stop on the new building. This is denied absolutely by Louis Schweitzer of Schweitzer & Co., one of the promoters of the Honolulu concern. He says the company was organized for the brewing business and the men in it have their money there for an investment. Enough more building material will arrive in a week to carry the building to the second story. Steel structure is now on its way around the Horn, and the machinery for the refrigerating plant left New York on the St. Katherine in October. Construction will be pushed rapidly and business will be begun as soon as the plant is installed.

FAVORS PACIFIC CABLE.

WASHINGTON, December 1.—Secretary Root, in his annual report, makes a strong recommendation for the laying of a Pacific cable as a matter of great military and political importance. The cost of such a cable is placed at not exceeding \$8,500,000, running by way of Hawaii, Wake Island and Guam, from San Francisco to Manila.

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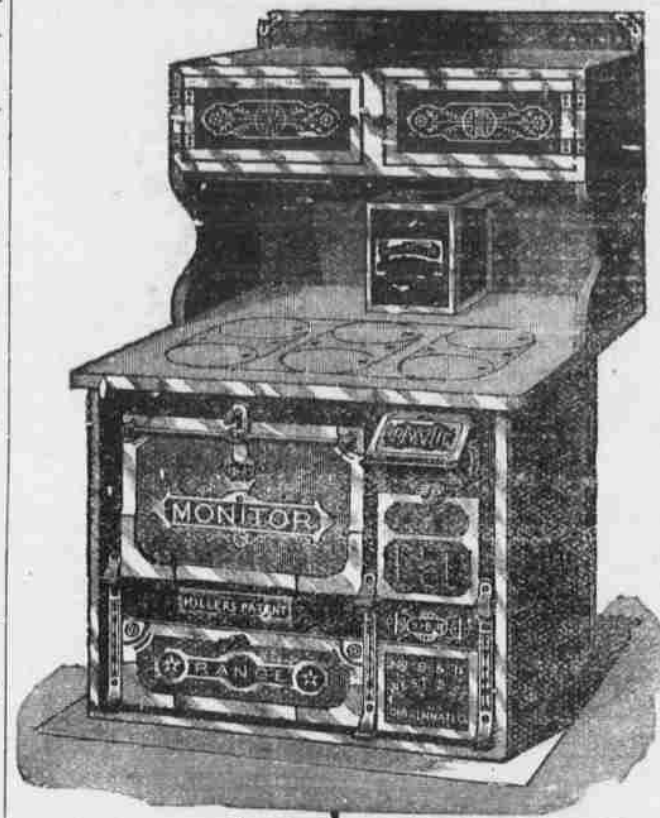

A DIRECT CONTRADICTION
FLAW IN THE HOUSE FINANCE
BILL.

Difference of Opinion Among Lawyers
 and Financiers as to the Wording
 of Two Clauses.

WASHINGTON, November 29.—Able
 lawyers declare that the House Fi-
 nance bill contains a direct contradic-
 tion. This discovery was made today
 by former Representative Watson of
 Ohio, who was a member of the Bank-
 ing and Currency Committee when in
 Congress, is the author of "History of
 American Coinage" and is now a mem-
 ber of the Codifying Commission. Wat-
 son said tonight: "While I am a firm
 believer in the gold standard and am
 confident that a satisfactory measure
 will be enacted at the coming session,
 you may quote me as saying emphati-
 cally that the second section of the
 gold standard feature of the bill is in-
 definite, misleading and contradictory.
 I have talked today with able lawyers
 a Federal judge and two members of
 Congress, and they agree with what I
 have just said."
 "The contradiction in question is ap-
 parent even to laymen. The first clause
 of the gold standard section reads:
 'All interest-bearing obligations of the
 United States for the payment of money
 now existing or hereafter to be en-
 tered into shall be deemed and held
 payable in gold coin.'
 "The first clause of the section con-
 tinues: 'And all other obligations, pub-
 lic and private, for the payment of
 money shall be performed in conform-
 ity with the gold standard.' But the
 second clause specifically says: 'Noth-
 ing herein contained shall be construed
 or held to affect the legal tender qual-
 ity of the silver dollar, etc.'"
 A member of the House caucus com-
 mittee declares that no contradiction
 exists, and asserts that the section in
 question was considered carefully and
 was quite satisfactory to the commit-
 tee by which the bill was drawn.

The news from the Philippines continues satisfactory. The Filipino army is now completely disintegrated. The arms, munitions of war, provisions and clothing have been captured in some cases, and in others scattered over the mountain sides, where they had been left after hasty flight. The whereabouts of Aguinaldo still remains a mystery, but most probably he is on the sea coast waiting for an opportunity to escape to China or to Siam. It is doubtful if he will try Hongkong.

The Boer representative at The Hague employs his leisure time in concocting paragraphs anent British losses, and the Parisians, who hate "perfidie Albion" with a holy hatred, go wild with joy over the canards. The story that Ladysmith had surrendered is, on the face of it, more than improbable. The Boer force has been concentrating southward, and since November 9th, no Boer attack had been made. General White had ample provisions and sufficient ammunition. Moreover, he must have known that the relieving column was advancing. Everything pointed to his holding out to the last extremity.

FINANCIAL BILLS.

The financial bills in Senate and House will occupy widespread attention. Bills of this kind do not appeal to the general public in their details, but the general public realizes the importance of them. The mercantile and legal portions of the country take the liveliest interest in the bills, and they are naturally carefully scanned by the members of Congress. The scanning has resulted in one member discovering that there is a contradiction in the bill. It may have to be redrawn.

The importance of the financial bills at this time is patent to everyone. The gold standard can be so entrenched that any assault upon it will fall for some time to come, even in the very improbable event of the Republican Party having to give way to Bryanistic Democracy.

The gold policy is the sheet anchor of the Republican Party. Among the mercantile community, the men that deal with foreign commerce, it is far more thought of, than the most brilliant victories of the American arms. It has given the nation a solid basis upon which an unprecedented prosperity has been built. At the same time the expansionist policy of the people, carried into effect by the President, has been of immense value, extending the commercial operations of the country in a marvelous manner.

If the financial policy of the Republican leaders is carried out and is not hampered by factious opposition, the present era of prosperity will continue for a considerable period. After all, it is the finances of a nation and the stability of its money markets that tell in the long run. It has been fortunate for the United States that at a crisis in her career her statesmen had been allowed to establish a financial policy which gave the stability to the country which was required at the moment. With money markets disturbed, what would have been the result of the Spanish war?

INFANT MORTALITY.

The records show a steady increase of infant mortality notwithstanding the progress Honolulu has made in material advancement and improvement. The record of deaths of infants under one year of age for 1899, show an increase of 56.2 per cent over the figures for the cholera year 1895 and the succeeding year and 62.4 per cent over the figures for 1897. Taking years farther back and the percentages of increase run up appallingly, being more than 100 per cent over what it was eleven years ago, that is in 1889.

The number of deaths of infants under one year for the eleven years beginning with 1889 is as follows: 108, 144, 166, 107, 132, 131, 153, 154, 141, 190, and 239.

The number of deaths among children between 1 and 5 years shows almost the same proportionate increase. The figures for the same years are as follows: 56, 68, 44, 34, 49, 41, 66, 86, 55, 99 and 103.

It will be seen that in these figures as in practically all of the mortality figures in which sanitary conditions are an important element, there is a constant increase up to 1895 when the city received such a thorough cleaning; then a considerable drop, and then another constant increase as the city got farther away from the effects of that cleaning.

This fact is particularly striking in the figures for fevers. Formerly the records of the Board of Health did not separately classify the different kinds of fevers but put them all under one head classifying them simply as "fever." This included gastric and

puerperal fevers not so closely dependent on general sanitary conditions as well as malarial, remittent, and intermittent fevers which are closely dependent on general sanitary conditions. A better classification has been introduced of late years and in the figures here given gastric and puerperal fevers are not included, so that the showing for present conditions is really worse than the figures would seem to indicate. The figures for fever including typhoid beginning with 1891 are as follows: 78, 58, 70, 58, 63, 51, 36, 100, and 121 for eleven months of 1899 equivalent to 132 for twelve months. The figures for typhoid fever alone, beginning with 1894 which is the first record for several years of typhoid fever, are: 4, 8, 9, 12, 55 and 34 for eleven months of 1899, equivalent to 37 for twelve months.

The excessive number in 1898 is accounted for by the epidemic of typhoid fever among the soldiers of the First New York regiment.

Consumption and cancer both show a large and constant increase. The deaths from consumption beginning with 1891 for each year are as follows: 62, 76, 68, 66, 73, 63, 59, 99, 119. The figures for cancer for the same years are: 7, 7, 6, 11, 5, 7, 12, 12, 15.

GILMORE SAFE.

WASHINGTON, November 29.—The following cablegram has been received at the Navy Department from Admiral Watson:

"Lieutenant Gilmore is well, with seven men, twenty-five miles from Vigan. Received a Meyer code letter from Gilmore by Albert Soschen, a newspaper artist, who was with Gilmore seven months and escaped. He was brought here by the Samar. News from the insurgents through a Spanish sergeant indicates that the Urdaneta's crew were killed, except the four following: Farley, Green, Powers and Burke. Names of the Gilmore party: Walton, Vandoit, Ellsworth, Brisolet, Anderson, Edwards, Peterson. Some wounded were left at Baler. Gilmore has no news of them." WATSON.

ALFRED WATSON.

Alfred Watson, U. S. hospital corps, who was with the transport Siam on her typhoon trip, is on the transport Warren, which arrived here this morning. Last time Watson was here his leg was broken by a horse lying down upon it, but he left with his ship. On arriving in Manila he was sent back to San Francisco as disabled, but he is now going to the front again, his leg having healed. Watson has a striking picture of the Siam as she was just after the typhoon, with dead and struggling horses all over the deck.

CAPTAIN STOPFORD.

Captain Stopford, of the Forty-second on the transport Columbia, was captain of Company E, Eighth Massachusetts, which shot a match with the Hawaiian Sharpshooters about four years ago. The challenges for this affair were exchanged between Captain Stopford, at Beverly, and Captain Dodge here. Though the New England company had a national reputation for skill at the butts it was beaten by the local team. Captain Stopford served through the Cuban war with his company.

GASOLINE SCHOONERS.

Captain Isaac Bray, late of the Morning Star left by the Mariposa yesterday for the Coast to bring down a gasoline schooner which is just about completed for M. W. McChesney & Sons. This schooner has a carrying capacity of about 150 tons. Another schooner of still larger capacity is being built.

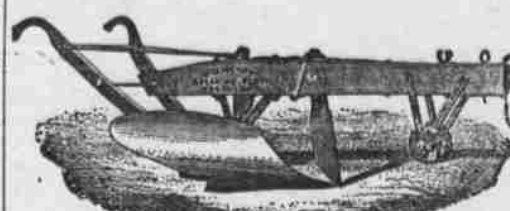

SHIPPING MASTER LEWIS

A NEW RESULT OF HONOLULU'S GROWTH.

The City Now Has a Boarding Master Who Will Get Crews When They are Wanted.

Honolulu's first boarding master's establishment has just been started, as a result of the growth of the shipping business. Though a seaport of some importance this city has been without the shipping master who does the crew-getting, etc., in San Francisco and other cities.

Oscar Lewis, who arrived a few days ago from San Francisco, is the man who is to have charge of the new business. He is a shipping master of experience in San Francisco and other cities and thinks Honolulu is a good place to start a sailors' boarding house. Lewis has already begun business and yesterday he secured twelve men for the British Bark Errol, which has been in the stream for several days, waiting for a crew.

The shipping master's business is a profitable one where many vessels are leaving. For every man secured sea captains pay at least three dollars, and generally the man who gets a job pays as much or more from his end for the place. Then there is boarding money. When Jack leaves a ship he generally goes on a boat that carries his pockets. He has to live somewhere, so he goes to the boarding house master, gets free board and room, and money for at least a few equally necessary drinks and it all comes out of his wages before he leaves on the next ship.

The place of a shipping master has practically been filled here lately by captain of Police Harry Evans, who looks after the waterfront. Skippers have always hunted up Harry when they wanted men and the result has been that he has often been kept on the move a little more than he wanted to be, trying to help out the captains. None of the latter are as glad as he is that a regular boarding master has come to town. Lewis has high recommendations from prominent Pacific Coast shippers, and expects to get all the business here.

For some time past great difficulty has been encountered in getting crews here. Six men deserted from the Hawaiian Isles and were caught hiding in the hills yesterday, in the hope that the ship would go without them. It is thought that the boarding house system will make matters easier for the skippers.

LATE LOCALS.

F. E. King the "sport" who took a worm-fence course down several streets while driving a few nights since, pleaded guilty in Police Court this morning and was fined \$10.

C. G. Ballentyne, manager of the Rapid Transit Company, will return by one of the steamers of the 29th. Business operations will begin with a vim after January 1.

There was a heated quarrel at Nuuanu and Hotel streets last night between the team boss at the Twelfth corral and one of his men, but no blows were struck. A big crowd gathered.

According to the Friend the expenses of the Hawaiian delegates to the Council in Boston were as follows: Steamer and railroad travel, \$1,800; Hotel and other expenses, \$740; outfit, \$400. In all \$2,940 for a delegation of five members for fourteen weeks.

Captain Harry Evans was fined \$15 by Judge Wilcox this morning for striking D. G. Camarinos. Defendant admitted the assault. It was the result of a talk on the Boer war.

THREE MONTHS IN HAWAII

MANILA TROOPS WILL "CLIMATE" HERE.

Each Regiment to be Brought Back Once a Year to Recuperate—Will be Quartered at Lihue.

A United States army officer who is in position to know says that every regiment in the Philippines will spend three months of each year in the Hawaiian Islands. The remainder will be on the big military reservation at Lihue.

The war department has decided upon this arrangement for the reason that it is not desirable to keep the men in the climate of Manila for a year at a time without a break of some sort. It is also not desirable to return them to the mainland, for the reason that once there they would want to return to their homes and would become dissatisfied.

Army surgeons refer to the military site at Lihue as one of the most bracing and healthful in the world. It is higher and dryer than Honolulu. There are frequent frosts on the reservation proper, and it is colder still at night on the neighboring mountain peaks. The change from Manila to Lihue will not be rushing into extremes. A name back to the mainland would be and at the same time the men would get the full benefit of cool, pure air.

Early in the new year work on the great barracks at Lihue will begin. Soon after a regular schedule of the biggest transports in the United States service will be established. There will be three regular per month between Honolulu and Manila, besides extras it may be necessary to employ.

A full regiment of infantry will be stationed permanently at Honolulu, at a permanent post to be designated later. Camp McKinley will eventually be abandoned, but until other quarters are ready will be occupied.

SOUTH AFRICAN WORDS. To abate somewhat the havoc that ensues when the average reader encounters a despatch filled with Boer names and expressions, the New York Tribune has explained the meaning and pronunciation of the Boer words most frequent in the news reports, some of which are quoted below:

Oom Paul means Uncle Paul and is pronounced Ome Powl.

Bloemfontein means Bloom Spring, and is pronounced Bloem-fon-tayn.

Majuba, a Kafir word, is pronounced ma-yoo-ba.

A veldheer, or field lord, is a Boer general.

The veld is the field.

The veldwachter is the field warden or military police.

Kloofs is pronounced klofes and means clefts or ravines.

Joubert, the name of the Boer general, is pronounced Yow-bert.

The Jonkheeren, pronounced yonk-hay-reen, are the young lords or members of the first and second orders of the legislature.

The Raad Huis, pronounced Rahd Hoys, is where they meet.

Uitlander is pronounced Oyt-lah-der.

The rand, where so much gold is found, means the border.

Witwatersrand means Edge of the White Water.

Kopje means little head, and is used to describe a hill or small eminence.

A langer, pronounced lah-her, means a camp.

A trek is a journey.

Boer means a rustic.

MARK TWAIN AT WORK.

As to the literary activities of Mark Twain, it may be said that he is toiling regularly at a new book. It is fiction—no doubt humorous fiction—but for the present there is nothing more to be said about it. The expectation is that the volume will be ready in the spring, by which time the collected edition of Mark Twain's writings will have been months in the hands of subscribers. Mark Twain is in capital health, thanks in part to his enjoyable trip which he recently had to Scandinavia. He fancies he will be in England for the next six months, going afterward to America.—London Chronicle.

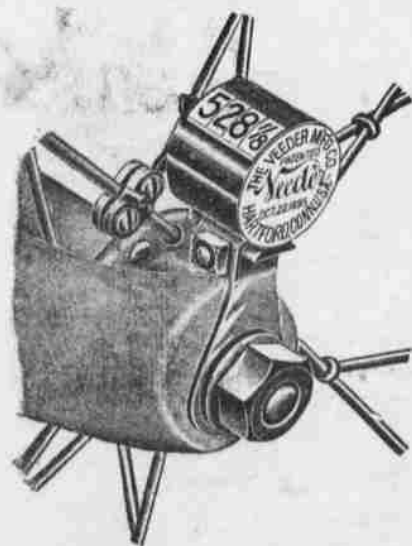

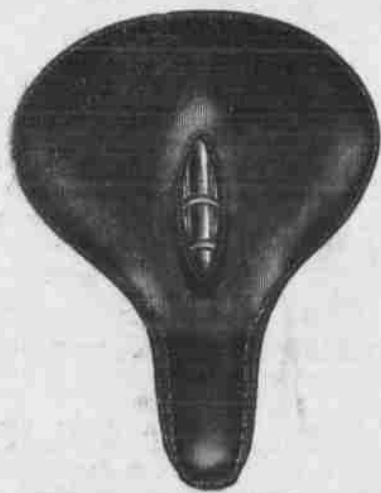
