DINNER WITH DAN INFORMATI

The following information is intended to be of assistance to you in insuring that you make the first scheduled event in Dan Inouye's 1974 re-election campaign a complete success.

PURPOSE

Dan Inouye boasts of being a professional politician. He is proud of politics because politics is, at the very least, resolving in public the people's problems.

Our government can only be as good as its elective representatives.
