In every numbred dollars' worth of shoes, thirty-seven dol-lars have been paid out as wages in the manufac-ture of the article: in the same value of crockery, the workman has received forty dollars: in woolen cloth, sixty out of the hundred have been pa d out as wages: in entlery, sixty-five dollars: while of liquors the proportion is only three dollars in every hundred!



Foreign News Items.

United States—Pacific Coast.

The estimate of the total loss by the fire on the steamer City of Sydney is estimated by the Marine Adjuster at \$3,000, of which \$30,000 is on the cargo and \$5,000 on the vessel. The report of the inspectors says: The testimony taken in this case shows beyond doubt that the fire originated in the freight on board consigned for Honolulu and stored in the steerage deck forward; and we have taken evidence, particularly, to find out the cause of the fire, but said evidence has not enabled us to ascertain its true source. The evidence in this case shows that there were shipped for Honolulu two cases of oil clothing, said cases having only holes bored in them to admit air, and, according to the testimony of those who manufacture oil clothing, it will ignite in a short time when packed freshly oiled, and is, therefore, liable to spontaneous combustion. From the evidence given in this case we also find that opium was found in the debris without having been regularly shipped, and from this it is inferable there might have been other articles of combustible nature shipped unknown to the agents or officers of the ship. We are, therefore, unable to decide positively what was the true source of the fire, although the evidence points strongly to the cases of oil clothing, as one of the cases was wholly destroyed.

It proposes to restore to the Government 106,500,000 acres of public lands heretofore granted to the Southern Pacific, Northern Pacific, and Atlantic and Pacific railways, and from their sale at an average of \$2 per ways, and from their sale at an average of \$2 per acre, to realize \$213,000,000, to be constituted a public improvement fund, from which loans are to be made to these railroads upon certain prescribed conditions. Provision is made not to interfere with homestead entry and at the same time to deal with firstless and same time to deal with firstless and same time.

He is essaying to carry water on both shoulders. He is essaying to carry water on both she He is desirous of securing the approval of the Cali-fornia people and at the same time preserving our commercial relations with China. The thing can-not be done. California's approval is only to be had by expelling the Chinese from the Pacific Coast and by expening the Camese from the Pacific Coast altogether, and if that expulsion is permitted by the Government we may as well abandon all ex-pectations of preserving our "commercial rela-tions" with them in their own country. The in-terests of the whole country are paramount to the race prejudices of California, and paramount also to whatever political or rartism consideration to whatever political or partisan considerations are entering into the controversy in connection with the Presidential election.

Central and South America. Central and South America.

The Panama Railroud people are concerned about the railway across the Isthmus of Tehnantepee, for the construction of which a company has been organized, with a grant of land from the Mexican Government. The line will be about 130 miles long. It will have the advantage of a terminal Pacific point 1250 miles nearer San Francisco than Panama, while its eastern terminus will be no further from New York than is Aspinwall, and about 700 miles nearer New Orleans. This enterprise may affect seriously both the Panama and the Nicaragua Canal projects.

The South American war is developing a race of naval heroes. Recent advices from rero sale was that the Housear, the lively Chilean ironeiad, was bombarding the Peruvian town of Arica and making things very unpleasant for the inhabitants. Now comes the news that the corrette Union, probaby assisted by the monitor Mance Coper, has driven off the Chilean ironclads and a transport, and has landed supplies for the besteged fown. The fight, it is reported lasted seven hours. There will doubtless be a good chance for promotions again among the subaltern officers of the Hussour.

British India.

The London Times, referring to the situation in Afghanistan, says: In India, as here, something like an interregaum must prevail until the impending changes have been made. Lord Lytton, viceroy, has been so identified with the present Government, and was so fully committed to its plans, that his prolonged tenure of office is as little possible, as it is desirable. The only doubt is whether he will wait to be called, or will anticipate by his own act a result he can scarcely hope to avoid. The name of Lord Northbrook, former ly Governor-General of India, suggests itself as Lord Lytton's successor, but Lord Northbrook does not wish to return to his old post. There is less room for doubt regarding instructions that the new Viceroy will take with him.

Peace will be made with a least possible dis-British India.

Peace will be made with a least possible dis-turbance of our normal relations with Afghanistan. If our lines must at any point be advanced: if, as is likely, there must be some annexation of terri-tory. What is done will be done with the sole view to the safety of India. We shall hear no more of the projected session of Herat to Persia, and of the entaugling alliance which must have attended it.



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
