STATUS OF PUBLIC LANDS

OFFICIAL STATEMENT OF THE SITUATION.

Sales of Land and Leases are Being Made Upon Direct Instructions From United States Government.

Yesterday's mail brought a rumor from Washington to the effect that Attorney-General Griggs holds that the Hawaiian Government has no right to dispose of any part of the public lands, and that McKinley will shortly instruct President Dole to cancel all leases made since annexation and return the money received thereon. The announcement created no little annoyance about town to persons who have purchased, leased or exchanged property in the past twelve months. Among the number of properties apparently effected are a number of Esplanade lots, purchased by Hackfeld & Company, E. O. Hall & Son and others; the lease of the Brewer lot on Queen street, upon which a fine building has been erected; lots exchanged in the street widening program; numerous lots at Waikiki and on the other islands.

As a matter of fact there appears to be absolutely no truth in the report and no excuse for its circulation.

From one of the highest authorities in the land, the following statement was this morning secured:

"Immediately following annexation the Hawaiian Government submitted to President McKinley a request for instructions on a number of points upon which there seemed a doubt here. While there was hardly a doubt as to the construction of the Hawaiian resolution on the question of public lands, this matter was submitted with the others.

"The questions were considered by President McKinley and his Cabinet and the local government was advised positively and finally on the matters in regard to which information was desirable.

"With respect to public lands the Hawaiian Government was instructed to proceed precisely as before, in making sales, leases or transfers, under Hawaiian laws.

"This course has since been followed by the Hawaiian Government. In a recent letter respecting the claim of squatters at Olua the new secretary of state showed plainly that he did not know of the ruling and instructions of last autumn. In reply the Hawaiian Government merely called attention to its instructions, which, of course, settles the matter.

"The suggestion or assumption that the Hawaiian Government will be called upon to repudiate its contracts of leases and sales is absurd on the face of it, as will plainly be seen. Aside from a construction of the Hawaiian resolution, which seems clearly to the side of the course pursued, the Government has acted in every particular upon the instructions of the Government of the United States."

NOT FOR HAWAII'S EXHIBIT

GOVERNMENT AND THE PARIS EXPOSITION.

Call Issued for a Conference Tomorrow Morning—Chamber of Commerce. Situation to be Discussed.

An effort will be made to have a Hawaiian exhibit at the Paris Exposition next year. Whether it will be a separate display or will go in with the American exhibit as the showing of one of the territories has not yet been determined. Many people feel that a distinct or independent exhibit would attract more attention and do more good; while others feel that now the country is a part of the United States its exhibit should go in the same way and on the same footing as those of other States and territories.

Mr. Potter, head of the American exhibit, has already extended an invitation to Hawaii in the matter. The invitation has come indirectly, but the assurance is bona fide that the Territory will be welcome. The arrangement of the school part of the exhibit has been carried on with the idea of its becoming a part of the big United Show at the Exposition.

At the Cabinet meeting tomorrow morning the subject of the exhibit and the other question mentioned will be taken up and discussed. This invitation to the Chamber of Commerce was issued yesterday afternoon:

"Honolulu, H. I., Sept. 27, 1899.

"Sir:

"I am directed by the Minister of Foreign Affairs to extend through you to the members of the Chamber of Commerce an invitation to meet the Executive Council on Friday morning at 10 o'clock to discuss the subject of a Hawaiian exhibit at the Paris Exposition.

It is expected that there will be a full attendance of Chamber members and others interested. Minister Mott-Smith has expressed his interest in the matter and has promised to be present. It is expected that the result will be some definite conclusion as to how the exhibit shall be made, if made at all. It is desirable to have the matter settled very soon so that there will be time to get things properly arranged.

McKINLEY'S PROCLAMATION.

In Line With Instructions Sent Here Months Ago.

President Dole states that the action of the Hawaiian Government in forbidding the registration of foreign built vessels under the Hawaiian flag was undoubtedly taken to suspend the pressure that has for some time been brought to bear upon the collector of customs by ship owners for registration and the flag. Four cases to that end are now before the courts and have been contested by the Hawaiian government.

It appears that nearly a year ago the local government was President McKinley of the local situation in regard to shipping and registration, and asked instructions as to how to proceed. "Since that time," said President Dole, "we have been acting upon the instructions of President McKinley in refusing to register and in contesting registration matters in the courts. The proclamation of the President relieves the customs department of a great deal of annoyance and is a source of gratification to the government. It is the one means of settling the matter."

RULE 24 ANNULED.

Minister King Knocks Out Objectionable Carriage Law.

Minister King has repealed Rule 24 of the carriage regulations. This particular regulation forbids a licensed hack to wait at any place other than its appointed stand. In the opinion of the Minister there is little use for the rule and it has worked a great hardship both to the drivers and the public.

A. McDowell is charged with violating Rule 26 of the regulations. This forbids a licensed hack to be up at any saloon. McDowell was on the premises of the Favorite saloon when arrested. He claims that this is private property and that the Minister of the Interior, with the consent of the owner, the hack rules ceased to apply to his vehicle, just as though he had driven into his own yard.

THEY SWAM ASHORE.

Three Japanese working on the steamer Mak-Maru deserted last night and swam ashore. They came over to see friends, but having no clothes on were taken in hand by the police. The men are held at the station house awaiting the pleasure of the master of the vessel.

COST BONDS FILED.

The man who libelled the yacht Nora has filed his cost bonds, in the sum of \$500. Paul Neumann signs for James W. Perceval as attorney in fact and goes security himself for the amount. This places the libel in proper legal shape.

HOLT ACCOUNTS.

J. S. Walker has filed his annual accounts as guardian of the property of James R. Holt, crediting \$3,543.82 and charging \$225.25. In the guardianship of James R. Holt \$3,368.55 is credited and \$3,211.93 is charged.

Mray Kalelali has been appointed guardian of the person and property of Mary Kalelali, a minor, under bonds in the sum of \$200.

GOATS FOR PLANTATIONS

A SHIPMENT FROM TEXAS FOR KAUALI.

One Hundred and Six Imported at High Expense as Substitutes for Milch Cows.

The bark Ceylon, Captain Willer, with 100 goats aboard, arrived in port last night after a slow and very calm trip from San Francisco. In addition to the goats, Captain Willer had on deck a large quantity of pipes, 380 boilers and 16,000 feet of lumber, making an unusually bulky deck load.

The goats are consigned to the Honolulu Stock Yards, seventy of them being destined for Kauai. They were transferred from the Ceylon to the steamer James Makee this morning and started for their destination, which is the stock ranch of W. H. Rice.

The goats are from Texas and are pure blooded animals. They were shipped here at an expense of over \$5 each, but it is thought that they will prove a paying investment in spite of the fact that there are thousands of goats to be had here at less than the cost of transporting the new arrivals. They will furnish about four quarts of milk a day and the milk is a good deal more rich than that of cows. The cost of keeping them is much less than that of cows and many plantation laborers who could not afford to keep a cow will be able to furnish all the cheaper necessities of a goat. If the present experiment proves a success, larger importations of goats will be made. The climate here is thought to be very favorable to the Texas goats. Captain Willer says that aside from a tendency to go aloft goats are the best behaved live stock he has ever carried. It was necessary to put covers on their stalls.

SUGAR AND RICE.

Extracts From Williams, Dimond & Co.'s Letter.

It is estimated that up to the first of October the United States will have received from Java about 165,000 tons, leaving to arrive in October and November, probably 250,000 tons, but these sugars comprise the greater portion of all the sugars to come from that market between now and the end of January next, and it is thought that the stock of raws is nothing like what it appears to be in published statistics.

RICE.—Hawaiian. Market very quiet, and but little demand. We quote rice, sixty days, but it is only the small stock that maintains this figure. New crop of Eastern will soon be on the market and indications are that a heavy drop in Hawaiians will follow.

NIGHT FIRE ALARM.

A fire alarm at 2:30 this morning created considerable excitement as the number sounded was 13, corner of Fort and King streets, in the heart of the business section. The three main fire houses responded promptly.

The alarm was a Chinese man, a can of oil stove and a blaze in the stove pipe of the restaurant near the Post Office. It is believed the alarm came from the Police Station. No damage.

DROPS THE AGENCY.

Henry Waterhouse & Company have resigned from the office of agents of the British-American Steamship line to take effect on October 1st. This is the concern operating the Elulu Thompson, Garonne and other boats between Seattle and Honolulu. The company has sent down a man from their Seattle office to take charge of the business after October 1st.

THE CLEMENT COMPANY.

Frank Curtis states that there will be no season seat sale for the coming season, and C. W. Brewer, of Welch & Company. The regular sale will open next Wednesday. The Clement Company numbers about seventeen people. The management state that they have a good selection of plays and a good company to interpret them.

STROW'S ESTATE.

J. C. Strow, who died last week, left property valued at \$2,600, besides 15 shares of Waiailua stock and some personal effects. Ed. A. Williams, his next of kin, asks that J. S. Walker be appointed administrator of the estate. The petitioner knows of no heirs, although an effort will be made to find them if any there be.

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CARRIED AWAY AT NIGHT

THE THEODOR LOSES MASTS IN A STORM.

She Puts Into Port Here in Distress. Bound for San Francisco Direct from London.

The German bark Theodor, Captain Arfmann, put into port in distress this morning. She had been 180 days at sea, bound for San Francisco from London. Twenty-nine days ago, she encountered a storm that broke her foretop mast and sent her foretop gallant masting crashing through the deck. The captain at once directed the vessel's course toward Honolulu, the nearest port and he arrived outside the harbor at about 8 o'clock this morning. In spite of the heavy seas she encountered and the damage she sustained the Theodor's "distress" is not very apparent and some surprise was expressed by skippers along the front that she should have turned out of her course to San Francisco.

The Theodor is a four-masted bark and was formerly the Cunard line steamship China. She is all iron and is capable of making good speed, but is an old vessel. Her tonnage is 2400. She left London on March 29th with a general cargo consigned to Balfour Guthrie & Company, San Francisco. The voyage was without incident till the fourth of this month, when a very severe blow and heavy rains were encountered during the night. The vessel shipped heavy seas and suddenly her top gallant mast broke with a crash and tumbled to the deck, breaking through two planks. The ship's carpenter was standing within two feet of where the mast fell and had a narrow escape from death. All sails on the foremast were carried away, two yard arms were lost and the other yards were broken or loosened. When day light came Captain Arfmann found his vessel seriously crippled, the foremast being useless, as all the yards were loose. The cargo was not damaged and the bark was able to go ahead with its masts, though not making very good time. The accident occurred about the 120th parallel, about due west from Honolulu.

The Theodor was towed into the harbor by the Eleu, and lies anchored near the quarantine island. Captain Arfmann intends to stay here until he secures new masts and yard arms.

CAPABLE LEADER.

W. S. Glover of the Boston Lyric Opera Company.

The reputation of W. S. Glover, the musical conductor of the Boston Lyric Opera Company, is world-wide. He claims to have conducted the orchestra for every opera that has been written and made a success. His experience as a conductor is generally must have covered a broad field on which all the great prima donnas of the operatic stage have been led by his baton.

The duties of a conductor are manifold, and the requirements for the post most exacting. He must have a perfect ear for harmony, and a pair of eyes that can look in fifteen different directions at one time, at his entire orchestra, the score before him and on the stage at the singers. A conductor can make or undo a performance of an opera after the curtain raises, he is the autocrat.

TWO CARGOES OF SUGAR.

The Hawaiian bark Andrew Welch, Captain E. P. Drew, cleared today for San Francisco with a cargo of 19,679 bags of sugar valued at \$93,650.70. It is consigned from Castle & Cooke and C. Brewer to Welch & Company. The American bark Martha Davis, Captain A. McAlmon, also cleared, carrying 17,945 bags of sugar, valued at \$75,683.71. Her cargo was shipped by Castle & Cooke, F. A. Schaefer & Company, and C. Brewer to Welch & Company. E. Van Dorn leaves as a passenger on the Andrew Welch.

AGAINST CONSUMPTIVES.

Quarantining of the State of California.

SAN FRANCISCO, September 15.—In Sacramento yesterday, Dr. D. D. Crowley, member of the State Board of Health, presented a resolution looking toward the quarantining of the State of California against all persons suffering with consumption. The preliminary resolution was adopted and there was a deal of sympathy expressed with it. So there is a possibility that a decision may be reached to station medical inspectors along the borders and turn back every person afflicted with pulmonary tuberculosis. As California has been considered a Mecca for consumptives, Dr. Crowley's resolution already has stirred up a deal of discussion among the doctors. When Dr. Winslow Anderson was a member of the State Board of Health, he proposed to let the consumptives come, but to rigidly isolate all cases, whether visitors or of local development. The recent Tubercula Congress urged that all countries make a systematic fight against this disease, which carries off one-seventh of all the people who die throughout the world.

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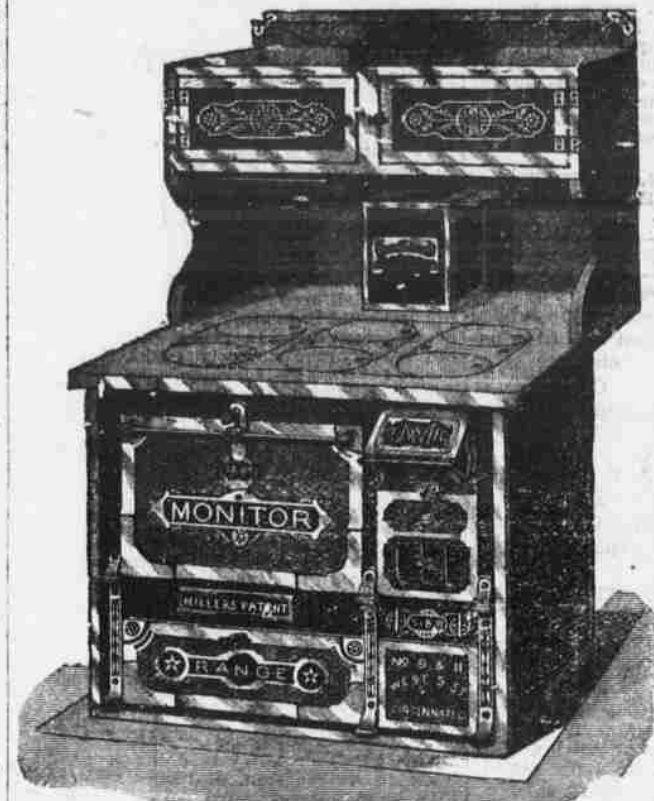
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THE LECTURE FIELD.

THE TRANS-OCEANIC LINES

ONE THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED

CABLES.

Hundreds of Thousands of Miles of Sub-

marine Telegraphs and Millions of

Messages—The Missing Link.

According to a publication of the United States Bureau of Statistics, the submarine telegraphs of the world at the close of last February numbered 1500, had an aggregate length of 170,000 miles, represented a cost estimated at \$250,000,000, and transmitted annually about 6,000,000 messages.

The greater number of these submarine telegraphs are comparatively short cables owned by governments and employed in connection with forts, lighthouses and signal stations. There are about 320 commercial cables, owned by thirty-five companies. These control about 150,000 miles of cable, leaving for the governmental cables only about 20,000 miles of the total. It is noted, however, that the governments of the world hold something more than 80,000 miles of cable stock for war purposes, ready at hand to be laid at a moment's notice when the emergency arises.

Every great body of water lying between any inhabited part of the earth has been crossed and recrossed by submarine telegraphs. The Mediterranean is traversed through its length and breadth by numerous lines, the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean Sea are almost equally well supplied, and their islands are connected with one another and with both the northern and southern American continents; thirty lines connect the United States with Europe; three span the ocean between South America and the Old World; the Red Sea and the Indian ocean are traversed by lines bringing Asia into communication with Europe; while in the Pacific ocean a series of cables stretches from Siberia southward to Australia and from that continent other lines extend to New Zealand and to New Caledonia. The one link lacking to the completion of the world system of submarine telegraph is that portion of the Pacific extending from America across to Asia. Concerning that link the report says:

"The chief obstacle in the past to the construction of a grand trans-Pacific cable was found in the fact that mid-ocean resting places could not be satisfactorily obtained or arranged for, no single government controlling a sufficient number of suitable landing places to make this seem practicable in view of the belief that the distance through which messages could be sent and cables controlled was limited."

"The results of the Anglo-American war have put the United States in a position to overcome the difficulty of the past. With landing places at Hawaii, Wake Island, Guam and the Philippines, the Americans can lay a cable no section of which would have a length equal to that now in daily operation between France and the United States. The length of the French cable from Brest to Cape Cod is 3250 miles, while the greatest distance from land to land on the proposed Pacific route would be the 2084 miles between San Francisco and Hawaii."

"Along with the extension of ocean cables there has been an extraordinary development and improvement in the methods of their operation. On the first cable across the Atlantic the speed rate was but three words a minute; several hours were required for the transmission of a message and the receipt of a response, and the cost to the sender was \$100 a message. At the present time the speed of transmission averages fifty words a minute, with a higher speed on the automatic transmitters; the price has been diminished to 25 cents per word, and it is noted that a message sent from the House of Representatives in Washington to the House of Parliament in London during the chess match of 1886 was transmitted and a reply received in 13½ seconds."

"Summing up the benefits to be expected by the United States from the construction of a trans-Pacific cable, the report says: 'The commerce of the countries of Asia and Oceania, and to more than \$2,000,000,000 annually, their imports alone averaging more than \$100,000,000 a month. Of this enormous market the United States at present obtains less than 6 per cent. With direct cable communication across the Pacific, direct water communication through the Nicaragua canal, and an increase in the number and capacity of American steamships, it seems not improper to suppose a material addition might be made to the share obtained by the United States in the trade of that part of the world.'"

The Standard Oil Company denies that it is a trust. The owners are but poor, hardworking men who are trying to keep even with the iceman.

Li Hung Chang suggests that the United States might solve the Filipino problem by selling the Islands to Japan. But the United States will solve the problem in her own way without the aid of any foreign prince.

Minister King is a chairman of the Board of Commissioners of Agriculture, and is also head of the Water Works department. As such he exercises general control over the business of both bureaus. It seems to the public to be a simple matter for Chairman King, of the Bureau of Agriculture, to make a deal with Minister King, of the Water Works department, for enough water to save the costly and beautiful verdure of Thomas square from the destruction that now threatens it.

Things are in a bad way at Ponce, Porto Rico. A correspondent states that people are starving to death almost every day in the city and while this sad state of affairs exists there is a failure to afford commercial relief, which is the only true and lasting relief. Unless a permanent government is established, unless the status of the island is determined, and the policy to be followed, in the future is soon outlined, existing conditions will be aggravated, and it will soon be necessary to feed the whole population through relief agents.

The Chinese Government has lodged a protest at Washington against the order of General Otis excluding Chinese from the Philippines. It insists that General Otis' action is contrary to international law, in violation of existing treaties and in complete disregard of the friendly relations which have been so long maintained between the two countries. It is understood that among the specific points of protest submitted by the Chinese Government is one to the effect that such an order is a departure from the announced purpose of the President of the United States to maintain the present status of affairs in the Philippines until Congress has determined a permanent condition. General Otis' order was issued some time ago without direction from Washington, and apparently as a military necessity, although the Chinese protest urges that there is no such military necessity, but on the contrary, that the Chinese have rendered valuable military assistance.

FAST DRIVING.

Every day the danger to life and limb from vehicles in the streets of Honolulu increases. The number of accidents that occur is not nearly so remarkable as the number narrowly averted. It is fast becoming so that in crossing Fort street a man practically takes his life in his own hands. The delightful sensation of dodging a flying hack at one hand to run into another similar peril in front is new to very few people of the city.

It has been suggested that a rule be adopted by the Minister of Interior forbidding any vehicle traversing Fort street at a rate of speed faster than a walk. The objection to this idea is that it does not cover the case. Other streets and centers are crowded also, betimes. The waterfront, Union square and Nuuanu street have been the scenes of several notable accidents quite recently.

The only reasonable, sensible, business-like plan is to get directly after the drivers. At present the punishment for furious or heedless driving is wholly inadequate. A short time ago, in a case of criminal carelessness on the part of a driver, as a result of which Mr. Wilson's arm was broken and his life seriously imperiled, a fine of only \$25 was imposed by the Police Judge. The hackman on this occasion chuckled over the light punishment. Usually, however, the fines for such outrages are less, being \$10 and as low as \$5.

The Minister of Interior is given the authority by the legislature to formulate rules for public conveyances and to prescribe punishment for infractions thereof. To this set of rules, as at present made up, there should be added a rider providing that the license of a driver of any public conveyance shall become void immediately upon his conviction in the courts of furious or heedless driving.

The effect can readily be imagined. The hack-driver will at once see his doom beyond the brink of a court conviction for either of the offenses named (which covers all the public is interested in) and will exercise extreme care to avoid accidents. At the same time the rule will gradually weed out the incompetent drivers of hacks and

drays, a thing most important, and will leave only the reliable element in the business.

The man who ran over Dr. Shaw on Union square, breaking his leg, was before the Police Court this week for violating another carriage rule. The driver who ran over Mr. Wilson in Union street has had two charges of violating carriage regulations preferred against him inside of five days last past. Though convicted and fined for criminal carelessness in his daily business the latter's license is not effected and he remains a menace to the public safety.

Let the rule be inserted: let any license expire immediately upon a regular conviction for carelessness. Of course the driver is not always to blame for an accident. It sometimes occurs that the victim has been careless. But the court invariably get at the facts and its verdict should mark the course of action in handling such matters. The rule proposed would be a protection to the careful, conscientious driver and would eventually give to the public all the protection it requires.

COFFEE REPORT.

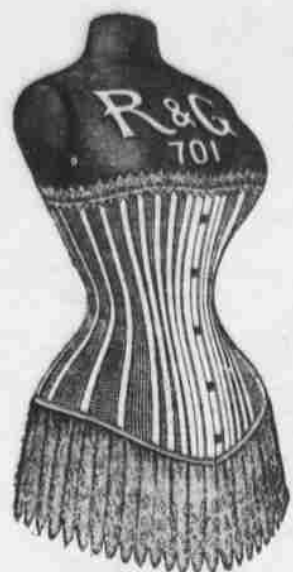

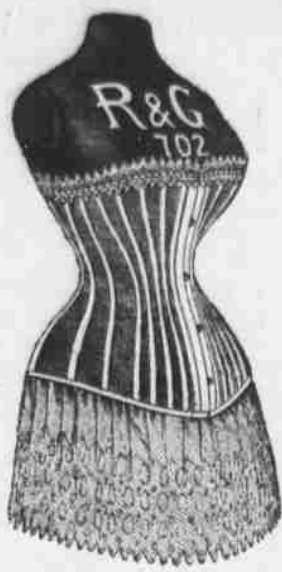

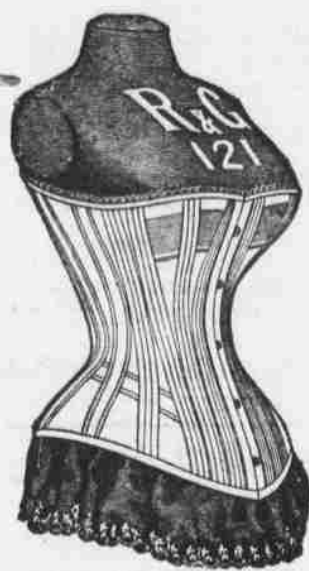

INSPECTION MUST GO ON

HEALTH BOARD LOOKING OUT
FOR SMALLPOX.

Reappearance of Disease at Presidio
Again Causes Alarm—Sailing Vessels
and Troop Ships to be Inspected.

A variety of health reports were brought by the Australia yesterday from San Francisco. The captain's statement was to the effect that there had not been any contagious disease on his vessel in six months and that none such was in the port last left or the vicinity thereof. The ship's regular health report shows that smallpox had broken out at the Presidio and that one whole regiment, the 1st, had been placed in quarantine on Angel Island.

The papers yesterday told of the reappearance of smallpox. There had been three cases but no deaths. The disease seemed to be a mild type. At the time the ailment was identified the Thirty First regiment, in which all the cases had appeared, had taken passage on the Grant for Honolulu and Manila. The transport was immediately taken to Angel Island and the troops landed there. As there are nearly 10,000 men at the Presidio it is believed there will be many more cases.

At yesterday's meeting of the Board of Health the reports referred to and the situation in general was discussed. It was decided to continue the practice of having the port physician board sailing vessels. Troop for Manila will also be carefully examined before landing here.

A letter from the United States Consul asked the authority of the Board of Health for inspecting sailing vessels and prescribing a charge of \$20 each therefor. The reply will be that the course followed is a health measure and the Board does not feel justified at present in discontinuing it. Some alarm was felt yesterday on account of the presence here on the Aztec of several men of the 31st Infantry, the regiment now infected at Angel Island. It is pointed out, however, that the men left their respective regiments at the Presidio fourteen days ago, and the danger period is already past.

DESTROYED BY FIRE.

A Vessel That Was Coming Here For
Sugar.

The American ship George Stetson, Captain Patten, which was expected here in the near future to take a cargo of sugar to New York, was destroyed by fire about two weeks ago off the Loochoo Islands, north of Japan. Captain Patten was on his way to Taku, China, with a load of lumber from Portland and intended to start for Honolulu as soon as his vessel was unloaded. No lives were lost in the fire. The George Stetson was owned in Bath, Maine. She was 232.9 feet long, 41.3 feet broad and 26.3 deep and her capacity was 1709 tons net.

LUMBER IS IN THE WAY

DANGEROUS BLOCKADES ON THE WATERFRONT.

Shippers and Officials Complain of Obstructions to Traffic Caused by Hauling and Piling Wood.

Many complaints are heard among business men and officials on the waterfront regarding the danger and inconvenience caused by the lumber yards at the foot of Fort street. The ordinary traffic is very heavy at this point, but the difficulties of the situation are greatly added to by a score or more of men who are constantly engaged in carrying lumber to and fro, as well as many long lumber carts. Tuesday's fatal accident was caused by a collision of two wagons whose drivers were trying to pick their way amid the confusion of vehicles, lumber piles and laborers.

The lumber yards are situated on government property, leased to local firms and at the time when the leases began Honolulu's waterfront was comparatively quiet. Now the island and foreign trade is large enough to take up every bit of available space and interested parties are clamoring for a cessation of the lumber hauling. The sidewalk from the custom house to the wharf is never open to use, except by those who are willing to risk being struck by long planks or beams of wood.

The heavy imports of lumber are on the increase, so that an even worse state of affairs may be expected. No less than fifteen schooners, carrying millions of feet of lumber, are on their way to this port now and the work of unloading lumber will go on without intermission as fast as facilities will allow.

"The lumber business has come to be a public nuisance," said Port Surveyor Stratemeyer, "and there surely ought to be some arrangement made whereby the streets can be kept open. There are enough wagons from the island and other vessels and hacks with passengers to leave no room to spare in this part of town."

Customs Inspector Neely was struck on the shoulder the other day by a piece of lumber that slipped from the hands of the men carrying it, who were piling it eight or ten feet above the ground. Such a piece of wood falling from the top of the pile and striking a pedestrian on the head would almost certainly cause death. Another small accident occurred on Monday, when a boy was knocked from his wheel. The bicycle was badly smashed.

SEA TELEPHONE WITHOUT WIRES

Professor Russo d'Azara, an Italian, has devised a telephone without wires. His instruments have been tried with success, according to the *Laga Navale*, on the warships at Genoa and Spezia. The general receiver, which is immersed in the water either at the bow or at the stern of a vessel, consists of two greatly flattened cones, separated by a broad ring. The other edge of the ring has eighteen receivers connected with microphones, and each joined to one of eighteen divisions of a dial on deck, nine for port and nine for starboard.

When the receiver for the point northeast to port, for instance, marks the sound from a passing vessel, a white disk shuts off the corresponding compartments of the dial. The outlook then puts his ear to the telephone. If the sound becomes more intense and the disk remains in place, it is a sign that the vessel is still approaching from that direction. If the sound grows fainter and the disk disappears and then shuts off the north northeast compartment, say, and the direction taken by the other vessel can be determined. If the apparatus can work at a distance of five miles, it ought to make collisions in fog or at night inexcusable, and as the sound of waves breaking on the rocks is transmitted just as easily, it should give warning at least of danger from land near at hand.

ROOSEVELT.

The London Daily Chronicle does not quite know how to take Colonel Roosevelt. Evidently it wishes to admire him, but in his talk on the Rough Riders there are some stumbling blocks. "We are all with Colonel Roosevelt when he praises his men; we are less complimentary when he praises himself. We have never before met with such vanity in print from one who was notoriously a brave soldier." The misunderstanding arises from the fact that in England they are used to little affairs like this, and the British officer takes them coolly. As a nation John Bull is used to an individual who is pretty apt to be quiet and modest about his achievements.

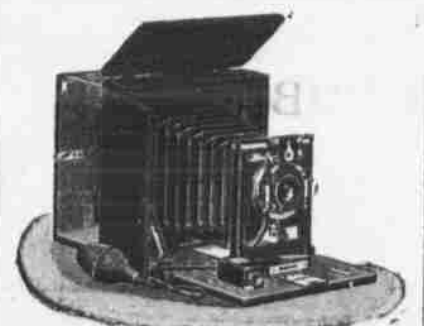

Honolulu, H. I., September 30, 1899.

Gentlemen: Salicylic Acid has been declared by the Board of Health to be deleterious substance, when mixed with any article of food or drink, and such injurious to health.

The sale of any article of food or drink containing Salicylic Acid is prohibited.

The brands of Tomato Catsup or Ketchup and Bottled Beers named in the following schedule contain Salicylic Acid, and the sale of such after date of this notice will render you liable to prosecution under Act 34, Session Laws of 1899.

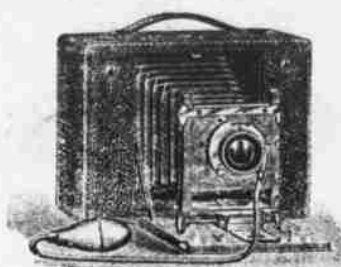

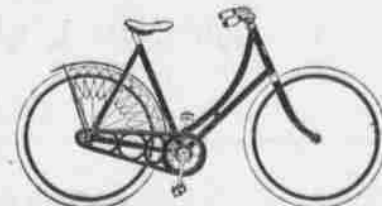
