WILBURTON'S TALE OF WOE

He Has Shaken His Job on Clipperton Island.

The Japanese Laborers Shipped at Honolulu Struck on Him—Altogether It's a Lonely Old Isle.

Mostly everybody in Honolulu knows Frank Wilburton. He has been a hostling overseer of working gangs in town and country for about a dozen years. A few months ago Frank was engaged here to take a gang of laborers, chiefly Japanese but some Hawaiians, to Clipperton Island to work guano. The expedition went from San Francisco in a chartered steamer.

Mr. Wilburton is not at Clipperton Island any more. His friend Chas. Roesch at Wilhelm's carpenter shop has received a letter from him dated at that island on July 28, in which he speaks of holding out until the spring but not any longer. However, Mrs. Wilburton has received a letter of later date, in which her husband says he was about leaving for home. To Mr. Roesch he gives a lugubrious picture of life on a guano island. He says in part:

"I could no more think of taking my wife to this island than of flying. You have no idea of what kind of a place it is, and I shall be glad when I can leave it."

"I am pretty well physically and I guess I can stand it all right, but mentally it is terrible. The Japs shipped in Honolulu, when they saw the place and found out the kind of work they had to do, went on a strike and we had a devil of a time to get them to work. Now just imagine, Charley, what my work must be to take a lot of Japs like that and work them here."

"When we landed there was not a house fit to live in—a lot of rotten old shanties leaking—and some of them had to sleep in the guano warehouses. We have not four men that had ever seen a boat before, and we had to get right in and get this freight ashore in boats through a heavy surf."

"We have the steamer Alice Blanchard and she will make this trip to San Diego. I expect to get her loaded in a day or two, and she will return with our winter supplies, and take one more load, and then no more ships can come here till next spring, when I will leave here and come home."

"It is a small island of curious formation. Not a blade of grass or a tree or a shrub of any kind. The place is alive with seabirds and landerabs, but I think the general climate is not bad, as there is plenty of fresh wind nearly always and we get plenty of rain water to drink."

Clipperton Island is about 800 miles off the coast of Mexico.

"A Church on Maui."

Lono, formerly a hack driver, left for Maui in the Kinau this morning. Just before the steamer hauled away from the wharf, he went forward and, with bible in hand and coat tails fluttering in the wind, delivered a sermon in questionable English. He proclaimed himself all sorts of things and then walked astern with the tread of a somnambulist.

Lono has, during the past few days, collected over \$300 in Honolulu for "a church on Maui." No one seems to know where the church is and some go far as say that it exists only in the disordered mind of Lono.

On Important Business.
B. F. Dillingham and L. A. Thurston were passengers on the Kinau to Maalaea this morning. From that place the two will go to Makawao where they have important business to transact. They will be back at the end of the week.

NEWS FROM GARDEN ISLE

Accident to Luna While Out on Hunting Trip.

Exploded a Cartridge Through Accident—Party in Waimea Saturday Night—Weather Better—Sugar Left.

The Noeau brought the news this morning of a distressing accident in the mountains back of Waimea.

It was last Saturday when Fritz Kaiser, a luna on Waimea plantation, went into the mountains to shoot goats. He took his rifle and asked a Portuguese to accompany him.

The two had journeyed along well into the mountains when, through some accident one of the cartridges exploded at the breach. The rifle was being carried over Kaiser's shoulder so that the point of explosion was close to his face. The result was disastrous. The face was cut up, one of the eyes all but put out and a piece of the lip almost severed.

The Portuguese, thinking he was doing a great favor to Kaiser took out his knife and severed the hanging piece of lip. The result later on can be imagined.

Kaiser was carried back to Waimea. He was getting on quite well when the Noeau sailed.

On Saturday night Mr. Blackstad of Waimea gave a party in honor of his two daughters who are to come to Honolulu to school. Dancing was the feature of the evening.

On Friday night, Mrs. Walter Wright of Waimea gave birth to a daughter.

The weather on Kauai has moderated. Last week it was very bad.

There are in all about 12,000 bags of sugar left on the Garden Isle.

RECORD CAMP FIRE.

First Reunion of Veterans Under Stars and Stripes.

For many years the annual camp fire of Geo. W. De Long Post, G. A. R., has had a note of hope in it, that before many more had come round the flag for which the veterans fought in the dark sixties would be floating over Hawaii.

Now that the fulness of time has elapsed ushering in the happy consummation, it is intended to make the ensuing camp fire a record one. The event is fixed for Thursday evening, at the time-honored place—the home of Commander J. N. Wright, Little Britain. Post Commander R. Jay Greene and Col. de la Vergne have charge of the arrangements.

HE INVESTIGATED COFFEE

The Errand of Colonel Gorton of New Zealand to Hawaii.

Decides That Hawaiian Government Issued Extravagant Information—Pointers on Cultivation.

Lieut. Col. E. Gorton of Rangitikei, New Zealand, and Mrs. Gorton, have returned to town from a visit of two or three weeks to the island of Hawaii. They are at the Arlington hotel.

Mrs. Gorton is a sister of Hon. Percy Smith, chief of the Government Survey of New Zealand, who is a corresponding member of the Hawaiian Historical Society and, while visiting these islands about a year ago, delivered several addresses of great interest and value before that organization. Mr. Smith is the most accomplished linguist of his country, as well as one of the very highest living authorities in Polynesian languages and lore.

Colonel Gorton was waited on this morning by a BULLETIN representative, to whom he gave an exceedingly interesting talk chiefly on the Hawaiian coffee industry. Substantially he spoke as follows: "Your country is at a rather critical stage just now. Nobody can tell exactly what your industrial conditions are going to be, until it is known how and where you are going to secure your future labor."

"The remarkable transactions in sugar plantation shares can hardly be regarded as investments. They partake rather of the nature of speculation—the doubling up of capital, and shares running to 240 and upward."

"True, as you say, the valuations may be upon a proper basis. The yields of sugar ten and eleven tons to the acre, at Ewa and Pahalala are most extraordinary. Still, when Cuba begins to produce sugar again, and the Philippine Islands, the price of sugar must come down. And even if the bounty system of Europe be abandoned, there is a great deal of beet sugar cultivation now even in the United States."

"Yet sugar is, and must continue to be, the great industry for Hawaii. To make it profitable you must have a large proportion of colored labor. White men simply cannot stand the intense heat of the cane fields. The stripping of the cane is fearfully warm and laborious."

"Annexation will undoubtedly prove to be a great improvement over your former conditions. But I believe a protectorate by the United States would have been far more preferable. You could then make your own laws to suit the peculiar conditions of the country. All you required was the flag of a strong power to protect you, and with that you could have an independent government similar to that of the Colonies. Protection of a strong power was certainly essential, for, without it, if two great nations were at war any one of them would be sure to take possession of the islands. Their geographical position makes them one of the strongest points of advantage to whatever power may hold them. And the United States is strong enough to protect them against any nation."

"While on Hawaii I made a careful examination of the coffee industry. My object was, if the climate was not too warm for Mrs. Gorton, to go into the business and have two of my youngest sons come here and engage in the cultivation of coffee. I have been all through the districts of Olua and Puna, and become convinced that coffee grows and bears well in Hawaii."

"Yet it is clear that the standing of the industry is far from being terminated. The book is—

RESOLUTIONS OF THANKS

Presented the Commission by Lahaina Yesterday Morning.

Action of an Annexation Club—Send Committee of Three to Honolulu—What Senator Cullom Had to Say.

There appeared before the Commission in the Executive building yesterday afternoon, a committee of three from the Annexation Club of Lahaina, Maui, composed of D. Kahaulelio, D. H. Kahaulelio and Geo. Dunn. They had been delegated to present to the Commission resolutions bearing upon annexation. Their work was done quietly and in a dignified manner.

D. H. Kahaulelio arose when the time came and, with a few preliminary remarks, read the resolutions as accepted by the Annexation Club of Lahaina. Summed up they contain the following:

1. Thanks to the President of the United States for recommending the annexation of the Islands.
2. Thanks to Congress for passing the resolution as introduced by Congressman Newlands.
3. Thanks to Congressman Newlands for framing the resolution which resulted in the annexation of the Islands.

Senator Cullom expressed the appreciation of the Commission at the receipt of the resolutions and assured the representatives of the Lahaina Annexation Club that these would surely be embodied in the reports of the Commission to both the President and Congress.

Two of the representatives returned to Maui on the Kinau this morning while the other will take the Claudine this afternoon.

It might be interesting to know that the Annexation Club of Lahaina is composed for the most part of Hawaiians.

Committee of Hawaiians Shut Out from the Commission.

They Address Chairman Cullom to Ascertain the Reason—They Want to Petition for Restoration.

The following letter was presented to Senator Cullom this morning:

Sir:—Being elected a committee of the "Hui Kaulana o Leahi" to present a memorial to your honorable body today regarding a protest against annexation of these islands to the United States of America by the above organization of native patriots who participated in the revolution of January, 1895, for the restoration of the independence of their beloved country.

And as the wish of this Hawaiian organization has been barred out by your commissioners through Mr. Sanford B. Dole himself who told Mr. J. W. Bipi-kane (a member of this committee this morning) that the four commissioners have decided not to receive our Committee and other committees who are bearing a memorial of this nature.

And as Mr. Sanford B. Dole, being a party of those who committed the crime of destroying the independence of our beloved country to the United States of America without a title, so we ask your commissioners through you the chairman if it be possible that your commissioners have taken such steps not to listen the voice of the native Hawaiians.

Deserted Contract Labor.

Two deserters from Oahu plantation were caught this morning while attempting to get away on one of the Inter-island steamers. The men were quite well dressed and had a considerable amount of money in their bundles. They were given in charge of an officer from the plantation, handcuffed and returned to where they belong by rights.

There have been quite a number of desertions from Oahu plantation of late.

Captured at Ewa.

Officer Kahalelanu went to Ewa plantation last night and, following the instructions of Harry Evans, captured the two deserters who left the ship Vincent without permission nine days ago. They were found near the pumps. It was their habit to remain in hiding during the day and then to come out during the night time. They were simply waiting until the Vincent should sail for the Sound on Thursday.

RED CROSS VOLUNTEERS

Workers, Not Money Is Now the Call Made.

Over 400 Ailing Boys in Blue in Camp—Meeting in Y. M. C. A. Hall Tomorrow Afternoon.

The Red Cross Society wants volunteers.

It is not money, but people to assist in the new work which is to be taken up.

There are now some 400 sick soldiers at the garrisons near Diamond Head. These men are not sick enough to go to the hospital, but are suffering from the effects of the water they have to drink at the garrison.

This matter has been brought to the attention of the Red Cross Society and it has been decided to establish two Red Cross tents, one at Camp McKinley and one at Camp Otis, where various drinks will be served to the boys in blue, from 9 to 12 in the forenoon. These tents will be established tomorrow and it is hoped that the response will be so cordial, that they can be continued for some time, at least as long as there seems to be necessity.

A mass meeting of the Red Cross Society is called for tomorrow (Wednesday) afternoon at 3:30 in the Y. M. C. A. hall. All members of the Society and all people interested in the work are requested to attend. It is hoped a large number will be present. Those willing to volunteer will take charge of the tents during the hours mentioned on days to be designated. The desire is to have the number large enough so that the entire work will not fall upon a few.

Remember the hour, 3:30 Wednesday afternoon in Y. M. C. A. hall.

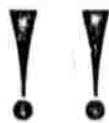

HANDSOME HONOLULU HOME

Residence of Dr. C. B. Wood on Foot-
hill of Punchbowl.

Many Novel Ideas Put Into Shape—The Dutch
Style—House Commands Magni-
ficent Views.

There are enough artistic dwell-
ings in and about Honolulu, and
the number is increasing, to form
material for a very creditable sou-
venir book to be entitled, "Hand-
some Homes of Honolulu." No
charge for this hint to enterpris-
ing publishers. One of the lead-
ing subjects for such a work would
certainly be the house of Dr. C. B.
Wood, situated on one of the most
picturesque foothills of Punch-
bowl mountain.

This beautiful dwelling is now
receiving the finishing touches
from the contractors—Lucas Broth-
ers, proprietors of the Honolulu
Planing Mills. Howard & Train
are its architects. The front gable
faces Thurston avenue, but the
main entrance is from the side.
Dr. Wood's demesne covers about
six acres. It is intersected in the
middle by Spencer avenue running
parallel to Thurston, but the
northwest corner the former ave-
nue turns down to strike the lat-
ter, which it does at the opening
of Wilder avenue.

The house is a story and a half
high and built in the Dutch style.
No two parts of one class are ex-
actly alike in construction. Reach-
ed from several points by flights
of steps, the ground floor is whol-
ly occupied by the living room,
the dining room and the culinary
department. Irregular in outline
—from having a broad bay in one
end, a stairway in the other, and
an outer doorway cutting off a
corner—the living room has ex-
treme dimensions of 27x25ft. 6in.
Beyond the stairway, at right an-
gles to the main entrance, a wide
and open archway gives commu-
nication with the dining room.
This apartment is 23x16ft.

The main entrance is fitted with
double sliding doors 8x8 feet,
looking out southwardly. It is
approached by broad steps across
the veranda. Double doors 8x5
feet on hinges, with plate glass
forming the upper halves, are fitted
cornerwise where the veranda
turns to run along the eastern
end. At this point the veranda is
13 feet from door to railing. Doors
are of redwood throughout.

Wainscoting of Oregon white
pine, moulded, is six feet high in
the living room and eight feet in
the dining room. The rooms have
beam ceilings of the same mate-
rial with mouldings, the main
beams 4x6 inches and the trav-
ersing ones 3x4 inches. Crepe paper
with decorative border fills the
space between wainscoting and
cornices.

Windows have the Dutch pecu-
liarity already noted. In the bay
of the living room are three verti-
cally sliding windows—the mid-
dle one 5 ft. 6 in. x 3 ft. 6 in., and
that on either side 5 ft. 6 in. x 3 ft.
The lower half of each window is
one pane of glass, the upper a
diamond sash of many lights. On
a line with the opening of the bay
is another window 4 ft. x 3 ft. 6 in.,
double and swinging laterally on
hinges. Then, on the north side,
is a series of three windows, hinged,
diamond sash, of 3 ft. x 3 ft. 6 in.
The dining room has two
double and hinged windows on
the side and one on the end. The

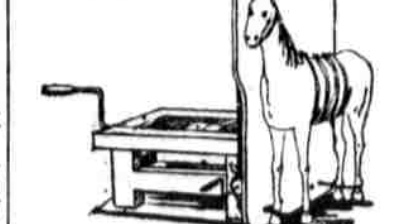

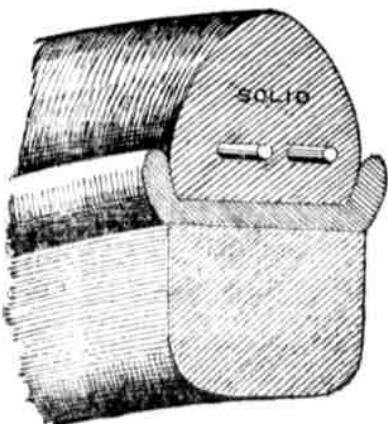

HE INVESTIGATED COFFEE.

Continued from first page.

sued by your Government in 1896 went too far entirely in promises. Coffee raising requires capital, experience and energy. It is experience that is most needed in this country. There is the great est diversity of methods. The questions of shade or no shade, of the distance between plants, etc., are answered variously in practice by different planters.

"In the matter of distance the rule varies from six feet to eight feet between the plants. The best coffee I saw was at eight feet apart. Plants only six feet apart, when they grow, will have their branches meet and crowd each other. And I saw better coffee without shade than with it.

"Now, the little book gives promises of profit in your coffee which are extremely alluring but they are quite delusive. It shows \$21,275 to the credit of a coffee plantation of 75 acres at the end of 7 years. I have figured the question down very carefully, and find that before any returns appear one must have expended \$20,000, and then he will begin to realize \$4000 to \$5000 a year at the utmost. The basis of my calculation is planting eight feet apart, which will give 680 trees to the acre, and an average yield of one pound to the tree. More trees will go below that average than above it.

"Then you must count upon some bad seasons, and if your plantation is at all neglected you are done. If weeds come up a re is an end to coffee."

Colonel Gorton, returning to the subject of diverse methods, said those planters had the best results who did not burn the trees cut down in clearing the land. By laying them in straight windrows they made windbreaks that protected the tender young coffee plants. In a few years, too, the trunks of the tree ferns rotted clean away, adding richly to the fertility of the soil. It was the experience in New Zealand that wherever brush was burned off the land a rank growth of thistles and other noxious weeds was inevitable.

Col. Gorton believes that the coffee planters will, sooner or later, have to use fertilizers on their land. He would not be surprised if the opinion of some were correct, that the coffee lands of Oahu would yet be given up to sugar cane. The soil is very rich and cane would flourish to an elevation of 150 feet.

The greater fertility and depth of soil in Oahu as compared with Puna was indicated to Colonel Gorton by the far larger size of the ohia trees in Oahu. There was evidently a difference also between the soil of the elder Mr. Rycroft's plantation down by the coast and his sons up in the hills of Puna. The young man's coffee was proving more successful than his father's.

Another thing the Colonel found demonstrated in Oahu was that much the better results were obtained from planting the seed directly than transplanting from seed beds. Three seeds are planted in each hole, and instead of transplanting the two superfluous shoots they are thrown away. The strongest one of the three of course remains.

Colonel Gorton found the volcano dead. Just a little smoke was emitted. It surprised him, however, to find that a stick burned fiercely at a depth of four feet in a lava crack the instant it rested there, while at twice the depth it took fire much less readily and burned more slowly. His interest in the volcano is great from the fact that New Zealand contains some of the most wonderful volcanic phenomena in the world—geysers, mud flows, etc.

"I must say," the Colonel emphatically remarked when he had finished with coffee, "that I have never in any country seen such civility as that shown by the people of these islands. The courtesy and kindness we have received is simply remarkable."

Colonel and Mrs. Gorton will remain here until the 30th inst.
