

nothing to record in the commercial news of the week, except a state of chronic duliness, enlivened by an occasional arrival or departure. Since our last issue the barkentine Victor, with lumber, has been discharged, and has gone. Maui, and in repairing bridges on Kauai. At The English bark *Atalanta*, from Newcastle, with coal to H. Hackfeld & Co., arrived yesterday.

The mails from San Francisco are fully due, and we hope before going to press to be able to give our readers a summary of the news per Moses Taylor and Nebraska.

In the Chamber of Commerce, the currency question was wharves. discussed, and the matter referred to a committee of three. The English sovereign will probably be rated at \$4.85, which, as we have previously intimated, is about its fair value here.

We notice that the price of paddy is quite firm in this market, with a good market in San Francisco. But little has come forward during the week, and the prospects are that more ground will be devoted to this crop every year. Considerable inquiry has been made in regard to Hawaiian tobacco, but there is none to be had. With proper cultivation these islands could rival Cobs in the quality and quantity of its tobacco crop. Sugar is coming forward slowly, and about the usual quantity is on hand to go East by the first opportunity. We

REPORT OF BARK ATALANTA, CHAS. H. SINCLAIR, MAS-TER .- Left Newcastle September 30th at midnight. October 24 experienced a terrific gale from south, which lasted until the morning of the 4th-lost sails, stove boat and sustained other damages, after which had a succession of gales and calms for several days. The 14th day after leaving passed the longitude of the North Cape of New Zealand. Had a good run from thence to the Touboual Islands, which were passed November 1st-was fifteen days from thence to Tahiti, which was passed the 15th November (a distance of 300 miles) had continued light head winds and calms with squalls. Had no southeast trades. Crossed the Equator in long. 151° west, November 30th took the northeast trades in 10° north, and had them fresh. Sighted the east point of Hawaii December winds and calms until vesterday.

# It has been suggested to us that if the Gov-

ernment wish to spend the money in the Treasury to the very best advantage, and with a view to the wants of our children, they have an opportunity of doing so in making good roads on Hawaii and this season of the year we have reports coming in from many points, all showing that the rains are doing damage to our highways, that must be repaired, to enable produce to come to our

Probably there is no one thing that would so materially lighten the labors of the planter, as the building and keeping in repair of roads over which his cane and sugar could be drawn. There is hardly a sugar estate on the islands but has hundreds of acres of the best kind of sugar lands that are useless on account of the expense attendant upon hauling the cane over the miserable tracks known as the "King's highway." Now two thousand dollars a month judiciously expended in road-making in such localities would go far towards making available the acres now lying unused, and the money would still be in the country. Let us figure a little. Two thousand dollars will build a mile of first-class road from Kaiwiki towards Hilo, over which cane can be drawn at any season of the year. Such a road would open up a strip of first-class cane land, say one mile long and five acres wide on

each side. In all 80 acres. This land will grow 24 tons of 2240 nounds to the ton to the acre. In all 200 tons of sugar or 448,000 pounds. Allowing one cent per pound net profit on this amount, and we have the nice little sum of \$4,480 to the plantation from land opened up at first cost of \$2,000, and the money all in the country. Which is best, to make good roads for our children, or to bag the money up and put it on board the Nevada or Nebraska?

WE NOTE that the extension of the esplanade is gradually going on, the excavator being kept busy in dredging the bottom of the harbor while the mud is dumped by the cars to the landward of the steamship wharf. 



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
