RECONSTRUCTED

Mr. Jefferson Davis, leader of the Southern rebellion, has at length accepted the situation, declaring himself a believer in the integrity of the Union. In a brief speech at the Mississippi banquet recently the Confederate President is thus reported:—

But now those scenes and incidents have passed, and they only live in mind and history. United you are now, and if the union is ever to be broken, let the other side break it. The army of the South will shine forever around the camp-fires, and will shine to our children and children's children. The truths we fought for shall not encourage you to ever fight again; but keep your word in good or evil.

These remarks have been hailed by the leading Northern press as sounding the death knell of sectionalism, as a Philadelphia paper puts it. The acknowledgment is frankly made at the North that this acceptance of the "one and inseparable, now and forever" situation by Mr. Davis once for all kills the waving of the "bloody shirt" business, so that elections in the North will henceforth have to be fought on the merits of national questions of the present, together with the personal qualities of the candidates, and not decided by appeals to lingering prejudices born of the late unpleasantness. There are still elements at the South, however, that will take time to be eradicated, which tend to delay the setting of the cement of friendship between the two sections of the country. But the gratifying process is going on, keeping pace with the increasing reverence for law and the growth of industrial enterprise. As a second Philadelphia paper says, in commenting on the remarks of Mr. Davis: "With slavery the South got rid of its antiquated notions about the degradation of work, and with work and the development of the natural resources, which had been hid as in a napkin heretofore, the South has found out the source of real strength."

FOR CHEAP LABOR.

Dr. McGlynn, of New York, who has sacrificed and is likely to suffer much for his espousal of Henry George's "land and labor" doctrine, has put himself in an equivocal position in the view of the labor element of the Pacific Coast by the following remarks in a recent lecture:—

What we want is freedom. If the Chinaman can make something that we want cheaper than we can make it, the proper thing is to get it from the Chinaman. Then there will be a happy Chinaman as well as a happy Yankee, and we shall be happy all around.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Yachting is an expensive business. Mr. Bayley, Vice Commodore of the Royal Albert Yacht Club, England, has become bankrupt with liabilities of \$335,000.

Reports of the Scottish yacht Thistle's trial performances indicate that she will either take the America Cup or compel the production of an unusually swift craft to prevent her.

"George Trust, an ex-convict and a hard case, has been appointed clerk in the Internal Revenue office in Baltimore." This news item might be cited by H. M. G. organ as evidence that the United States is becoming civilized through her intercourse with "little Hawaii."

H. M. G. organ boasts of the religious and educational enterprises centering at the Palace. Possibly it was business in one or other of these lines to which respectable ladies were summoned last autumn under injunctions not to tell their husbands about it. It might be unsafe to let the average Honolulu citizen know that his wife was invited to a religious or educational conference!

The emperor of Japan is dark and his features are heavy and irregular, but there is much dignity and majesty in his carriage. His uniform is handsome, the white cloth trousers having broad stripes of gold chrysanthemums, and the black coat being almost covered with embroidery in chrysanthemums.

In Judge Toohy's Court, San Francisco, one man was convicted of burglary and his accomplice acquitted, by different juries on the same evidence.

The Riverside Improvement Company has been incorporated in California, to build a \$250,000 hotel and supply the town with water.

RECONSTRUCTED.

Mr. Jefferson Davis, leader of the Southern rebellion, has at length accepted the situation, declaring himself a believer in the integrity of the Union. In a brief speech at the Mississippi banquet recently the Confederate President is thus reported:—

But now those scenes and incidents have passed, and they only live in mind and history. United you are now, and if the union is ever to be broken, let the other side break it. The army of the South will shine for ever around the camp-fires, and will shine to our children and children's children. The truths we fought for shall not encourage you to ever fight again; but keep your word in good or evil.

These remarks have been hailed by the leading Northern press as sounding the death knell of sectionalism, as a Philadelphia paper puts it. The acknowledgment is frankly made at the North that this acceptance of the "one and inseparable, now and forever" situation by Mr. Davis once for all kills the waving of the "bloody shirt" business, so that elections in the North will henceforth have to be fought on the merits of national questions of the present, together with the personal qualities of the candidates, and not decided by appeals to lingering prejudices born of the late unpleasantness. There are still elements at the South, however, that will take time to be eradicated, which tend to delay the setting of the cement of friendship between the two sections of the country. But the gratifying process is going on, keeping pace with the increasing reverence for law and the growth of industrial enterprise. As a second Philadelphia paper says, in commenting on the remarks of Mr. Davis: "With slavery the South got rid of its antiquated notions about the degradation of work, and with work and the development of the natural resources, which had been hid as in a napkin heretofore, the South has found out the source of real strength."

FOR CHEAP LABOR.

Dr. McGlynn, of New York, who has sacrificed and is likely to suffer much for his espousal of Henry George's "land and labor" doctrines, has put himself in an equivocal position in the view of the labor element of the Pacific Coast by the following remarks in a recent lecture:—
What we want is freedom. If the Chinaman can make something that we want cheaper than we can make it, the proper thing is to get it from the Chinaman. Then there will be a happy Chinaman as well as a happy Yankee, and we shall be happy all around.

NOTES AND COMMENTS.

Hon. Paul Neumann advertises for a valise missing since his arrival from San Francisco by the steamer Australia.

Captain Kempff and officers of the U. S. S. Adams were presented to the King by Mr. Merrill, American Minister, yesterday.

A children's communion will be held at 7 o'clock this morning in the Roman Catholic Cathedral, and a renewal of baptismal vows at 3 p. m.

Schooner Jennie Walker, with Mr. Greig's family on board, arrived off port from San Francisco yesterday afternoon, on the voyage to Fanning's Island.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will give a Victoria Jubilee concert at Emma Square on Saturday afternoon, when music prepared especially for the occasion will be played.

Mr. Lewis J. Levey will this day week sell for a leading importing house a large stock of merchandise, specified in an advertisement in this paper. This promises to be an opportunity that the retail-trade will find it important to avail of.

Police Court.

A nolle prosequi was granted at the request of the Crown to Ah Sung, on the charge of unlawfully furnishing opium to a prisoner.

This is Not Jeffersonian Simplicity.

A queen is a queen, and the fact that she is a little off color should not be allowed to weigh heavily against us.

Still, in this democratic country, it is in the worst possible taste to make much ado over royalty, especially when it is of the ginger cake colored variety. Take the case of the queen of the Hawaiian Islands, who is now on a visit to this country. It is all right and proper that she should be courteously treated and sent away with pleasant impressions of our people and our government, but it is not necessary that we should say and do absurdly unreplicable things. When the queen boarded a government steamer, the other day, for a little trip to Mount Vernon, Lieutenant Cowles, of the navy, welcomed her in the following speech:

"I ask your gracious Majesty's permission to speak. [The queen bowed her head.] His Excellency, the secretary of the navy, begs that your Majesty will accept his respectful homage, and begs that your Majesty will accept of this vessel to convey you to Mount Vernon, the resting place of the illustrious founder of this country. The secretary is always glad to render any service to a beautiful woman and is doubly pleased to-day in the fact that that beautiful woman is your gracious Majesty, the wise ruler of a nation near and friendly to the United States."

The queen listened to this remarkable address in silent amazement. Some of the members of her party were indignant. The Americans were disgusted. The lieutenant claims that as the commander of the vessel he felt bound to address his guest in such language as queens are accustomed to. He was determined to do the honors in a stylish way. The general opinion, however, is that it was a great mistake for an officer of our government to cut such a caper, and Lieutenant Cowles is not likely to hear the last of it for some time. After his brother officers get through with him the Washington belles will doubtless have something to say to him. He was not obliged, you know, to call her dusky Majesty "a beautiful woman" twice in a brief speech of fourteen lines.—*Atlanta Constitution*.

Mr. Jones also spoke in gratified terms of the successful temperance work going on among the Hawaiians, one member of whose Blue Ribbon League had brought in forty-five new members at last meeting, and instanced their fine celebration on Kamehameha Day. Mr. Atterton, in the absence of Mr. C. C. Cooke, reported from the entertainment committee a course of six illustrated lectures by Prof. Dickinson and a free lecture by Prof. Van Slyke as their month's work, and an entertainment for the American man-of-war Adams was stated to be in contemplation. Mr. Atterton reported for the finance committee, urging members to keep up their pledges of support.

Mr. E. O. White, treasurer, reported \$111 in the treasury. In the absence of Hon. A. F. Judd, Mr. Jones spoke of the Hawaiian Branch, stating that a Sunday afternoon meeting had been held several weeks past for English-speaking natives and half-breeds. A letter was read from Mr. Southwick, delegate to the 27th annual international convention of the Y. M. C. A. held at San Francisco, which was ordered to be published in full in the *Friend*. Mr. Southwick was on several committees and took part in the discussions of the convention. Two new members were elected last night, and a collection of \$7.45 was taken. Mr. S. D. Fuller, General Secretary, states that the number of visitors to the reading room during the month was 957.

Return of a Search Expedition.

Yesterday the tern Ke Au Hou, Captain Brownell, of the Pacific Navigation Company's fleet, returned from her cruise in search of the missing schooner Gen. Seigel on which she left this port April 30th for French Frigate Shoals and intervening islands. She brought no tidings of any trace of the missing vessel, nor could any cargo be obtained at the numerous islands visited to recompense the company for the cost of the expedition. The Shoals were reached on May 4th, Bird Island and Necker Island being touched on the way. After a short stay and exploration of the reefs, nothing but birds and turtles being found, the vessel sailed to return on May 5th. At Layson Island five of a peculiar species of canary bird were taken on board, but four of them have died on the passage. Several dozen very pretty ducks were also taken, but only two or three of these have survived. Samples of guano dug up four feet beneath the sand, at the foot of a bluff, were secured. Eggs were found in abundance, making an agreeable change of diet on board ship. At Lisiansky Island were found relics of a shipwreck, empty boxes marked "Germans" being among them.

Ocean Island, Hawaii's great conquest of 1886, was reached on May 16th, and the vessel was becalmed five miles off for six days. Boats were sent ashore, and the Hawaiian Government sheds put up by Col. Boyd's party were intact, the water tanks were full of drink, the buried cans of meat were safe, and the wreck of the Dunnottar Castle had evidently been blown over into the deep side of the shelving reef that had caught the doomed ship, for only the top of a spar was visible above water. The Ke Au Hou sailed from Ocean Island, May 24th, arriving here as stated above.

Peculiar Runaway Accident.

A runaway horse harnessed to a brake came from the upper streets to Nuuanu avenue at a high speed yesterday afternoon. At Mr. C. Afong's place the horse ran foul of a train of pack mules bound for Koolau. One of the shafts struck a mule diagonally on the hip, entering beneath the muscles of the flank a foot into the poor beast's body and then breaking off. The driver of the train taking hold of the protruding stick drew it out with a single pull. Strange to say the terribly injured mule kept its feet after the accident. Its back was humped up from the effect of the blow, and even should it survive it will never be the same mule again.

There are sensational charges in Los Angeles, Cal., that the police have been bribed by the gamblers.

SUPREME COURT.

AT CHAMBERS.

Before Judge Bickerton, Thursday, June 16th. In re bankruptcy of Daniel Lyons. Motion to assign property to bankrupt under section 14, chapter xxxi of the Acts of 1884. Mr. V. V. Ashford filed an appraisal of the bankrupt's household furniture, showing a value of \$154. On reading the petition and the assignee's assent thereto, the Court orders that it is granted, conditional upon the bankrupt's paying and satisfying all costs, including the reasonable charges of the assignee; to be paid before application for discharge, the property to be held meantime subject to the said condition, for the sole use of the bankrupt and his family, and not to be in any way alienated or disposed of. Mr. V. V. Ashford for bankrupt; Hon. W. C. Parke for the assignee, Messrs. Parke and Austin.

Stranger's Friend Society.

Yesterday afternoon the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Stranger's Friend Society was held at the residence of Mrs. J. M. Damon. There was the large attendance of about sixty members. Mrs. J. M. Damon was re-elected President, having held the office for thirty years; Mrs. Alex. Mackintosh, First Vice President; Mrs. Thos. Hobson, Second Vice President; Mrs. S. M. Damon, Secretary, in place of Mrs. H. M. Whitney, resigned; Mrs. W. E. Allen, Treasurer, in place of Mrs. E. S. Bishop, resigned, and Mrs. S. Dowsett, Directress. The Treasurer's report showed receipts as follows: donations, \$55; memberships, \$50; Hospital tax, \$500; coupons, \$128.34; premium, exchange of bonds, \$100; total \$833.34; and expenditures: for beneficiaries in Queen's Hospital, \$693.25; outside beneficiaries, \$94.40; passages of destitute persons, \$215; \$15 a month allowance for relief of needy persons, \$180; copying records of the society, \$15; deposited in Postal Savings Bank October 2, 1886, \$500; total \$1,697.65; excess of expenditures above receipts, \$364.31, which deducted from cash on hand June 17, 1886, \$1,277.95, leaves cash on hand June 4, 1887, and deposit in Postal Savings Bank, \$853.64. In the evening the annual social of the society was held in the same house, in course of which members and their gentleman friends sat down to an abundant and elegant collation. Rev. E. G. Beckwith, of Oakland, Cal., and Mr. W. H. Rice, of Kauai, were among the sympathizers with the organization who participated in the pleasant anniversary. "Thirty-five years ago," said the venerable President to our reporter, "the society was formed in this room, and a great deal of good it has accomplished since."

LOCAL NEWS.

Yesterday was damp as well as dull.
 The hand plays at the Queen's Hospital this afternoon.

Monday next, Victoria Jubilee, is proclaimed a public holiday.

Judgment in the rifles' detention case is promised in the Police Court to-day.

Hon. Paul Newman advertises for a valet missing since his arrival from San Francisco by the steamer Australia.

Captain Kempf and officers of the U. S. S. Adams were presented to the King by Mr. Merrill, American Minister, yesterday.

A children's communion will be held at 7 o'clock this morning in the Roman Catholic Cathedral, and a renewal of baptismal vows at 3 p. m.

Schooner Jennie Walker, with Mr. Greig's family on board, arrived off port from San Francisco yesterday afternoon, on the voyage to Fanning's Island.

The Royal Hawaiian Band will give a Victoria Jubilee concert at Emma Square on Saturday afternoon, when music prepared especially for the occasion will be played.

Mr. Lewis J. Levey will this day week sell for a leading importing house a large stock of merchandise, specified in an advertisement in this paper. This promises to be an opportunity that the retail-trade will find it important to avail of.

Police Court.

A nolle prosequi was granted at the request of the Crown to Ah Sung, on the charge of unlawfully furnishing opium to a prisoner.

Kum Pow was similarly released from the charge of malicious injury in breaking up furniture in the Chinese theatre.

Kahelemana was in like manner let off from the charge of malicious mischief.

Domingues Jose Lobo was tried for assault and battery on Officer Kelikewa, and being found guilty was fined \$8.80.

This is Not Jeffersonian Simplicity.

A queen is a queen, and the fact that she is a little off color should not be allowed to weigh heavily against us. Still, in this democratic country, it is in the worst possible taste to make much ado over royalty, especially when it is of the ginger cake colored variety. Take the case of the queen of the Hawaiian Islands, who is now on a visit to this country. It is all right and proper that she should be courteously treated and sent away with pleasant impressions of our people and our government, but it is not necessary that we should say and do absurdly unrepublishable things. When the queen boarded a government steamer, the other day, for a little trip to Mount Vernon, Lieutenant Cowles, of the navy, welcomed her in the following speech:

"I ask your gracious Majesty's permission to speak. [The queen bowed her head.] His Excellency, the secretary of the navy, begs that your Majesty will accept his respectful homage, and begs that your Majesty will accept of this vessel to convey you to Mount Vernon, the resting place of the illustrious founder of this country. The secretary is always glad to render any service to a beautiful woman and is doubly pleased to-day in the fact that that beautiful woman is your gracious Majesty, the wise ruler of a nation near and friendly to the United States."

The queen listened to this remarkable address in silent amazement. Some of the members of her party were indignant. The Americans were disgusted. The lieutenant claims that as the commander of the vessel he felt bound to address his guest in such language as queens are accustomed to. He was determined to do the honors in a stylish way. The general opinion, however, is that it was a great mistake for an officer of our government to cut such a caper, and Lieutenant Cowles is not likely to hear the last of it for some time. After his brother officers get through with him the Washington belles will doubtless have something to say to him. He was not obliged, you know, to call her dusky Majesty "a beautiful woman" twice in a brief speech of fourteen lines.—*Atlanta Constitution.*

Captain Wm. Matson and Evadne M. Knowles were married by the Rev. E. G. Beckwith at Ocean View Farm, San Mateo Co., Cal., May 28th.

Y. M. C. A.

Mr. T. Rain Walker presided at the monthly meeting of the Y. M. C. A. last night, in the absence of Mr. Lowrey, President. In the course of the evening Mr. Walker stated that the Earl of Aberdeen, who is widely known as a Y. M. C. A. worker, had on his recent passage through the city been very favorably impressed with the prosperity of this Association apparent in its building and equipments.

Mr. Bowen reported from the devotional committee a growing interest in the Sunday afternoon meetings, the average attendance at which the last month had been fifty-nine. Mr. P. C. Jones reported from the temperance committee that their efforts had been chiefly directed to helping the Blue Ribbon League, to the continued prosperity of which he was happy in testifying. He highly recommended the devotion of the League President, Rev. H. H. G. wen, attesting his fitness for the position. Mr. Jones also spoke in gratified terms of the successful temperance work going on among the Hawaiians, one member of whose Blue Ribbon League had brought in forty-five new members at last meeting, and instanced their fine celebration on Kamehameha Day. Mr. Atherton, in the absence of Mr. C. S. Cooke, reported from the entertainment committee a course of six illustrated lectures by Prof. Dickinson and a free lecture by Prof. Van Slyke as their month's work, and an entertainment for the American man-of-war Adams was stated to be in contemplation. Mr. Atherton reported for the finance committee, urging members to keep up their pledges of support.

Mr. E. O. White, treasurer, reported \$111 in the treasury. In the absence of Hon. A. F. Judd, Mr. Jones spoke of the Hawaiian Branch, stating that a Sunday afternoon meeting had been held several weeks past for English-speaking natives and half-breeds. A letter was read from Mr. Southwick, delegate to the 27th annual international convention of the Y. M. C. A. held at San Francisco, which was ordered to be published in full in the *Friend*. Mr. Southwick was on several committees and took part in the discussions of the convention. Two new members were elected last night, and a collection of \$7.45 was taken. Mr. S. D. Fuller, General Secretary, states that the number of visitors to the reading room during the month was 957.

Return of a Search Expedition.

Yesterday the tern Ke Au Hou, Captain Brownell, of the Pacific Navigation Company's fleet, returned from her cruise in search of the missing schooner Gen. Seigel on which she left this port April 30th for French Frigate Shoals and intervening islands. She brought no tidings of any trace of the missing vessel, nor could any cargo be obtained at the numerous islands visited to recompense the company for the cost of the expedition. The Shoals and Necker Island being touched on the way. After a short stay and exploration of the reefs, nothing but birds and turtles being found, the vessel sailed to return on May 5th. At Layson Island five of a peculiar species of canary bird were taken on board, but four of them have died on the passage. Several dozen very pretty ducks were also taken, but only two or three of these have survived. Samples of guano dug up four feet beneath the sand, at the foot of a bluff, were secured. Eggs were found in abundance, making an agreeable change of diet on board ship. At Lisiansky Island were found relics of a shipwreck, empty boxes marked "Germans" being among them.

Ocean Island, Hawaii's great conquest of 1886, was reached on May 16th, and the vessel was becalmed five miles off for six days. Boats were sent ashore, and the Hawaiian Government sheds put up by Col. Boyd's party were intact, the water tanks were full of drink, the buried cans of meat were safe, and the wreck of the Dunnotar Castle had evidently been blown over into the deep side of the shelving reef that had caught the doomed ship, for only the top of a spar was visible above water. The Ke Au Hou sailed from Ocean Island, May 24th, arriving here as stated above.

Peculiar Runaway Accident.

A runaway horse harnessed to a brake came from the upper streets to Nuuanu avenue at a high speed yesterday afternoon. At Mr. C. Afong's place the horse ran foul of a train of pack mules bound for Koolau. One of the shafts struck a mule diagonally on the hip, entering beneath the muscles of the flank a foot into the poor beast's body and then breaking off. The driver of the train taking hold of the protruding stick drew it out with a single pull. Strange to say the terribly injured mule kept its feet after the accident. Its back was humped up from the effect of the blow, and even should it survive it will never be the same mule again.

There are sensational charges in Los Angeles, Cal., that the police have been bribed by the gamblers.

SUPREME COURT.

AT CHAMBERS.

Before Judge Bickerton, Thursday, June 16th. In re bankruptcy of Daniel Lyons. Motion to assign property to bankrupt under section 14, chapter xxxi of the Acts of 1884. Mr. V. V. Ashford filed an appraisal of the bankrupt's household furniture, showing a value of \$154. On reading the petition and the assignee's assent thereto, the Court orders that it is granted, conditional upon the bankrupt's paying and satisfying all costs, including the reasonable charges of the assignee; to be paid before application for discharge, the property to be held meantime subject to the said condition, for the sole use of the bankrupt and his family, and not to be in any way alienated or disposed of. Mr. V. V. Ashford for bankrupt; Hon. W. C. Parke for the assignee, Messrs. Parke and Austin.

Stranger's Friend Society.

Yesterday afternoon the thirty-fifth annual meeting of the Stranger's Friend Society was held at the residence of Mrs. J. M. Damon. There was the large attendance of about sixty members. Mr. J. M. Damon was re-elected President, having held the office for thirty years; Mrs. Alex. Mackintosh, First Vice President; Mrs. Thos. Hobson, Second Vice President; Mrs. S. M. Damon, Secretary, in place of Mrs. H. M. Whitney, resigned; Mrs. W. F. Allen, Treasurer, in place of Mrs. S. E. Bishop, resigned, and Mrs. S. Dowsett, Directress. The Treasurer's report showed receipts as follows: donations, \$55; memberships, \$50; Hospital tax, \$500; coupons, \$128.34; premium, exchange of bonds, \$100; total \$833.34; and expenditures: for beneficiaries in Queen's Hospital, \$693.25; outside beneficiaries, \$94.40; passages of destitute persons, \$215; \$15 a month allowance for relief of needy persons, \$180; copying records of the society, \$15; deposited in Postal Savings Bank October 2, 1886, \$500; total \$1,697.65; excess of expenditures above receipts, \$364.31, which deducted from cash on hand June 17, 1886, \$1,277.95, leaves cash on hand June 4, 1887, and deposit in Postal Savings Bank, \$853.64. In the evening the annual social of the society was held in the same house, in course of which members and their gentleman friends sat down to an abundant and elegant collation. Rev. E. G. Beckwith, of Oakland, Cal., and Mr. W. H. Rice, of Kauai, were among the sympathizers with the organization who participated in the pleasant anniversary. "Thirty-five years ago," said the venerable President to our reporter, "the society was formed in this room, and a great deal of good it has accomplished since."

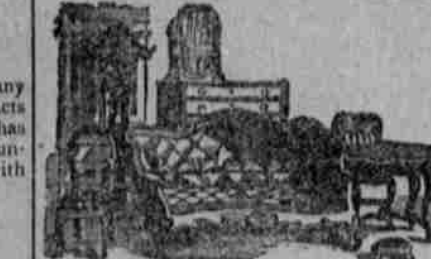
