BISHOP ESTATE REPORT

CONDITION OF KAMEHAMEHA SCHOOLS LAST YEAR.

Various Matters Connected with the Trust—Annual Account and Report of the Museum.

The trustees of the estate of the late Mrs. Bernice P. Bishop have filed their annual report. They have complied with the Court's directions last year, in paying off the overdraft with Bishop & Co., and accounting for surecharged commission. The death of a native woman, Naakahi, has relieved the Estate of the payment of \$300 annuity under the will. The only changes in the capital account have been the sale of Keoua Hale to the Government for the purposes of a High School for \$30,000, the money being required toward the liquidation of the indebtedness to Bishop & Co., and the relinquishment of the Trustees' claim to the ahupua'a of Pahoa, Lahaina, which had turned out not to belong to the Estate. Particular are given of different operations in the line of improvements.

The Kamehameha Schools are reported to have been maintained throughout another year with good results. The opening of the school year was somewhat deranged by the outbreak of cholera, and the attendance at the schools interfered with. The attendance at the Boys' School has been larger than for two years past, particularly in the Preparatory Department. There have been received at the Manual Department 115 pupils, with an average attendance of 110. The attendance at the Preparatory has been 60, all that the building will accommodate. At the Girls' School there have been 66 pupils received during the year, and the close of the year shows an enrolment of 63.

The Normal Class work of both schools has been kept up to a high standard, but the attendance at the Manual has been only five at the close of the year. The teachers graduated from the Normal Class have given a good account of themselves, and their services have the approbation of the Inspector General of Schools.

The health of the scholars has been very good, notwithstanding an epidemic of measles. With regard to the latter the hospital was useful in keeping the epidemic within bounds, as only 34 cases required attention out of the 241 pupils attending the schools.

Another teacher is to be added to the Girls' School staff. A cottage will be built for teachers of the Manual. Hon. C. R. Bishop has contributed funds for the erection of a stone chapel, for the pupils of both schools, and the foundations of the building are laid.

The annual account of the Trustees under the will of Mrs. B. P. Bishop exhibits receipts of \$148,880.88, payments \$139,913.30, balance cash on hand \$8967.58.

The annual account of the Bernice Pauahi Museum Trust shows \$13,282.92 of receipts, \$12,985.22 of expenditures and balance of \$297.70. There is a debit balance from last account of \$1959.20.

In their report on the Museum the Trustees refer to the tour of Curator Brigham round the world "with the view of seeing what Hawaiian antiquities there may be in other museums, securing such articles as would be essential in making more complete our exhibit of Polynesian ethnology, and arranging for a series of exchanges with the various museums and ethnological societies of the world."

Arrangements have been made with the British Museum and the British Association by which the Bishop Museum shares in the collection of birds and insects that is being made on these is-

lands by R. C. L. Perkins for those institutions. All the expense of these arrangements has been borne by Mr. Bishop. To him the Museum is also indebted for the addition of over 1500 specimens to an herbarium, including twenty and more new species now first brought to the notice of students of botany.

The number of visitors to the Museum has been very large, especially from two classes—the Chinese with their wives and children and public school teachers with their classes. These latter have found a wide field for advancement in intelligent information in regard to this island world of the Pacific, and for special exercises in language in writing their descriptions of what they have seen and admired.

THE PINEAPPLE CANNERY.

Description of the Handsome Label Used on Its Products.

The pineapple cannery at Emmeluth and Kidwell's plantation is running full blast and expects to turn out a pack of from four to five thousand cases of strictly first class goods this season. The new label designed by the Schmidt Label and Lithographing Company of San Francisco is artistically gotten up, showing a view of Diamond Head with a group of cocoanut palms in the foreground. Across the face of the label is a reproduction of a large pineapple, the whole being in dainty colors. The management has resolved to pack only the highest grade of canned fruit and thus obtain and maintain a reputation for the Hawaiian product. The first shipment of the season, consisting of 1000 cases, will go forward to San Francisco shortly.

DEPARTURE OF COUNT MUTSU.

With the Countess He will Leave by the China.

Count Mutsu, the distinguished Japanese statesman, and the Countess will leave for home by the steamer China now nearly due. The Count has found considerable benefit from the sea voyage and his few weeks' stay in Honolulu, but is not a well man by any means. His trouble is of a pulmonary nature. It is to be hoped that the homeward voyage will further help him. The Count is a good sailor. Countess Mutsu, it is recorded with extreme regret, is also ailing. She was very ill yesterday. Count Mutsu, it is ascertained, is much pleased with this country and its climate. His visit will be remembered with pleasure, there is little doubt, by the President and members of the Cabinet.

Funeral of Phil. Braun.

A few of the immediate friends of the late Phil. Braun and his loving wife accompanied the body from the house to St. Andrew's Cathedral yesterday afternoon. The pall-bearers, who were all comrades of the deceased in the late volunteer fire department, rode in a wagonette to the church and afterward to Nuanu cemetery. Rev. Alex. Mackintosh conducted the services in a sympathetic manner. Wray Taylor, organist, played low solemn music as the body was borne up the aisle. "Nearer my God to Thee" was sung in the church, and Mr. Mackintosh recited "Just as I am" at the grave. Interment was in the volunteer fire department's lot, which is marked by a tall marble shaft in the middle. The casket was a handsome one heavily trimmed in black with silk fringe festoons and mounted with silver. On a silver name plate was the following inscription: "Ernst Otto Phil. Braun, born at Kassel, Germany, July 25, 1842. Died at Honolulu, August 2, 1896."

EXCITING FIRE ALARM.

ACCIDENT TO THE TEAM OF NO. 2 HORSE CART.

One of the Horses Breaks a Leg and Has to be Shot—Little Damage From the Fire.

An incipient blaze, which was nipped in the bud by the firemen, occurred on Maunakea street, near the corner of Queen, at five minutes before noon today, in a two story wooden shanty, occupied as sleeping apartments above and below as a small grain warehouse and fish store. The premises are owned by Lam Toi Kee, and the rooms above occupied by three Chinese, while Tom Choy runs the fish emporium.

The fire originated in a pile of matting and clothing in the upper story, and is supposed to have been started from some one smoking. A hole was burned through the floor and a small amount of clothing scorched, the damage being very slight.

While on the way to the fire No. 2 horse wagon met with a disaster. At the corner of Nuuanu and Hotel streets, in attempting to make the turn nakai, the wagon had gained so much headway that the off horse, a large, handsome bay, ran into the telephone pole at the Cosmopolitan saloon corner, breaking his leg. Dr. Shaw was called and, after examining the animal, decided that it should be shot, which was immediately done.

Police Court Items.

In the District Court this morning the case of Henry Dole, accused of obstructing an officer in the performance of his duties, was set for trial on the 7th, at the request of the defendant.

Ah Kai was fined \$50 for having opium in possession.

Ah Tong pleaded guilty of having a chefa ticket in his possession and was fined \$20 and costs.

The preliminary examination of Yong Yee and Tong Tak on a charge of burglary was completed yesterday. The defendants were discharged, the evidence not being sufficient to connect them with the offense.

Juan Boaries, arrested for the larceny of fruit from George Carter's place, has been discharged from custody, his case having been nolle prosequ'd.

THE STEAMSHIP CHINA

BROKE TWO RECORDS ON HER LAST TRIP TO THE COAST.

Averaged Sixteen Knots Between Honolulu and San Francisco—Chief Steward Goodchild a Passenger.

The Pacific Mail Steamship Company's China, which is off port this afternoon, broke two records on her last trip, viz.: the fastest record on the voyage from Honolulu to San Francisco and the record from Yokohama to San Francisco. In October, 1895, she made the run from Honolulu to San Francisco in 5 days, 13 hours and 19 minutes, which established a new record. On her last trip she completed the same journey in 5 days, 11 hours and 11 minutes, thus beating her own record by 2 hours and 8 minutes. The steamer's performance was a splendid one, as she averaged 15 knots an hour between Yokohama and Honolulu, and 16 knots an hour between Honolulu and San Francisco.

The China left Honolulu on the 13th ult. at 6:22 p. m. During the succeeding eighteen hours she covered 288 knots. The next day she made 376 knots, the next 368, the next 376, the next 370, and at 8:04 a. m. on the 19th she finished her course of 2094 nautical miles. The steamer's time from Yokohama was 15 days 15 hours and 29 minutes, which establishes another record from that port, and from Hongkong 24 days 7 hours and 6 minutes.

In conversation with one of her engineers on a previous trip a BULLETIN reporter was informed that the big liner has never yet been opened out to her full steaming capacity, and all of her boilers have never yet been in use at one time. The statement was made that the China could average seventeen knots an hour, day in and day out, whenever competition made it necessary. Of course the increased coal consumption is an item of expense that the company desires to save as long as possible.

Chief Steward Goodchild will be a passenger and a gentleman of leisure this trip, as he is going to quit steamboating. He is one of the most popular men in his line, and in consequence has received many flattering offers. On his last trip he was tendered the management of the Hongkong Hotel, and at once accepted it. He will take up his new duties on the arrival of the China at Hongkong.

Fleeing Sensation.

M. S. Levy, the Fort-street dry goods merchant, worn out by long bearing of arms against outrageous business fortune, retired on Monday to Kalih for rest. He did not tell his family or store assistants where he was going, and there was some anxiety yesterday over his absence. In the evening his whereabouts were ascertained and the police brought him to town and home. He seemed to be somewhat dazed over his business troubles. The store was attached by the principal creditors in his absence, and a policeman placed on guard at the door. One of the evening papers was kind enough to suggest that Mr. Levy had committed suicide, while another one had little doubt that he had skipped out on the strange bark Petitediac, that called off port for medical attendance on the captain. Mr. Levy had made a brave attempt to keep his head above water in business, and deserves as he doubtless will receive the sympathy of the community in his failure.

TANK STEAMERS FOR BEER.

A New Scheme for Shipping the Beverage to Europe.

Baltimore capitalists are considering a proposition to construct a tank steamer in which beer can be shipped to England and other European countries. The project is regarded as feasible, and plans are being made for a suitable vessel.

The ship will have a complete refrigerating plant on board, and the beer will be kept at a low temperature during the voyage. On arrival at port it will be removed to suitable vats near the wharves by means of pipes. As it will be kept cold until it is sold, the brewers are confident that they can compete with the European beer, which is always warm when it is sold.

Secretary Olney will be asked to see if arrangements can be made with foreign governments which will allow the sale of American beer, and it is stated that plenty of European capital can be secured for the enterprise if it proves to be successful after an experiment on a small scale.—New York World.

Herr Seeth's Lion.

The feat with which Jules Seeth, the lion tamer of the Circus Schumann, now showing at the Industrial Exposition in Berlin, winds up every performance beats anything yet shown in this line. 

FATEFUL DISCUSSION.

An amusing controversy is in progress between the Advertiser and the Hilo Tribune, over the question of the future capital of the islands. The Tribune claims that the island of Hawaii has furnished the means for making and keeping Honolulu the capital, and in the near future will turn its stream of wealth into its own town of Hilo and make it the metropolis, political as well as commercial, of the group. This threat apparently alarms the Advertiser and it valiantly springs into the breach to save Honolulu. In the meantime Hilo is growing, and Honolulu grows too. This island of Oahu has not reached the full development of its resources by any means. In the matter of sugar alone, Oahu bids fair to produce as much, before many years, as the whole group has lately done. Other industries on this island are also forging ahead. Even with the projected harbor enlargement at Honolulu, there is a possibility that in a few years commerce will overcrowd the port. Direct shipments of the products of the island of Hawaii, consequent upon the making of a good harbor at Hilo, are not likely ever to make Honolulu harbor deserted or even to dwarf its commerce. Hilo ought to have what it asks

and more too, but justice to that town will not be hastened by nonsensical brag, in advance of obtaining its dues, about doing up Honolulu. On the other hand, opposition from Hilo harbor is extremely shortsighted and narrowminded from a national viewpoint. What will benefit Hilo and the island of Hawaii will inure to the common welfare and progress of the nation. There is not the least doubt that with direct steam communication between Hilo and the Pacific Coast diversified industries on the island of Hawaii would develop by leaps and bounds. Tourist travel would also be stimulated and that without diminishing, but on the contrary increasing, the flow of tourists to Honolulu. The revenues of the nation would increase in magical progression from all sources. There is indeed no argument in favor of hurrying forward a complete system of roads for Hawaii which will not apply to the enhancement of commercial facilities at Hilo. Let the whole country be developed as evenly as possible between its different sections. Sectional and jealous bickering between Honolulu and Hilo should receive no countenance from any who have the good of the commonwealth at heart. It is not only ridiculous but obstructive to national progress.

There is a request from Hilo for Sunday band concerts at Coconut Island. Since the Government gives Sunday band concerts at Honolulu, it cannot refuse permission for Hilo to listen to Hilo's own band on Sunday.

Speaker Reed has got over his jilt, abandoning the intention to retire from public life. He will not only try for Congress again, but lead the campaign for McKinley in Maine. The retirement of so able a statesman and legislator would be a national calamity. Knowing ones hold that his decision to remain in public life will place him in line for the Republican presidential nomination in 1900. He is also slated for Secretary of State if McKinley is elected.

One of the pleasing features of the large increase of Pacific steam traffic looking into Honolulu, which has developed within recent years, is the visiting of statesmen of countries washed by this ocean to other countries within the same vast bounds. It tends to create an inter-oceanic community of interest which bodes well for at least the prevention of international misunderstandings between countries that growing commerce brings more and more into neighborly relations.

Timely Topics

—ON THE—
DEMOCRATIC PARTY AND
THE AERMOTOR
WINDMILL.

The singular situation of the Democratic party at this time is aptly illustrated by the story of two Irishmen who occupied berths in a sleeping car on one of the great American railway lines. A collision took place in the night and confusion ensued. Both men dressed hastily, and when they emerged from behind the curtains, Pat, recognizing his friend Mike, said to him, "Mike, are you hurt?" "No," said Mike, who in his haste to dress had gotten into his trousers with the hind part before, "I am not hurt, but am fatally twisted." The Democratic party, it is almost needless to remark, is like unto Mike, "fatally twisted."

Instead of being twisted in a railway collision, however, Democracy seems to have been twisted by wind. Whether some remnants of the recent St. Louis tornado hovered around the Chicago convention or whether it was simply a tornado issuing from the mouth of the "Boy Orator of the Platte" certain it is that windy eloquence carried the day in the Democratic convention, and from all accounts the campaign will have to be carried through on wind, as the banks refuse to let the Democrats have any gold to run it with.

If the windy eloquence of a boy orator can force a Presidential nomination in favor of an almost unknown candidate, what must be the power of old Boreas himself when he turns loose a consignment of the real article. We have seen it in the almost total destruction of a portion of the city of St. Louis and we have seen it take a "twist" through Kapiolani Park just to show the people of these islands that we are not entirely forgotten.

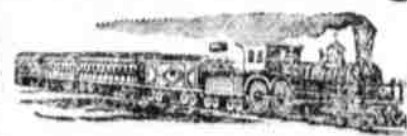

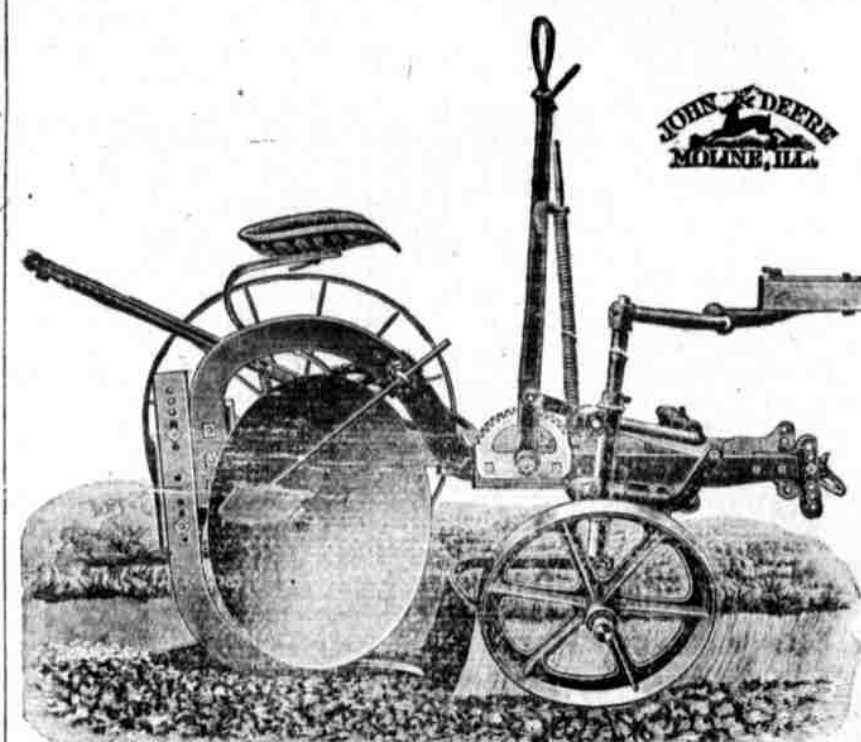

Branded Pineapple.

Branded pineapple does not require to be cooked and is exceedingly nice to serve with ice creams, custards or corn-starch puddings. After peeling the pines and removing the eyes begin at the stem end, and with a silver fork pick the fruit from the core. Take self sealing jars and pack them with the picked pineapple and granulated sugar, allowing as much sugar as you have fruit. Pour very slowly over them white brandy until the jars are filled. Screw the covers down tight and keep the jars in a dark place. If one does not wish to use so much brandy, the fruit can be prepared thus: After picking the pineapples into pieces, for every pound of fruit take a pound of granulated sugar. Put them in alternate layers in an open mouth stone jar or porcelain kettle. Cover and stand in a cool place over night. In the morning put the fruit in jars and fill with the sirup, letting the jars overflow to remove all the air. Add a tablespoonful of sherry to every quart jar. Before filling the jars stand them with the tops down in hot water; keep the lids and rubbers also in water. Keep the filled jars in a dark, cool place.

IN MY LADY'S CHAMBER.

New and Artistic Bedspreads—Summer Blankets and Mattress Pads.

The first object of importance in a bedroom is the bed. If this is comfortable, properly made and prettily draped, the rest of the room is easily managed. With a view to being helpful in this matter, a writer in the New York Herald offers these suggestions: If you can drape your bed irrespective of cost, there is nothing handsomer than renaissance lace on brussels net. If your soul yearns for embroidery, there are heavy linen hand embroidered and hemstitched spreads, with drawn work insertion, richly embroidered in raised satin stitch, in cotton, white or colors.

The old Marseilles quilt, which has held undisputed sway, has now a rival in the patent sateen embroidered spreads. These show a sateen finished face, with heavily raised border and sprays in floral effects closely resembling hand embroidery, in heavy raised satin stitch. You may pay for them anything from \$2.50 all the way up to \$25. But when you have reached \$10, they are embroidered by hand. The sateen spreads are also shown with a deep border in a raised design, then a floral border in colors, dogwood or wild roses in daintiest shades, and more of the raised effect, with the center covered with sprays in the design of the border. This printing is hand stamped and in absolutely fast colors. The beauty of any of these spreads is greatly enhanced by a deep fall of lace, which is sewed on by hand. This may be of heavy torchon, antique or renaissance, according to the quality of the spread.

For summer use, and more especially for one's cottage in the country, the ariel spreads of light, figured dimity are to be recommended. For trimming these comes a pretty cotton vandylee fringe. The whole thing is suggestive of sweetness and country scents and lavender sheets.

Summer blankets of a lightness as to weight that would scarce embarrass a fairy are shown in colors to suit the furnishings of any room, and instead of being left double, to the dismay of the unwary sleeper, for whose discomfort they are always put on wrong end up, they are cut in two and handsomely bound with satin ribbon in white or colors.

Mattress pads in all sizes are shown. They are light and easily washed and a great improvement on the muslin cases with which neat housewives have heretofore enveloped their mattresses.

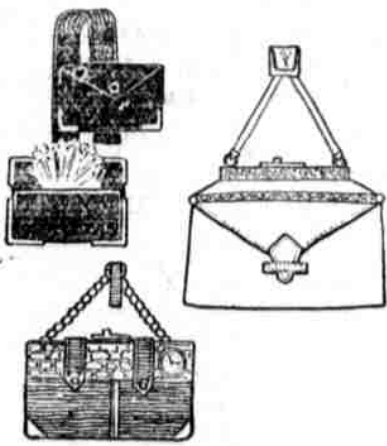
Lemon Cake.

Cream together 2 cupfuls of sugar and a cupful of butter; add two-thirds of a cupful of milk; then the stiffly beaten whites of 6 eggs, and 4 level cupfuls of flour in which 2 teaspoonfuls of baking powder are mixed; flavor with 2 teaspoonfuls of the extract of lemon. One-half of this recipe makes a nice cake.

Frosting for this cake is made with the stiffly beaten white of an egg made thick with frosting sugar; add the yolk of an egg to color the frosting yellow. Flavor with lemon.

Purses and Bags.

The shops are full of convenient contrivances in way of purses and bags for women shoppers and women who ride a bicycle. No woman will be fully equipped without one of these useful and pretty things. They are made of leather, chosen for its durability rather than beauty, although many of them are very handsome. The New York Herald illustrates several styles. A double pocket,



made with strap long enough to slip through the belt and having one bag higher than the other, is a most convenient one, as the smaller is used as a change purse, the other for handkerchiefs, cards, keys and other small necessities. Morocco, calfskin, alligator and monkey skins are fashionable just at present, the latter skin being very much the rage for bags, and is very handsome. A monkey skin bag, silver mounted, with a watch in one end, will cost \$8 or \$10. Others may be bought for prices which vary from \$2.50 to \$5.
