BRIEF OF MR. KINNEY ON THE VALIDITY OF RECEIPTS GIVEN BY B. R. BAN-NING TO W. F. ALLEN FOR ONE-

HALF OF THE ESTATE. Ist. As to the law. We contend that where a trustee seeks to avoid liability by setting up release or acquiescence on the part of his beneficiary it is incum-bent upon him to show affirmatively that the beneficiary when giving the release was fully and fairly informed of all the facts and circumstances bearing upon the subject-matter of the release and was

premises See 2 Pomeroy, Sec. 1083, p. 650, note. Also, 7 Chitty Equity, p. 7061, 74 N. Y. 553, 40 N. Y. 77,

1 Perry, p. 588, and cases there cited. In King vs. Talbot, 74 N. Y., p. 589, where the trustees sought to set up acquiescence and release by the beneficiary in defense of an improper invest-ment made by them, the Court says "Such acquiescence or assent to relieve the trustees could only avail when given after a full knowledge of all the facts and a full understanding of all the benefi-ciary's own rights in the matter. Any as sent given in the absence of such full

knowledge and understanding was of no effect. In the light if the Court adopts the above principles of law as correct, we abmit that the receipt interposed by Mr. Alien cannot possibly avail. In the first place from Mr. Alien's own evidence it is clear that Banning did not know the true condition of the securities he was accepting from Mr Allen and for which he gave the receipt in question. It is undisputed that Mr. Allen several times assured Mr. Banning that all of the secu-rities in question, barring the Union Iron Works bonds and the Scattle bonds, were good. This representation is proven to be incorrect beyond all question. At the very time the representation was made certain of the securities had no market value. This Mr. Allen admits the only contention on Mr. Allen's behalf being that while the securities were not then marketable be believed that they would wentually prove good. If that was what Mr. Allen meant it is what he should have said. Certainly it cannot be seri-ously contended that the facts were fully and fairly laid before Mr. Banning or he was apprised of his legal rights at the time of signing the receipt.

2d. Again, the receipt should be set aside on the ground that Mr. Banning at i to the time of giving the same believed that the securities he was receiving from Mr. Allen and for which he gave the receipt had all been passed upon by the Probate Court, and that this belief was induced by Mr. Allen's own conduct. As a matter of fact the Court was in total ignor ance of the investments that Mr. Allen had made, nor had he ever given the Court a statement of them. It is hardly to be supposed that Banning would have accepted these securities so unquestion ingly if he had believed for one moment that they had not received the sanction and approval of the Court.

G., whose members are claimed to be honorable men.

It was probably only a case of the ostrich hiding its head in the sand, for no fact is more notorious than that the League's campaign is, most of

ANOTHER ROMANIICIST.

Dr. M. E. Grossman, a tooth puller of Honolula, has joined the imaginative school of Hawaiian revolutionary literature. She left Honolulu but did not go to Mani. Instead, she steamed up and down a couple of hours in front of Honolulu hariage. The erew were all the time going through gun drill and taking sights on all the Provisional Government buildings where troops were stationed, aumunition stored and public offices establish d. The Champion then steamed a little further out and had some shell practice, returning to the harbor late in the day, but not a man from either the British or United States ships was allowed to go on shore.

"H. M. S. Champion is preparing to hoist the British ensign over Hawaii. It is the intention that as soon as the Queen is restored by United States troops and they may retire, the Queen is to appeal to the British Minister, Major Wodehouse, for pro-tection. They do not contain a trace of fact beyond that there is a British warship here called the Champion, and that she did go out of the harbor about the time menioned for shell practice. 




