LATEST NEWS ITEMIZED.

The State of Pennsylvania has provided for the payment of the last dollar of its debt in 1912 through the operation of a sinking fund, for which provision was made before the war.

The "big tree" that California will send to Chicago measures eighty-seven feet, nine inches in circumference at the base, and sixty-five feet at a height of sixteen feet above the ground.

The New York Sun publishes a story showing that Police Inspector Black was a blackmailer, and the probability that Day and Egan, who were convicted on his evidence, were innocent.

Dr. Emil Dorn, a London scientific writer, will start out in a few days on a tramp across the Continent, leaving New York for San Francisco. The tramp will be undertaken in the interest of science.

Editor Pulitzer of the New York World secured the long-sought Park Row and Ann streets property, about one thousand three hundred square feet, for \$208,000—at public auction—less than he had offered.

The colored military Tennessee rifles company of Memphis disbanded as a result of the action of Judge Dubose in ordering the arms of the company confiscated during the excitement following the lynching of the three negroes lately.

Sam Jones has been preaching at Breunham, Texas, and has got into trouble by adding to his old repertoire a discourse on Texas politics in favor of Hogg, present incumbent, and opposing Clark, who would like to succeed Governor Hogg.

AN ANGRY MEXICAN.

A few weeks ago in the City of Mexico, El Tiempo, the newspaper organ of the Catholic clergy in Mexico, opened a register to inscribe the names of all the Mexican patriots who are opposed to the return of the flags taken by the Americans during the Mexican war, and publishes each day the names received for inscription. In its last issue appears the following, which is signed by Louis Alfonso Munoz, minister:

"As a Catholic and Mexican I protest against the insult which the hated and grasping Yankee offers to my adored country by the return of our flags, which were taken from us very much as the thief or assassin robs the wayfarer of his belongings. My faith, my nationality and Latin blood all compel me to cry out, 'Long live independent Mexico, death to the thieving Yankee; down with the hated flag of the Stars and Stripes!'"

The Australian ballot law is enthusiastically declared by the Examiner to have been a success in California. Its success wherever adopted in the United States should be an argument in favor of its retention here, only our law requires some amendments to secure its smoother working.

California has displayed its live interest in the Nicaragua Canal in a most effective manner. A convention held in San Francisco on the subject has resulted in a call by Governor Markham of a national convention, to be held at the central city of St. Louis. It is a wise precaution that has been taken of having the convention non-partisan, by having the delegates to it equally divided between the two parties. Great hopes may be entertained of practical results following the holding of the national convention.

CUSTOMS CULLINGS.

In his annual report the Collector-General of Customs says: "In view of the McKinley Bill, which will cause a large decrease in our imports and exports, would it not be advisable to increase the duties on a few articles of merchandise? More particularly on spirits, and all Chinese clothing, provisions and sundry merchandise now coming in at ten percent ad valorem, as recommended to Your Excellency in a communication under date of February 12th of this year." If duties be raised on the articles mentioned and others that may be found appropriate objects for increased taxation, perhaps the Legislature may see the way clear to abolition of the duties on printing machinery, type and ink.

The printing industry is a large one here comparatively speaking. It gives employment at good wages to a large number of persons, while open to no small competition from the printers and lithographers of the Coast. While the revenue derived from presses, type and ink each year is but a trifle to the treasury, it is a severe tax on a newspaper or job office that puts in new equipments. The tax is a burden on the cause of public intelligence as well as on a valuable home industry.

The Collector-General draws attention to "the lack of wharfage, which is becoming more apparent every day," saying that with the entrance of the harbor deepened for the admission of large steamers, it is absolutely necessary that wharfage be provided. He suggests that "a great deal of accommodation might be afforded for the smaller vessels by the removal of the present market, and the repairing and extension of the wharves in that portion of the harbor." As the Interior Department also has wharf extension in view in connection with the deepening of the channel, the Legislature will doubtless not be left without something tangible on which to deliberate in this important matter.

The erection is recommended of detached kerosene warehouses for the storage of oil, to be built entirely of corrugated iron, so that in case of fire only one building would be burned or destroyed. At present, since the destruction of the warehouses by fire last summer, the Government is losing considerable revenue from the lack of sufficient storage.

A recommendation of the appointment of a board of examiners, for passing on the qualifications of officers commanding our foreign and domestic vessels, and of a board for the examination of the qualifications of pilots, is referred to by a correspondent in this paper. As there are 51 vessels on the Hawaiian registry, it would seem to be necessary to have such precautions taken, as those recommended, for the proper regulation of our home and foreign mercantile marine.

COFFEE AND TEA.

At the meeting of the Hawaiian Coffee and Tea Company to-day, Mr. Tom May, president, gave a gratifying report of a visit of inspection he had paid to the coffee plantation in Kona. It was not expected that planting would begin before June, but the occurrence of exceptionally favorable weather induced Mr. Miller the manager to begin earlier. There are over 30 acres set out with young plants from the nursery. Not one of the plants is dying, although the usual expectation of death is 10 percent. A specimen of the growing coffee is exhibited in a window of E. O. Hall & Son's store. The annual meeting of the company will be held in a few days, when a full exhibit of its status in every respect will be made.

BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

EDITOR BULLETIN:

The Collector-General of Customs in his annual report recommends that a board of examiners be established for passing on the qualifications of officers commanding our domestic and foreign vessels; also, one for examination of the qualifications of pilots in the ports of the Kingdom.

This is what should have been done years ago. A law should be passed at the coming session of the Legislature covering the recommendations of the Collector-General, and also one providing that our inter-island vessels be properly officered and provisioned. How many of our inter-island captains are navigators? It has frequently happened that when there has been occasion to send one of our island fleet out of sight of land, her captain has had to be replaced for the voyage by one who knew enough to find his way back. There is a rumor current that the I. S. N. Co. have discharged the second officers of all their steamers with the exception of the W. G. Hall and Mikahala. Any one who has traveled around these islands on steamers knows that there is work enough for the first and second officers; with some vessels it is work day and night from the time port is left until their return, and any reduction such as the one contemplated would only impose additional hardship on the remaining responsible persons, to the increased danger to valuable lives and property entrusted to their care. It is a well-known fact that the arduous duties of seafaring men demand more time for sleep and rest than those of persons employed on land, and if they are compelled to do double service while at sea it stands to reason that they cannot exercise their full faculties in times of danger if they are deprived of their necessary rest by a lack of capable assistants. In justice to those who travel from place to place in the group a law should be passed compelling every company carrying passengers to employ competent navigators, and an examining board should be provided as is done in every other nation in the world. It is to be hoped the coming Legislature will take the hint.

THE WHALEBACK.

The whaleback Charles W. Wetmore is at Main-street wharf, and was visited by a large number of shipping masters and nautical amateurs yesterday. She will leave in about three days' time for Port Townsend. Captain O'Brien, who commands her, was formerly of the steamer Premier on Puget Sound, and is one of the best known navigators on the coast. He was at one time owner of the Alden Besse. The Wetmore will go up in ballast and will take down a cargo of coal from Port Townsend to San Diego.—S. F. Call, April 13.

THE LARGEST SHIP.

The sailing ship Maria Rickmers, which was launched some time since by Russell & Co., Port Glasgow, is the largest sailing ship in the world. Besides having five masts she is provided with auxiliary steam power, which will enable her to make progress even when there is not sufficient wind to fill her vast sails. The vessel has been built for Messrs. Rickmers of Bremen and is of steel. Her dimensions are: Length, 375 feet; breadth, 48 feet; depth, 28 feet 4 1/2 inches. Her tonnage is 3813 tons gross and she will carry 5700 tons dead weight on Lloyd's freeboard. She will be supplied with triple expansion engines of 650 limited horsepower, with 160 pounds working pressure; cylinders to be of 16, 26 and 42 inch by 27-inch stroke. The propeller will be of Bevis patent feathering gun metal, and it is calculated that a speed of from six to seven knots an hour will be attained in calm weather with the vessel fairly loaded. Her spread of canvas will be enormous. The vessel will have several special features of construction to distinguish her from the ordinary type of first-class sailing ships. She will be fitted to carry a large quantity of water ballast in a suitably subdivided double bottom. For facilitating loading and discharge of cargo, she will have three steam winches, steam donkey boiler and steam windlass, besides a fan engine to ventilate her cargo. She will be employed, along with the large fleet already owned by the Messrs. Rickmers, in the East India trade, and her movements will be watched with considerable interest in commercial and shipping circles.

PROBABLY A SMUGGLER.

Victoria, April 12.—The San Francisco schooner Casco arrived here last evening. She is ostensibly a sealer, but if the truth were known she is a second Halcyon in smuggling. She has been out fourteen days, but had no sealskins. Her agent here is named Stewart, a noted smuggler. About two weeks ago the little steamer Mystery, which runs to Clayoquot, on the West Coast, carried away four tons of opium, and it was stated after the steamer left that it was going to the schooner Casco. Stewart and one companion came ashore as soon as she dropped anchor. Captain Folger, who commands the boat, said he had no sealskins. Stewart evidently joined the Casco at Clayoquot, as he was here since she left San Francisco. The schooner carries a Japanese crew.

REPORTED MURDER.

S. W. Kamaka, of South Kona, Hawaii, has been arrested for the murder of his step-daughter, 10 years old, on January 30. The story is that he struck her twice with a club because she had taken a piece of the fresh meat left for the evening meal before he had come home. Then that Kamaka buried the girl behind his house and threatened to kill his family if they revealed his crime. The secret came out through enquiries of the school teacher about the girl, made to her brother attending school. Kamaka is in custody.

SUCCESS OF THE BALLOT LAW.

The practical working of the Aus-
tralian ballot system in the munic-
ipal elections of Monday disappoint
all the predictions of its enemies,
that it would prove clumsy and un-
workable in practice. So far from
presenting any difficulties or making
any confusion the election was every-
where noted for its quiet and smooth
working of the system. "Complete
satisfaction" is the report from
Healdsburg; "worked splendidly,"
says Redding; "gave general satis-
faction," comes from Ukiah; "more
than pleased with its working," says
Monterey; "worked with entire
satisfaction," reports San Jose, and
so on through the list.

There was, indeed, no reason to
suppose that the Australian ballot
system would work any differently
in California than in other States.
Everywhere it has been adopted it
has proved a smooth and expeditious
method of voting and has put an end
to some of the most open abuses of
elections. No particular acuteness
is required of a voter. If he knows
his own name, the name of the man
and the party he wants to vote for,
and has intelligence enough to stamp
a cross opposite the name on the bal-
lot he will have no trouble.

The system abolishes the ticket
peddler, puts an end to the assess-
ments for printing and distributing
ballots and makes the "worker" at
the polls a superfluous person. The
only employees a party may legiti-
mately have are the challengers and
the watchers of the count.

With proper care on the part of
officers and citizens, the system of-
fers a secret ballot that would put an
end to vote-buying. The system can
be beaten only by the collusion of
election officers and the carelessness
of challengers and the police. It is
probable that an attempt will be
made in this city to buy votes and
break the secrecy of the ballot
through the provision allowing an
officer of the election board to assist
an illiterate in marking his ballot.
A suitable reward offered for the ar-
rest and conviction of such offenders
will result in speedily landing in jail
everybody who tries that trick.

The new ballot system has every-
where proved its excellence and it
will put elections in this State on an
honest basis.—S. F. Examiner.

THE NICARAGUA CONVENTION.

Governor Markham has complied
with the request of the Nicaragua
Canal Convention recently held in
this city, and has issued a call for a
National Nicaragua Canal Con-
vention, to meet at St. Louis on June 2d.
The call is issued in the form of a re-
quest to the Governors of the States
and Territories to appoint two dele-
gates for every Senator, Representative
or Delegate in Congress to attend
on the date mentioned. The request
of the California convention that the
delegates be appointed equally from
the two political parties is repeated,
and the Governor states that the call
for the convention is not only by re-
quest of the convention, but "agree-
ably to his own feelings."

The prompt acquiescence of Gov-
ernor Markham in the plan of the
convention is gratifying. The invita-
tion to the Governors has been is-
sued in time to give ample opportu-
nity for the selection of representative
citizens from all the States and Ter-
ritories. It is to be hoped that no
Governor will neglect to make the
necessary appointments. No State
should be unrepresented at the St.
Louis convention. No State can fail
to be benefited by the construction of
the Nicaragua canal, and none should
hold back from an effort to have it
completed.

The Nicaragua canal is the great-
est work of the latter part of the
century. It will be the greatest aid
to commerce between the Atlantic
and Pacific States that could be se-
cured. Millions of tons of products
that are now not exchanged on ac-
count of the high transcontinental
freight rates will be sent through it.
The trade of the Pacific that now
goes to England will pass to the
United States through the shortening
of the ocean route. The disadvantage
that is now against New York and
New Orleans will then be against
London, and even in greater propor-
tion.

Every State is interested in the en-
terprise and all should be represent-
ed at St. Louis.—S. F. Examiner.

A RUN ON P'S.

An Eastern exchange tells its read-
ers how to mind their "P's" in the
following paragraph: "Persons who
patronize papers should pay prompt-
ly, for the pecuniary prospects of the
press possess a peculiar power in
pushing forward public prosperity.
If the printer is paid promptly, and
his pocketbook kept plenteous by
prompt paying patrons, he puts his
pen to his paper in peace; his para-
graphs are more pointed; he paints
his pictures of passing events in more
pleasing colors, and the perusal of
his paper is a pleasure to the people.
Paste this piece of proverbial philo-
sophy in some place where all per-
sons can perceive it."

ENGLISH SAILORS.

Montreal, April 11.—Canadian
Pacific authorities have received a
cablegram to the effect that 250
sailors and marines destined for the
Pacific squadron, would sail on the
steamer Carthagenian from Liverpool
for Halifax. From there they will
take the Canadian Pacific special
train, which will leave at once for the
Pacific coast. It is believed the pre-
sent detachment is being sent over
to reinforce the crews already doing
duty in Pacific waters.
