The latest advices from the Volcano will be found in a short narrative from the pen of Mr. Geo. A. Howard, who visited it on the 3d instant, and found it very active, there being now two lava lakes with numerous miniature volcanoes and blow holes. Travelers will find this a good time to visit this great wonder. The road to it from Hilo is now finished half the distance, and we understand that the work on the remaining half is to be commenced at once, and will be prosecuted to completion. His Excellency the Minister of the Interior took passage in the steamer Kinau Friday, for Hilo, to decide what route the unfinished portion of the road shall take. Being quite familiar with that section of Hawaii, no one is better fitted to decide the matter than he.

Dr. Koch's recent discoveries have startled the whole world, and though some may attempt to decry the value of his remedies, there can be no doubt that his investigations and discoveries are in the right direction, following in the track of Jenner and Pasteur in discovering antidotes for smallpox and hydrophobia, by inoculation of certain prepared lymphs. Now Dr. Koch is studying the leprosy disease as well as consumption, and a recent telegram, dated Madrid December 26th states that "Two persons suffering from leprosy have been inoculated with lymph according to the method of

Dr. Koch. The doctors at the hospital where the lepers are being treated report that the patients have been rapidly improving since the new remedy was applied."

It behooves the Board of Health to take immediate steps for ascertaining how far the remedies referred to have been successfully tried, and for procuring some for testing their virtue on the patients here or on Molokai. It may be that the door of hope is even now being opened for the relief and cure of the poor inmates of our public hospital.

REVIEW FOR THE MAIL STEAMER.

The month of December has not been a very remarkable one, but a few incidents and occurrences may be noticed.

The weather throughout the group and for the greater part of the month has been very unfavorable, and the coasting trade and the interests dependant on it have suffered in proportion. The Kinau reports the weather along the coasts of Maui and Hawaii too bad to allow any attempts at landing at the different landings, and returned with only a few hides and sundries. The steamer Hawaii was away three weeks. The schooner Kauikaouli was driven from her anchors off the Kohala coast and made her way back to port with two men and a boy, her captain and the rest of the crew having gone ashore with freight were unable to return, and by the capsizing of a freight boat on the same coast five lives were lost.

The visitors to Kilauea report the volcano as particularly active, and the view either from the brink of the lakes or from the verandah of the Volcano House is grand beyond description. There is a large amount of snow on the mountains, which, however, is a common occurrence in the winter season.

The quinquennial census was taken as of the night of Sunday, Dec. 28th. The reports are not yet all in. It will take some weeks, however, before the results can be properly tabulated and made available for publication.

The Custom House returns for the twelve months 1890 as compared with the corresponding period 1889 show a healthy increase in all our exports except goat-skins, tallow, betel-leaves and, strange to say, bananas, the market for which appears to have been over-loaded in 1889, and so necessitated a reduction in export this last year. The exports of sugar show a total of nearly 130,000 tons, as against 121,000 tons for the year 1889. The customs districts, after Honolulu, stand in order of value of exports: (1) Kahului; (2) Hilo; (3) Mahukona. In the San Francisco export list Hawaii stands second, with value \$4,637,800 for just nine months of 1890, having Great Britain only above it as doing more business. The largest cargo of sugar ever taken by one sailing ship from this port was by the British bark Girvan on the 2nd inst. with 2135 tons.

The labor question is still the most important consideration for the whole country, wages of plantation hands are everywhere rising, the Chinese are leaving the country in far greater numbers than any substitutes coming in, and unless our envoys to Japan and elsewhere succeed, and that speedily, in introducing laborers, there will soon be grave difficulty in all branches of agriculture and the trades depending thereon.

The new school term began on Monday, the 5th inst., with some few changes amongst the teachers and a prospect of enlarged attendance of scholars, many country school-houses having been enlarged and otherwise improved and some new ones built.

Building operations are going on briskly in the city. Messrs. Theo. H. Davies' new warehouse on Kaahumanu street is finished as to exterior and nearly ready for occupation. Two more brick buildings adjoining those recently finished on Nuuanu street, are rapidly approaching completion, and large cellar excavations preparatory to building are in hand on Hotel street, and Brewers' property on Fort street.

The Honolulu and the Union ironworks are working to their full capacity, engaged on heavy contracts for sugar mill and other machinery.

The mortuary report for the month is not pleasant reading for those who look hopefully for the

re-vivifying of the Hawaiian race. Of a total of 53 deaths reported, 35 were Hawaiians and 18 of all other nationalities. The death rate per thousand of the estimated population, we find average of the whole 25.54, of Hawaiian 35, Chinese 5.14, all other nationalities 30. Nineteen deaths of infants under one year is a large proportion of a total of fifty-three, and ten unattended does not look well. However, in the last five years, only one year, 1887, showed a lower death for December than this of 1890.

HILO RETROSPECT AND NEWS.

(From the Hilo Record.)

In looking back over the past year
we find reason to be thankful in
many respects. Our progress as a
town has been characterized by a
slow but sure advance. To-day our
town shows quite an advance in
buildings and population. Quite a
large number of Portuguese families
have settled in town, and are making
houses for themselves in our midst.

We have reason to believe that the
present census will show a great ad-
vance in our population. Probably
we number about 2000, whereas at
the last census, some six years since,
we only numbered 1500. New build-
ings have been erected in many parts
of the town, and still many others
are in process of erection. Business
has been fairly good, and our busi-
ness men have no reason to complain.

The Government has been awake to
the putting in of improvements, as
far as the funds would allow. Our
roads have been gradually improved
until our streets show well alongside
of those in other parts of the Islands.

We have a good carriage road as far
as Onomea one way and to Olaa the
other. The canal to Waiakea stream
from the Waialama has been a de-
cided success, giving us a fine drive
along Front street to Waiakea land-
ing. Active work has begun on our
water pipe system, and we hope will
be pushed right along.

Our health has been good, very
little sickness having been abroad
amongst us. Socially we have made
advance; our social reunions, tending
to bring us into better acquaintance,
have been well attended. The Liter-
ary club has been a decided suc-
cess on that of past years, and has
given our young people something to
do other than to attend on the
saloons and other places of low re-
sort, and we sincerely hope that their
work will be kept up during the
coming year. So, as we have before
said, we have reason to be thankful
for our progress during the past
year, and may our New Year show
no less advance.

The Government has at last com-
menced to look after the Volcano
road. Mr. Bruner is at present over-
hauling the best route to the Vol-
cano, it seeming to him that the road
can be built farther in the woods
than it now is, and with less expense
than it would take to build it across
the pahoehoe. We are almost sure
that it can be done, and wish Mr.
Bruner success in his investigations.

As to the advisability of giving out
the road to be built under contract,
we don't think it the best way. Such
a road ought to be built in the best
possible manner, in order to last for
all time.

We learn that an accident hap-
pened to a traveler in the Waipio
gulch. In descending the pali on the
Hamakua side, his horse in going
too near the side of the road
slipped off, carrying his rider down
some feet. The rider escaped from the
saddle, but the horse continued
his down journey, and was ever-
lastingly smashed up on reaching
the bottom of the pali. We suppose
the Bulletin will also lay this to the
late Cabinet.
