## BOARD OF HEALTH.

Variety of Matters Considered at a Special Meeting.

Board of Health held a special meeting Thursday afternoon with the new president, Dr. Emerson, in the chair. Communication was read from Dr. Crane accepting the position of Government physician of North and South Kona. He will succeed Dr. Lindly, who in turn goes actively into the coffee business. Dr. Crane was granted a leave of absence for two months in order to visit the states. On motion of Mr. C. A. Brown it was decided to allow one person to go up to Molokai with the Board as the representative of the press of Honolulu. It is understood that the Chinese Times will avail itself of this rare opportunity, and will be the paper represented on the trip. It was agreed that in future all goods for the Molokai store be purchased in the name of the Board of Health and signed for by Mr. Meyers accordingly.

## HARRISON'S POSITION.

Carried Out Original Plan in Refusing to Oppose McKinley.

INDIANAPOLIS, May 12.—F. T. Boies, the Indiana politician, has made the following statement regarding the significance of state convention action: "The question has been frequently asked what significance attaches to Harrison's absence from the convention. In answer, it may be said, his absence is a confirmation of his statement, 'there never was an hour since I left the White House that I desired to return to it,' and further frees him from the charge that might have been made, i. e., insincerity."

"In answer to the question, 'What will be the effect of the resolution instructing for McKinley?' it can be truly said that it must be beneficial for all concerned. First, it is a truthful reflection of the sentiment of the voters of Indiana concerning McKinley, which has crystallized since Mr. Harrison's letter of February last, and if the unexpected should happen at St. Louis and there should be a call for the ex-President he would be in a position to accept such a call, and the followers of McKinley would become the supporters of General Harrison, since Indiana is no uncertain term has instructed and declared for McKinley at her state convention."

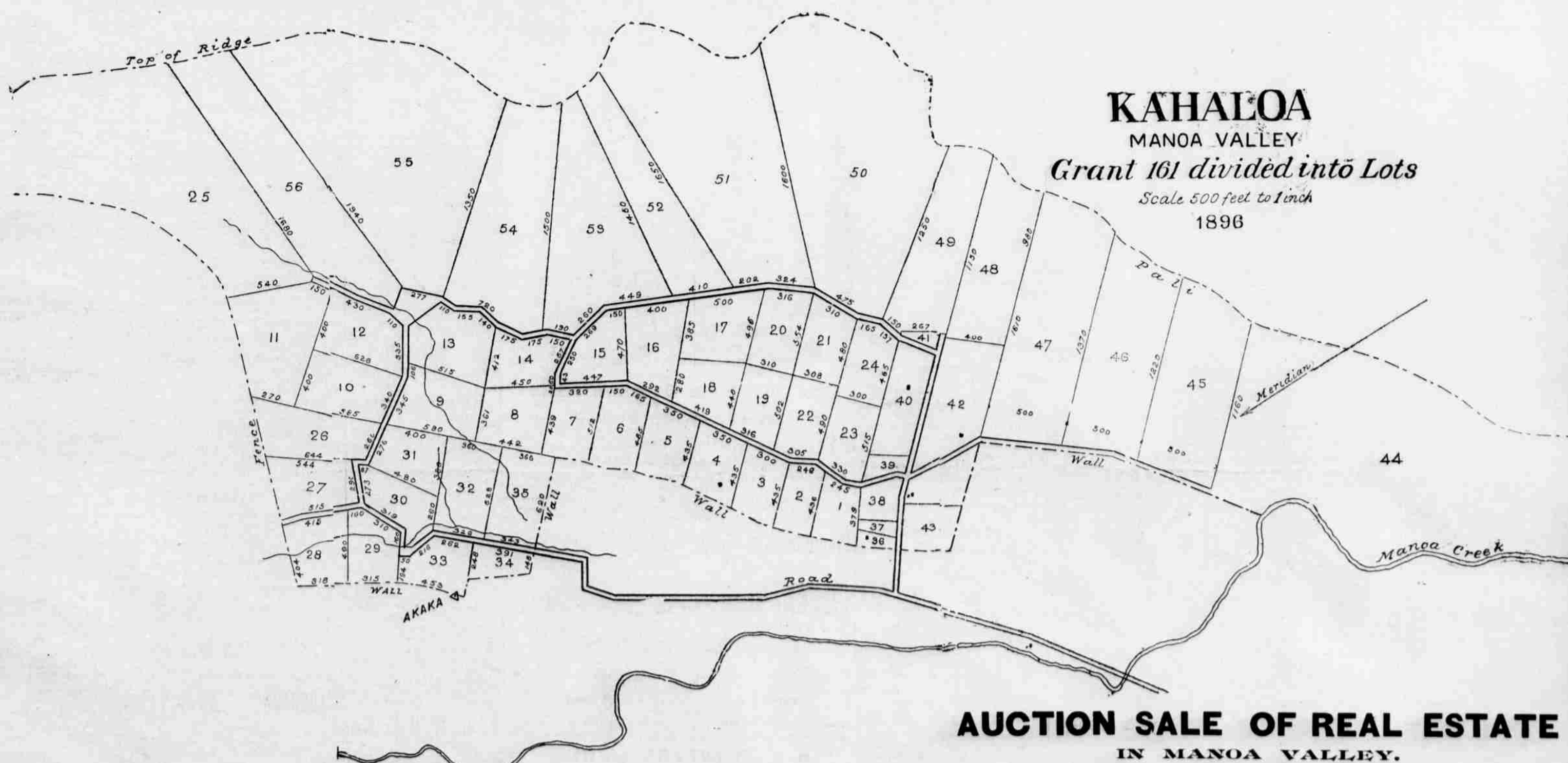

Several agitators seem to have become somewhat subdued during the past week.

The trouble with the agitators against removal of duty on the lightest wines, is that opponents use the stock attacks on temperance which have no application whatever.

If the Legislature has nothing to say on Cable it might put forth a resolution suggesting a signal line or a flying squadron for better communication with the outside world.

A vessel with cargo waits two weeks in the stream for a berth to discharge and still there are people who fail to observe the present necessity for a greater harbor for Honolulu.

Are the advocates of the San Francisco system getting out their plans, specifications and estimates? These are required for use at the moment if the matter of filtration is to be attended to at this session.

So far as The Star is concerned, it will notify the esteemed Board of Health when it wishes to syndicate on a reporter to Molokai. For a Bureau that asks so much of the Press are done the Board, shabby treatment is a mild description of its attitude toward the newspapers.

Dr. Russell lost his temper and left a meeting of the Medical Association because a couple of resolutions he had proposed were tabled. How the doctor would suffer as an advocate of reform measures in the Legislature. The Association did the right thing; however, when it resorted to the resolutions and referred them to a committee for an autopsy.

Punaluu College, with its record of good work, of superb progress and with its present promising status is a magnificent monument to all who have been concerned in the task of rearing it. While the members of the administrative corps, those who have labored in the past and the present faculty are entitled to great credit, the highest honor is due Charles R. Bishop, whose unbounded generosity has enabled the establishment of such a valuable institution.

A petition against free light wines for this country is more than likely in circulation. There can be no objection to this manner of giving expression, but the action should have method. The petitions should be free from block signatures of little boys and girls of whom it can at least be said that they go into the matter without any real knowledge of what they are doing. Several of the reform petitions now in the House have scores of names of the kind here mentioned.

So well-informed a man as Senator Gorman, of Maryland, predicts that the present Democratic regime will float still another heavy bond issue. Mr. Gorman and associates are already organizing to antagonize this supposed plan of President Cleveland and his secretary of treasury. The gold reserve of the United States is sinking rapidly on account of the large exports of the yellow coin. Hawaii imports some of it by every steamer but somehow does not get the amount to which her balance of trade entitles her.

The Senate has so far been fair and rational in its consideration of every measure presented. It will doubtless give to the income tax act the attention its importance merits. The Upper Branch is composed of representative citizens and business men and the sincerity of those whose ideas it has rejected that it is a class organization is indeed far fetched. So far the present Senate has been the Governmental balance wheel. In the cases in which its advice and counsel met with disregard error in the course has almost invariably been admitted later.

Minister Damon's big speech on the Income Tax Act, in the House, was in the main most excellent. His argument was sound and his ideas clear. He was earnest even to the point of enthusiasm. He spoke for progress and tax equalization, which are always happy subjects. Mr. Damon's slap at the Senate had the justification that the Senate has at times refused to give cordial embrace to some of his measures. Some of the Senators heard the speech and no doubt will remember the reference to themselves. But The Star did not suppose, till the Advertiser came out as a victim to the Minister's eloquence that all of the embellishment of the speech was getting on famously as a legislative factor. He is to be congratulated.

## NOTES

After a trial by jury the principals in the Sunday evening riot of Portuguese have been adjudged guilty of assembling unlawfully and resisting the law of the land with force. These men at bar, and others, fought the police. They earned heavy punishment. On account of the good record of the colony for observance of the statutes and for certain extenuating circumstances, the jury recommended the defendants to the mercy of the Court and their sentences will likely be light. They are taught a lesson and should profit by the experience. As The Star viewed the evidence, the man actually responsible for the disturbance has escaped. All the witnesses who testified upon the point agreed that one "Tricks" Nelson, disarmed variously from the army, fire department and police force, as well as Oahu prison, was the author of the trouble. The authorities cannot afford to let the interest of law and order go to overlook this offender or condone his lawlessness. He deliberately made a row, while the Portuguese made their breach of peace under pressure of high excitement. The latter will be more careful hereafter but there is no hint or promise that Nelson will reform.
