NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—The *Herald's* Tallahassee special says: It is reported that the Senate Committee is preparing to meet in Jacksonville, Fla., on Dec. 20, to discuss the proposed amendments to the election law, and is discussing the question of making a list of soldiers along for protection, it being stated that the committee felt that it could not afford to leave a large number of soldiers in the city to leave a safe to trust themselves without such protection.
