"I could no more think of taking my wife to this island than of flying. You have no idea of what well when the Nosau sailed. kind of a place it is, and I shall be glad when I can leave it.

but mentally it is terrible. The Japs shipped in Honolulu, when they saw the place and found out the kind of work they had to do, went on a strike and we had a devil of a time to get them to work. Now just imagine, Charley, what my work must be to take a lot of bad. Japs like that and work them

"When we landed there was not lete. a house fit to live in -a lot of rotten old shanties leaking -- and some of them had to sleep in the guano warehouses. We have not four men that had ever seen a boat before, and we had to get right in and get this freight ashore in boats through a heavy surf.

" We have the steamer Alice supplies, and take one more load, and then no more ships can come here till next spring, when I will leave here and come home.

" It is a small island of curious formation. Not a blade of grass or a tree or a shrub of any kind. The place is alive with seabirds and landcrabs, but I think the general climate is not bad, as there is plenty of fresh wind nearly always and we get plenty of rain water to

Clipperton Island is about 800 miles off the coast of Mexico.

There are now some 400 sick soldiers at the garrisons near Diamond Head. These men are not sick enough to go to the hospital, but are suffering from the ffects of the water they bave to drink at the garrison.

This matter has been brought to the attention of the Red Cross Society and it has been decided to establish two Red Cross tente, one at Camp McKinley and one at Camp Otis, where various drinks will be served to the boys in blue, from 9 to 12 in the forenoon. These tents will be established tomorrow and it is hoped that the response will be so cordial, that they can be continued for sometime, at least as long as there

seems to be necessity.

A mass meeting of the Red Cross Society is called for tomorrow (Wednesday) afternoon at 3:30 in the Y. M. C. A. ball. All members of the Society and all people interested in the work are requested to attend. It is hoped a large number will be present. 

HANDSOME HONOLULU HOME

Residence of Dr. C. B. Wood on Foothill of Punchbowl.

Many Novel Ideas Put Into Shape—The Dutch Style-House Commands Magnificent Views.

There are enough artistic dwellings in and about Honolulu, and the number is increasing, to form material for a very creditable souvenir book to be entitled, "Handsome Homes of Honolulu." No charge for this hint to enterprising publishers. One of the lead-Dress Trimmings ing subjects for such a work would certainly be the house of Dr. C. B. Wood, situated on one of the most picturesque foothills of Punchbowl mountain.

This beautiful dwelling is now receiving the finishing touches from the contractors - Lucas Brothers, proprietors of the Honolulu Planing Mills. Howard & Train are its architects. The front gable faces Thurston avenue, but the main entrance is from the side. Dr. Wood's demesne covers about six acres. It is intersected in the parallel to Thurston, but t the northwest corner the former aveuue turns down to strike the lat ter, which it does at the opening of Wilder avenue.

The house is a story and a half high and built in the Dutch style. No two parts of one class are ex actly alike in construction. Reached from several points by flights of steps, the ground floor is wholly occupied by the living room, the diving room and the culmary department. Irregular in outline -trom having a broad bay in one end, a stairway in the otner, and an outer doorway cutting off a corner - the living room has extreme dimensions of 27x25ft. 6ia. Beyond the stairway, at right an gles to the main ent ance, a wide and open archway gives communication with the during room. This apartment is 23x16tt.

The main entrance is fitted with double sliding doors 8x8 feet, looking out southwardly. It is approached by broad steps across the veranda. Double doors 8x5 feet on hinges, with plate glass forming the upper halves, are fitted cornerwise where the veranda turns to run along the eastern end. At this point the veranda is 13 feet from door to railing. Doors are of redwood throughout.

Wainscoting of Oregon white pine, moulded, is six feet high in the living room and eight feet in the dining room. The rooms have beam ceilings of the same material with mouldings, the main beams 4x6 inches and the traversing ones 3x4 inches. Crepe paper with decorative border fills the space between wainscoting and cornices.

Windows have the Dutch peculiarity already noted. In the bay of the living room are three vertically sliding windows—the mid dle one 5 ft. 6 in.x3 ft. 6 in, and that on either side 5 ft. 6 in x3 ft. The lower half of each window is one pane of glass, the upper a diamond sash of many lights. On a line with the opening of the bay is another window 4 ft.x3 ft. 6 in., double and swinging laterally on hinges. Then, on the north side, is a series of three windows, hing-ed, diamond sash, of 3 ft.x3 ft. 6 in. The dining room has two double and hinged windows on the side and one on the end. The

former bave diamond sashes, and the latter has diamond panes top and bottom, connected with elong ated panes ending in diamond

A door in the living room under the staircase leads to the side of a portico about 11 ft.x7 ft. 8 in., Do you want to which steps lead up from the front line of the house. Opposite the steps a door leads into the kitchen, 16 feet square, beyond which is a latticed enclosure, 10x 6 ft., for ice chest, meat safe. etc. Lying between kitchen and dinit g room is the pantry, 16x8 ft., and, like the kitchen, having a sink with hot and cold water faucets.

Broad stairs of Oregon pine, in both steps and ornate banisters, lead to the upper floor. They are in the Colonial style. There are two intermediate landings, the turns at right angles. At the second landing Venetian double doors, covering the whold breadth, open on friction rollers to HARDWARE LINE? a balcony on side. The stairs attain to a bail way running across the house.

To the left, on the front, is a large bedroom occupying, with a closet on each side, the entire breadth of the house. At its farther end is a double door, the upper part open and screened with mosquito netting, which communicates with a balcony. This door is flanked on either side with a vertically sliding window, half being diamond sash. On the north side, above a small rectangular bay, is a binged double win-dow. The closets run under the roof, each lighted with a diamond sash swinging from the top.

Across the hallway, on the north and south sides, are two bedrooms each about 15 feet square. They have each hinged double windows in two walls, also closets set under the roof. Be tween them is a bathroom fitted with porcelain bathtub served with hot and cold water, together with other elegant accessories. The bedrooms have lavatories, the basins of Tennessee marble. All the bedrooms are mosquito proof. A door at the fartner end of the hallway, also one from the southern bedroom, leads out to a spa cious balcony beneath a pretty dormer gable.

Picturesque, with a villa-like aspect, the exterior of the house, as its varied angles and facades peep out from among the trees, is in keeping not only with the elegauce and high finish of the interior, but with the magnificent scenery the site commands. 


