THE CENSUS OF 1884.

Through the kindness of Mr. F. L. Clarke, Superintendent of the Census of 1884, we are enabled to give some particulars of that important work. The simultaneous method has been adopted, whereby it is designed to enumerate all the inhabitants of the Kingdom on a particular day. That day is to be the 26th of December instant. Twenty-six agents of the Superintendent have been appointed by the President of the Board of Education, one for each electoral district. These will appoint, according to the amount of work to be done in their respective districts, sub-agents to assist them.

A few days previous to the 26th a blank, with columns for all the kinds of information desired, will be left at every house to be filled by the householder. On the 27th of December the sub-agents will begin collecting the blanks, and are obliged to see that they are made out correctly. The agent, on receiving all the blanks from the sub-agents, will summarize their contents in a blank provided for the purpose, which he must send to the Superintendent. He must also preserve the blanks from which he makes out his table, until the receipt and acceptance of his returns shall have been acknowledged by the Superintendent, and until he shall have received instructions as to the disposition to be made of the blanks. The agents shall arrange with the sub-agents for the amount of compensation to be given them for their

Inter-island vessels are to be supplied with blanks to be filled in cases where they are not in port on the night of the 26th. Besides the regular blanks, for English-speaking and Hawaiian people, special forms have been prepared in the Chinese and Portuguese languages, respectively. Senor Canavarro, the Portuguese Commissioner, has kindly volunteered to address the blanks to his countrymen in the Kingdom.

Each blank is to contain an enumeration, with particulars of age, sex, condition, occupation and religion, of those who sleep in each domicile where it is left, on the night of December 26th. It is of the utmost importance that the census shall be accurate, and it becomes the whole people to cheerfully facilitate the work as they best can. The Superintendent seems to have planned the operation well, and if all his subordinates do their duty a very complete census should be the result.

SANTA CLAUSLAND.

(Special Correspondence of the BULLETIN.) Feasting is one of the principal industries in Santa Clausland, and the traders are very eager to supply the viands. One of the most popular dishes in this part of the empire is called poi. It is made of the taro bulb, usually by pounding in a mortar with stones. Nothing is more wholesome and nutritious as regular diet, and no festive board here can be bountcously laid without a calabash full of it in the centre. Some fastidious people have not taken kindly to this dish, from their suspicions that the mode of manufacture did not ensure cleanliness. So that none need be without poi, however, a skilful artificer has invented a machine for making it, and the product, absolutely clean and inviting to the daintiest palate, is sold by a Mr. F. B. Oat, whose place is in | 891

the Pacific Navigation Company's building, Queen street. No one can give a feast to friends from parts of Bank of California, S. F. the empire where poi is unknown, which shall be complete without the native dish of this region.

All over the empire the most palatable fish is acknowledged by a majority to be the salmon. No place yields better salmon than the Columbia river, Oregon. Mr. E. P. Adams, a renowned auctioneer of these parts, has on hand a supply of this year's catch of that stream's red salmon. No Christmas table can be complete without some of this fish, and it is no wonder that the store where they are got is thronged with people buying it up like hot cakes.

The shop of Messrs. H. Hackfeld & Co., one of the largest firms in this place, is where many of the traders go to get their supplies of all kinds of provisions at wholesale. One of their specialties is Australian preserved beef, which is at once a necessary and a luxury.

Messrs. Wolfe & Edwards keep a large grocery and provision store at the corner of King and Nuuanu streets. They have such a large and diversified stock on hand at all times that one would think, to look in from the street, that they had scarce room enough to turn round in. Nevertheless they are able to accommodate a large custom, by good arrangement and prompt attendance. It would be impossible to tell in this letter all that they sell. But just name any article in their line, and you may call for it at their shop with assurance that it will be supplied. They receive groceries and provisions by every steamer.

Mr. Wm. McCandless, 6 Queen street, and Mr. Ed. G. Waller, who has a shop on King and one on Punchbowl street, supply most of the people with all kinds of fresh meat, fish and vegetables.

There is one establishment here that would leave a serious blank upon many festive boards if it was blotted *out. That is the Pioneer Steam Candy Factory and Bakery of Mr. F. Horn. It can furnish a whole feast to order, or supply the national dishes of Santa Clausland separately, such as plum pudding with rich sauce, all kinds of cakes, plain and ornamented, rich mince pies, and the meat to make the latter when it is desired to make them at home. His place is the leading source of supply for sweetmeats distributed by the Emperor in the children's stockings the night before Christmas.

Probably the most enterprising grocers here are Messrs. Lewis & Co., Hotel street. You cannot imagine a dainty or a luxury from any quarter of the globe, which is capable of transportation in any form, that cannot be obtained in their shop. The variety of fruits they obtain by every steamer makes their shop suggestive of a California fruit exhibition. Their establishment is positively essential to the proper administration of Santa Clausland affairs in this quarter.

For the lone, lorn bachelors and cognate characters, out alone in the cold, cold world, the best apology for a home Christmas keeping is to be found in the Beaver (temperance) Saloon of Mr. H. J. Nolte, and the same gentleman's Casino in a neighboring park. Victims of the "vile weed" can also get their consolation in his varied stock of tobacco and cigars, and dry characters slake their thirst at his fountain. Mr. Robert Donnolly keeps a place he calls "The Fountain," at 123 Fort street, where persons can treat each other to anything in the smoke or temperate and wholesome beverage line. And this is one of the customs of the land which blooms particularly on Christmas Day.

This morning Mr. Lucas formally handed over the new building in the Government yard to the Government. It is a most substantial and thoroughly finished structure within and without, and an ornament to the locality.

A young half white man who arrived from Mahukona last week stands six feet five inches high. Wonder how the weather is up near the regions of his head.

Musically inclined Kala, who deprived John Kea of the use of his Stradavarius violin by purloining it, had his case brought up this morning, and was further remanded.

MR. A. Kraft, the well-known ieweller and optician, has removed his place of business, next to Waterhouse's store, where he will be pleased to see all his old customers, and new ones too.

THE S.S. Mariposa after leaving her dock got stuck in the mud, and it was a quarter before one o'clock before she got away. The freight list is good, but she does not carry many passengers.*

Messas. Bishop & Co. request that in future all accounts against them, whether owed by them personally, or as trustees, guardians, executors or agents, be presented at the end of each month.

THE largest shippers of sugar by the Mariposa were:-Irwin & Co., 11,123 bags; Schaefer & Co., 5,-695 bags; Brewer & Co., 4,107 bags; Grinbaum & Co., 2,517 bags; Davies & Co., 1,721 bags.

CAPT. John H. Brown, agent of the Board of Health, wishes that persons would not take their dead horses out into the harbor and leave them there. A notification to him would be properly attended to, and prevent the horrid smells which proceed from that vicinity with a south wind.

A Christmas dinner is a very important item. Of course the piece de resistance will be a turkey. S. J. Levey & Co. will have for sale a quantity of choice turkeys, ready dressed, on ice, to arrive by the Alameda, Dec. 22nd. By the same steamer they will also receive a large and varied stock of choice groceries and Xmas goods.

THE lumber for the new quarantine ground has been ordered to-day. The first thing done will be to erect a strong fence round the lot, which contains about three acres. A place will also be erected for diseased animals, and when they are shot they will be properly buried. The prompt action in this matter is very commendable.

LETTERS have been received from four different Portuguese on the Naalehu Plantation, Hawaii, complaining that the manager puts difficulties in the way of their ordering goods from Honolulu, so as to compel them to buy from his store. He refuses to issue plantation orders, and when the laborers do manage to get anything from Honolulu, he imposes a sort of duty. Surely this is not just.

THE mail for America and Europe by the Stmr. Mariposa to-day was unusually heavy, and comprised 6,305 letters and 1,913 papers and packages, many of which came from the other Islands. This morning over 2,500 letters and papers were posted at the office, many of them being left without stamps, some people seeming to think it the duty of the Post Office to affix their stamps. In other countries, the custom is for the writer to affix the necessary stamp himself on his correspondence.

WHILE a crew of the Myrtle Boat Club were out in their boat "Red, White & Blue," yesterday afternoon, they came across three sharks feeding on dead horses near the Spar Buoy. One of them was about fifteen feet long, and just as this monster was going to swallow a large piece of meat, Fred. Wundenberg struck him with a harpoon near the fin, driving the weapon into him nearly up to the handle. The brute let the meat go and started off, but had not got far when unfortunately the rope broke, and he was free. It was hardly possible for him to live long. There are too- many sharks in the harbor, attracted by dead horses. The latter ought to be taken further out to sea.

THE opening of the new skating rink on Saturday night was a success in every respect. There were four dozen pairs of skates on the floor, and over 150 people present. Skates were in so great a demand, that as soon as anyone took them off they were given to another. The floor is

perfect and the skates are good. Several natives, who were never on skates before and seeing how easy it was to manœuvre, were very anxious to try, and they did. One of them, a man not weighing less than 200 lbs., having strapped on his skates was assisted to the floor. He stood erect and smiled, and then-biff, bang! he sat down and took them off. Such ludicrous actions of the beginners and the unmerciful bumps they received afforded much laughter for the spectators. Mr. Wall expects two dozen pairs of skates by the Alameda, and then he will be better prepared to supply the demand.
